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1 [REDACTED]: We are on the record.

2 Today is September 11, 2024, and this is a
3 transcribed interview of [REDACTED].

4 House Resolution 1367 directed this Task
5 Force to investigate and facts and circumstances of
6 the attempted assassination of Donald J. Trump on
7 July 13, 2024, in Butler, Pennsylvania. Pursuant
8 to House Resolution 1367, Chairman Kelly and
9 Ranking Member Crow have requested this interview
10 as part of the Task Force's investigation.

11 BY [REDACTED]:

12 Q. Can the witness please state their name and
13 spell their last name for the record.

14 A. Sure. [REDACTED].

15 [REDACTED].

16 Q. Thank you, ma'am. My name is [REDACTED]
17 [REDACTED], and I'm a Senior Counsel with the Majority
18 on the Task Force. I want to thank you for coming
19 in today for this interview. The Task Force
20 appreciates that you're here voluntarily. You're
21 allowed to have an attorney present today to advise
22 you during this interview.

23 Do you have an attorney representing you
24 in a personal capacity present with you today?

25 A. No.

[REDACTED]: Next, starting with the Majority and then the Minority, can the additional Staff Members please introduce themselves with their name, title, and affiliation?

[REDACTED]: [REDACTED], Senior Professional Staff Member, Task Force Majority.

[REDACTED]: [REDACTED], Investigative Counsel, Task Force Minority.

[REDACTED]: Thank you, all.

BY [REDACTED]:

Q. So, ma'am, before we begin, I'd like to just go over the ground rules for the interview. The interview will proceed as follows: The Majority and Minority Staff will alternate asking you questions 30 minutes per side per round until each side is finished with their questioning. The Majority Staff will begin and proceed for 30 minutes, and then the Minority Staff will have 30 minutes to ask questions. We will then alternate back and forth in this manner until both sides have no more questions.

If either side is in the middle of a specific line of questions, it may choose to end a

few minutes past 30 minutes to ensure the completion of that specific line of questioning, including any pertinent followups. In this interview, while one member of the Staff for each side may lead the questioning, additional Staff may ask questions.

There is a court reporter taking down everything I say and everything you say to make a written record of this interview. For the record to be clear, please wait until the Staff Member questioning you has finished each question before you begin your answer, and the Staff Member will wait until you finished your response before proceeding to the next question.

Further, to ensure that the court reporter can properly record this interview, please speak clearly, concisely, and slowly. The court reporter cannot record nonverbal answers such as nodding or shaking your head, so it is important that you answer each question with an audible verbal answer; do you understand?

A. Yes, I do.

Q. We want you to answer our questions in the most complete and truthful manner possible, so we will take our time. If you have any questions or

do not fully understand the question, please let us know. We will attempt to clarify, add context to, or rephrase our questions; do you understand?

A. Yes.

Q. If we ask you about specific conversations or events in the past and you are unable to recall the exact words or details, you should testify to the substance of those conversations or events to the best of your recollection. If you recall only a part of a conversation or event, you should give us your best recollection of those events or parts of conversations that you do recall; do you understand?

A. Yes, I do.

Q. Although you are here voluntarily and you are not under oath -- we will not swear you in -- you are required pursuant to 18 USC 1001 to answer questions from Congress truthfully. This also applies to questions posed by Congressional Staff in an interview; do you understand?

A. Yes, I do.

Q. If at any time you knowingly make false statements, you could be subject to criminal prosecution; do you understand?

A. Yes, I do.

1 Q. Is there any reason you are unable to
2 provide truthful testimony in today's interview?

3 A. No.

4 Q. Please note that if you wish to assert any
5 privilege over a statement today, that that
6 assertion must apply to the rules of the U.S. House
7 of Representatives. For the Chair to consider
8 assertions of privilege over testimony or
9 statements, witnesses or entities must clearly
10 state the specific privilege being asserted and the
11 reason for the assertion on or before the scheduled
12 date of testimony or appearance; do you understand?

13 A. Yes.

14 Q. Finally, I'd like to note that the content
15 of what we discuss here today is confidential. We
16 ask that you not speak about what we discuss here
17 today in this interview to any outside individual
18 in order to preserve the integrity of this
19 investigation. For the same reasons, any marked
20 exhibits that are used today will be provided to
21 the court reporter so that they may go in the
22 official transcript, and any copies of those
23 exhibits will be returned to us when we wrap up.

24 We plan to take a five-minute break at
25 the end of each of the 30 minutes of questioning,

1 but if you need a longer break before that, please
2 let us know and we will be happy to accommodate
3 you. However, to the extent that there is a
4 pending question, we would ask that you finish
5 answering the question before we take a break; do
6 you understand?

7 A. Yes.

8 Q. Do you have any other questions before we
9 begin?

10 A. No, ma'am.

11 [REDACTED]: It is now 9:09 a.m. The
12 Majority Staff will begin its questioning.

13 EXAMINATION

14 BY [REDACTED]:

15 Q. Ma'am, how long have you worked at the
16 Beaver County ESU?

17 A. From 2018.

18 Q. And how long have you been in your current
19 role?

20 A. Since 2018.

21 Q. How long have you worked in an emergency
22 services role?

23 A. That would be since 2014.

24 Q. What are your daily responsibilities in
25 your present role?

1 A. Well, if we get a call for a warrant or an
2 emergency situation, I then go out as a medic. And
3 if we get a debrief before, we go over that
4 debrief, going over the situation itself: Our
5 resources; any resources we need to then call in
6 for. Also an exit plan from a medical standpoint:
7 What the next step would be and how to care for
8 that individual; or if it's a mass casualty, then
9 the individuals that are present at that situation.

10 Q. Thank you. Let's move to advanced planning
11 prior to July 13 and the campaign rally. When did
12 you first learn that the Former President as coming
13 to Butler?

14 A. I want to say it was, at most, three or
15 four days prior to the event and that we would be
16 participating in that event.

17 Q. How did you learn of that?

18 A. There was a text that went out to our team
19 saying that they were asking for one medic to go
20 and then other resources, which would be the
21 operators that were going.

22 Q. Who sent that text message?

23 A. My text message came from my team leader,
24 the medic team leader, who is [REDACTED].

25 Q. Thank you. And were you offered any

1 overtime or comp time?

2 A. I -- no, it was not overtime. I may have
3 been paid through Medic Rescue, who is my
4 sponsoring agency when I go out with the Beaver
5 County ESU.

6 Q. Were you involved in any advanced planning
7 prior to July 13?

8 A. No, ma'am.

9 Q. Did anyone from Beaver County ESU
10 participate in any advanced planning activities?

11 A. To my knowledge, no.

12 Q. Did your team lead, to your knowledge,
13 participate in any advanced planning activities?

14 A. No, ma'am.

15 Q. Did the U.S. Secret Service provide any
16 briefings to Beaver ESU prior to July 13?

17 A. No.

18 Q. Were you surprised by this?

19 A. Yes.

20 Q. Could you describe why you were surprised
21 that they didn't provide any briefing?

22 A. I think a visit by an individual, whether
23 it's a current president or former president, is a
24 large event. And given the state of everything in
25 the nation right now, it's just concerning that

1 there wasn't more of a plan, especially going into
2 -- I was asked by -- during one of my interviews if
3 I even knew what the medical plan was for that day,
4 and I had no -- there was no plan.

5 Q. And, thank you, ma'am. We will go delve a
6 bit deeper into that. Did anyone at any juncture
7 request that the Secret Service come and brief for
8 anything?

9 A. To my knowledge, no.

10 Q. So you had mentioned the lack of planning,
11 ma'am, and we'll return to that. Just a few more
12 questions.

13 Did the Butler County ESU provide Beaver
14 County with any advanced planning or operational
15 materials?

16 A. Not prior to that -- excuse me, I misspoke.
17 I believe that there may have been a map of the
18 location sent prior to us showing up on the scene
19 that day in Butler. That may have only been 24
20 hours to 48 hours before, but, again, I'm not sure
21 about that because I did not see anything.

22 Q. Thank you. And did you receive any
23 advanced planning or operational materials from
24 local law enforcement?

25 A. Prior to that day, no.

1 Q. Okay. Did the Secret Service provide
2 Beaver ESU with any advanced planning or
3 operational materials?

4 A. To my knowledge, no.

5 Q. Did the Secret Service provide Beaver ESU
6 with any assignments?

7 A. I am not sure where our assignments came
8 from, at least from where my position was at that
9 day.

10 Q. Prior to July 13, ma'am, did you do any
11 walkthroughs of the campaign rally location?

12 A. No.

13 Q. Did anybody at Beaver ESU request to do so?

14 A. No. Not to -- well, excuse me, not to my
15 knowledge.

16 Q. Okay. Did any discussion of the AGR
17 Building come up in any advanced planning
18 conversations or any conversations prior to July
19 13?

20 A. To our knowledge, no.

21 Q. Were you aware of any conversations
22 regarding the day-of communications between the
23 Secret Service and local law enforcement?

24 A. Prior to that day? No.

25 Q. Yes.

1 A. Yes? And no. No, I am not aware of that.

2 Q. Okay; thank you. So turning to the day of
3 the campaign rally, July 13, ma'am, you had just
4 previously stated on the record that there was no
5 plan. If we could just start off, can you briefly
6 discuss a timeline of events for that day,
7 including any operational briefings that may have
8 occurred?

9 A. I believe we arrived on scene -- and I
10 don't have my timeline with me, so I will try to
11 approximate. I believe the briefing for us was to
12 begin at 9:00 a.m. at the FOP lodge on the site for
13 the rally at the Butler Farm Ground. That briefing
14 was led by the Butler County ESU, one of their
15 commanders. It was a slideshow. We did not have
16 the printout of that slideshow. It was just gone
17 over on the screen.

18 In that meeting, present was Butler
19 County ESU representatives, Washington County ESU
20 representatives, ourselves -- Beaver County ESU.
21 There may have been some state troopers there, but
22 they were not participating. They were in the back
23 of the room, and I believe there may have only been
24 one or two there.

25 During that briefing, they, in my

1 opinion, glossed over a lot. There was kind of a
2 lot of flipping of slides but not truly reading
3 through, which differs from how we do debriefing
4 through Beaver County ESU. How it felt was just,
5 "Okay, this is where you're going to be. Have fun
6 today."

7 There was no discussion from my
8 perspective as a medical provider. There was no
9 discussion of where the medical tents were, how
10 many medical providers were actually there, and
11 what the plan was for a mass casualty should one
12 occur.

13 Q. Would you characterize this, ma'am, as a
14 deviation from standard procedure?

15 A. From how we do things, yes, ma'am.

16 Q. When you say "we," could you please clarify
17 who "we" is?

18 A. Yes. Beaver County ESU.

19 Q. Who was leading that briefing that morning?

20 A. It was one of the Butler commanders. I had
21 thought it was someone, but I was told that that's
22 not who it was. I was told it was [REDACTED], last
23 name [REDACTED], but I was told that is not who that
24 was. So I was mistaken, his identity, and I just
25 honestly do not know his name.

1 Q. Thank you.

2 [REDACTED]: I'd like to mark and
3 introduce as Majority Exhibit 1 the Butler ESU
4 Donald J. Trump Detail.

5 BY [REDACTED]:

6 Q. Ma'am, do you recognize this slideshow?

7 A. Yes.

8 Q. Okay. And is this the presentation that
9 was given the morning of July 13?

10 A. I believe so. Again, they went through
11 this pretty quickly, but this looks familiar. It's
12 what we went over that day.

13 Q. Okay. Ma'am, I know there are no page
14 numbers. If you flip to the sixth, the execution
15 where there's a timeline of events that's listed --

16 A. Yes.

17 Q. -- do you see the 0915 hours?

18 A. Yes. At the bottom, yes.

19 Q. Okay. I'm not sure that we're looking at
20 the same --

21 [REDACTED]: It's the next page.

22 [REDACTED]: Oh, yes. Got it.

23 [REDACTED]: Thank you, ma'am.

24 BY [REDACTED]:

25 Q. Ma'am, if you could take a moment just to

1 review this timeline of events, would you say that
2 this is an accurate reflection of the execution
3 that occurred that day?

4 A. From our standpoint, yes, with the
5 exception that I know Former President Trump was
6 running late, so some of these times when it came
7 to when he arrived and when he started his speech,
8 those were -- those differ.

9 Q. And, ma'am, I'd like to drill down a bit
10 further in terms of what you had described as a
11 lack of instruction, planning, and direction. It
12 is our understanding that you thought that it was
13 someone from Butler County that had given the
14 briefing that morning.

15 A. Yes.

16 Q. Who else was present at the briefing?

17 A. It was representatives from Butler County
18 ESU that would be present that day, Washington
19 County Emergency Services Unit -- the
20 representatives from that group that were present
21 that day -- and then also ourselves, Beaver County
22 ESU. Then, like I said, I believe that there were
23 some state troopers in the background, but I think
24 there were only two of those individuals there. I
25 am not sure what their -- they really did not

1 participate in the discussion. They were, again,
2 just in the background.

3 Q. So PSP was present?

4 A. I believe so, yes.

5 Q. Okay. Was the Secret Service present at
6 this briefing?

7 A. Not to my knowledge.

8 Q. Okay. At any time during this briefing,
9 was there any attempt by Beaver ESU to seek
10 clarification as to job responsibilities or duties
11 for that day?

12 A. It seemed that our jobs were clearly
13 identified from our perspective. So when I say
14 "our," the Beaver County ESU. We were positioned
15 at the main entrance where the bystanders would be
16 coming -- I shouldn't say bystanders -- the
17 attendees of the rally would be entering. We were
18 just to stay there and basically tuck in and only
19 respond to any emergency events that occurred.

20 Q. In terms of an emergency event, how would
21 you become informed of such an emergency?

22 A. There were radios that we were supposed to
23 pick up once we left the briefing at the Butler
24 County Command Post, and we drove past that as we
25 went to our position. We received two radios, I

believe. One was given to Commander [REDACTED], the other one was given to Sgt. [REDACTED]. One was supposed to be for, to my understanding, a command radio. The other one was supposed to be for a patrol radio.

Q. Was there discussion amongst Beaver ESU regarding concerns about a lack of a plan or instruction or direction?

A. At that time it seemed -- at the briefing it seemed as if the plan seemed reasonable. Although they did go through the briefing very quickly, it seemed like the plan was reasonable. I don't think we realized what we were getting into until we got to our post.

[REDACTED]: Can you just go down a little further what you mean when you say you didn't know what you were getting into until you got to your post?

[REDACTED]: What I mean by that is we -- at an event like that that we've participated in before, there's much more patrol support. When we got to our post -- which, again, was at the entrance where everybody would be coming in from the parking lot -- I would have expected patrol presence to be there and there was none.

1 We ended up having to actually be
2 involved in some incidents that occurred at that
3 entrance there. One was a disagreement between to
4 vendors. Another were two medical emergencies that
5 occurred. And, really, that was not -- although we
6 are more than happy to help, that was not meant to
7 be our position.

8 BY [REDACTED]:

9 Q. Okay. And was there a separate medical
10 plan that was given to you, ma'am, that morning?

11 A. No, ma'am.

12 Q. Is that typical to receive such a medical
13 plan with events of this size?

14 A. I would hope that if we ran an event and
15 the events that -- well, I shouldn't say the
16 events. The operations that I've been on, we
17 always put in a medical plan that includes who was
18 there. I was present, so the medical providers
19 that are present, whether it's a physician, all the
20 way down to an EMT or first responder or
21 firefighter. We also know what our hospitals are
22 that we're going to evacuate to; where our landing
23 zones are; and if there's a mass casualty, where
24 the casualty collection points will be and who may
25 be responsible for running those, too.

1 Q. Thank you. Two quick questions, and then
2 we can kind of move forward here. Was it Beaver
3 ESU's understanding that Butler County ESU was
4 taking the lead, or what was the impression that
5 day in terms of, you know, who was sort of leading?

6 A. My impression after that briefing was that
7 Butler County ESU was the in-charge agency.

8 Q. Okay. And, ma'am, thank you for the
9 helpful details with respect to once you arrived on
10 the scene and your impressions as you arrived. At
11 any juncture did you ask for backup or additional
12 personnel to arrive?

13 A. We asked for -- when those situations
14 occurred, the interaction or the altercation
15 between the two vendors and the two medical
16 emergencies that occurred right in front of us, we
17 did ask for some patrol to show up, which one
18 sheriff officer showed up, and that was it with
19 regard to the altercation between the two
20 individuals.

21 The two medical emergencies that we had,
22 we were able to get first responders that, again, I
23 didn't know that were there. They showed up in an
24 ATV to remove -- or not remove, help these
25 individuals to a medical tent that was on the --

1 later I found out there was a medical tent on the
2 opposite side of where we were located.

3 Q. When you say you later found this out, can
4 you clarify? Does this mean you were previously
5 unaware that there had been a tent --

6 A. Correct.

7 Q. -- located in the location?

8 A. I was not aware that it was there.

9 Q. What was your initial understanding or
10 knowledge of where the medical tents were located?

11 A. I was not aware -- one of the -- during the
12 briefing, there was no mention of a medical tent
13 that I am aware of. I don't remember hearing that.
14 I don't recall that. We had a Butler County medic
15 that was put in with us, integrated with us, and he
16 was kind of letting me know his understanding of
17 the medical plan. His last name is [REDACTED].

18 He was letting me know, "Oh, there's a
19 medical tent on the opposite side of the farm
20 grounds where we are." And, to my knowledge, there
21 was only one physician that was present there,
22 which kind a surprised me as well.

23 [REDACTED]: For [REDACTED], do you know
24 his first name? I believe there may have been a
25 couple [REDACTED].

1 [REDACTED]: There's [REDACTED] and
2 then there's -- I want to say his name is [REDACTED],
3 [REDACTED].

4 BY [REDACTED]:

5 Q. And then, ma'am, do you feel that the
6 backup that did eventually show up, was that
7 sufficient to address your concerns?

8 A. For those incidents that occurred at the
9 entrance, yes.

10 Q. Okay. And we'll revert back to the
11 presence of only one physician.

12 A. Yes.

13 Q. Thank you. Did you see or have access to
14 any operational plans from the Secret Service?

15 A. No.

16 Q. Did you see or have access to any
17 operational plans from other law enforcement
18 agencies?

19 A. Other than Butler County, no.

20 Q. The day of the rally, July 13, were ESU
21 members, to your knowledge, supposed to meet with
22 the Secret Service?

23 A. Not to my knowledge.

24 Q. The day of July 13, was the Secret Service
25 supposed to provide a face-to-face briefing to

1 Beaver ESU members?

2 A. To the -- I believe to the snipers, yes.

3 We were -- our group that was at the entrance, no.

4 There was no discussion of that.

5 Q. And to your knowledge, ma'am, did the

6 Beaver County ESU snipers ever receive that

7 briefing from the Secret Service?

8 A. Not to my knowledge, no.

9 Q. And did anyone ever explain why not?

10 A. Not to my knowledge, no.

11 Q. At any point in time on July 13, was there

12 any information shared with you by the Secret

13 Service regarding how to communicate with them if

14 you needed to alert them of something?

15 A. I don't think that was directly -- excuse

16 me. I think in the briefing it was mentioned that

17 the Secret Service would be either present in the

18 Command Post or the Command Post would have access

19 to the Secret Service, and then that would be the

20 hub of communication, the Command Post.

21 Q. So, ma'am, if you needed to communicate

22 with the Secret Service, what would you have done?

23 A. I would have spoken to my commander,

24 Commander [REDACTED], who was on the scene that day, and

25 let him know we have a situation. Can he please

1 alert -- if it was needed, to talk to the Secret
2 Service. Then he would relay that to the Command
3 Post, and they would, in turn, be able to relay
4 that to the Secret Service.

5 Q. Do you feel as though that indirect
6 reporting mechanism was problematic insofar as an
7 emergency would be concerned?

8 A. How -- I did not think so, because when we
9 have done -- again, "we" being Beaver County ESU --
10 have done events in the past, our Command Post
11 typically has commanders from each representative
12 agency as well as -- if state police are there,
13 they are there as well as Secret -- someone from
14 Secret Service is there. In order to facilitate
15 that communication, we also have our own
16 dispatchers there, too.

17 Q. Thank you, ma'am. And did you at any time
18 attempt to make contact with the Secret Service on
19 July 13?

20 A. Me personally, no, ma'am.

21 Q. Okay. So we'll turn to the operational
22 period of July 13 now. Turning to your assignment,
23 ma'am, what was your assignment for that day?

24 A. Our assignment was to be posted at the
25 entrance of the farm grounds where everybody would

1 be kind of filtering in to get to the magnetometers
2 that were on the opposite side of where we were.
3 Our job was told to us that we were just to, again,
4 tuck into our post and remain there unless we were
5 called up for an emergency situation.

6 Q. If you could please describe for us, what
7 was your assigned area of coverage?

8 A. We were at the, again, main entrance of the
9 farm grounds. They were by the livestock barn. I
10 also understand that if there was an event or --
11 event -- an incident to occur in the parking lot,
12 we were to respond to there as well.

13 Q. How were you given your assignment?

14 A. It was given to us at the briefing that day
15 and shown to us on the -- we did get a map that was
16 handed to us with -- I think it may be in here --
17 with a couple different colored blocks saying this
18 is where you're going to be posted.

19 Q. Thank you, ma'am. And who gave your
20 assignment to you that day?

21 A. Butler County ESU.

22 Q. Was there a specific individual?

23 A. It was the individual leading the event,
24 and, I'm sorry, I don't know his name.

25 Q. That's all right.

1 A. It was one of the commanders there.

2 Q. Thank you. And just to reiterate here, are
3 you aware of any assignments made to Beaver County
4 ESU members by the U.S. Secret Service?

5 A. Not that I'm aware, no.

6 Q. Ma'am, what time did you get to your
7 assigned post?

8 A. Approximately, maybe 9:30. Not much after
9 the briefing. The briefing was, again, very brief.
10 So I want to say it was around 9:30, but that's a
11 very approximate time.

12 Q. Thank you. What instructions were you
13 given about your assignment?

14 A. Just that we were supposed to stay there
15 unless we were called up, and really not to --
16 we're not charged with manning that gate or doing
17 any kind of policing of that gate.

18 Q. Was there a dedicated group of staff at
19 Beaver ESU that was assigned to respond to any
20 emergencies that arose at the rally?

21 A. It was basically ourselves, the group that
22 we had there. We had -- I would be rough-counting
23 the number of individuals that were with us, but I
24 want to say there were six of us: Commander [REDACTED],
25 [REDACTED].

1 And there was one individual that left -- and I
2 can't think of his name -- but he was there very
3 briefly. He had to leave for something else, so he
4 had to go.

5 Q. Thank you, ma'am. What other law
6 enforcement or other individuals were at your
7 assigned post?

8 A. The only other person that was there that
9 was not a part of Beaver County ESU was that medic
10 that was with us, so [REDACTED].

11 Q. Okay. So just to clarify for the record,
12 no Secret Service was at the post. No PSP was at
13 the post.

14 A. No, ma'am.

15 Q. Okay. Did you assist with Team 400 at all?

16 A. I'm not sure who Team 400 is.

17 Q. Okay. That's okay.

18 A. I do -- do you mind if I add one thing?

19 Q. Go ahead.

20 A. There was a Homeland Security officer that
21 was running a gate near us, but he was mostly
22 sitting in his car. He was basically just charged
23 with letting individuals that were coming from
24 behind the stage area -- I'm not sure who they
25 were. Sometimes we saw that they were Secret

Service. Sometimes it seemed like they were Homeland Security. They were just -- he was just opening the gate for them to let them through back and forth.

[REDACTED]: How did you know he was Homeland Security?

[REDACTED]: He actually came over and introduced himself, and he had a vest on that said HSI on it.

[REDACTED]: Do you remember his name?

[REDACTED]: No, I do not, but I probably would recognize him if I was shown a picture. I'd recognize who he is.

BY [REDACTED]:

Q. Did he describe what his responsibilities were?

A. He did not, no.

Q. So to clarify for the record, this DHS HSI individual came up and introduced himself but did not go over why he was present at the rally or what his duties were that day?

A. Not to my knowledge, no.

Q. Once at your assigned post, ma'am, how did you communicate with others from Beaver ESU?

A. So we have our own radios that we had

1 brought that we -- at the time when we were sitting
2 there, we didn't need to use. But when we went
3 down -- which I'm sure we're going to talk about
4 later -- when we went down to the stage, that's how
5 we were communicating with each other.

6 While we were at our post, however, we
7 would talk amongst ourselves as we were sitting
8 there, and then also [REDACTED], who was a sniper
9 who was on the other side of the fairgrounds. We
10 communicated with him through text.

11 Q. So you had mentioned that you were using
12 text to communicate.

13 A. Yes.

14 Q. Was it common to use text to communicate
15 important information rather than relaying over the
16 radio?

17 A. Because we did not have access to radios to
18 communicate with other individuals, yes. The other
19 individuals being the other teams.

20 Q. So, ma'am, is it fair to say that, as you
21 did not have any radios, you were not privy to any
22 radio traffic that was going on amongst law
23 enforcement?

24 A. I was not personally. Commander [REDACTED] and
25 Sgt. [REDACTED] did have access to the patrol radio and

the command radio, so they could hear some traffic that was going on.

Q. Were you concerned that you had no access to communications that were going on over the radio?

A. Typically -- in that respect, no, because I -- Commander [REDACTED], that's -- that would be his job. There would be a lot of chatter going on, so he kind of would monitor that frequency and Sgt. [REDACTED] would monitor the patrol frequency, and then they would communicate back to us. That's typically how things, for us, go. It goes in a hierarchy of communication.

It would be concerning to me if we were -- had an event or an incident and I had no communication and we were just, like, yelling back and forth to each other. That's why we had our own radios that day, so we could communicate amongst our team to say what was going on and what we were seeing and experiencing.

[REDACTED]: Just for my clarification.

[REDACTED]: Yes, sir.

[REDACTED]: So, one, Commander [REDACTED], he could communicate with your other ESU teams; that's Beaver, Butler, Washington ESU teams?

1 [REDACTED]: No, sir. He could only
2 communicate with the Command Post.

3 [REDACTED]: Okay. And then when you
4 say "patrol," was that Butler PD that you were --

5 [REDACTED]: I'm not sure who was on that
6 frequency, to be completely honest. I would assume
7 that would be the local Butler agencies that would
8 be communicating through that frequency, and that's
9 the one that Sgt. [REDACTED] had access to.

10 [REDACTED]: And then all of you, the
11 six or so of you --

12 [REDACTED]: Yes.

13 [REDACTED]: -- had radios that were
14 just to the six of you.

15 [REDACTED]: Correct.

16 [REDACTED]: Okay. Thank you.

17 [REDACTED]: Yeah. It's a little
18 confusing.

19 BY [REDACTED]:

20 Q. No. Thank you. Were there any other means
21 or manner of communication that you used that day?

22 A. Other than the text and the radios that
23 were provided by Butler County ESU and our personal
24 radios, no, ma'am.

25 Q. Thank you. Did you experience any phone or

1 other service issues that day?

2 A. I personally didn't, because I wasn't using
3 my phone to communicate with them. No, ma'am, I
4 did not.

5 Q. Okay. And during the rally, were you able
6 to communicate with Butler ESU personnel?

7 A. Not directly through radio, no. With my
8 personal radio, no, I was not.

9 Q. How did you -- if you did communicate with
10 Butler ESU, how did you do so?

11 A. So that actually occurred when we were
12 asked to go to the AGR Building. What happened was
13 I was approached by a Washington County -- a
14 Washington County commander. I don't know his name
15 -- I'm sorry -- but I do know it was the commander.
16 He asked me that -- he told me that we needed to go
17 to the AGR Building.

18 I then relayed that to Commander [REDACTED]
19 through our radio to let him know where I was
20 going, and then Commander [REDACTED] relayed that to --
21 to my understanding, relayed that to the Command
22 Post, and then we pushed out from there.

23 Q. Thank you.

24 A. That's how that would occur.

25 Q. And just a few more questions before

Majority's time is up and then our next round we'll move to the shooting, ma'am. Did you receive any pictures of Mr. Crooks via text or e-mail on July 13?

A. I personally did not, but Commander [REDACTED] did show us the picture that he received from [REDACTED].

Q. Do you recall what time that was?

A. I would be -- I do not recall a specific time. I would be guessing, but I want to say it was -- I would be totally guessing, to be completely honest, and I don't want to --

Q. Just to give a more sort of approximate window --

A. Sure.

Q. -- would you say that you were shown the photo more than a half an hour before the shooting?

A. Yes.

Q. Did anyone inquire at that juncture as to whether efforts were being made to detain this individual?

A. I remember Commander [REDACTED] telling me that [REDACTED] had spotted someone, and that he had relayed that to Command Post -- Commander [REDACTED] had relayed that to Command Post, and that they were looking

1 for the individual. But to say what that effort
2 was -- specific effort was, I'm not sure.

3 [REDACTED]: Was any of that
4 information communicated to the HSI agent that was
5 posted near you that you are aware of?

6 [REDACTED]: I am not aware of that, no,
7 sir.

8 BY [REDACTED]:

9 Q. And once at your assigned location, did you
10 ever receive any communications or updates from the
11 Secret Service?

12 A. We never spoke to the Secret Service that
13 day.

14 [REDACTED]: My time is concluding,
15 ma'am. Thank you.

16 [REDACTED]: You're welcome.

17 [REDACTED]: Would you like to take a
18 little break before we begin? Up to you.

19 [REDACTED]: No, I'm good.

20 [REDACTED]: You're good?

21 [REDACTED]: Yes.

22 [REDACTED]: Okay.

23 EXAMINATION

24 BY [REDACTED]:

25 Q. Thank you so much for being here today. So

1 you mentioned that you have been with Beaver County
2 ESU from 2018 on?

3 A. Yes.

4 Q. And you've been in the emergency services
5 since 2014. What did you do prior to Beaver?

6 A. I actually work for Medic Rescue Ambulance
7 Service. I've been an EMT with them for -- since
8 2014. I still work with them from time to time.

9 Q. And what is your experience coordinating
10 with PSP or federal agencies?

11 A. Federal agencies, I don't believe I have
12 personally worked with before, but PSP, I worked
13 with them in a couple different capacities. I'm
14 one of the deputy coroners for Beaver County, so I
15 communicate with them often.

16 Then also we have -- we did a standby
17 for President -- was it President Trump or -- I
18 believe it was President Trump when he came to the
19 Shell plant, which is the cracker plant down the
20 road here. And we -- they went over our plan for
21 what the plan was for President Trump, also what
22 the medical plan was and how we were going to
23 respond if we were called into that plant.

24 Q. Okay. What is kind of the work experience,
25 your education to become a deputy coroner?

1 A. So I'm actually a physician assistant, and
2 so that's my background. With Pennsylvania, the
3 actual coroner itself is an elected position. I am
4 just one of the assistant coroners. But we do go
5 to a class that -- I want to say the class is
6 almost like a week long, and we go through
7 education that week, and then we take an exam
8 that's put on by the Attorney General's Office for
9 Pennsylvania. Then we have to do continuing
10 education every year that's up to, I think, eight
11 hours of continuing education.

12 Q. One of my questions was going to be what is
13 your experience working with coroners. So quite a
14 bit of experience.

15 A. Yes.

16 Q. Yes. And then what is your experience
17 working with medical examiners?

18 A. So we actually sit in with our pathologists
19 on a lot of their autopsies. The pathologists with
20 Beaver County, we sit in on their autopsies.

21 I'm sorry, I'll sit this way. I don't
22 want to cut anybody off.

23 We sit in on the autopsies, and as the
24 pathologist and his assistant do the examination,
25 dissection, we talk through the injuries that they

1 may have sustained, and also the findings that they
2 are seeing internally that may be a medical
3 condition that caused their passing versus an
4 actual trauma that caused their passing.

5 Q. So, approximation, how many times did you
6 act in that realm as a deputy coroner?

7 A. Oh, gosh. At least over -- I would say at
8 least over a hundred. I've been doing it since
9 2019, so, yeah. Yeah, beginning this year, I think
10 I've had -- through this year now I think I've had
11 at least 36 if not -- I would say at least 36 calls
12 this year that have been my personal cases.

13 Q. So how many times have you supported Butler
14 County ESU?

15 A. I personally have only been on -- I want to
16 say two or three events with them. One was a
17 barricaded subject that was on a farm in Butler
18 County. I want to say another one was -- they came
19 to support us for -- it may have been another
20 barricaded subject. Then this would have been the
21 third one, sorry.

22 Q. What does that mean, "barricaded subject"?

23 A. An individual who possibly we were serving
24 a warrant on or had made threats. It's usually
25 when someone -- it's either a warrant that we're

1 serving and they attempt to barricade themselves in
2 their house or a room or -- the individual that we
3 went to the farm for, he had made threats against
4 his family. The police had responded and then they
5 could not locate him -- but they knew he was there
6 -- so they asked us for extra support.

7 Q. What is the process from going from Beaver
8 County ESU to supporting Butler County ESU?

9 A. We act as a support agency, so we kind of
10 look to them for direction of "Where do you need
11 us?" "What can we do for you?" "How can we
12 support you?"

13 Sometimes we will give our input on how
14 to handle a situation, but it just depends on the
15 event that we're responding to or the incident that
16 we're responding to.

17 Q. Is it usually done via e-mail that someone
18 puts in that request, or is there a more formalized
19 process?

20 A. I believe how the process goes, if we're
21 responding to something like a barricaded subject,
22 a call goes out to Commander [REDACTED], and then he
23 kind of distributes that, saying, "Hey, Butler
24 needs us."

25 For this event specifically, I'm not

1 sure how the communication was done. I would
2 assume it was either through a call first and then
3 maybe an e-mail after.

4 Q. Do you have any experience supporting
5 events at Butler County?

6 A. No, I do not.

7 Q. And beyond the standby for President Trump
8 at the Shell --

9 A. Shell plant.

10 Q. -- Shell plant, do you have any experience
11 supporting political rallies of any sort?

12 A. No, not outside of that.

13 Q. So the day of the rally, you mentioned the
14 timeline, 9:00 a.m. briefing and then you were at
15 your post by 9:30. How quickly could you have
16 gotten to the AGR from that location?

17 A. If we're going directly across the farm
18 grounds, maybe a couple minutes, if that. It
19 depends. If it's on foot, a couple minutes. If
20 it's with our BearCat, much quicker.

21 Q. Then you started to kind of give a timeline
22 of the day earlier. Would you mind just walking me
23 through what you recall as the timeline?

24 A. Sure. I wish I printed out our timeline.
25 But we got there about 9:30, and from 9:30 until --

1 I want to say around 4:00 -- just looking at this,
2 I'm trying to get -- like remember. I want to say
3 it was 4:00, maybe 4:45 we started putting our gear
4 on because we knew President Trump would be
5 arriving soon.

6 When I say put our gear on, we're
7 putting our vests on. We're making sure that all
8 of our -- anything that we didn't want to wear
9 right then -- so, like, sometimes our helmets are
10 very heavy. We don't put them on right away, but
11 they're really quick just to click on. But
12 everything else was prepped and ready to go. Our
13 medical bags were ready to go for us. The
14 operators, they had their long guns ready and they
15 were are geared up. So if we needed to act
16 quickly, we could act quickly without hesitation.

17 Q. Okay. That was 4:45?

18 A. I want to say that was around like 4:45.
19 Again, that's an approximate because it's been a
20 while. I have a timeline. I just didn't look at
21 it, so I apologize for that.

22 Q. No worries. So you were assigned to one of
23 the counter assault teams; correct?

24 A. Yes.

25 Q. What does that mean to be a medic assigned

1 to a counter assault team?

2 A. We are charged with responding to the
3 scene. So if we -- we'll use this scene, for
4 example. We respond with the operators, and then
5 the operators, if they come against any assailant,
6 they mitigate them, or any -- and then we would
7 then respond behind them to address any medical
8 issues that needed to be attended to.

9 For example, when we arrived -- after we
10 were called up, when we got down to the stage -- if
11 you're looking at the stage, to the right-hand side
12 there was an individual down. I believe it was the
13 individual that got shot in the chest twice. [REDACTED]
14 [REDACTED], the medic that I was with, responded to
15 that side.

16 There was also -- after learning one of
17 the physicians was there at that individual's side
18 giving aid and -- so at that point there was at
19 least two medical providers there, so I stepped off
20 from that person because I was not needed. It's
21 better to see what else is going on and where else
22 I'm needed rather than just go to that person,
23 so --

24 Q. So we'll come back to that timeline --

25 A. Yes.

1 Q. -- in a little bit, but I appreciate the
2 context. That day, what was your chain of command?

3 A. My chain of command was pretty much I was
4 getting my instruction from Commander [REDACTED], who
5 was then getting his command from or his
6 instruction from the Command Post that was run by
7 Butler County ESU.

8 Q. To your knowledge, did Commander [REDACTED] have
9 access to communicate to the U.S. Secret Service
10 Command Post?

11 A. Not directly. Not to my knowledge.

12 Q. Who was Commander [REDACTED] talking to at the
13 Butler County ESU Command Post?

14 A. I'm not sure who was on the other end of
15 that line, but I'm assuming it was either one or
16 more of the commanders from Butler County ESU.

17 Q. Do you know -- was anyone in your team
18 using Signal to communicate that day?

19 A. Not to my knowledge.

20 Q. And it was Commander [REDACTED] who was
21 communicating with [REDACTED] who was --

22 A. Through text.

23 Q. Through text. And where was [REDACTED]
24 located?

25 A. He was in the AGR Building.

1 Q. Did anyone in that brief that happened at
2 9:00 a.m. instruct your team to be on the lookout
3 for drones?

4 A. Yes. I do remember that.

5 Q. Did you or your team see any drones on 13
6 July?

7 A. I personally did not and, no, I don't think
8 that anybody that I was with saw them, but I may be
9 speaking out of turn for them.

10 Q. The post that you were in near the gate,
11 what did that look like?

12 A. There are several livestock barns that are
13 lined up, if you're walking in the entrance, to the
14 right of the farm grounds. We were tucked into one
15 of the alleyways between those, and to our left was
16 a main gate that all the people were coming in from
17 the parking lot.

18 Q. But you were out in the elements, you
19 weren't inside?

20 A. We were not inside the buildings, no,
21 ma'am. We had a full view of the entrance and the
22 people that were coming in.

23 Q. So to your recollection, when did you first
24 hear that there was a suspicious person?

25 A. Again, I think it was around -- maybe

1 around like 5:00, 4:45, maybe, that Commander [REDACTED]
2 had said to me that he received a text from [REDACTED]
3 that he spotted some -- a suspicious individual. I
4 think that's when I saw the pictures of Mr. Crooks'
5 -- the back of his head and also his side profile.

6 Q. It was [REDACTED] that was relaying that
7 information to Commander [REDACTED]?

8 A. Yes.

9 Q. Who could hear the information being
10 relayed?

11 A. I don't think any -- I don't know if
12 anything was heard. I don't -- I don't know if
13 Commander [REDACTED] -- I'm sure he put that over the
14 radio, but I was not sitting next to him when that
15 was communicated.

16 Q. And when did your team hear that the
17 suspicious person had a range finder?

18 A. I don't recall the time, but I know that
19 that was communicated. I think [REDACTED] communicated
20 that to Commander [REDACTED] and he relayed that to the
21 Command Post.

22 Q. Prior to the 13th of July, do you have any
23 experience with range finders? Did you know what a
24 range finder was?

25 A. I do know what a range finder looks like,

1 yes.

2 Q. And when your team heard that, what was the
3 response?

4 A. I mean, that's highly concerning because --
5 yeah, that's extremely concerning for the situation
6 that we were in and the amount of people that were
7 there, plus also Former President Trump being
8 there, honestly.

9 Q. Did you hear any discussion about the
10 possibility of the QRF team being deployed?

11 A. I did not, no. Not yet. Not yet. We were
12 in -- we are actually opposite of the -- the AGR
13 Building was completely across the field from us,
14 and in between us there were several other elements
15 that could have been -- should have been or could
16 have been employed. Plus, I think also the
17 expectation of or what we would have assumed,
18 which, obviously, I mean, you can ask -- I mean you
19 of me -- that there were patrol somewhere near that
20 building that should be converging on that building
21 to help out.

22 Q. So that -- the assumption was a patrol
23 would arrive?

24 A. Yes.

25 Q. In the brief at 9:00 a.m., was there any

1 discussion about patrol being around the AGR
2 Building?

3 A. I don't know if it was specifically
4 mentioned around the AGR Building. They mentioned
5 that there would be patrol around, and that was
6 clearly not the case. When we got to our post at
7 9:00 a.m., we had no patrol near us whatsoever, and
8 there was no patrol at the entrance to the
9 fairgrounds whatsoever. We were -- we were it.

10 Q. Then when you requested help to resolve the
11 vendor issue, one patrol?

12 A. One sheriff's deputy showed up, and it may
13 have been the sheriff. I'm not sure of his name,
14 but the Butler County Sheriff. That was the only
15 person that showed up.

16 Q. So can you walk us through a timeline from
17 when things picked up when your team realized based
18 on what was being communicated that there was an
19 issue?

20 A. So I believe -- I don't recall when -- I
21 don't remember if there was high concern when
22 President Trump went on stage, but I do feel like
23 before he went on stage we were kind of
24 questioning, you know, if this individual --
25 because we knew about the individual before Former

1 President Trump went on stage, there was concern
2 why aren't they keeping him off the stage if they
3 know that this individual is out there, because
4 that is concerning.

5 We were standing at our post when I
6 remember or I recall that at some point they -- and
7 at that point I was standing close to Commander
8 [REDACTED]. You could hear on the radio that they lost
9 the individual, the individual being -- now that we
10 know -- Mr. Crooks. And I remember that being
11 communicated -- I could hear on the radio that it
12 was communicated that he, Mr. Crooks, had been
13 heading towards Sheetz.

14 At that point, I think we were starting
15 to load up because we weren't sure what was going
16 on. By loading up, that means we were putting our
17 helmets on, putting on our full gear and getting
18 into the BearCat.

19 Then I remember hearing over the radio
20 someone yelling that he has a long gun, he being
21 Mr. Crooks. Then I think at that point we were
22 starting to move up, and between us getting the
23 truck going, moving the gate, I think that's when
24 the first shot was fired. We went down the gravel
25 path that we had to go through where the Homeland

1 Security officer was manning that gate. We went
2 through that. We paused briefly just before the
3 Command Post and then proceeded forward to the
4 right side -- behind the stage on the right side,
5 and then we dismounted from the BearCat, our
6 BearCat and --

7 Q. Sorry, if we can stop right there.

8 A. Yes.

9 Q. Did anyone tell you to get ready to get in
10 the BearCat to get moving?

11 A. I don't know if anyone specifically told
12 Commander [REDACTED] to do that, but I think we --
13 because we knew something was happening, that they
14 couldn't find this individual that had a range
15 finder, we knew that we needed to, like, be ready
16 to deploy immediately.

17 Q. And then when you went down the gravel path
18 where the HSI agent was, did you see the HSI agent?

19 A. Yes. He had gotten out of his vehicle --
20 or he may have been already out of the vehicle, but
21 in any case, he was there to move the gate for us
22 so we could go through.

23 Q. When you paused briefly at the Command
24 Post, was there any communication?

25 A. I'm not sure why Commander [REDACTED] paused

there, but it was seconds, if that, because he only paused briefly.

Q. And at this point, do you know was anyone talking to Commander [REDACTED] or giving him direction or did Commander [REDACTED] -- "I had realized the issue on app"?

A. I don't know, to be completely honest. I believe that something may have been communicated, or we just knew we needed to move up because shots were fired, like, so go to the stage.

Q. So -- and I apologize for interrupting. So you got to the stage and then what happened?

A. So we deployed from the BearCat, and when that happens, the operators -- those are the police officers -- they will fan out and make a perimeter. And so we put the -- I shouldn't say we -- Commander [REDACTED] put the BearCat in between the opening between the stage and the -- I think it was combines that were holding up some of the flags and -- but it was a piece of machinery to the left. He put it in between there to kind of make a blocking. So if there was a shooter still active, it shielded the people that were behind it, and also we weren't sure if there was a shooter in the crowd too at this point, so we -- anyway, we're doing that.

1 So our operators fanned out. And then
2 myself, what I was doing was just scanning to see
3 if there was anyone down. At that point I did see
4 the individual that had been shot in the chest down
5 on the ground. I went to their side. Also,
6 [REDACTED] went to his side or her -- yeah,
7 his side as well. Then I looked up and saw that
8 there were at least three medical providers. That
9 is when I stepped off because -- a better use of
10 resources.

11 When I stepped off, I did see two
12 individuals that were -- if you looked behind the
13 stage, there were two red barns. There would have
14 been -- if you're looking at the stage to the barn
15 on the right, there were two females that were down
16 on the ground, and what I saw was red across their
17 chests, later to find out -- I believe that was
18 some of the hydraulic fluid that had been -- when
19 one of the shots was fired by -- I'm not sure whom
20 -- it hit a hydraulic line and then sprayed
21 hydraulic fluid everywhere. If you don't know what
22 it is, it's red, and so it looked like blood
23 initially.

24 So I went over to them. Checked them
25 out. They were fine. I stepped off of them and

1 came back to the perimeter that we were at.
2 Continued to scan. That's when I was approached by
3 the commander for the Washington County ESU, asking
4 me to go to the AGR Building because they -- it was
5 very confusing. They weren't -- they weren't sure
6 what happened. There was a lot of
7 miscommunication. They weren't sure what happened
8 there. They knew that there was a shootout of some
9 sort, or they communicated that they thought it was
10 a shootout of some sort. They thought it was a
11 mass casualty there. The shooter was down, too.
12 We needed to get over there immediately.

13 So I then got on my radio, because none
14 of this -- this was all face to face. So I then
15 got on my radio to let Commander [REDACTED] know that
16 they were requesting us to the AGR Building, that I
17 was going to head over there. He asked me to take
18 some of the operators with me because, myself, I
19 don't carry a firearm. Our team does not allow the
20 medics to carry a firearm for insurance purposes.
21 We work through an ambulance service versus a
22 police agency.

23 So they came with me. We ran from the
24 back side of the stage, across, behind. I was
25 stopped briefly by -- I guess there was a casualty

collection point that was established behind the AGR Building where there ended up being -- I heard later that there was a physician that was supposed to be stationed with Former President Trump. I guess he got left behind, so he ended up, under my understanding -- again, I didn't go inside there, but he was running that casualty collection point. And I thought that's where they wanted us to stop for some reason, but I stopped there briefly and then continued on to the AGR Building.

We had squeezed through a fence and then ran across. At that time I saw some operators and officers on top of the lower roof of the AGR Building where Mr. Crooks was eventually found, asking us to, you know, get up there quickly, so we did. We ran around -- me -- myself and Det.

ran around the side where the parking lot was in the AGR Building.

We went in the first door. They said there's no access to the roof from there, so we had to go back outside. Then we saw a ladder that was a tactical ladder that later on I realized that was brought over by one of the tactical teams. I believe it was Butler County, if I remember their video, watching them. But they carried that ladder

1 over there.

2 So we climbed up that ladder, climbed
3 across two roofs, and then got to the roof where
4 Mr. Crooks was. When I got up there, there were no
5 officers injured. It was just a request to
6 evaluate Mr. Crooks.

7 Q. And so what time did you arrive on the
8 roof, approximately?

9 A. I want to say it was about a little after
10 6:00, because I think I pronounced him at 1815, I
11 believe is the time.

12 Q. So what actions did you take once you got
13 on the roof?

14 A. Once I got on the roof, I put gloves on and
15 observed Mr. Crooks lying prone on the roof. I
16 felt for a pulse in his carotid, and there was
17 absolutely no pulse, so at that time I pronounced
18 him. And then I -- because I've been on teams like
19 this before, I didn't want to compromise the scene
20 or the investigation, so I stepped off and tried to
21 remain in place where I was, not trying to step
22 around or move anything. Then we waited for
23 someone to come up who was going to be in charge of
24 the investigation.

25 Q. What is the process for declaring someone

1 deceased?

2 A. Looking for obvious signs of death, also
3 looking -- you know, seeing if there's any signs of
4 life whatsoever. Mr. Crooks had absolutely no
5 signs of life.

6 Q. Have you had prior experience seeing
7 someone with a gunshot wound to the head?

8 A. Yes.

9 Q. In your experience, was there anything
10 unusual about Mr. Crooks' body compared to other
11 individuals you've seen with gunshot wounds?

12 A. No, ma'am.

13 Q. Do you recall where the entrance wound was
14 for the bullet?

15 A. So because I didn't want to compromise the
16 scene, I didn't want to roll him. I could see an
17 obvious wound to the back of his head, but that
18 looked more like an exit wound versus -- or not an
19 exit wound, but not the place where the bullet
20 would have entered, I should say. So I assumed
21 that would have come from the front. But, again, I
22 did not roll his body, because I didn't want to
23 compromise the scene.

24 One thing to add, when I observed Mr.
25 Crooks, he did have his hands behind his back that

1 were bound with flex cuffs, which was done by the
2 officers that were on the roof. That is typical
3 procedure for any individual dead or alive just
4 because they were not checking for signs of life.
5 They were just doing their due process to make sure
6 this individual couldn't inflict any more harm or
7 damage, so --

8 Q. So from the time you got to Mr. Crooks'
9 body from the time you declared him deceased, what
10 was the timeframe about?

11 A. A long time. Oh, wait, I'm sorry, when I
12 saw his body to when I pronounced him deceased?

13 Q. Yes, what was the timeframe?

14 A. Oh, that was very quick.

15 Q. Very quick.

16 A. Very quick, yes, ma'am. Pretty much as
17 soon as I got on the roof, I went right to his
18 side. I think I -- I may have already had gloves
19 on or I put them on on the roof, and that'd be
20 minutes, if that.

21 Q. Okay. Do you know what the chain of
22 custody was for Mr. Crooks' body?

23 A. I do not.

24 Q. And maybe from your experience there on the
25 13th or your experience as a deputy coroner, do you

1 know why it was sent to Allegheny County as opposed
2 to Butler County?

3 A. I don't know. I don't think -- speaking
4 for our office, I don't know if we would have
5 transferred care to Allegheny County. But I don't
6 know. I don't know what the conversation was. I'm
7 not a part of that conversation.

8 Q. So from when you were there with the body
9 to when you stepped off, who took custody of the
10 body after you were done?

11 A. So we were actually asked to leave the roof
12 because they thought there was a bomb in there so
13 -- a bomb in the building, so they did bring at
14 bomb dog over so -- I'll step back.

15 As we were standing on the roof, I don't
16 know if one of the officers was given direction to,
17 but they did check his pockets, and they found a
18 device in his pocket that was gray and had a silver
19 antenna. The device just had a number -- a number
20 pad on it. At that point we thought maybe it was a
21 -- something to do with like a bomb or detonation
22 device. And the -- an individual from a bomb
23 squad, I want to say -- I'm not sure if it was
24 PSP's bomb squad or Allegheny County's bomb squad.
25 They came to the roof. They said, yes, they do

1 think that's what that was.

2 They had also -- someone had brought a
3 dog that identifies bombs, and it was -- the dog
4 had hit inside the building for possibly explosive
5 material, so we were then asked to exit the roof
6 and clear the building, which we did. At that
7 point I never went up to the roof again.

8 Q. Who asked you to leave the roof?

9 A. I don't know if it was Secret Service -- so
10 as we were on the roof, several individuals came up
11 to the roof that -- there was only one individual
12 that I know to be Secret Service. Other than that,
13 I'm really not sure which agency people were coming
14 from because they really didn't identify
15 themselves. I saw IDs, but I didn't see
16 specifically who they were representing.

17 Q. So somebody you're not sure asked you to
18 leave the roof?

19 A. Yes.

20 Q. Did anyone remain on the roof?

21 A. I do not -- I don't believe so, no.

22 Q. Do you know how long Mr. Crooks' body would
23 have been up there without anybody else on the roof
24 with him?

25 A. I want to say that he was up there maybe

1 for a couple hours, like two, and then people
2 didn't return to the roof -- at that point we did
3 not return to the roof. He was still up there, Mr.
4 Crooks' body, that is. I think he -- his body was
5 still up there by the time we were leaving, which
6 was around a little after midnight. At that point
7 I do think that they were -- they brought in a --
8 the fire department with a ladder to get him off
9 the roof.

10 Q. Was that the last time that you saw
11 Mr. Crooks' body?

12 A. When I exited the roof when we were asked
13 to leave by the bomb squad, yes, that was the last
14 time.

15 Q. Have you seen it since?

16 A. I have not, no.

17 Q. When you were on the roof, what did you see
18 happen with the gun that Mr. Crooks had used?

19 A. When I saw Mr. Crooks initially, it was off
20 to his left-hand side. It had -- the officers --
21 the operators on the roof said that they had moved
22 it to the side, which would be typical protocol to
23 remove the gun from his reach if he was still alive
24 or any concern that he may still be alive. But I
25 do not know what was done with that gun once we

1 exited the roof because it was still on the roof
2 when we exited.

3 Q. Do you remember a general approximate time
4 when you left the roof?

5 A. I don't remember a general time, but I want
6 to say we were on the roof for at least -- I want
7 to say we were up there for almost two hours before
8 we were asked to leave the roof.

9 [REDACTED]: I believe I'm at my
10 time right now, so we can go off the record.

11 (Off the record.)

12 [REDACTED]: The time is now 10:12 a.m.
13 We are back on the record, Majority round two of
14 questioning.

15 EXAMINATION

16 BY [REDACTED]:

17 Q. Ma'am, when did you first learn that there
18 was only one physician at the medical tent that you
19 had previously described?

20 A. I want to say it was that day when I was
21 speaking with [REDACTED], who is from Butler
22 County ESU.

23 Q. Was one physician insufficient to deal with
24 a crowd that size?

25 A. I mean, I feel like that's true because

1 I've been to events before where there's at least
2 one or two. They'll usually ask, because we are --
3 Pittsburgh's a big hub for medical schools, and so
4 they usually ask residents from different
5 facilities to come and say, "Hey, do you want to do
6 this as a volunteer project?"

7 Q. Thank you. And then quickly two additional
8 follow-up questions when Mr. Crooks was first
9 identified, and then we'll move to the shooting.
10 Did [REDACTED] at all indicate over the radio that
11 efforts were being made to detain Mr. Crooks?

12 A. Over the radio, I'm not sure. I believe
13 they had a radio, but I'm not sure if they actually
14 had a radio over there, to be completely honest.
15 So I would not be able to speak on that. I do feel
16 that [REDACTED] had communicated to Commander [REDACTED] that
17 he passed along the information to the snipers, as
18 well as, you know, Commander [REDACTED] was passing
19 along to Command group, and Commander [REDACTED] then
20 communicated back to [REDACTED] like, "Passed along,"
21 "Received," that this was received by Command.

22 Q. And do you have any knowledge, ma'am, as to
23 whose ultimate responsibility it would have been to
24 locate Mr. Crooks and detain him?

25 A. I don't know. I can make a guess, but I

1 don't know.

2 Q. Would it be reasonable for anyone on the
3 ESU team to try to locate Mr. Crooks after he was
4 IDed as a suspicious person?

5 A. I would think that patrol should be,
6 because they -- what I -- what people would guess
7 is that -- or assume is that there would be patrol
8 near that building, and they would be the ones to
9 respond. And I do believe that if there was
10 supposed to be any incident that occurred within
11 the crowd or that type of situation, that patrol
12 was supposed to address it first or PSP was
13 supposed to address that first and then we were
14 supposed to respond.

15 Q. So any active threat would have been
16 neutralized by Butler ESU or patrol, or could you
17 clarify?

18 A. I think it should have been patrol
19 initially to approach the individual. But as for
20 neutralizing a threat, it depends on what the
21 threat is. If it's just a fight that breaks out,
22 that would be probably patrol. If it was an active
23 shooter, it should be the closest responding
24 officer, and then kind of building upon that would
25 be ESU and further, so --

1 Q. And, ma'am, you helpfully mentioned that
2 you were concerned that Former President Trump had
3 not been kept off stage in light of the fact that a
4 suspicion person had been identified and not found
5 or detained at that juncture. Are you aware of who
6 would have been responsible for keeping Former
7 President Trump off stage?

8 A. I'm not aware, but if I were to make an
9 educated assumption or guess, I would assume that
10 it should be Secret Service that would ultimately
11 make that decision.

12 Q. Did you hear of any communications or other
13 efforts that were being made to keep Former
14 President Trump off stage?

15 A. I did not hear of anything, no.

16 Q. Thank you. Moving to the shooting, could
17 you just let us know where you were at the juncture
18 you first heard gunshots?

19 A. We were already loaded into the BearCat,
20 our emergency services vehicle, and I believe
21 starting to pull out from our point of -- our
22 stationed point. And I believe I remember hearing
23 Officer [REDACTED] say that he heard gunshots and then
24 we heard screaming, and so --

25 Q. And at that juncture you headed toward the

stage.

A. Correct; yes.

Q. When you got to the stage, were there any other medical personnel there?

A. Yes. Butler County did have a couple of medics there. I don't know the specific number, but I want to say at least three outside of [REDACTED] [REDACTED], who was with us. And then as I got to the side of the individual that had been shot in the chest, there was a physician there, too -- which I'm not sure if I knew that was a physician then, but when I spoke to [REDACTED] later that evening when we were waiting to see what the next step would be for us, he mentioned that that was an AHN physician, an Allegheny Health Network physician.

Q. So the physicians were not clearly noticeable or able to be distinguished from the crowd. They weren't wearing any sort of, you know, markers or anything like that?

A. She wasn't -- from what I'm aware of, she was not wearing something that had like "physician" across her back or anything like that, like something that we wear always says, like, "medic" on it. She may have been wearing a shirt, a

1 T-shirt or something like that that may have
2 mentioned "Allegheny Health Network" on it, but
3 nothing that specifically said like in big, bold
4 letters "physician." Now, granted, I wasn't -- I
5 didn't completely overview her entire attire, but I
6 don't recall anything like that.

7 Q. Then briefly could you go over the injuries
8 that you observed when you got to the stage?

9 A. Sure. So I remember seeing the individual
10 that was shot in the chest. I remember seeing
11 someone that had been loaded to an SUV, but I'm not
12 sure what their injuries were. They were across
13 the way. They had looked like they had medical
14 providers with them at that time. Those were the
15 two injuries that I saw at that point. Other
16 individuals were just -- those two girls that I
17 approached that were sitting next to the barn, they
18 were not injured. They were just very overwhelmed
19 by the situation.

20 Q. Did you make the decision to leave the
21 stage area only after the commander from Washington
22 County ESU requested that you go to the AGR roof?

23 A. Yes.

24 Q. Who else did the commander from the
25 Washington County ESU request go to the AGR roof?

1 A. No one specifically that I was aware of
2 that said. The reason why he approached me was he
3 was asking for a medic because they were requesting
4 a medic over there at the AGR Building.

5 Q. Following the shooting, was there any
6 communication with the Secret Service?

7 A. Once we got to the roof and pronounced Mr.
8 Crooks, that's the only time I had met a Secret
9 Service officer -- or individual or representative.

10 Q. Okay. Thank you. We'll get back to that.
11 So to clarify, Mr. Crooks had been left on the roof
12 unattended for a period of time; is that correct?

13 A. Yes.

14 Q. Could you give us a window?

15 A. I want to say it's from when we left the
16 roof or asked to leave the roof because the
17 possible bomb inside the building -- because the
18 bomb dog had hit for explosive material -- it could
19 have been anywhere from like an hour and a half to
20 two hours, because I know they had to go into that
21 building, and they were waiting for permission to
22 enter the area that the dog had hit on explosive
23 material.

24 Q. Is it in line with protocol for a body to
25 be left unattended for that period of time?

1 A. I've never had that situation occur where
2 there might be explosive material in the area. But
3 if that were the situation, I would assume that
4 that would be protocol. Otherwise, no, we don't
5 typically leave bodies unattended.

6 Q. So, for the record, just to be clear,
7 Mr. Crooks' body was left unattended due to fears
8 of there being an explosive device in the building?

9 A. Yes.

10 Q. Who arrived on the scene to check or sweep
11 for an explosive device?

12 A. It was a bomb squad. I don't recall if it
13 was Pennsylvania State Police's bomb squad or if it
14 was Allegheny County's bomb squad. I don't think
15 Butler County has a bomb squad.

16 Q. Okay. So, ma'am, you had indicated at
17 approximately -- and from our records, our
18 understanding at approximately 1823 you climbed a
19 black tactical ladder on Building 3, which was to
20 the right of Door 8 --

21 A. Yes.

22 Q. -- to access the roof. Who else from
23 Beaver ESU was with you?

24 A. Det. [REDACTED], [REDACTED].

25 Q. Who else was on the roof when you got up

1 there?

2 A. One Washington County ESU operator and two
3 Butler County ESU operators. There was also a
4 local officer that was on the roof. I'm not sure
5 what agency he was from. Either Butler City or
6 Butler Township.

7 Q. How long did it take the Secret Service to
8 arrive on the scene?

9 A. The individual that came up on the roof, he
10 had a suit on and a red tie. I want to say that
11 was within maybe half an hour.

12 Q. Did you examine any bullet holes on
13 Mr. Crooks?

14 A. Other than the -- because, again, I did not
15 roll him, other than the wound to the lower aspect
16 of his scalp or his skull, no, I did not.

17 Q. Did you perform any other physical exams
18 other than checking his carotid artery and checking
19 for a pulse?

20 A. No, I did not.

21 Q. Did you fill out an incident report?

22 A. I filled out a report with Medic Rescue,
23 who is my home agency, just to explain the
24 situation that I saw and things that were seen
25 on-site.

1 Q. Who was this report provided to?

2 A. Medic Rescue has that copy, and we did a --
3 Beaver County ESU did kind of a timeline where we
4 kind of outlined what we did that day and things
5 that we have, so I think that may have been
6 provided to you by Detective -- or Commander [REDACTED].

7 Q. Okay. Was that report given to any other
8 law enforcement or agency, to your knowledge?

9 A. It may have been provided to Pennsylvania
10 State Police and also the FBI.

11 Q. Okay. Did you take any photos while you
12 were on the roof?

13 A. I did not, no.

14 Q. Did [REDACTED]?

15 A. Yes, he did.

16 Q. After the shooting, did you write any other
17 reports?

18 A. No, ma'am.

19 Q. Have you had any contact with the Butler
20 County Coroner's Office?

21 A. No, I have not.

22 [REDACTED]: So you were not present
23 during the autopsy?

24 [REDACTED]: No, sir.

25 [REDACTED]: Okay.

BY [REDACTED]:

Q. After the shooting, did you receive any communications or updated information from the Secret Service regarding what you should do?

A. No.

Q. What was your assignment, ma'am, after the shooting?

A. After the shooting, Butler -- I'm sorry, Beaver County ESU stayed on the scene, because -- for several reasons. One, we decided to act as perimeter, because there did not seem to be an established perimeter by local or state police. So we tried to help with that.

Also, I assumed that we would be debriefed or at least have our names taken by someone, and that never occurred. That's another reason why we remained -- why, me specifically, I remained standing where I was or tried to remain standing where I was as much as possible, because from the investigations that I've been a part of, they at least like to know where you were standing, where have you stepped, those types of things, and that never occurred.

Q. Quickly, following the sort of protective sweep, did you return to the roof?

1 A. I never returned to the roof.

2 Q. You mentioned that there had been no
3 established perimeter. So was Secret Service or
4 DHS, HSI, anyone else assisting in that effort?

5 A. To my knowledge, no.

6 Q. You also mentioned that there were no
7 debriefings that occurred. Is that the day of or
8 no debriefings following July 13?

9 A. Neither the day of nor following. To add
10 to that, we, ourselves, Beaver County ESU, did do a
11 debrief talking through our thoughts of the day
12 from start to finish, and also establishing a
13 timeline through our recollection and also messages
14 that had gone out so we understood, like, where we
15 were and what we were doing so we could better help
16 with the investigation.

17 [REDACTED]: I'd now like to introduce
18 as Majority Exhibit 2 the FPOTUS After Action
19 presentation.

20 BY [REDACTED]:

21 Q. Ma'am, do you recognize this slide deck?

22 A. Yes.

23 Q. Okay. And is this the After Action or
24 debrief that Beaver ESU did?

25 A. Yes, ma'am.

1 Q. Okay. Did you feel that this debrief
2 sufficiently covered the events of July 13?

3 A. I do, yes.

4 Q. Did the Secret Service provide you with any
5 after action or debrief information?

6 A. No, ma'am.

7 Q. Did Butler County ESU participate in any of
8 Beaver County's after action meetings or
9 debriefing?

10 A. Not this one. I don't know if there were
11 any meetings held between Commander [REDACTED],
12 Commander [REDACTED], and Butler County, but with us,
13 no. As a group, no.

14 Q. During the debriefing, was this an overview
15 of the events that transpired?

16 A. It was an over -- do you mind if I have you
17 clarify that a little bit?

18 Q. Absolutely. What I mean to get at, was
19 this typically something that would go over a
20 timeline, or did this discuss failures of that day?

21 A. Both. So we went over a timeline, and we
22 typically do this after every event that we
23 participate in just so we can identify failures and
24 also learn. But, yes, we went over both failures
25 and a timeline.

1 Q. If you could, please, ma'am, could you go
2 over some of the failures that were discussed
3 during the debriefing.

4 A. Some of the failures we identified was
5 preplanning, that we were not a part of the
6 planning procedures and our input was not taken
7 into account. Lack of patrol that was present on
8 that day. Lack of medical planning, at least from
9 our understanding from what was provided to us.
10 Communication is always an obstacle for any of
11 these events, but I feel like things were not
12 clearly identified of who was present in the
13 Command Centers.

14 We just -- in general, Beaver County
15 ESU, I feel like -- we felt like we were just kind
16 of left to our own devices. Thankfully, we do
17 train often, and I think we train very well, so we
18 were able to handle that situation well, I believe,
19 as best as we could.

20 Q. Thank you, ma'am. That was very helpful.
21 Have you been interviewed by any other agencies or
22 law enforcement since July 13?

23 A. Yes. Pennsylvania State Police, they
24 actually came down the day we put this together,
25 which would have been the Monday after -- I believe

1 it was the Monday after July 13th, and FBI was also
2 present with them as well.

3 Q. They were present at the briefing?

4 A. They were not present at the briefing.

5 Q. They were not.

6 A. They were present to interview us. They
7 came down to interview us individually.

8 Q. Okay; thank you. Ma'am, what was your
9 understanding of what the Secret Service's role or
10 job was the day of July 13?

11 A. I'm not really -- I'm not really sure.
12 That wasn't communicated to us. What I would
13 assume their job was was to, obviously, protect
14 Former President Trump, but also have a very good
15 understanding of what was going on in the ground
16 that day, and I'm not sure if that was really
17 happening or not.

18 Q. Thank you. What interactions or meetings
19 did Butler ESU have with Beaver ESU following the
20 shooting?

21 A. To my knowledge, I do not believe that any
22 meetings have occurred.

23 Q. Do you believe a central radio
24 communication channel among law enforcement and
25 those that were working the rally that day would

1 have assisted in the efforts of protecting Former
2 President Trump?

3 A. I think if you limited it to certain
4 individuals are allowed to communicate on it.
5 Like, for example, if everyone had access to the
6 command radio -- but, again, to give radios to all
7 the law enforcement people that were present that
8 day, it's too much chatter. It's too hard. I know
9 that, like, through our county radio system, we
10 have -- every -- different regions are divided up
11 into different radio systems, and then like the
12 medical side also has some radio system.

13 I believe that dispatch can do an
14 all-call across all of them, and I don't know if
15 Butler's command unit has that capability. To my
16 knowledge and understanding, Beaver County, when we
17 go to these events, we have our own command bus
18 that goes out. A dispatcher is present there, and
19 they may have the capability to do like an all-call
20 thing, like, "This is going on." I just don't know
21 if that capability was present or not.

22 Q. How do you feel communication could have
23 been improved for a rally of this size in the
24 future?

25 A. I think knowing that we are in

1 communication with Secret Service would have been
2 nice. I just don't know if that was ever -- if
3 that ever happened. I know Beaver County ESU had
4 no contact with the Secret Service, nor did we have
5 any way to directly reach them. I'm not sure if
6 Butler had the capability or not. I think some
7 type of all-call would have been very helpful to
8 make all agencies aware of what was transpiring.

9 Q. Do you feel that people were aware of what
10 their respective responsibilities were when
11 responding to an active threat on July 13?

12 A. After the threat was identified, but --

13 Q. Or in general in the event that there was a
14 threat or an active threat the day of the rally, do
15 you think that individuals were aware of what each
16 person's respective duties would have been in
17 response?

18 A. I think we had an idea of what those
19 responsibilities were. I think -- at least from
20 our perspective, I think we didn't realize how
21 short-staffed the event was for the size that it
22 was as well.

23 Q. One more question and I'll turn to my
24 colleague. Did anything stand out to you on July
25 13 that seemed out of place? You had mentioned

1 short-staffing and missing elements of planning.
2 But anything else in terms of security posture,
3 anything else that seemed out of place to you that
4 day?

5 A. Lack of just -- lack of patrol and lack of
6 communication from Secret Service. I think those
7 were the biggest ones.

8 [REDACTED]: Thank you.

9 [REDACTED]: Two questions for you.

10 EXAMINATION

11 BY [REDACTED]:

12 Q. So you mentioned that you talked with state
13 police and FBI. Have you talked with Secret
14 Service since?

15 A. No, sir.

16 Q. You said that you were not present during
17 autopsy. Have you seen the autopsy report?

18 A. I have not, no.

19 [REDACTED]: That's all I have. Thank
20 you.

21 [REDACTED]: Majority will go off the
22 record now. Thank you.

23 (Off the record.)
24
25

EXAMINATION

BY [REDACTED]:

Q. So going back to the physician, two quick follow-up questions on that. So there was one physician in the tent and then -- I just want to clarify, to your knowledge, how many physicians were there?

A. So, originally, there was only planned to be one physician there.

Q. Okay.

A. To my knowledge, to my understanding, there was a physician that was traveling with Former President Trump that was supposed to remain with him through the duration. So he went to the scene with Former President Trump, and he was supposed to stay with him throughout the day and travel with him.

From my understanding, what I've gathered later is that he was left at the scene because there was so much chaos. And when Former President Trump was taken to the Butler Hospital, from Butler Hospital -- there was a physician that was working there that day which then traveled with him to his next stop, which I think was New Jersey. I'm not sure. Anyway, so originally planned, there

1 was only supposed to be one physician there that
2 day.

3 Q. Then Former President Trump's physician
4 remained back --

5 A. Yes.

6 Q. -- so there were two that were helping out
7 with the aftermath.

8 A. Yes.

9 Q. And the physician that was planned to be
10 there that day, was she from Allegheny County?

11 A. She's from -- probably -- I'm not sure
12 where she is from. She's from Allegheny Health
13 Network, which is a health service network in the
14 area like UPM -- you guys aren't familiar, but UPMC
15 Health Network and Allegheny Health Network are the
16 two big health networks in the area.

17 Q. Okay.

18 A. Sorry.

19 Q. No, that was my misunderstanding. So when
20 you were at the event that Former President Trump
21 was at with Shell, when was that?

22 A. I want to say it was before -- it was
23 before 2020, so it was probably in 2019, I'm
24 guessing.

25 Q. Was that an outdoor event or --

1 A. Yes, it was outdoor.

2 Q. To your knowledge, during that event, how
3 many Command Posts with there?

4 A. I believe there was only one Command Post.

5 Q. Then on 13 July, did you know that day that
6 there were two different Command Posts, or did you
7 hear that after that fact?

8 A. I had no idea there were two Command Posts,
9 actually. That's news to me.

10 Q. Oh, okay.

11 A. Yes. Yeah. I only knew of the one Command
12 Post that we drove past and where we got our radios
13 from, which was the only one I knew of.

14 Q. Now, we've seen body cam footage of some of
15 what happened that day. Were you wearing a body
16 cam that day?

17 A. I did not have -- I had one, but I did not
18 turn it on. It would not have changed anything
19 because the battery wasn't working anyway.

20 Q. Then you had brought up the word patrol.
21 That you thought there would be more patrol.

22 A. Yes.

23 Q. What specifically are you talking about
24 with that word?

25 A. So patrol just means to me like a local law

enforcement.

[REDACTED]: Any particular agencies that you would have expected to be there or to be running that point of patrol that day?

[REDACTED]: So I can't speak to Butler, because I'm not as familiar with their jurisdiction. So Pennsylvania has a ton of townships, and they're all individual police jurisdictions. So, for example, for Butler -- or Beaver County, we have -- I don't even know how many municipalities we have, but we would basically reach out to everyone, saying, "Hey, We have this big event going on here. We need support," and they would offer up officers to come support that event.

We just had a local event that was nothing like this scale, but I want to say almost every department in the county sent in extra officers to be there, to be present. So I would assume that any agency that's nearby -- I will say after the shooting occurred when we were leaving, there were people from, for example, Adams Township, which is near Cranberry Township -- you're talking that's like probably 45 minutes to an hour away from Butler. They had driven in as

extra support to kind of help with perimeter and whatnot.

[REDACTED]: Would you describe state troopers, Pennsylvania State Police as falling within that patrol bucket? How do you view that?

[REDACTED]: They're an interesting entity in the fact that they operate a lot differently than we do, but they do come in and support often. So events that we've had in Beaver County, they've come in and supported us. So, yes, they would come in and support. To what degree they would be able to give us officers, I'm not sure as far as how many troopers. I don't know.

BY [REDACTED]:

Q. Then the final question from me, and then I'll turn it over to my colleague. When the building -- AGR Building was cleared due to the bomb threat, was there a perimeter that was set up around to prevent people from going into the building?

A. I'm not sure on the -- so we were on the parking lot side of the building, so I'm not sure from the field side of the building if there was anybody on that side, because we stayed where we were. Again, we were expecting someone from state

1 police or -- well, state police or Secret Service
2 or FBI or someone to approach us to say like --
3 taking down our names, phone numbers, information
4 to reach out to us later. So we only stayed on
5 that one side.

6 So from our side there really was not a
7 perimeter, so that's why we kind of spread out a
8 little bit. I know that some of the operators that
9 put their night vision on came at nighttime to make
10 sure that no one was coming through the woods,
11 because we didn't know what the -- the perimeter
12 was set up on the other side of those woods,
13 because anybody could probably walk through those
14 woods. No one was there.

15 Q. So how long was your team in the parking
16 lot that evening?

17 A. We were there from the time that I got on
18 the roof till I want to say a little after midnight
19 when we left there.

20 Q. And it was you and Det. [REDACTED]?

21 A. [REDACTED].

22 Q. [REDACTED]?

23 A. I forget how to spell his name.

24 [REDACTED], maybe.

25 Q. And it was the two of you that went up to

the roof.

A. Yes.

Q. And then when you got back to the parking lot, did the rest of your team join you?

A. By that time they were there. So we -- while we were on the roof, our team then moved over to the AGR Building and was helping to clear not only -- before the bomb threat occurred, helping to clear not only the building, but also there was a couple Conex boxes, so storage containers that were there. They were trying to get into there to clear those -- and some outside the building. So they were helping to try to clear those.

The water tower, we did look at that, but no one climbed up on top of the water tower because, one, it was locked, and it was just pointless -- or it wasn't pointless. It just didn't seem like it was the best use of our time.

[REDACTED]: Okay. I'm going to turn it over to my colleague to see if she has follow-up questions.

[REDACTED]: Okay; thank you. Just a few clarifying points.

EXAMINATION

BY [REDACTED]:

Q. Sorry. I apologize if we're retreading or if I misheard something. I believe you said starting out the day you were positioned at the main entrance. You were supposed to stay there, and I think you referred to tuck in --

A. Yes.

Q. -- and only respond. What does "tuck in" mean to you?

A. Tuck in, just to kind of keep out of the way of the people that were coming in, but also -- I mean, we were there observing. The officers that I was with that day, at least two of them have at least 20 years of service, I would say. And the other ones have many years of service. So we were all kind of watching everybody walking in.

Tuck in, what I mean is we weren't meant to not be involved because -- I guess tuck in might not be a great word, because you may think of tuck in as -- there were those livestock barns there, so I guess tuck in might to some people be perceived as us sitting inside the barns and not actually being visible. We were visible. Our BearCat was -- our emergency services vehicle was there. We

1 were visible the whole time.

2 Q. And that's exactly what my question was, if
3 there was any suggestion that you shouldn't be
4 seen.

5 A. No, no.

6 Q. That you should remain out of sight.

7 A. Just, like, kind of be present but not --
8 you know, I think the perception was communicated
9 to us that we didn't want to scare anybody because
10 sometimes people walking around with long guns can
11 spook people.

12 Q. Who did that instruction come from?

13 A. I want to say that came from Butler County
14 ESU. It was never that we weren't supposed to be
15 seen. It was just like not to appear threatening.

16 Q. And I think we've asked a few times if
17 Beaver ESU had any direct communications with
18 Secret Service. I've understood you to say no
19 direct contact there.

20 A. None.

21 Q. So you're getting your information through
22 Butler County ESU. Do you have any understanding
23 of the communications, if any, between Secret
24 Service and Butler?

25 A. I think we all assumed that there was a

1 Secret Service representative within that command
2 bus, and so when we were communicating to Butler,
3 we assumed that that was being passed on directly
4 to Secret Service, but we're not sure if that
5 actually occurred or not.

6 Q. Was there anybody from Beaver ESU in that
7 command bus?

8 A. No, ma'am. Which, to add to that --

9 Q. Please.

10 A. -- is surprising to me, because I think,
11 like I said before, when we do events, we always
12 have at least one representative from every agency.
13 We try to have at least one representative for
14 every agency in there so they can be a part of
15 what's happening, and in realtime rather than
16 delay.

17 Q. Did you have any understanding that you
18 were -- that Beaver County was told "Don't come in
19 the command bus"? Did you make any request to be
20 in there?

21 A. I don't know if that conversation ever
22 occurred.

23 Q. Okay. And who would you have expected to
24 be in there? Would that have been Commander [REDACTED]?

25 A. Probably Commander [REDACTED].

1 Q. But you said that he was by radio -- issued
2 a Butler ESU radio to be able to communicate with
3 that --

4 A. Directly with Command, yes.

5 Q. Okay; thank you. And, again, I just want
6 to make sure I understand the radio situation.
7 Commander [REDACTED] has, it sounds like he was wearing
8 two radios. Like is he wearing two physical
9 devices, one to communicate with your Beaver ESU
10 team and one that Butler ESU issued him to
11 communicate with that Command Post --

12 A. He --

13 Q. -- or is he monitoring two different
14 channels?

15 A. He's monitoring two different channels,
16 which, to be honest, that would not be hard,
17 because we didn't start using the Beaver County
18 radios until the incident went off, and he would
19 have been -- the radios that we communicate through
20 will be pumped through the BearCat itself.

21 So it's like listening to a car radio.
22 He doesn't have to listen to it in his ear. He
23 doesn't have to hold a handheld. He can just
24 listen to that in realtime. The Command radio that
25 he was given by Butler would be something that he'd

1 have to hold in his hand and make sure that he's
2 hearing it and listening to it properly.

3 Q. So he wouldn't ordinarily on that BearCat
4 radio have access to the Butler channel or --

5 A. I don't believe the Butler channel can come
6 into our BearCat, no. And they may have been
7 operating on a -- so, for example, like our radios
8 in Beaver County, we have our ESU channel, but we
9 also have like -- there's tactical channels,
10 there's local police channels. Then Butler County,
11 I'm not sure what frequencies they were using that
12 day, if it was their tactical -- their ESU channel
13 and another tactical channel, because they'll do
14 different operational channels to stay off of local
15 radio because, obviously, there were things
16 occurring that were outside what we were
17 experiencing that day.

18 So to answer your question, no, I don't
19 believe that he would have had the ability to
20 listen to the Beaver County -- I'm sorry, Butler
21 County Command radio through our BearCat, no. He
22 would have needed that individual radio.

23 Q. Then you were wearing a radio that just had
24 communications to the Beaver ESU team, which I
25 think you said was around six people that day?

1 A. Yes, ma'am.

2 Q. I just want to make sure I have those names
3 correct. You, Commander [REDACTED], [REDACTED],
4 [REDACTED], [REDACTED], [REDACTED], [REDACTED]?

5 A. [REDACTED], yes.

6 Q. Okay. And you said another individual who
7 had to leave early.

8 A. Yes.

9 Q. So, essentially, it sounds like seven plus
10 you were there over the course of the day.

11 A. Yes.

12 Q. Anybody else that we've missed?

13 A. Then there was [REDACTED] that was in the
14 AGR Building. He was not sitting with us directly.
15 And then there was [REDACTED]. He was also
16 separate, but he left early as well before
17 Mr. Trump even arrived. I think he may have left
18 around 4:00, but I'm not sure on that time.

19 Q. So that first group of folks that I listed
20 off, those were sitting at the entrance with you?

21 A. They were there with me, yes, the entire
22 time.

23 Q. Then when the shooting occurred, or I guess
24 just before the shooting when you said you were
25 sort of putting on your gear, going into BearCat,

1 did all of those folks go in the BearCat with you?
2 Did any remain at the entrance?

3 A. No, we all went in the BearCat, which would
4 be normal. We would not leave anyone behind.

5 Q. You operate as a team in there.

6 A. Yes.

7 Q. I think perhaps my last question, you said
8 you've been on teams like this before -- you tried
9 not to move anything when you were on the roof, and
10 you were waiting for somebody to come up who would
11 be in charge of the investigation. Who did you
12 anticipate being in charge of the investigation?

13 A. I wasn't sure if it was going to be Secret
14 Service or FBI. I was expecting someone -- either
15 FBI or Secret Service to come up.

16 Q. Then you said a gentleman from the Secret
17 Service did come up. I think you didn't recall his
18 name.

19 A. He never gave his name, actually.

20 Q. Never gave his name. Dark suit, red tie.

21 A. Yes.

22 Q. Did you have an understanding that he was
23 then in charge of the investigation?

24 A. That's what it seemed like based on the
25 questions he was asking and his demeanor on the

scene.

: I think that was all I
have. Anything else?

EXAMINATION

BY :

Q. Any other final recommendations or thoughts
about July 13th?

A. I think we covered it pretty much. I think
I said all I can to help you guys with. If there's
anything else, please let me know.

: We can go off the
record.

(Witness excused.)


