September 11, 2024, and this is a transcribed
interview of [REDACTED].

House Resolution 1367 directed this Task
Force to investigate the facts and circumstances of
the attempted assassination of Donald J. Trump on
July 13, 2024 in Butler, Pennsylvania.

Pursuant to House Resolution 1367,
Chairman Kelly and Ranking Member Crow have
requested this interview as part of the Task Force
investigation.

Q. Can the witness please state his name and
spell your name for the record.

A. [REDACTED]

Q. Thank you, [REDACTED].

My name is [REDACTED], and I am
Special Counsel and a consultant with the Task
Force. I want to thank you for coming in today for
this interview.

The Task Force recognizes and
appreciates that you are here voluntarily. You're
allowed to have an attorney present to advise you
during this interview.

Do you have an attorney representing you

in a personal capacity present with you today?

A. No.

Q. There are no members of Congress currently present. For the record, if there were members, they would introduce themselves.

So what I'll do now is turn to the staff and the consultants who are present, starting with the Majority.

Can the Majority please introduce yourself to the witness.

Q. [REDACTED], before we begin, I'd like to go over the ground rules for this interview.

The way the interview will proceed is as follows: The Majority and Minority staff will alternate asking you questions, 30 minutes per side, per round, until each side is finished with

its questioning.

The Majority staff will begin and proceed for 30 minutes, and then the Minority staff will have 30 minutes to ask questions. We will then alternate back and forth in this manner until both sides have no questions.

If either side is in the middle of a specific line of questioning, they may choose to end a few minutes past each half an hour to ensure completion of that specific line of questioning, including any pertinent followups.

In this interview, while one member of the staff for each side may lead the questioning, additional staff may ask questions.

There's a court reporter taking down everything I say and everything that you say to make a written record of this interview.

For the record to be clear, please wait until the staff member questioning you finishes each question before you begin your answer, and the staff member will wait until you finish your response before proceeding to the next question.

Further, to ensure the court reporter can properly record this interview, please speak clearly, concisely and slowly.

1 The court reporter cannot record
2 nonverbal answers such as nodding or shaking your
3 head. So it is important that you answer each
4 question with an audible, verbal answer.

5 Do you understand?

6 A. I do.

7 Q. We want you to answer our questions in the
8 most complete and truthful manner possible, so we
9 will take our time.

10 If you have any questions or do not
11 fully understand the question, please let us know
12 and we will attempt to clarify, add context to, or
13 rephrase our questions.

14 Do you understand?

15 A. Yes, I do.

16 Q. If we ask about specific conversations or
17 events in the past and you're unable to recall the
18 exact words or details, you should testify to the
19 substance of those conversations or events to the
20 best of your recollection.

21 If you recall only a part of a
22 conversation or event, you should give us your best
23 recollection of those events or parts of
24 conversations that you recall.

25 Do you understand?

1 A. Yes.

2 Q. And although you are here voluntarily and
3 we will not swear you in today, you are required,
4 pursuant to 18 U.S.C. § 1001, to answer all
5 questions from Congress truthfully. This also
6 applies to questions posed by Congressional staff
7 in an interview.

8 Do you understand?

9 A. Yes.

10 Q. If at any time you make knowingly false
11 statements, you could be subject to criminal
12 prosecution.

13 Do you understand?

14 A. Yes.

15 Q. Is there any reason you are unable to
16 provide truthful testimony in today's interview?

17 A. No.

18 Q. Please note that if you wish to assert a
19 privilege over any statement today, that assertion
20 must apply within the rules of the Task Force on
21 the attempted assassination of Donald J. Trump.

22 For the Chair to consider assertions of
23 privilege over testimony or statements, witnesses
24 or entities must clearly state the specific
25 privilege being asserted and the reason for the

1 assertion on or before the scheduled date of
2 testimony or appearance.

3 Do you understand?

4 A. Yes.

5 Q. Finally, I'd like to note that the content
6 of what we discuss here today is confidential. We
7 ask that you not speak about what we discuss today
8 in this interview to any outside individual in
9 order to preserve the integrity of the
10 investigation.

11 For these same reasons, the marked
12 exhibits today will be provided to the court
13 reporter so they may go onto the official
14 transcript, and any copies of those exhibits will
15 be returned to us when we wrap.

16 We plan to take a five-minute break at
17 the end of each 30 minutes of questioning, but if
18 you need a longer break before that, please let us
19 know and we're happy to accommodate.

20 However, to the extent that there is a
21 pending question, we would ask that you finish
22 answering the question before we take the break.

23 Do you understand that?

24 A. Yes.

25 Q. Do you have any questions before we begin?

1 A. No.

2 Q. I'm going to start the timer here. I'm
3 going to set the timer for 30 minutes and start
4 the Majority questioning.

5 [REDACTED] what is your job title and
6 your responsibilities?

7 A. My full-time job is I'm a police sergeant
8 with the [REDACTED] and a
9 K-9 handler, and then I'm on our Beaver County
10 Emergency Services Unit as an assistant team leader
11 for the sniper unit.

12 Q. And how long have you worked in that
13 capacity?

14 A. I've been in law enforcement for 25 years,
15 and I've been with the Emergency Services Unit for
16 about 16 total, 17.

17 Q. And how long specifically have you had the
18 role that you currently have?

19 A. Probably three years.

20 Q. When did you first become aware of the
21 Donald Trump event on July 13th?

22 A. I believe it would have been the Tuesday
23 prior to the 13th. The exact date I'm not sure.

24 Q. So somewhat shortly before the event?

25 A. Yes.

1 Q. And how did you learn about it?

2 A. Through a text message.

3 Q. And who sent you the text message?

4 A. The text message was sent out by our deputy
5 commander from our Emergency Services Unit
6 requesting availability for the assistance in the
7 rally.

8 Q. And who's your deputy commander?

9 A. [REDACTED]

10 Q. And he was asking for volunteers for that
11 day or for availability?

12 A. Availability.

13 Q. Availability. So it would not have been in
14 a volunteer capacity? It would have been in an
15 official capacity of just who was available?

16 A. Yes. Our team is a multi-jurisdictional.
17 We're not a full-time, so...

18 Everybody has a full-time job, and then
19 that's kind of like you help out as you can.

20 Q. Okay. And then when you received this
21 text, do you recall -- not specific words -- but
22 generally what you said in response?

23 A. I originally was scheduled daylight at my
24 full-time job that day, and we knew it was going to
25 be an all-day event.

1 So my original thing was I was available
2 after 3 p.m. until the close of the day.

3 Q. Okay. And you communicated this to your
4 deputy commander?

5 A. I communicated that directly to
6 [REDACTED], who is our sniper team leader, and I
7 guess it was in a group text. So I guess, yeah,
8 they would have all got it.

9 Q. So when were you actually assigned to work
10 on that event?

11 A. Well, that day, originally I was going to
12 work from roughly 3 p.m. until the close of the
13 event, but I ended up -- we had an extra guy
14 available to work at my full-time job. So because
15 of the size of the event, I decided to work the
16 entire day.

17 Q. Okay. And you communicated this to your
18 deputy commander in that group chain or to

19 [REDACTED]

20 A. Yes.

21 Q. And was that the same day that you were
22 informed of the event, that you could do it the
23 full day, or was that sometime after?

24 A. It may have been a day or so after. I'm
25 not positive.

Q. So you looked at your schedule, and you realized you could do the full day at some point?

A. Yeah, because originally I know [REDACTED] -- there were only two of our snipers from the team that could work, myself and [REDACTED], and [REDACTED] had to leave early that day, and basically we were going to swap positions.

Q. Got it. And just backing up a bit on your training as a sniper, can you just tell us a little bit about the training that you received as a sniper?

A. So I've been to three separate sniper qualification trainings through the NTOA, Pennsylvania State Police, and the third one, I don't remember the name of the company. It was about 20 years ago.

Q. Okay.

A. And the owner, he's deceased now. I can't remember the name of the company, but it was out of Moundsville, West Virginia.

And then I've been to multiple one- and two-day training courses offered by the NTOA, the OTOA -- the Ohio Tactical Officers Association; NTOA is the National Tactical Officers Association -- and then the PNOA, which is the

1 Pennsylvania Tactical Officers Association.

2 I've been to numerous trainings with
3 that, and then we train twice a month as a unit, as
4 well.

5 Q. Got it. Is there any kind of, like,
6 licensing that you get as a sniper?

7 A. Just like I said, we go through basic
8 courses, and you get a certificate for that and
9 that makes you operational. I've been to three of
10 them.

11 Q. Right. Understood. You may have already
12 answered this, but just to be clear: Who at the
13 Beaver County Emergency Services Unit was
14 responsible for work assignments for that July 13
15 event?

16 Do you know?

17 A. As far as?

18 Q. Who was making the decision about asking
19 people, and then who was going to actually do the
20 event?

21 Do you know?

22 A. So, I mean, [REDACTED] was the individual
23 that sent the response out for availability.

24 Q. Right.

25 A. And then anybody that was available to work

1 responded that they could or couldn't.

2 I mean, our team really had no input in
3 assignments at the event. We went wherever we were
4 told or asked to by Butler County because we were
5 an assisting agency. We were there as a support
6 system, not as the overall command of the project.

7 Q. Okay. So your understanding was that
8 Butler County was asking for support to your team
9 leaders, and that your team leaders would then ask
10 the team, "Who's available to do this?"

11 A. Yeah. Butler asked for assistance in
12 support of the event for manpower.

13 Q. Right.

14 A. And, yeah, they basically reached out, and
15 then we got numbers and provided those numbers to
16 Butler.

17 Q. Was there any specific request that you
18 knew about for snipers from ESU here?

19 A. Directly, I'm not sure, but my
20 understanding is originally they had asked for
21 operators and then a day or so later asked for
22 snipers.

23 Q. And what are operators?

24 A. Operators would be your typical SWAT guy.
25 Like entry guys, ground guys.

1 Q. So can you tell us what your understanding
2 of what your assignment was for the July 13th
3 event?

4 A. So for the event, my understanding was that
5 we were advised by Butler County to occupy a
6 building which was the AGR building.

7 We were to occupy the second floor of
8 the building and observe over basically the
9 entrance of the event, through the crowd, to the
10 rear of the event from an elevated position away
11 from the event.

12 Q. And did that strike you as a normal type of
13 request or anything unusual about it, from your
14 experience?

15 A. From my experience, I didn't understand the
16 purpose of what we were instructed to observe
17 basically because in that type of role, I was
18 assuming we'd be counter-sniper unit, not a sniper
19 unit.

20 Q. Right. And why is that? Explain that
21 difference. I think I know what it is, but please
22 explain for the record.

23 A. Like a counter-sniper unit would be a
24 situation where you're looking for a target;
25 whereas, a sniper, you know your target.

1 So like in this instance, Donald Trump
2 would be a target. So as a counter-sniper, you'd
3 be looking for somebody trying to assault him; to
4 where the individual that's trying to assault
5 Mr. Trump would be the sniper because he has a
6 target.

7 Q. Right. Right. Understood. And the reason
8 that you mentioned that you didn't really
9 understand exactly the purpose because you were not
10 told that you were a counter-sniper unit? You were
11 told you were a sniper unit?

12 A. No. For that type of an event, typically
13 you would deploy counter-sniper units because
14 you're in a protective detail.

15 Q. Right.

16 A. So you're there to find somebody trying to
17 assault the target.

18 Q. Right.

19 A. And from the position and the
20 responsibility that we were given and told to
21 cover, it didn't make sense to me, but...

22 Q. And can you explain that a little more?

23 Why didn't it make sense to you?

24 A. Because we were -- I mean, we were
25 observing the crowd in front of the stage as

1 opposed to looking out away from the event in
2 toward -- I don't know how to explain that.

3 But we were looking from back into the
4 event instead of in the event out.

5 Q. I see. Understood. And the reason for
6 that is because if you're a counter-sniper, you're
7 looking for other snipers or shooters who are
8 outside of that immediate area?

9 A. Yes.

10 Q. And you'd want to be able to identify them
11 from away from the crowd?

12 A. Yes. And also the crowd was going through
13 a secured entry point. So...

14 Q. Right. As far as you know, they had
15 magnetometers and that kind of thing?

16 A. Yes. And like I said, it's a secured entry
17 point, which everybody was screened coming through,
18 and, you know, we're over-watching with lethal
19 force.

20 Q. Right. It seemed like it was overdoing it?

21 A. I don't want to say overdoing it. Just the
22 assignment didn't make sense to me, but...

23 Q. Did you have any conversations with anybody
24 about the fact that you didn't think it made sense
25 prior to going to the event?

1 A. Well, I didn't know -- we didn't know what
2 we were doing prior to the event. I found out that
3 morning what my assignment was.

4 Q. I see. Okay. I'm going to go through that
5 day in a second.

6 When you learned the day of the event
7 that you were not really in a counter-sniper
8 position but in a sniper position focused on the
9 crowd in front of where Mr. Trump would be, did you
10 have any conversations with anyone at that point
11 that you didn't understand why you were doing this?

12 A. Yeah. So once we were taken into the
13 location that we were to occupy, Butler County had
14 pointed out a couple different positions that they
15 identified as where they would like us to post.

16 Once I posted on my position, I had a
17 conversation with [REDACTED], who is our sniper
18 team leader, and I basically said to him that the
19 position that they put us in didn't make sense.

20 But we were there as a support unit.
21 That's where they asked us to be. So that's where
22 we stayed.

23 Q. Do you recall what [REDACTED] said in
24 response, if anything?

25 A. I think basically it was the conversation

1 that "This is what we were asked to do, so..."

2 Q. Right. Okay. Did you get the sense that
3 he agreed that it didn't make a lot of sense?

4 A. Yes.

5 Q. Anybody else that you spoke to that you can
6 recall that had the same view or a different view?

7 A. Not that day.

8 Q. Okay. But that moment, that day, it was
9 [REDACTED] who was effectively your boss for that
10 day?

11 A. Yes.

12 Q. And he had a similar view, from your
13 impression?

14 A. Yes.

15 Q. And as far as you understood it at the
16 time, putting it at the time versus now, you
17 understood it to be Butler County that was telling
18 people where to go or somebody else?

19 A. I mean, as far as I knew, Butler County
20 because we were -- I mean, that's who we were asked
21 to support and that's their jurisdiction.

22 Q. Understood. Understood. And you were
23 aware that the Secret Service was present, but at
24 that point, you hadn't had any contact with them;
25 correct?

1 A. No. Yeah. I mean yes, I knew they were
2 present. No, I did not have any contact with them.

3 Q. Right. Understood. Had you ever worked an
4 event like this before for a presidential
5 candidate?

6 A. Not really in that capacity. I've been
7 involved with some over the years but not in that
8 capacity.

9 Q. What kind of capacities had you been
10 involved in before?

11 A. I've been involved with basic from a patrol
12 side as a uniformed officer, and several years ago
13 I was involved when I was an operator on our team,
14 but we were in a response mode, basically a full-
15 response mode positioned away from the event.

16 Q. Understood. So you had not been in a
17 sniper role at a presidential candidate event like
18 that before, in that physical type of role?

19 A. No.

20 Q. Tell us a bit about what types of events or
21 situations that you've been in a sniper role
22 outside of presidential candidate events, just
23 generally.

24 A. Basically, it's been through -- I mean just
25 deployments as far as barricaded subjects, hostage

1 situations, search warrants for different stuff.

2 Q. Right, okay. So you had experience in live
3 situations as a sniper?

4 A. Yes.

5 Q. And would you say you had a lot of
6 experience in that capacity?

7 A. A decent amount.

8 Q. You consider yourself -- you knew what you
9 were doing?

10 A. Yes.

11 Q. I mentioned the Secret Service before, and
12 you said that you knew they were there. You hadn't
13 had any contact with them at that point.

14 But did you have any expectations about
15 what their role was at that event at that point?

16 A. I mean, we weren't really told what their
17 role was. They weren't present at the briefing,
18 so...

19 I mean, we knew at some point that they
20 were going to have a sniper unit there, a counter-
21 sniper unit, but, yeah, that was about it.

22 I mean, I knew they were going to be
23 there because the president was going to be there.

24 Q. Right. But you had no other information
25 about that?

1 A. No.

2 Q. You mentioned the briefing that morning, I
3 guess. Generally speaking, not all the people, but
4 who was present at that briefing?

5 A. Our unit was there, Beaver County Emergency
6 Services Unit. Butler County Emergency Services
7 Unit and then Washington CERT.

8 Q. Washington... I'm sorry?

9 A. A SWAT.

10 Q. A SWAT, okay.

11 A. Washington County SWAT.

12 Q. Okay. And who was leading that briefing?

13 A. Butler County.

14 Q. Do you remember the name of the person?

15 A. I do not. I do not. I don't know those
16 guys that well.

17 Q. Right. Was it one person who was leading
18 the briefing or multiple people?

19 A. So I know -- the individual that was
20 basically handling the briefing, I believe he's a
21 team leader for one of their assault teams. And
22 then one of their -- they have three commanders on
23 the team. He was kind of standing there. Not
24 really involved but involved, if that makes sense.

25 Q. Right.

1 A. But the individual that was handling the
2 briefing directly was one of their team leaders.

3 Q. Understood. Was there any mention at that
4 meeting of any concern about a specific threat that
5 was known or suspected?

6 A. No. Not that I recall.

7 Q. Occasionally when I ask you questions, I'm
8 going to tell you things that we don't think you
9 know, but I do that in order to set context, not to
10 try to put any information in your head.

11 So one of the things I'm about to do is
12 tell you something we don't think you know. If you
13 do, tell me you did know this.

14 So prior to the July 13 event, prior to
15 that morning, we understand that there were a
16 series of meetings between local law enforcement at
17 large and the Secret Service before the actual talk
18 about the planning for the event.

19 Were you aware of those meetings?

20 A. I mean, no, but I mean --

21 Q. You assumed?

22 A. I've been doing this long enough that,
23 yeah, I kind of know the process. So...

24 Q. At the briefing you were at, did anybody
25 mention that they had been meeting with the Secret

1 Service to discuss the event?

2 A. I believe. So we had the briefing, the
3 initial briefing, and then [REDACTED] had asked
4 what basically our assignments of snipers were
5 going to be, and we were told that once the
6 briefing concluded, that we would have a separate
7 sniper briefing.

8 Q. Okay.

9 A. And that they would tell us at that point
10 what we were going to do for the day.

11 And so in that little conversation, we
12 were basically told that originally Secret Service
13 wasn't sending snipers, and then they were sending
14 snipers, and then it was only going to be one team
15 but then they decided to send two teams.

16 So that's kind of where I knew that they
17 had conversation with the Secret Service prior, but
18 like I said, I mean, I assumed because --

19 Q. They were referring to it?

20 A. -- that's how you do stuff, I mean.

21 Q. Right. Okay. And you mentioned that there
22 was an initial briefing, and then you were told
23 there would be a second sort of sniper-specific
24 briefing?

25 A. Yes.

1 Q. And can you tell us about that?

2 Did that briefing actually occur, that
3 second briefing?

4 A. I guess, yes. It was basically a
5 conversation that was, "Hey, you're going here.
6 Your guys are going here. This is what we want you
7 to cover. Come over here and get your radios."

8 Q. Got it. And who led that second briefing?

9 A. Butler's sniper team leader. Name, I'm not
10 sure.

11 Q. You don't know his name? That's fine.

12 And your team was present for that
13 briefing?

14 A. Yes. Me and [REDACTED].

15 Q. Was anybody else from Butler present other
16 than the person who was the leader?

17 A. There were people there.

18 Q. You don't know who they were?

19 A. Yeah. I believe there were some from
20 Butler there because, like, we wear multi-cam,
21 Butler wears multi-cam, and Washington wears blue.

22 Q. Right.

23 A. But sometimes their snipers wear multi-
24 cam. So...

25 Q. Right, right. "Multi-cam" meaning multi-

1 camouflage?

2 A. Yes.

3 Q. Right, okay. Occasionally if I know what
4 you're talking about, I might just say it just so
5 that the record is clear to somebody who doesn't
6 know what that is.

7 A. Okay.

8 Q. So in the course of the first briefing and
9 then the sort of second briefing with Butler
10 County, were you told that your job was to focus on
11 the crowd?

12 A. Yes. The separate briefing from the
13 original. The sniper briefing, I guess.

14 Q. Understood. Did the Butler people who were
15 telling you that's your assignment, did they
16 express any views about whether that made sense?

17 A. No. They told us -- they took us into the
18 AGR building. We had a site map. And they
19 basically gave us areas of responsibility.

20 Q. Okay. So did both briefings happen in the
21 AGR building or only one of the two?

22 A. No. So the briefing happened at the Brady
23 Paul Memorial Lodge, which is the state police's
24 F.O.P. Lodge.

25 Q. Understood.

1 A. That's where the briefing happened. And
2 then after the initial briefing with everybody
3 involved, it kind of broke off into operators, QRF,
4 snipers, patrol, whatever.

5 In that sniper briefing there was
6 basically when we were given maps and told that,
7 "This is your area of responsibility."

8 And then they had said, "You guys are
9 going over to the AGR building." I had never been
10 to that site prior to. I live an hour away from
11 Butler.

12 Q. Right.

13 A. I don't know anything up there. So I'm
14 like, "Where's the AGR building?"

15 Q. Right.

16 A. And they were like, "One of our guys will
17 take you over there."

18 So we then went across to the barn that
19 was directly behind the stage, and that's where one
20 of the Butler sniper team leader guys had some of
21 his equipment and he gave us two radios and then
22 told us what channel we were operating off of, and
23 then they said, "Okay. We'll meet you over at the
24 AGR building."

25 Q. Understood.

1 A. So then we drove over to the AGR building
2 and met there outside. We then went in.

3 They gave [REDACTED] a keycard access
4 to get into the building. When we got over
5 there -- because we had left the lot -- [REDACTED]
6 basically said, "I know where the AGR building is,"
7 because you could see it from that point.

8 Q. Right.

9 A. And [REDACTED] said, "I'm going to stop at
10 Sheetz and get a drink real quick and then we'll
11 head over."

12 Q. Okay.

13 A. I said, "Well, I'll follow you over."

14 So I followed him over. We went to
15 Sheetz. He got a drink. We then drove over to the
16 AGR building and parked in the lot, and we were the
17 only two there at the time.

18 Q. Okay.

19 A. So [REDACTED] and I backed our cars up to the
20 door, took our equipment out, set it on the first
21 floor and waited. And then Butler, a team leader
22 and then one of their operators -- or one of their
23 snipers -- had shown up.

24 Q. Okay. I'm going to ask you a couple of
25 questions about that meeting before we do that,

1 just for the record.

2 You said that you got two
3 walkie-talkies?

4 A. Yes.

5 Q. And that you were told which channels you
6 were on?

7 A. Yes.

8 Q. Did you have an understanding at that point
9 who would be also on those channels, what other law
10 enforcement?

11 A. Yeah. So it was Butler 4. I'm pretty sure
12 that these are the channels: Butler 4 was going to
13 be the tactical channel; Butler 3 was going to be
14 the patrol channel; and I think 5 was the medics or
15 something like that.

16 Q. Okay.

17 A. But we were specifically told we were
18 operating off of Channel 4, which was a tactical
19 channel.

20 Q. Okay. And just explain to us what you
21 understood "tactical" to mean.

22 A. Tactical, to me, would have been all the
23 tactical officers on scene, being the emergency
24 response units that would be responding to an
25 incident, not patrol which would be the uniformed

1 ground guys.

2 Q. Understood. And did you have any
3 understanding as to whether or not the Secret
4 Service had access to Butler 4?

5 A. No, I didn't.

6 Q. You didn't know --

7 A. Yeah.

8 Q. -- one way or the other? Okay.

9 A. I would have assumed but...

10 Q. Right. No one told you they did or did
11 not?

12 A. No.

13 Q. And then you mentioned Sheetz. Can you
14 just tell us what that means?

15 A. Oh, Sheetz. You're not from around here.
16 Sheetz is basically a gas station.

17 Q. Oh, Sheetz. Got it.

18 A. Sheetz.

19 Q. Sheetz gas station?

20 A. Yes.

21 Q. I wasn't sure if there were sheets of,
22 like, construction.

23 A. No. Sheetz is a gas station.

24 Q. I know Sheetz, okay. Got it. Got it.

25 So now let's go back to that you're in

the first floor of the AGR building waiting for Butler to come.

Do you remember -- I'm not looking for exact times -- but just best recollection about what time they arrived?

A. So, I mean, basically while we were unloading our equipment is when they pulled in. So it wasn't like we were waiting on them. But it was probably 10:30-ish maybe, roughly, give or take. I'm not exactly positive.

Q. Got it. And without going into too many specifics, your equipment included your weapons?

A. Yes.

Q. And sights?

A. Yes.

Q. Okay. And it was just the two of you, [REDACTED] and yourself initially, who ended up going?

A. Yes.

Q. How many people from Butler do you recall came over?

A. Two. One sniper and then their team leader. So there were three of us positioned in the building: myself, [REDACTED], and then [REDACTED] from Butler.

1 And then their team leader came over
2 basically to show us the building because I had
3 never been there and [REDACTED] had never been there. I
4 don't know if [REDACTED] was or not.

5 Q. Got it, okay.

6 A. But he basically walked us through the
7 building up to the second floor, the team leader.

8 Q. And the team leader is the one who told you
9 that you're going to focus on the crowd?

10 That was your job?

11 A. Yes.

12 Q. And did you or [REDACTED] say anything about
13 your concern about, "Why are we doing that?"

14 A. No. Not to them.

15 Q. Not to them, right. To each other, but not
16 to them?

17 A. Yes.

18 Q. And then the team leader took you on a tour
19 of the building or at least parts of the building?

20 A. I wouldn't say -- yeah, I don't want to say
21 a tour of the building, but he walked us -- it's
22 not a big building but it's not a small building --
23 he walked us through up to the second floor, and
24 then he did show us around on the second floor of
25 that portion of the building that we were

1 occupying.

2 Q. Okay. And that's when you first saw where
3 you were going to be stationed?

4 A. Yes.

5 Q. And describe what you saw.

6 A. So when we got -- when we were taken up to
7 the second floor of the building, we were told
8 that -- you know, all the windows in the building,
9 there were several that were open and some that
10 weren't. The windows that weren't open, they
11 couldn't open.

12 There were -- I don't know -- three or
13 four different positions -- I want to say four --
14 that Butler basically said, "These are the
15 positions that we have identified that we think
16 offer the best observation of what we would like
17 you to cover. You guys go ahead and get wherever
18 you feel is necessary."

19 Q. I see.

20 A. So I had picked -- basically it was the
21 room -- I don't know if you guys -- do you have our
22 pictures?

23 [REDACTED]: Do you want these
24 (indicating)?

25 [REDACTED] Yeah. I was going to use

1 that. We can use it now.

2 [REDACTED]: Which one do you want?

3 This offers a decent shot.

4 [REDACTED]: Okay, great. I'll take that
5 one. Thank you.

6 (Majority Exhibit No. 1 was marked for
7 identification.)

8 BY [REDACTED]:

9 Q. I'm going to show you what we're going to
10 mark as [REDACTED] Exhibit 1, and what I'd ask you to
11 do -- this is a map or an overview, I should say,
12 of the area for the event -- can you identify on
13 there what building you were in?

14 A. How do you want to identify it?

15 Q. We can actually give you a pen, and you can
16 just circle it or put an X on it.

17 A. So this (indicating) is the building that I
18 was in.

19 Q. Right. And this (indicating) is the stage
20 area?

21 A. Yes.

22 Q. And in that, can you identify, just
23 generally, where you set up?

24 A. So my sniper rifle was set up in this
25 second window here (indicating).

1 [REDACTED]: Make sure you guys see that.

2 [REDACTED]: Yep. We're good. Thank
3 you.

4 BY [REDACTED]

5 Q. So you set up here (indicating) -- just to
6 restate some of your testimony -- you set up
7 here (indicating) after the Butler leader had told
8 you, "This is your job. Watch the stage area, and
9 choose where you think is the best spot for you to
10 see that line of sight"?

11 A. Yes.

12 Q. And this was roughly around 10:30 to 11:00
13 that morning?

14 A. Yes.

15 Q. And then did [REDACTED] stay, as well, or
16 station himself somewhere else?

17 A. So there's a hallway that runs down the
18 middle of this structure (indicating). He was set
19 up -- I don't know how to mark this on here -- but
20 he was set up on the side of the building in a top
21 window.

22 Q. Okay. So your line of sight was to the
23 stage and the crowd, and then would his line of
24 sight have been toward the outer edge of the crowd?

25 A. So, roughly, my field of view was

1 roughly --

2 [REDACTED]: For what it's worth, this
3 one (indicating) may be an easier one to
4 demonstrate the view.

5 [REDACTED]: Oh, great.

6 So why don't we mark this as [REDACTED]
7 Exhibit 2.

8 (Majority Exhibit No. 2 was marked for
9 identification.)

10 (The timer rings.)

11 [REDACTED]: We'll finish this.

12 [REDACTED]: I mean, if you want to
13 take it through --

14 [REDACTED]: I can take him through if
15 you want.

16 [REDACTED]: Maybe the breaking point
17 is, like, after post setup?

18 [REDACTED]: Right.

19 [REDACTED]: I'll defer to you.

20 [REDACTED]: Okay. That's fine.

21 [REDACTED]: Because these are all the
22 same questions we're going to ask.

23 [REDACTED]: Right, okay.

24 A. This (indicating) would probably be a
25 better one.

1 Q. Is that a better one?

2 [REDACTED]: For what it's worth, just
3 to keep consistency, do you want to do just all
4 four as [REDACTED] 1 - 4 and that way there's no
5 confusion about Alpha, Bravo, all that jazz?

6 [REDACTED]: Yeah. We can do that.

7 So why don't we do -- we have [REDACTED] 1,
8 [REDACTED] 2. We're going to introduce [REDACTED] 3.

9 (Majority Exhibit No. 3 was marked for
10 identification.)

11 [REDACTED]: And [REDACTED] 4, as well.

12 (Majority Exhibit No. 4 was marked for
13 identification.)

14 BY [REDACTED]

15 Q. Why don't we start by, first, just, if you
16 can, identify on each of these overviews where you
17 were that day set up.

18 A. This (indicating) is the building that I'm
19 in.

20 [REDACTED]: And for the record, the
21 witness is putting an X on the building he was at,
22 and then he's putting a circle around the general
23 location he was in the building.

24 A. That one you can't --

25 Q. Can't do it?

1 A. And... (indicating).

2 Q. Okay, perfect. Thank you.

3 And which of these would you prefer --
4 do you think is most useful to identifying your
5 field of vision?

6 A. Probably this one (indicating).

7 Q. That's one? Okay. So we're going to look
8 at [REDACTED] 3 to identify the field of vision.

9 A. So like mine was basically, I would say, in
10 that rough (indicating) --

11 Q. Okay. What we'll do is I'm going to mark A
12 for you and B --

13 A. So [REDACTED] would have been -- basically
14 it's an overlap because [REDACTED] would have went
15 like this (indicating).

16 Q. Right.

17 A. Like I said, he was in this hallway window
18 (indicating); I was in this side window
19 (indicating).

20 Q. Got it. All right.

21 A. So he was watching the entry point,
22 basically.

23 Q. Got it.

24 A. We all kind of overlapped --

25 Q. Overlapped.

1 A. -- a little bit.

2 Q. Right. Okay. So I'm going to, just for
3 the record and so we can identify this later on,
4 I'm going to put A next to your line of vision or
5 your field of vision, and then can you just draw
6 where you believe [REDACTED] ' line of vision would
7 be?

8 A. I think he basically was like that
9 (indicating).

10 Q. Okay. Understood. So I'm going to put a
11 B, for the record, next to where [REDACTED] line of
12 vision was, and there's an overlap between those.

13 And so can you just describe to us what
14 you understood to be -- I know you've said this
15 before but just because we have this now -- what
16 you understood your job, what you were watching at
17 that point?

18 A. Yeah. When we were given the map, we were
19 basically told that our over-watch was from the
20 entrance point, which was up here (indicating), I
21 believe.

22 Q. Right.

23 A. From the entrance point to the stage and
24 the general crowd area.

25 Q. Understood. So the field of vision that

1 two of you set up would cover that area, from your
2 perspective?

3 A. Yes.

4 Q. Now, I notice on the overview here that
5 [REDACTED] field of vision took him much further
6 away from the stage --

7 A. Yes.

8 Q. -- than yours did.

9 Did [REDACTED] have a similar concern
10 that his field of vision didn't make a lot of
11 sense?

12 A. Actually, from where he was at, his
13 wasn't -- it made more sense than what mine and
14 [REDACTED] were, [REDACTED], because he had the entry
15 point.

16 Q. Right.

17 A. So he had people actually coming in to the
18 entry point, you know, prior to going through a
19 secured location.

20 Like this (indicating) is secured, and
21 then it's all fenced in. So...

22 Q. Right.

23 A. Once people entered in here, it's almost a
24 guarantee, but it's assumed, you know, that they
25 have been cleared.

1 Q. Right.

2 A. And they're not carrying a weapon.

3 Q. Right. You mentioned [REDACTED]?

4 A. [REDACTED], yeah.

5 Q. Where was he located? Do you know?

6 A. Yeah. He was in one of these -- these two
7 windows (indicating) are in the same room. I'm not
8 sure exactly which window he was in, but he was
9 roughly right here (indicating).

10 Do you want me to mark that?

11 Q. Yeah. You can fill it in. That's perfect.

12 A. He was basically right there (indicating).

13 [REDACTED]: Just for the record,
14 [REDACTED] has marked on [REDACTED] 2 a filled-in circle
15 for where [REDACTED] was located.

16 Q. Go ahead. I'm sorry.

17 A. So his field of view was pretty much the
18 same as mine with a little bit more -- he was able
19 to see to the back of the stage or back of the
20 building.

21 Q. And could he see over -- do you know if he
22 could see over the building that's in front on
23 [REDACTED] 2 in front of his --

24 A. Yeah. You could see over the rooftop of
25 that building because it's only a single-story

1 building.

2 Q. Okay. So this building that he was in,
3 that you were in, was it taller than the one in
4 front?

5 A. Yes. We were the only -- well, there might
6 have been one other one. We were the only two-
7 story building on the property other than, I
8 believe, this one (indicating) up front might be
9 two.

10 But other than that, the rest of the
11 buildings are all single floor. They're all
12 industrial, basically, workshops, and then we were
13 in an office area.

14 Q. Did you have any conversation with
15 [REDACTED] about whether or not the field of vision
16 made sense for the purpose?

17 A. No.

18 Q. Just a couple more questions and I'm going
19 to hand it over to the Minority.

20 So at this point you have now set up.
21 [REDACTED] is set up. [REDACTED] is set up. It's
22 roughly, again, 10:30, 11:00.

23 What was your job at that point since
24 the event wasn't going to start until much later in
25 the afternoon?

1 A. Just observation. I mean, that was about
2 basically it.

3 Q. Right. Was there anybody in the crowd yet?
4 Had anybody started entering the area?

5 A. No. I don't believe the doors opened until
6 1:00.

7 Q. So your job was to observe people outside
8 of the perimeter --

9 A. Basically, yeah.

10 Q. -- who had not yet entered?

11 A. Well, I mean, mine, no, because I couldn't
12 see them.

13 Q. Right.

14 A. I mean, we were put in place in the morning
15 so we're in place and, you know, we're in place
16 prior to people coming.

17 Q. Right.

18 A. And then also so we're in place when they
19 enter.

20 Q. Right.

21 A. Yeah. So we were just in place observing
22 at that point.

23 Q. Okay. I'm going to turn it over to the
24 Minority now to continue the questions, unless you
25 want to take a five-minute break?

1 [REDACTED]: Let's go briefly off the
2 record.

3 [REDACTED] Let's go off the record for
4 a second.

5 (Off the record.)

6 [REDACTED]: We are back on the record
7 at 9:57. This is [REDACTED] with the Minority.
8 BY [REDACTED]:

9 Q. Those questions were very much along the
10 lines of what the questions I would have had. So
11 I'm going to try to fill in a few gaps and then
12 we'll advance in time.

13 You know, again, perhaps oddly, this is
14 a very bipartisan cooperative effort. So we're not
15 trying to do gotcha things.

16 If you have questions, obviously feel
17 free to ask, as I may misphrase something. I'm
18 sure it will happen, and just please correct me and
19 clarify.

20 For the record, the Minority also
21 acknowledges very much that we know what Sheetz is,
22 though WaWa offers a superior sandwich.

23 [REDACTED] Great hot dog.

24 [REDACTED]: WaWa?

25 [REDACTED]: Yeah.

1 [REDACTED]: Interesting. All right.
2 Well, that will be a discussion later.

3 BY [REDACTED]:

4 Q. I want to clarify. So what is your day
5 job?

6 What county or township are you with?

7 A. I work with [REDACTED]. It's in Beaver
8 County.

9 Q. [REDACTED], all right. The political
10 topography of Pennsylvania is difficult for the
11 outsider to understand.

12 My understanding -- and please tell me
13 if this is wrong -- [REDACTED] is your day job. When
14 ESU is needed, then collaterally you'll go up and
15 do that as long as [REDACTED] doesn't have a pressing
16 need for you, otherwise; is that right?

17 A. Yes. So like I said, we're a multi-
18 jurisdictional SWAT team. So we respond on
19 emergency situations.

20 So if an emergency occurs, we respond
21 like a Task Force, basically.

22 Q. More effective, perhaps.

23 Were you a volunteer for that? Were
24 they like, "Hey, you're a pretty good sniper. We
25 need someone who can do your job"?

1 How does that work?

2 A. The team has standards and qualifications.
3 So in order to try out for the team, you have to
4 have -- I believe right now it's five years of
5 experience in law enforcement.

6 You have to have a letter of
7 recommendation from your chief or immediate
8 supervisor, and then you have to go through
9 assessments and qualifications, which are basically
10 physical fitness, shooting standards, and an
11 interview process with all team leaders and
12 assistant team leaders from the -- there's two
13 operator units out from Bravo. Then there's a
14 sniper unit, which is a Sierra unit; and then
15 there's a TENS unit, which is our medics; and then
16 there is a negotiator unit.

17 Each of them have a team leader and
18 assistant team leader, and then you have your
19 commander and a deputy commander.

20 So you have to go through an interview
21 process with all of them.

22 Q. Got it. And what is a better way for me --
23 and this is just to sort of save my own
24 curiosity -- what's a better way to think of it?

25 Is it a separate job, or is it like a

1 collateral duty that you can do from your day job?

2 Both maybe. I don't know.

3 A. It's kind of both.

4 Q. Okay.

5 A. So, like, technically we're employees of
6 the District Attorney's office.

7 Q. That's ESU officers?

8 A. That's ESU officers. But we're like
9 special detectives is how I believe they classify
10 it.

11 So when we have an active emergency
12 situation and we get called out, we fall under them
13 for, like, workers' comp liability and stuff like
14 that, and then the training aspect of it, we fall
15 under our department. So, yeah.

16 Q. Sounds busy. Fair enough.

17 And then for this event, so day job, ESU
18 collateral, or secondary job.

19 For this, it's more than Butler.
20 Because of the size of the event, the nature of it,
21 they're like, "Hey, we need some help." And then
22 you're detailed over there, and you fall
23 temporarily under their chain of command; is that
24 right or not? Please tell me.

25 A. I don't want to say their chain of command,

1 but we are there to assist them for what they need.

2 So anything they ask for that we can
3 provide, we provide, because we fall under them.
4 Or we don't fall under them, but we're there for
5 them.

6 So it's like, you know, me coming to
7 your house to help you open the pool and I have no
8 idea what's going on, and you say, "I need you to
9 go do this, this, and this." "Hey, I'm here to
10 help. Whatever you need."

11 Q. Like if you were to say, "Hey, this is the
12 person who would tell me what to do on that day,"
13 who would it have been, like, operationally during
14 the day?

15 A. As far as?

16 Q. Just generally. Like if you were to have
17 someone change your assignment or if you have a
18 problem, do you report it?

19 Like is it the team leader, the sniper
20 team leader for Butler ESU? Is it Detective [REDACTED]?

21 I mean, who would you communicate to?

22 A. Who would I communicate to?

23 Q. So, like, who is giving you direction on
24 that day?

25 A. So Butler.

1 Q. Butler ESU, okay. And would you say their
2 first sort of line of hierarchy would be the sniper
3 team leader?

4 A. Yes.

5 Q. Is that [REDACTED]? Do you recall?

6 A. For them, I'm not sure. Mine is

7 [REDACTED].

8 Q. [REDACTED], okay.

9 And I told you I'm going to do patchwork
10 just to follow up some of the questions my
11 colleague asked.

12 Prior events, you said you worked first
13 as a patrol officer at some campaign events; is
14 that right?

15 A. Yes.

16 Q. Do you recall which ones?

17 A. I think I worked -- I'm not positive. I
18 know I did some for Obama. I know I did some for
19 Bush.

20 Q. That's fine. Any interaction with the
21 Secret Service in those events?

22 A. Not that I recall.

23 Q. And what about -- you also said you were in
24 response. Is that like a QRF or counterassault
25 team?

1 A. Yes.

2 Q. One of those types of things?

3 A. Yes.

4 Q. In those roles, any sort of similar
5 interactions with the Secret Service or not really?

6 A. Not me. I mean, usually when I was
7 involved more with that stuff, I was more of a
8 grunt. So I didn't have any supervisor experience.
9 That's usually handled by the bosses.

10 Q. Understood. Were you at the 2020 then-
11 President Trump event at the Butler Airport, I
12 believe it is?

13 A. No.

14 Q. And then just general impressions:

15 Again, I understand you didn't have a
16 lot of involvement in Secret Service, but just
17 general impressions, from either your understanding
18 of what they were doing or just overall from the
19 ESU side of the planning and organizational
20 structure that you felt was put in place prior to
21 the event, similar levels? Less organized? More
22 organized?

23 Any general thoughts?

24 A. It wasn't well organized.

25 Q. Do you want to expound on that a little,

1 like in what ways, or just --

2 A. I mean, you guys have the OPS plan, but the
3 OPS plan is not what was discussed in the briefing.

4 The briefing basically was a PowerPoint
5 presentation, and it was a slideshow.

6 Q. Okay. Talk real quick: "Briefing," you're
7 talking about the morning of, the one outside by
8 Butler ESU?

9 A. Yes. So that briefing was basically a
10 slideshow presentation, and when I say "slideshow
11 presentation," I mean flipping from slide to slide
12 saying, "You got it?" Next slide: "You got it?"
13 Next slide: "You got it?"

14 So unless you had the briefing directly
15 in front of you and was flipping page to page, it
16 was like, "Okay, yeah."

17 It wasn't well -- as far as the pre up
18 to that point, I couldn't tell you. I don't know
19 what happened.

20 Q. Got it. Yeah, sure. Okay. I appreciate
21 that insight.

22 You talked a little about your
23 understanding as they were first looking for
24 operators when they were first requesting help, and
25 by "they," I mean Butler ESU. But then they asked

1 for snipers.

2 Any understanding on why that change
3 happened?

4 A. Well, I believe the sniper request came in
5 because Butler was told that Secret Service was not
6 sending snipers.

7 Q. Initially?

8 A. Initially.

9 Q. And then Secret Service was going to send
10 snipers?

11 A. Yes.

12 Q. And then you guys were needed?

13 A. Yeah. I don't know what changed their
14 request. I just know originally it was they wanted
15 the operators and that was it. And then it turned
16 into -- because they didn't want -- they didn't
17 need snipers or TENS personnel or medics, and then
18 it turned into snipers, and then they ended up
19 taking our guys.

20 Q. I may be misunderstanding. So initially
21 Butler doesn't -- they want operators. And then
22 they want snipers. But that still -- eventually,
23 then, Secret Service sends snipers, but they still
24 are taking you guys?

25 A. Yes.

1 Q. So is it fair to guess -- and I realize
2 that's a very loaded question -- but is it fair to
3 guess that initially they wanted you in a counter-
4 sniping role that, at the event, was then filled by
5 Secret Service counter-snipers?

6 Do you have any reason to believe that?

7 A. I mean, that could have. I mean, I'm sure
8 that prior to Secret Service saying that they were
9 coming, that local would have occupied the
10 positions that Secret Service were in. But since
11 Secret Service was there, I mean it's their job.
12 They're protecting. They take those positions.

13 But, still, I don't know that the
14 positions that we were in were the ideal positions
15 for that type of event.

16 Q. I think that seems pretty clear, yeah.
17 Fair enough.

18 Do you have any -- and, again, I feel
19 like maybe this has been answered -- but do you
20 have any cognizance over whether Secret Service was
21 aware of what you guys were doing as crowd
22 oversight?

23 A. I have no idea. Like I said, I don't know
24 what discussions happened or didn't happen. I
25 don't know anything about the pre-planning or site

1 evaluations prior to us being there.

2 Q. That would be a better question for your
3 colleagues in Butler to answer?

4 A. Yes.

5 Q. Because they did that planning?

6 A. Yes.

7 Q. Got it. And, very similarly, to your
8 knowledge, did anyone else in any other law
9 enforcement agency, other than the ESU, have any
10 notion of what you guys were doing in AGR or even
11 that you were in AGR?

12 A. I think everybody knew we were there. I
13 don't know that they knew what our assignments were
14 correctly, but I believe everybody, as far as TAC
15 team, was onsite. I believe they knew we were
16 there.

17 Q. Understood. The next part of my question:
18 When we were off the record, I showed you a picture
19 of a Butler ESU leader, Sergeant [REDACTED]


20 You said he was at the ESU meeting the
21 morning of the event but did not lead it; is that
22 correct?

23 A. Yes. He wasn't the one that was presenting
24 the brief.

25 Q. I also showed you a color-coded map that

1 looks like a fun art project, but you had not seen
2 that map before; is that right?

3 A. So I've seen -- I don't know if maybe
4 the -- I've seen a map because we were given a map
5 with color codes like that that were -- basically
6 it was zones. But I don't know if this is the same
7 one because it looks like you guys colored it in
8 more.

9 Q. So I may as well introduce this Minority or
10  Exhibit Alpha, however it's best for the
11 court reporter.

12 (Minority Exhibit A was marked for
13 identification.)

14 Q. This is a page from a briefing we were
15 given by the Butler ESU folks. I'm not asking you
16 to vouch for any information on that page, but
17 then, I guess, now that we have it as an exhibit,
18 is that map roughly representative of the one you
19 saw?

20 A. Yes. Very. It's very similar. Like I
21 said, it's not colored like that. It had color
22 coding on it, but it was a lot more -- not
23 kindergarten-ish color like that.

24 I don't know if that was colored like
25 that to enhance the vision for you.

1 Q. Sure. For the record, that was not the
2 Minority's art, although, you know, we probably
3 wouldn't have done any better.

4 A. Do you care if I look at my phone? I may
5 have a picture of the one that I seen.

6 Q. I have no objection to doing it on the
7 record or if you want to wait until afterwards.
8 It's not super critical for me. So why don't we
9 just save it for after the record for timing
10 purposes.

11 I guess one thing I want to draw your
12 attention to, which I can also just do on [REDACTED]
13 Exhibit 3, which given that you have drawn [REDACTED]
14 Exhibit 3, it's probably more representative of
15 your understanding and also it's the same in terms
16 of the gap; right?

17 From your understanding -- let's do a
18 little drawing -- could you please draw a C?

19 Well, do you know where Thomas Crooks
20 took his shot from?

21 A. Yeah.

22 Q. Can you draw a C on [REDACTED] Exhibit 3 from
23 that?

24 A. (Indicating).

25 Q. And that's on, let's say, the eastern side

1 of that first southern building on the AGR complex;
2 is that right?

3 A. Yes.

4 Q. Any thoughts on, given the sight lines you
5 had, understanding that you didn't prepare these,
6 any thoughts on that being outside of your sight
7 lines?

8 A. That was outside of all ours.

9 Q. Right.

10 A. So [REDACTED] was gone at this point. So
11 the west side of the building wasn't -- there was
12 no one there, basically.

13 Q. Right.

14 A. And then where myself and [REDACTED] were, that
15 was completely out of our sight.

16 So like I said, originally when we were
17 set up and put in that building, we were told that
18 our area of responsibility was the crowd.

19 So when we set up in an interior
20 location, we set up within the room. So we were
21 approximately six feet, if not further back, from
22 the window.

23 I mean, I'm sure you guys are aware of
24 this now, but like I've told everybody in all of my
25 interviews, any of these pictures that you look at

do not represent the observation or the view that we had from that building.

Q. Yeah. And I want to make that very clear because I've toured the site. I've seen where your weapons were set up. I understand.

On the record, now that we're here, walk me through the impetus for you guys being -- because I know this but I want it to be very clear for the record -- the impetus for you guys being back from the window and removed, given your operational concerns, given your duties, and also given any extraneous issues that may have come up?

A. So like I said, when we set up inside on an interior of the building, we set up so we're not easily able to be seen. So, you know, you don't want your muzzle hanging out at the end of the window or anything.

So, yeah, we were set up approximately -- so my barrel, in general, I have a 16-inch barrel with a four- or five-inch suppressor on the front of it, and my barrel being the tip of my suppressor was about a foot off of the window.

So now if you go to picture me back behind the gun, I'm four to five feet within the room, and [REDACTED] was set up in a very similar

1 context, as far as being set up in the room.

2 So, yeah, we sit back in a room to hide
3 us and also to give a little bit of distance
4 between the shot being taken and if there's a
5 window or a screen or anything else.

6 Q. Yeah. And again, I want to make it very
7 clear for the record. Can you explain why you
8 don't want your muzzle hanging out of the window
9 and why you want to be a little bit withdrawn from
10 the crowd?

11 A. So people aren't sitting there saying,
12 "Hey, there's a" -- you know, so people don't know
13 where you're at, basically.

14 [REDACTED]: Just finish that word.
15 Sniper. Sniper; right?

16 [REDACTED]: Yes.

17 [REDACTED]: You swallowed the word.

18 Q. And is that typical, from your
19 understanding, of -- and, again, having not done
20 these at other events -- was that typical for this
21 type of event that you would be removed in that
22 way?

23 A. Absolutely.

24 Q. And I want to come back to AGR in a minute,
25 but I understand, also, you said you've never been

1 to this AGR complex before in your life?

2 A. I've never been to the Butler complex.

3 Q. So when you got there, what was your
4 understanding of that area?

5 First of all, outside the Secret Service
6 is the security perimeter or inside?

7 Was the AGR complex inside or outside
8 the security perimeter for the Secret Service?

9 A. Outside.

10 Q. Did you have any understanding of who would
11 be patrolling that area?

12 A. No.

13 Q. Any understanding of who would be providing
14 external security while you're looking at the
15 crowd?

16 A. No.

17 Q. Any understanding of, like, who would be,
18 you know, watching, let's say, the rooftop?

19 A. No.

20 Q. Did anyone ever talk about being up on the
21 roof?

22 A. No.

23 Q. If someone had --

24 A. Not to us.

25 Q. If someone had asked you to be on the roof,

1 would you have been able to do that?

2 A. Absolutely. I mean, we went there that day
3 with the expectations and understanding that we
4 were going to be on a rooftop all day long because
5 it was a hot day.

6 And, you know, [REDACTED], our commander,
7 made a joke and he said, "I hope you brought a
8 couple bottles of sunscreen," because it was an
9 understanding that we were going to be on the
10 rooftop outside all day.

11 Q. Sure, yeah. And let's walk through that.
12 Why was that your understanding?

13 Why did you think that would be the
14 case?

15 A. I mean because of the type of event, and to
16 be deployed in a counter-sniper role, that would be
17 one of the best locations.

18 Q. And which rooftop, let's say, would you
19 think -- just looking at this map and your decades
20 of expertise in this area, which rooftop do you
21 think would have been the ideal placement for your
22 duties that day?

23 A. In that complex?

24 Q. Yes, sir.

25 A. Probably on -- I mean, if it were to be in

1 that complex, it would have been on top of the
2 building that we were sitting in.

3 Q. Do you know how you would access that
4 rooftop?

5 A. We would've probably had a ladder, but...

6 Q. And you would have been willing to do that
7 that day?

8 A. Yeah.

9 Q. In fact, you were prepared to do that that
10 day?

11 A. Yes.

12 Q. I want to move to -- let's talk about the
13 AGR complex. And I have been there, so I'll try to
14 walk through it in my mind, but my visual mapping
15 is pretty poor.

16 So tell me if I'm wrong: If I recall,
17 along the south side of that second building where
18 you were stationed, how many rooms do you remember
19 were on that south side?

20 There were, let's say, a half a dozen
21 windows. How many rooms were there?

22 A. One more time. What building?

23 Q. Yeah. So in the building you were set up,
24 which looking at [REDACTED] Exhibit 3 is the sort of --
25 I know they're all connected, but it's kind of the

1 second building from the south up.

2 A. Yeah. In the southern portion of it, there
3 was one, two, three... I think four and a bathroom.

4 Q. Cool. And, you know, let me redirect you
5 to [REDACTED] 1 because, to me, this is helpful for me.

6 Which windows -- so you all were
7 stationed in the westernmost room; is that right?

8 A. I was, yeah. So these first two windows
9 here (indicating), that's one room. That's one
10 office.

11 Then these two windows here (indicating)
12 is a second office. And then this single window
13 here (indicating), I believe, is a third. And then
14 I think there's a bathroom. And then this last
15 room is like a break room.

16 Q. Okay.

17 A. There's a bathroom somewhere. I'm not sure
18 if it's exactly on that wall, but there's a
19 bathroom right there (indicating).

20 Q. Got it. And remind me: You were in the
21 last room. Where was [REDACTED]?

22 With you?

23 A. [REDACTED] would have been in the hallway. So
24 if you look at the top of the structure, there's a
25 hallway that runs down the middle of the building

1 and then a set of stairs.

2 So there's, like, a hallway that runs
3 down here (indicating). There's offices on this
4 side (indicating); offices on this side
5 (indicating).

6 Q. Is there a window then --

7 A. There's a window right here (indicating).

8 Q. -- at the end of that hallway?

9 A. There's a window directly at the end of the
10 hallway, yes.

11 Q. Got it. Where was [REDACTED]?

12 A. He would have been where the dot is. He
13 was in the room beside me.

14 Q. The room beside you, understood. Okay. I
15 think that is helpful for me to understand.

16 Do you recall which windows opened,
17 offhand?

18 A. I think the first four, maybe, opened or
19 the first three. I know the window to the far east
20 of the building that we were in didn't open, the
21 very first one, the one that --

22 Q. You said might be in the break room?

23 A. Yes. That window did not open. And then
24 there was one other one on that side of the
25 building that didn't open. I'm not positive which

one. It was maybe one of the ones in the room that [REDACTED] was in.

Q. Did you set up, presumably, your rifles up behind the ones that did open, or no?

A. Yes.

Q. Would it impair -- let's say there was a window that didn't open. How much of an impact would that have on a shot you would take if, you know, within the first two feet, a bullet has to go through a window?

A. I mean, it's hard to say. There would be -- there's too much ballistics involved in it. Depending on the angles, the distance, it could dramatically affect it or very little affect it. There's too many.

Q. Understood.

A. That's why we don't like to shoot through those unless...

Q. Sure. That makes sense to me. So that's perfect.

So I think we've covered a lot of the window stuff. I just want to be very clear.

So from the limited job that you all were assigned, which was crowd oversight, first of all, you felt like that was kind of a confusing

1 job; right?

2 A. Yes.

3 Q. And that you are used to being a counter-
4 sniper, but now you are a sniper without a clear
5 target; is that right?

6 A. Yes.

7 Q. What are you looking for at that point?

8 A. At that point we were just observing the
9 crowd, looking for anything that seemed odd.

10 Q. So is it fair to say that for a sniper,
11 who's obviously an expert at taking a shot, here
12 most of your role -- I mean, if you have to take a
13 shot, you would -- but you're looking at people who
14 have already been scanned by the magnetometers and
15 assumedly do not have weapons?

16 A. Yes. But I will say 95 percent, if not
17 more of the job of a sniper, is observation. It's
18 not taking a shot.

19 I mean, Secret Service is a prime
20 example here. Those guys are on a detail like
21 that, and I think this is the first counter-sniper
22 shooting in the history of them. Something like
23 that.

24 So it's very rare that, in a law
25 enforcement capacity, a sniper takes a shot in this

1 type of an event. Military is different, but,
2 yeah.

3 Q. I suppose that's probably a good thing;
4 right?

5 A. Yeah. Well, like I said, 95 percent, if
6 not more, of a sniper's job in law enforcement is
7 observation. That's why they call them sniper
8 observation units.

9 Q. Understood, yeah. My very tangential
10 knowledge is a JAG officer in the military. I kind
11 of know what that is, but they don't want us
12 anywhere near shooting people.

13 We've talked a lot about everything up
14 until the event, and I know this has taken a while.
15 I just want to be very clear about the
16 communications on that day.

17 You had a local radio?

18 A. Yes.

19 Q. What was it set to?

20 Do you remember, like, what you're
21 listening to?

22 A. It was the Butler -- I think it was Butler
23 Police 4, which was the tactical channel I was
24 assigned for that day.

25 Q. We've heard that described as OPS 4. Is

1 that a fair --

2 A. Yeah. Absolutely.

3 Q. And were you guys told to just be on that?
4 Were you told to scan?

5 Was there anything else going on?

6 A. No. We were told that we were running
7 tactical operations off of OPS 4, Channel 4, and
8 that's what we were on.

9 Q. I also understand there were some text
10 messaging exchanges?

11 A. Yes.

12 Q. Do you recall who were on those text
13 messages?

14 A. So there was -- the thread that was out
15 that day was there was a thread, a text thread,
16 between the snipers that were on scene, excluding
17 Secret Service.

18 It was just the local snipers on the
19 team, being Butler, Washington and Beaver, and then
20 we had a separate text chain that was just for our
21 Beaver folks that were on scene.

22 Q. Understood. The sniper text chain, I want
23 to walk you through some folks and see if you
24 recall them being on the thread.

25 Would you remember names?

1 A. (Shakes head.)

2 Q. Okay. Let me ask you two names then:

3 Do you know a [REDACTED]?

4 A. No.

5 Q. What about a [REDACTED]?

6 A. No.

7 Q. What about someone with initials [REDACTED],

8 [REDACTED]?

9 A. I think.

10 Q. If not, that's fine.

11 A. I'm not positive, but if I were to imagine,
12 that's [REDACTED] -- I can't think of his last name.

13 "[REDACTED]," "[REDACTED]," or something like that.

14 Q. It that [REDACTED]?

15 A. Yes. It's something similar to that, yeah.

16 Q. I know Officer [REDACTED]. Okay.

17 What about Signal or any other types of
18 apps? Did you use those that day?

19 A. No. I don't even know what that is.

20 Q. Fair enough. FirstNet: Do you have
21 access -- have you heard of FirstNet?

22 A. Yes.

23 Q. Do you have access to it, or did any of the
24 people, to your knowledge, have access to FirstNet?

25 A. To my knowledge, I don't know. That's my

1 personal phone. I don't think I have FirstNet. I
2 know on my work phone I do, but I was using my
3 personal phone that day.

4 Q. How was tech service that day?

5 A. It was okay to a point just prior to the
6 president arriving.

7 Q. And then what happened?

8 A. I don't know if they put up a net on it or
9 what, but there was some delayed response,
10 especially with Verizon. AT&T, not so much, but
11 Verizon there was some delay.

12 Q. The last thing with text messages, did you
13 ever have any communication or were you aware of
14 any communication with the U.S. Secret Service via
15 text message?

16 A. I had none and -- I mean, I guess I could
17 say now I do.

18 Q. Do you know who was doing that?

19 A. I believe the Pennsylvania State Police
20 sent a text. I'm not positive.

21 Q. We're not holding you to this. Maybe the
22 Pennsylvania State Police?

23 A. Maybe.

24 Q. To the extent that Secret Service was
25 aware -- and I'm asking you to assume the

1 presumption -- but to the extent the Secret
2 Service, including their sniper teams, were aware
3 of anything going on around AGR via text message,
4 do you know of anyone within your local sniper
5 community who would have been texting with them?

6 A. No, I don't. Not that I'm aware of.

7 Q. All right. I want to get away from text
8 messages and radio. Let's talk -- well,
9 unfortunately, one more technological thing.

10 Did you ever see a drone that day?

11 A. No.

12 Q. What would you have thought if, at any
13 point, you're seeing a drone flying around on your
14 side of the Secret Service perimeter?

15 A. So, actually, in the briefing, one of the
16 things that was brought up was drone surveillance;
17 that if any were spotted, they would be reported
18 and that somebody had capabilities of intercepting
19 the drones.

20 So, yeah. I mean, throughout the day,
21 through the observations, it was part of the thing
22 to look around for, but I didn't see any drones
23 that day.

24 Q. Understood. All right. I've finally
25 caught up to my Majority colleagues in terms of

1 timing.

2 [REDACTED] Do you want me to take it
3 a little bit further? I'm at, like, a little bit
4 of a breaking point. I'm happy to kind of go
5 forward.

6 [REDACTED] Whatever you want to do. I
7 was going to go into sort of the initial sighting
8 of Crooks.

9 [REDACTED]: Right. That was my next
10 step, too.

11 [REDACTED]: Okay.

12 [REDACTED]: Why don't I take it a
13 little bit?

14 [REDACTED]: Yeah.

15 [REDACTED]: Fair enough.

16 BY [REDACTED]:

17 Q. Yeah, let's talk about that.

18 What is your first -- so the day is
19 moving on. I don't want to shortcut anything, but
20 to the extent anything of note, looking back on it,
21 was relevant prior to, let's say, 1600, which was
22 around when [REDACTED] left, I believe?

23 A. No. Nothing.

24 Q. When does [REDACTED] leave?

25 A. He leaves about a quarter after, 20 after

4.

Q. And was that scheduled?

A. Yes.

Q. Any reason, or just he had to go?

A. He had a family event that was scheduled. I believe his wife bought him a Father's Day gift for a concert or something.

[REDACTED]: I think for the record, I think you were saying Crooks. I think you meant [REDACTED].

[REDACTED]: Did I say Crooks?

[REDACTED] Yeah.

[REDACTED]: Oh. [REDACTED].

[REDACTED] No, you understood.

[REDACTED] I understood.

[REDACTED]: I just wanted to make sure.

[REDACTED]: That would have changed --

[REDACTED]: That would have changed everything.

BY [REDACTED]:

Q. So [REDACTED] leaves?

A. [REDACTED] was scheduled to leave because like I said earlier, originally [REDACTED] was able to work until about 3, 4:00. I was scheduled originally to work until then, and we were going to swap

1 basically, but then I was able to work the whole
2 day.

3 Q. What did he alert you of after he left?

4 A. So when he had left, he had sent a text
5 message.

6 So the parking lot in the AGR building
7 was empty with the exception of [REDACTED] car, my
8 car, and [REDACTED] car. Those were the only
9 three cars that were in the lot when we went into
10 the building.

11 So when [REDACTED] left, he had noticed a
12 vehicle parked in the lot and a gentleman sitting
13 outside, and at that point he had sent a text
14 message to us that basically said, "Hey, somebody
15 followed our lead."

16 What he meant by that was the parking
17 lot was blocked off, and we had to go around the
18 cones to get up in there to park.

19 He texted -- don't quote me on the exact
20 wording -- I'm sure you have it -- but it was,
21 "Somebody followed our lead and snuck into the
22 lot."

23 And then he said something to the effect
24 that, "The guy" -- I don't know if he said "guy" or
25 "someone" -- "they seen me come out of the building

1 with my rifle. They probably know you guys are in
2 there."

3 Q. I want to take a step back.

4 You mentioned cones. Do you know who
5 put up cones?

6 A. I don't know.

7 Q. And are those cones at the entrance to the
8 AGR complex which is on the top side, north area of
9 [REDACTED] 2?

10 A. Yeah. It would have been --

11 Q. These are the exhibits.

12 A. Yeah. It would have been this
13 (indicating). This (indicating) is the one we went
14 in. They were both blocked off, but we came in
15 this first one here (indicating).

16 Q. Understood.

17 [REDACTED]: Let the record reflect the
18 officer has drawn an X on the easternmost entry
19 point into the AGR complex.

20 Q. At that point how many folks are within the
21 secure perimeter, if any, let's say, around 1630?

22 A. Security perimeter?

23 Q. Within the Secret Service of the event.

24 A. Oh, I couldn't.

25 Q. There are many?

1 A. Yes. Tens of thousands.

2 Q. Lots of folks there. Got it.

3 What about milling around AGR in front
4 of the fence line, to the north side of the fence
5 line?

6 A. There were probably a couple hundred that
7 were around the outside of the building throughout
8 the day.

9 Q. And when [REDACTED] left, he's leaving through
10 the eastern side of AGR, and then he sees someone
11 in the car, says, "They're onto us," kind of?

12 A. I don't know if he seen somebody in a car,
13 but he seen a car.

14 And then I know there was -- I think
15 there was a picnic table or something over there
16 that he seen somebody was sitting at, and that's
17 who I think he was referring to as when he said he
18 seen me come out of the building with my rifle.

19 Q. To your understanding today, do you
20 understand that he saw Mr. Crooks?

21 A. Today, yes.

22 Q. Yeah.

23 A. That day, absolutely not.

24 Q. So he sees someone. He says, "Someone's
25 onto us," okay.

1 I want to take you then forward. When
2 do you first observe Mr. Crooks?

3 A. So it would probably have been about -- I
4 don't know. I'm not exactly sure on the time. A
5 little after 5 maybe after [REDACTED] had left.

6 So I was kind of moving around the
7 building a little bit on binocular glass and doing
8 the observation, and I had moved from the room that
9 I was in into the hallway and was standing where
10 [REDACTED] was positioned prior.

11 As I was just looking out at the crowd,
12 I noticed an individual that was walking pretty
13 close to the building, kind of looking up and down
14 the building, and just thought it was odd.

15 I, like, looked down at him and then
16 didn't pay no attention to it. He then walked, it
17 would have been, to the front of the building,
18 which would have been southeast, I guess, and then
19 around the building, and when he did that is when I
20 lost sight of him.

21 I didn't think nothing of it at that
22 time. I just continued about my business. And
23 then after a few minutes, I was s going back into
24 the room that I was in and I seen [REDACTED] standing
25 there, and me and him were having conversation.

1 He was like, "Hey, I just seen this kid
2 out here walking around, looking up and down the
3 building. I think he knows we're in here."

4 I said, "Did the kid have long hair and
5 a gray tee shirt?"

6 He's like, "Yeah."

7 I said, "I seen him on the side of the
8 building, too, doing the same thing."

9 So at that point we then separated, and
10 then we were basically looking for him again. And
11 after a little bit of looking around, I was
12 standing in the room that I was positioned in but I
13 was in the first window in the room, not the second
14 window where my rifle was, because it was easier.

15 I could get closer up to the window but
16 didn't have my rifle in front of it to look out
17 than I could with the one that had my rifle.

18 So I was looking out that window --

19 Q. Can I pause you real quick?

20 A. Yes.

21 Q. Sorry. First of all, can you help orient
22 me to the approximate timeframe we're at?

23 A. I don't know. I didn't bring the book that
24 I have.

25 Q. No, no, no. You're fine. Approximately

1 1715? 1730? Somewhere in that early 1700s
2 timeframe?

3 A. I don't remember exactly what time I sent
4 the text out. That's why I was asking.

5 Q. But when you sent the text is when --

6 A. Well, it would have been prior. It's about
7 15 minutes prior to when I sent the text.

8 Q. So I can show -- if you want, I have the
9 text message.

10 [REDACTED]: I'm showing the Majority
11 what I believe is a text message that [REDACTED] has
12 sent out.

13 A. Yeah. So it was probably 15, 20 minutes
14 prior to that.

15 Q. All right. So I want to just read into the
16 record. This is Image_0543 in the Beaver County
17 production docs.

18 Do you have it?

19 [REDACTED]: Do you want to offer it?

20 [REDACTED]: Much better.

21 [REDACTED]: This is [REDACTED] B?

22 [REDACTED]: I guess, so, yeah. That's
23 right.

24 (Minority Exhibit B was marked for
25 identification.)

1 Q. So you said 15 minutes before. Now we're
2 saying 1730, approximately?

3 A. Yeah. 1725, 1730, something like that.

4 Q. And I want to be clear. When you first see
5 him, you and Officer [REDACTED], see him, he's not doing
6 anything illegal?

7 A. No.

8 Q. Just something about the way he's acting,
9 looking, observing triggers both of your senses
10 from your decades of experience in law enforcement?

11 A. Yes.

12 Q. Anything else, just on the initial
13 observations, that kind of triggered you to then
14 take these pictures of him sitting on the fence?

15 A. No. So like I said, after [REDACTED] and I had
16 talked and it was like he noticed it and I noticed
17 it, we were like, "Okay. Let's see if we can find
18 this kid again."

19 So like I said, I had been going back
20 into the room that I was in, and then the first
21 window, I was looking out, looking out. I couldn't
22 see nothing. Couldn't see nothing. And I'm like,
23 "Man, where is this kid?"

24 And I brought my binoculars down, and as
25 I brought them down, I looked down because like I

1 said, I was up pretty close to the window at this
2 point. We're on the second floor.

3 And as I brought my binoculars down, I
4 just happened to look down and I was like, "There
5 he is." He was sitting directly below me.

6 Q. This is from the southwestern corner of
7 that second building?

8 A. Yes. And there is, like, a little wall
9 that's about two and a half, three feet high, and
10 he was just sitting on it. I'm like, "Well, there
11 he is."

12 So I don't know why. Maybe the
13 opportunity and because he was so close. I'm like,
14 I got my phone. I just pulled out the picture.

15 The first one is the one of his back.
16 That was the first picture that I took. And then
17 the second picture is the one -- because I took the
18 first one. I'm like, "Come on, man. Turn your
19 head. Turn your head." And then, finally, he
20 turned, and then I took that second one, which was
21 the side view.

22 Q. I think we may be at a decent breaking
23 point here, but one thing I did want to ask:

24 So your weapon is set up on, like, a
25 tripod, a stand? How would you describe it?

1 A. Yeah, my weapon was on a tripod, and then I
2 had an office chair that basically I was sitting
3 in. That's how it was set up.

4 Q. And this is probably obvious to everyone in
5 the room, and hopefully to the record, but it is
6 set up on that to ensure accuracy; is that fair?

7 A. Yes.

8 Q. So when you're observing, you're, in fact,
9 not carrying your weapon around with you?

10 A. No.

11 Q. You're trying to get the best vantage point
12 of different things?

13 A. Yes.

14 Q. But you were also within the vicinity of
15 being able to return to your weapon at pretty quick
16 notice?

17 A. Yes.

18 Q. Last question before, I think, turn it over
19 because this is a breaking point, I think.

20 From one side of the building -- so
21 again, the, let's say, north side of that second
22 building across the hall -- how far would it take
23 or how long would it take to get from, let's say,
24 the opposite side of that building, north side,
25 down into the south building to your rifle?

1 Like let's say you hear a call, "Hey,
2 get to your rifle." How long does that take you to
3 do?

4 A. From...?

5 Q. Looking at [REDACTED] Exhibit 2, you have an X
6 where [REDACTED] was.

7 A. Uh-huh.

8 Q. Let's say just north of that X, I believe
9 there are either rooms or something there because
10 there are windows there looking at Exhibit 4;
11 right?

12 A. Yeah.

13 Q. So from that window on the north side of
14 that building to the south window where your weapon
15 is set up on that stand, about, a guesstimate, how
16 long would it take you if you urgently had to run
17 and get to that weapon?

18 How long does that take?

19 A. 15 seconds.

20 Q. Okay.

21 [REDACTED]: I don't have any anything
22 else. Do you want to go off?

23 [REDACTED]: Yeah. Why don't we go off
24 and just take a brief break.

25 [REDACTED]: We'll go off at 10:36.

[REDACTED]

(Off the record.)

1 [REDACTED]: [REDACTED], [REDACTED], my
2 colleague, is going to ask you a couple of
3 questions, and then I'm going to go back to that
4 timeline that the Minority left off with.
5

6 [REDACTED]: Okay.

7 BY [REDACTED]

8 Q. I just have a couple quick clarifying
9 questions.

10 You were talking a little bit about the
11 cellphone issues earlier. I think you said
12 something like you weren't sure if a net had been
13 set up.

14 Can you remember what you meant by that,
15 by "net"?

16 A. So it seemed to me that -- I mean, there
17 weren't a lot of texts going out through the day,
18 but it seemed like when we started the text
19 messaging, it was when the president was en route
20 to the site.

21 I know there's capabilities to jam the
22 signal in the area. So I didn't know if possibly
23 that had something to do with it because when I was
24 trying to send them -- not to the group because
25 these pictures were sent out twice.

1 It was sent out to the sniper group and
2 then sent out to our Beaver County group the same,
3 and then they were sending them to the command. So
4 that was all about the time that the president was
5 en route to the site.

6 Q. Is that kind of cellphone jamming something
7 that you have seen before in previous --

8 A. Yeah.

9 Q. And would you be able to say like who would
10 do that jamming?

11 A. It's typically the Secret Service or the
12 FBI. One of those two.

13 Q. Another question I had: The map that we
14 received from the Secret Service, is this a map
15 that you received as a resource or a reference
16 point?

17 A. I don't know. I've never seen that at all.

18 Q. You've never seen it? All right.

19 [REDACTED]: Do you want to offer it? I
20 guess we don't need to, but we can if you want.

21 [REDACTED]: I'm fine either way.

22 Q. That's all the questions I have. Thank
23 you.

24 [REDACTED]: Thank you.

25 BY [REDACTED]:

Q. So I'm going to go back to when you first became aware of Crooks, the person you understood to be Crooks.

I'm going to show you first just a little bit back in time from the questions you were asked by the Minority, and I'm going to offer this as [REDACTED] Exhibit 5, I think it is.

(Majority Exhibit No. 5 was marked for identification.)

Q. So [REDACTED] Exhibit 5, it's a text exchange between [REDACTED] and [REDACTED].

[REDACTED] is you?

A. Yeah. So this is a text message sent from [REDACTED] to -- [REDACTED] is me, [REDACTED], and [REDACTED] is [REDACTED].

Q. Got it.

A. We were the three guys that were in the AGR building.

Q. And you were previously talking about the fact that [REDACTED] had noticed somebody in a car; right?

A. Yes.

Q. And the blue here, you understand that to be [REDACTED]?

A. Yes.

Q. So it says, "Someone followed our lead and snuck in and parked by our cars, just so you know." This is from [REDACTED].

Then he writes, "I'm just letting you know because he seen me go out with my rifle and put it in my car. So he knows you guys are up there. He's sitting to the direct right on a picnic table about 50 yards from the exit." And that's him, as well. And then those two texts were at 4:26 p.m. and 4:27 p.m.

And then you respond with a thumbs up at 4:27, and [REDACTED] responds at 4:39 with a, "Roger that."

And then at the bottom it says, "That bike was not there when I pulled out." That's from [REDACTED]. "Maybe have them check that car..." And it's cut off at 5:52 p.m.

A. So that one at 5:52, that response is to the text I sent to the group.

Q. Right. Yeah, we'll put it all in.

A. That's what that is. That was a response to that.

Q. Right. To the photos and everything?

A. To us instead of to the group in general.

Q. Understood, okay. So when you give a

1 thumbs up, you're saying got it, understood. And,
2 of course, [REDACTED] says, "Roger that."

3 Do you recall at that point? Had you
4 seen this person, or were you just acknowledging
5 that okay, we're going to take a look?

6 A. Yeah, I was just acknowledging that he was
7 letting us know.

8 Q. Okay. Got it. And then what you were
9 going to do at that point was go and try to see if
10 you can identify this person?

11 A. Not really.

12 Q. No?

13 A. I was just acknowledging that he said,
14 "Hey, this guy was sitting out there."

15 Q. Got it. Okay.

16 A. Like I said, there were hundreds of people
17 sitting outside the building.

18 Q. Right. Right. Got it. Understood.

19 So before this text exchange, you had
20 gotten there like early in the morning, 9, 10. You
21 set up about 10:30. And from that point, from,
22 like, 10:30 after you set up until around the time
23 you get this text message, you're doing your job of
24 observing the crowd from your field of vision. And
25 during that period of time, did you see anything,

1 any person or thing, that struck you as suspicious?

2 A. Not alarming, no.

3 Q. Nothing alarming, okay.

4 A. There were some characters that were
5 observed but nothing alarming.

6 Q. Nothing that raised your antenna, based on
7 your experience, that there might be a threat?

8 A. Yes.

9 Q. Okay. When you received these text
10 messages from [REDACTED], did they cause you to
11 think, "Oh, this person's a threat"?

12 A. No, because I had no idea who he was
13 referring to. I'll be honest with you: Until
14 about three weeks ago maybe, I hadn't even known
15 that [REDACTED] actually seen Mr. Crooks sitting at that
16 table.

17 Q. Right.

18 A. I didn't know that that's who he was
19 referring to.

20 Q. You only learned that subsequently. At the
21 time you did not know?

22 A. Yeah. Like I said, only three weeks ago.

23 Q. And even at the time of the shooting, you
24 did not know that that was Mr. Crooks?

25 A. No. I had no clue.

1 Q. Okay. So at that time, you only learned
2 that subsequently from reports or from After-Action
3 or things like that?

4 A. Yes.

5 Q. Or from talking to [REDACTED]?

6 A. Yes.

7 Q. [REDACTED] is also an experienced law
8 enforcement officer; correct?

9 A. Yes.

10 Q. And these texts don't say this person is a
11 threat or a potential threat; right?

12 A. Not at all.

13 Q. And you would expect that he would say that
14 if he saw somebody that he thought was a threat
15 from looking at it?

16 A. Yeah. I mean, I would expect him to
17 encounter that person.

18 Q. Right.

19 A. Not only say something.

20 Q. Right, okay. So you had no reason to
21 believe at that point that he was saying anything
22 other than what he was saying here, that "Somebody
23 has spotted us"?

24 A. Absolutely. I assumed that was just a,
25 "Hey, dude's out here, just so you know."

1 Q. Right. And so when he tells you that "This
2 dude is here, he probably has spotted us," why
3 would he tell you that?

4 What was the reason why he would tell
5 you that?

6 A. It's just a safety thing. You know, you're
7 leaving. I'm sure he wasn't thrilled that he had
8 to leave. I mean, maybe he was. But, you know,
9 you don't like to leave in the middle of an
10 operation.

11 If you see something, you say, "Hey,
12 just so you guys know." The last thing you want is
13 somebody you know to get hurt, you know.

14 Q. Right.

15 A. And not saying something on the most minute
16 thing typically leads to something.

17 So, yeah, I just think he was just
18 saying, "Hey, dude's out here, just so you guys
19 know."

20 Q. Understood. Understood.

21 You previously had testified that the
22 way you set up your weapon, you don't have the
23 barrel hanging out the window, and you didn't want
24 people to see you; right? I mean, that's the
25 reason why you set up that way.

1 Why do you not want people to see you?

2 What are the reasons why you don't want
3 people to see you?

4 A. Because then it's known where you're at,
5 and I mean if somebody is going to do something,
6 they know they can get rid of you first.

7 Q. Right. Right.

8 A. So, you know, it's a safety thing and a
9 tactical advantage.

10 Q. Right. So from your perspective and your
11 understanding and from your experience, the reason
12 you do that is for safety reasons, security reasons
13 for yourself and for the purpose of the project?

14 A. Yes.

15 Q. Or of the operation, I should say?

16 A. Yes.

17 Q. Did anybody suggest to you that they also
18 didn't want you to have your barrel hanging out or
19 have people identify you because they didn't want
20 to make the crowd uncomfortable?

21 A. No.

22 Q. Did anybody suggest to you that the Secret
23 Service or the campaign or anyone else had said,
24 "Hey, we want to make sure that no one knows
25 there's snipers out there because it's not a good

1 look at a campaign event"?

2 A. Not to me.

3 Q. You never heard that?

4 A. No, I never heard that.

5 Q. And when [REDACTED] was sending this text
6 message, your understanding is that he was telling
7 you this, as you said before, for safety reasons
8 only; right?

9 A. Yes.

10 Q. All right. So then let's go to -- I think
11 that was [REDACTED] Exhibit B, Beta.

12 So this is -- you previously testified
13 about this -- this is about, say, roughly an hour,
14 a little over an hour, after you received these
15 texts from [REDACTED] that are in Exhibit 5.

16 There's a first one here. I don't think
17 we can tell -- actually, we can tell you. It's
18 from [REDACTED] -- actually, we don't know who it's from.
19 "Game time," 5:34 p.m.

20 I'm not asking who sent that because we
21 can't tell from this exhibit, but does that roughly
22 correspond with when the event was going to start?

23 A. So, yes. So my interpretation of that
24 "Game time" text was we were notified that -- I
25 forget what the code name was -- but that he was

1 en route to the site.

2 Q. "He" being Trump?

3 A. "He" being Trump, yes. "Game time" was
4 like, "Okay, get your shit together."

5 Q. Right, right.

6 A. Excuse my language.

7 Q. And also a common thing for people to say,
8 "Game time"?

9 A. Absolutely, yes.

10 Q. "Let's get ready. Now it's on." Right?

11 A. Yeah. "Black Hawk Down, Irene." Right?

12 Q. Right. Exactly.

13 [REDACTED] You don't even know Black
14 Hawk Down?

15 [REDACTED]: I had a very different
16 military experience here.

17 [REDACTED]: I mean, the Irene was the go
18 sign.

19 [REDACTED]: Fair enough. Sorry to
20 disappoint.

21 Q. Great movie. I've seen it about five
22 times.

23 [REDACTED] at 5:35, thumbs up.

24 A. Acknowledging.

25 Q. Acknowledging. And then a few minutes

1 later, you send these photos?

2 A. Yes.

3 Q. So do you remember? Did the photos --
4 again, this is just to the best of your
5 recollection -- did you take those photos and
6 immediately send them?

7 A. No.

8 Q. Okay. So tell us more about when did you
9 notice this person that turned out to be Crooks?

10 Was it before you were notified that
11 Trump was on his way, or was it after?

12 A. So I had taken these pictures. There were
13 these two pictures.

14 Do you have the next one?

15 Q. Yes.

16 A. I think the next one is the bike and the
17 backpack.

18 Q. Yes.

19 A. So I had taken these two pictures
20 (indicating), I want to say, at 5:13 and 5:14 or
21 5:14 and 5:15, roughly.

22 Q. Okay.

23 A. Like I said, if you let me grab my phone,
24 I'll tell you. That's when I had taken these
25 pictures. And then that one, that bike picture,

1 was taken at about 5:25-ish.

2 Q. Is this (indicating) the bike picture?

3 A. No.

4 Q. No? We'll see if we can get it.

5 But go ahead. Continue.

6 A. So I took these two pictures first. Like I
7 said, the picture of his back was taken first.

8 Q. Right.

9 A. Like 5:14. The picture of him was taken
10 5:15, whatever.

11 Q. Right.

12 A. Roughly around that time. And then I took
13 a picture of a bike and a backpack at about 5:25,
14 5:26.

15 Q. Got it.

16 [REDACTED] Do you have it?

17 [REDACTED] I have a picture. That's
18 when he sent it. This guy right here (indicating)?

19 [REDACTED]: Yeah.

20 BY [REDACTED]

21 Q. All right. That's at 5:45, okay. So why
22 don't we do this. Let's go through the time of
23 when you took the -- here we go.

24 This is the photo?

25 A. Yes.

1 Q. Why don't we offer this in as [REDACTED] 6.

2 (Majority Exhibit No. 6 was marked for
3 identification.)

4 [REDACTED] And then I'm also going to
5 offer in [REDACTED] 7.

6 (Majority Exhibit No. 7 was marked for
7 identification.)

8 [REDACTED]: I'm sorry. When did you
9 say that was taken? Sorry to interrupt.

10 [REDACTED] I think this is ours. This
11 was taken at 5:28. And like I said, this one was
12 taken at like 5:14-5:15 or 5:16-5 -- they were
13 taken about a minute apart about ten minutes prior
14 to this.

15 [REDACTED] So just for the record, the
16 two photos that are [REDACTED] B, they were taken, to
17 the best of the witness's recollection, at
18 5:14-5:15.

19 And then we're going to offer in [REDACTED] 6
20 and 7.

21 A. I will say. You know the packet that you
22 got that from, it will have the times.

23 Q. It will have the times, yeah, but we'll
24 reconcile it later on. We don't have to waste your
25 time on that.

1 So I'm going to give you exhibits here.
2 [REDACTED] 6, that's the photo that you took at about
3 5:28 of a bike and a backpack, and that was about
4 ten minutes or more, a little bit more than after
5 the two photos that are [REDACTED] B.

6 A. Yes.

7 Q. I'm also going to show you [REDACTED] 7, but
8 we're going to go in order.

9 So tell us -- you testified a bit about
10 this -- but just tell us a bit more about when you
11 took the photos. Why did you take the photos of
12 that person?

13 A. Okay. So like I said, I took the photos at
14 about, I don't know, 5:14, 5:15-ish, something like
15 that, and like I said, I am not positive why I took
16 the photos.

17 I think it was just opportunity and
18 because he was so close, and he just seemed like an
19 out-of-place character, you know, especially
20 because I had noticed him, [REDACTED] had noticed him,
21 you know. We're both experienced guys. So it was
22 like, "Eh."

23 Q. Something set off your antenna?

24 A. "I'm just going to take this picture."

25 And like I said, it was just, I think,

1 the opportunity because he was so close to me and I
2 was sitting there.

3 Q. Right.

4 A. I had my phone in my hand; I took the
5 picture.

6 Q. Got it. But at that point you did not know
7 this was the same person that [REDACTED] had texted
8 about?

9 A. No. Not at all. But --

10 Q. And then -- sorry. Go ahead.

11 A. So I had taken those pictures and sat there
12 and, you know, was watching him for a little bit.
13 Then he had got up and moved and I lost sight of
14 him.

15 Like I said, he was up against the
16 building, and unless you, like, literally laid your
17 cheek against the window and tried to look, you
18 couldn't see down the side of the building.

19 But he had got up and moved.

20 Q. Right.

21 A. We lost sight of him.

22 So I had then got up, and I started to
23 move to different windows within the building, and
24 when I got to -- it would have been the opposite
25 side of the building.

1 Q. So we're looking at [REDACTED] 4. Can you tell
2 us where did you --

3 A. I went into this building (indicating). I
4 got into the window, first window, over here
5 (indicating).

6 Q. Why don't you put a circle around that
7 area.

8 A. First window (indicating).

9 Q. Great.

10 [REDACTED] The witness, just for the
11 record, has put a circle around the area that he
12 went to where he observed the bicycle and the
13 backpack on [REDACTED] 4.

14 Q. Go ahead. I'm sorry.

15 A. So I went over there and was still looking
16 around for this individual, and I had noticed over
17 across the property there was a bike sitting there
18 with a backpack and it was underneath the tree.
19 And just from moving around earlier in the day, I
20 didn't remember seeing that.

21 So after seeing him and then after
22 seeing that, it was like, eh. I thought it was
23 kind of strange, so I took a picture of it.

24 Q. Right. Understood. So let's just back up.

25 You mentioned there was something about

him that led you and [REDACTED] to think there was something off with this guy, but also you mentioned that that it was unusual because he was so close; right?

Yes; right?

A. Yes.

Q. And was there anybody else around him?

A. No.

Q. Was there anybody else even in the vicinity?

Is that why he was particularly noticeable?

A. I mean, there was no one else directly around him, but there was a bunch of people in the area.

Q. But there was nobody so close to the building?

A. No. No. Most of the people weren't up against the -- every once in a while somebody would come up towards the building, but it was, I think, to get out of the sun and get some of the shade from the building.

Q. Right.

A. But when they did it, it wasn't like they were looking in the windows, looking up and down

1 the building where this kid was like trying to --
2 you could actually tell he was trying to look into
3 the building.

4 Q. And from your vantage point when you were
5 looking at him, one of the things that alerted you
6 to him was the fact that he seemed to be looking
7 into the building --

8 A. Yeah. He was looking.

9 Q. -- and trying to find you guys?

10 A. Well, he was looking -- it was -- like I
11 said, most of the building is a one-story building.

12 Q. Right.

13 A. And then that building we were in was two
14 stories.

15 So as he was walking, you could see he
16 was looking in the single story of the rest of the
17 complex, you know.

18 Q. I see. Right.

19 A. And then when he got to our building, he
20 was looking in there first and then also up and
21 down the building, and that's kind of what --
22 that's what made him stand out to me.

23 Q. Right.

24 A. Because like I said, other people came up
25 to the building, but it was more -- you could tell

1 they were there to gather shade or something.

2 Q. Right.

3 A. They weren't, like, looking in windows.

4 Q. They weren't examining the building?

5 A. Yes.

6 Q. Right. Did you get a sense that he had
7 spotted you guys?

8 A. I did not.

9 Q. Okay.

10 A. [REDACTED] the way that he had expressed his
11 thoughts to me, yes. I think he thought that he
12 seen us in there, but I don't know.

13 Q. Okay.

14 A. I tend to think no just because of what
15 happened.

16 Q. Right, right. But at the time you weren't
17 sure?

18 A. Yeah.

19 Q. You didn't think he had, but [REDACTED] might
20 have thought he did?

21 A. Yeah.

22 Q. Okay. And then when he left and you lost
23 sight of him, did he leave in a way that he seemed
24 to be trying to hide from you?

25 A. No. He just got up and walked. And like I

1 said, when he walked around the building, I
2 couldn't see where he went because of, you know,
3 the view that we had.

4 Q. Okay. And there's about 10 minutes or so,
5 12 minutes between when you first -- or 14 minutes,
6 I guess -- between the first photo and then the
7 photo of the bike.

8 During that time, were you looking for
9 him the whole time?

10 A. Yeah. I was moving around the west side of
11 the building that we were in.

12 Q. Right. Right.

13 A. Because it's all -- it's office, hallway,
14 and then an office, and I was basically going back
15 and forth between those three areas, looking out
16 the window, trying to see if I could locate him.

17 Q. Okay. And you couldn't find him at that
18 point?

19 A. No. I didn't see him.

20 Q. And then at around 5:28 you saw this bike,
21 the backpack, and you decided to take a picture of
22 it?

23 A. Yes.

24 Q. And you said that you did that because you
25 were like maybe this bike and backpack is connected

1 to this guy?

2 A. Yeah. I mean, not that I was looking for
3 him, but I had noticed him throughout the day.

4 Q. Right.

5 A. And then noticed him looking up and down.
6 It seemed like he came out of nowhere, and then all
7 of a sudden I noticed his bike.

8 Q. Right.

9 A. So I thought maybe he rode his bike here.
10 Two backpacks or a backpack and a bag strapped to
11 the bike. It just was like --

12 Q. Right.

13 A. It seemed out of place, so that's why I
14 took a picture of it.

15 Q. And when you say "it's out of place," is it
16 because you didn't see any other bikes and
17 backpacks?

18 A. No.

19 Q. It wasn't a bike area, for example?

20 A. Yes.

21 Q. There wasn't like a bike rack?

22 A. Yeah. It was sitting underneath here
23 (indicating), yeah.

24 Q. Right. And just from the photo, it doesn't
25 look like there's much of anything around it?

1 A. No. There's a tree to the right of it, and
2 then, yeah, there's a building behind it.

3 Q. So fair to say that because you had seen
4 this potentially suspicious character, you saw this
5 bike that you hadn't noticed before, and there were
6 no other bikes or vehicles around it that had stood
7 out to you?

8 A. Yeah.

9 Q. So you took that photo at 5:28, okay.

10 And then going back to [REDACTED] B, the
11 "Game Time" at 5:34, this is about when you guys
12 were notified that Trump was coming.

13 Then you send the photos, the first two
14 photos from 5:14 and 5:15, at 5:38 p.m. to this
15 group.

16 Why did you send the photos at that
17 point?

18 A. So after I had taken the picture of the
19 bike, I was still looking to try to locate
20 Mr. Crooks.

21 I then went -- I made my way. I was
22 back in the original window that I was in on the
23 south side of the building.

24 Is that right?

25 Q. Right.

1 A. On the south side of the building in the
2 first window there, that's when I noticed that he
3 had been sitting back on the stoop down there where
4 I originally had seen him.

5 And at that point, I noticed he was on a
6 cellphone, and I was sitting there with binoculars.
7 So I zoom in on his cellphone, and I could tell
8 that he's looking at news feeds. Which particular
9 ones, I don't know, but he he's scrolling through
10 news feeds on his phone.

11 So then he takes his phone and he puts
12 it in his pocket, and he pulls out -- it's a range
13 finder, but he pulls out a range finder and he
14 starts looking.

15 At first, I'm like -- I'm looking -- I'm
16 like, is this a range finder, or is that
17 binoculars?

18 So I grabbed my binoculars and I zoomed
19 in again, and I noticed -- I'm like that's a range
20 finder.

21 So, you know, when I noticed him looking
22 through this range finder he was looking towards
23 the stage and kind of just in different areas,
24 general areas, looking out but in the direction of
25 the stage. I was like, yeah, this is not right.

1 So I was like, "Hey, [REDACTED]."

2 And he's like, "What's up?"

3 I said, "A dude's out with a range
4 finder looking through it."

5 Q. Right. And just tell us for the record why
6 was a range finder, in particular, particularly
7 concerning to you versus binoculars?

8 A. I mean, a range finder is used specifically
9 to determine the distance from Point A to Point B.

10 Q. Right.

11 A. There's no other reason. They're not -- I
12 mean, some of them have a little bit of a
13 magnification, but if you want to look at
14 something, it's not going to be through a range
15 finder.

16 Q. Right. If you just want to see something
17 from a distance, like an event, you use binoculars?
18 You don't use a range finder?

19 A. You use a binocular or a monocular.

20 Q. Right.

21 A. That's why I said at first, eh, maybe it's
22 a monocular.

23 Q. Right.

24 A. Because I carry one in my bag, you know --

25 Q. Right.

1 A. -- in my sniper bag because it's easier to
2 use.

3 But when I zoomed in on it, I knew it,
4 you know, was a -- I don't want to say multi-cam,
5 but it was like a Realtree camo.

6 Q. Right.

7 A. I'm like that's a range finder.

8 Q. And when you observed him using the range
9 finder, you actually saw him using it?

10 A. Yes.

11 Q. Could you tell where he was looking?

12 A. Like I said, it looked to me like he was
13 looking at the stage because he was like looking in
14 that general area.

15 And then, just, he was looking towards
16 the stage, and then it looked like he was at a
17 couple different points but it was towards the
18 stage.

19 Q. So when you saw that, that also gave you
20 concern?

21 A. Absolutely.

22 Q. Right. Okay.

23 Now, going back to the text messages, it
24 looks like when you send the photo -- actually,
25 before I ask that, why did you decide to send the

1 photos at 5:38, you know, about 10 minutes after
2 you -- 10 to 20 minutes after you took them?

3 Why at that point?

4 A. Because until I had seen him with the range
5 finder, it was just he was an odd person.

6 Q. Got it. Okay.

7 A. But once the range finder, now he's a very,
8 very suspicious person to me.

9 Q. Got it. All right. So the range finder
10 happens after you take the photos?

11 A. Yes.

12 Q. Got it, okay.

13 So then now we know Trump's coming. You
14 see he has a range finder. You send the photos
15 you've taken of him. And then in [REDACTED] 7, you sent
16 a text message at 5:38 and you say, "Kid 'learning'
17 around" --

18 A. It's supposed to be lurking.

19 Q. Lurking. I get it. I get it. My text
20 messages, Apple doesn't do a good job on
21 autocorrect.

22 "Kid 'learning'" -- lurking is what you
23 meant -- "around building we are in. AGR, I
24 believe it is. I did see him with a range finder
25 looking towards stage, FYI. If you want to notify

1 SS snipers to look out, I lost sight of him.

2 "Also, a bike with backpack sitting next
3 to it in rear building that was not seen earlier."

4 Right? That's what you write?

5 A. Yes.

6 Q. And this is effectively saying, in summary
7 in a text, what you had just seen?

8 A. Yes.

9 Q. And SS, of course, refers to Secret
10 Service?

11 A. Yes.

12 Q. By the way, do you know where the Secret
13 Service snipers are located at this point?

14 A. Yes.

15 Q. Where were they located?

16 A. They were on the two little barns, I guess
17 they're calling them.

18 Q. Right.

19 A. Sitting on the rear of the stage.

20 Q. On the rear of the stage.

21 A. Rear and left of the stage.

22 Q. Okay. And then T.L. [REDACTED] responds.

23 Who is T.L. [REDACTED]?

24 A. I believe he's one of Butler's team
25 leaders, sniper team leaders.

1 Q. Did you know him before that day, or did
2 you just meet him that day?

3 A. Like some of these guys I know to see their
4 faces, but names --

5 Q. Right.

6 A. -- I'm terrible with names. But, like, I
7 might know them to see -- because we don't do a lot
8 of work with -- especially Butler. We work a lot
9 more with Washington.

10 Q. Right.

11 A. Not a lot with Butler.

12 Q. Right.

13 A. So some of these guys, I don't know their
14 names. I might know their faces as hey, I've seen
15 him before.

16 Q. Right.

17 A. But not names.

18 Q. When you sent out the text message at 5:38
19 and you send it to this group, you're obviously
20 alerting the people on the team who had tactical
21 responsibilities?

22 A. Snipers.

23 Q. Snipers?

24 A. This is just the snipers.

25 Q. It was just snipers, okay. So this is the

1 sniper group.

2 Were you expecting anyone in particular
3 to respond, or did you expect [REDACTED] to respond?

4 A. I just was putting it out there as this is
5 information.

6 Q. Okay. All right. And then [REDACTED] writes
7 at 5:40 p.m., "Call in to command and have a
8 uniform check it out." Right?

9 A. Yes.

10 Q. And you understood him telling you to do
11 that?

12 A. Yes.

13 Q. Did you do that?

14 A. Yes.

15 Q. And when they say "command," what does that
16 mean?

17 A. That would have been -- Butler had a
18 command post set up. So that would have been like
19 the radio communication through our tactical
20 channel to them.

21 Q. Butler 4?

22 A. Butler 4, to say hey... Basically the same
23 thing.

24 Q. Right.

25 A. Basically, I just notified the command that

1 I had seen the kid out there with a range finder
2 and he was suspicious and needed checked on.

3 Q. Okay. Like when you call this in, you do
4 it on Butler 4, and somebody answers and you tell
5 them this information; is that right?

6 A. Yes.

7 Q. And do you know who it was, or was it just
8 a person on the other line?

9 A. A dispatcher, yeah.

10 Q. Dispatcher; right?

11 A. I have no idea.

12 Q. Okay. And was there any kind of reaction
13 that you got from the dispatcher, or did they just
14 basically say, "We'll pass it on"?

15 A. Basically, they acknowledged it and said
16 that they'd send somebody out to check on it.

17 Q. Okay. They didn't ask you to do anything?

18 A. No.

19 Q. And also that wasn't your role; right?

20 You weren't supposed to leave your post
21 and go search around for them?

22 A. No.

23 Q. Okay. So at that point when you've called
24 it in, do you see Crooks again at any point?

25 A. When I called it in, no.

1 Q. Okay. So the last time you saw him before
2 the actual shooting was when you took the photos --
3 or, actually, no. When you saw the range finder?

4 A. I seen him with a range finder and then a
5 couple minutes before the shooting.

6 Q. Okay, yeah. We'll get to that in a second.

7 A. I figured.

8 Q. Yeah, we'll get to that in a second.

9 So you call it in. As far as you know
10 at that point, you've called it in. They're going
11 to send somebody out to check it out?

12 A. Yes.

13 Q. All right. Are you still looking for him
14 at this point?

15 A. Yes, yeah, because I'm trying to keep eyes
16 on him, you know.

17 Q. Right.

18 A. He's suspicious.

19 Q. Right. Right.

20 A. He looked suspicious.

21 Q. Right.

22 A. But, yeah, trying to keep an eye on him,
23 yeah. So moving kind of around, looking for him,
24 trying to see if I can see him.

25 Q. Did you talk to [REDACTED] about the fact that

1 you were looking for him?

2 A. So he -- I don't want to say -- I didn't
3 directly say, "Hey, I'm looking for this kid."

4 Q. Right.

5 A. But I assumed, you know, we both are doing
6 the same job. I'm assuming he knows we're looking
7 for him because, you know, he knew I seen him with
8 a range finder.

9 Q. Right.

10 A. Because I had mentioned it to him. Do you
11 know what I mean?

12 I said, "Hey, the kid's got a range
13 finder over here." Because [REDACTED], actually, one
14 of the ones that like, you know, said, "Send a
15 text," because I was going to call it in over the
16 radio originally. I'm not a big radio guy.

17 Q. Right.

18 A. And then [REDACTED] was like, "Well, maybe send
19 out a text to the group." I was like, "Okay."

20 So that's what I did, and then I get one
21 back from the group essentially calling command,
22 anyway. But, yeah.

23 Q. Got it. All right.

24 A. So he knew what was going on, you know.

25 Q. Right. Now, so after this text exchange

1 and after you call command, you've reported this,
2 how much later was it from that point did you see
3 any police officers or law enforcement coming
4 around looking for him?

5 A. At that point I hadn't.

6 Q. Right.

7 A. You know, see, originally when we got put
8 into that building, I assumed there was going to be
9 somebody on the exterior of the building.

10 Q. Right.

11 A. I mean, typically you don't put guys in a
12 building that is not secured.

13 Q. Yeah.

14 A. But, you know, we didn't -- it was
15 several -- I mean 10, 15 minutes -- before I had
16 seen anybody.

17 Q. Okay.

18 [REDACTED]: So 10, 15 minutes from
19 1738?

20 [REDACTED] Yeah. It was just after 6
21 before I seen anybody.

22 [REDACTED]: Just real quick: I asked
23 the witness a question, and to make sure it's on
24 the record, he said originally 10 to 15 minutes
25 from when he sent the text.

1 But then on considering it, you said
2 it's around 1800 when you first saw local law
3 enforcement respond?

4 [REDACTED]: Yeah. It was a little bit
5 after six. It was after I had seen him go around
6 the building, which I'm sure you're going to get
7 into.

8 When I followed or went down to the
9 first floor, that's the first time I seen the --

10 Q. Right. Right. So, actually, we have some
11 further texts here. I don't think we have a
12 printout of this.

13 A. That's our Beaver County personnel that
14 were on scene. That's a group text for them.

15 Q. Right, okay. So let me just enter that
16 into the record.

17 So we're going to call IMG_0544.png,
18 that will be marked as [REDACTED] 8.

19 (Majority Exhibit No. 8 was marked for
20 identification.)

21 Q. This is a text exchange that you're on.
22 Just, again, tell us for the record what text group
23 is this?

24 A. So this is Beaver County personnel that are
25 on scene.

1 Q. Got it.

2 A. At the rally.

3 Q. Okay. So at 5:45 you can see that you've
4 sent the photo of the bike and the --

5 A. Actually, all three of them are in there.

6 Q. Okay. All three of them, yeah. All three
7 of them are in there.

8 A. Yeah. The pictures of him and the bike.

9 Q. Right.

10 A. I had sent -- like I said, I don't know
11 these guys from Butler.

12 Q. Right.

13 A. So I had sent this picture to our group.

14 Q. Right.

15 A. And that's why it says in here -- because I
16 sent pictures and then I sent it -- "[REDACTED], if you
17 want to send this to whoever at command, if you
18 have their cellphone number."

19 Q. Got it.

20 A. Because like I said, I don't know them
21 guys. They do. So I figured -- you know, I got
22 pictures of the kid. Who needs it.

23 Q. Right. So the first set, which is in [REDACTED]
24 7, this is with Butler; right?

25 A. This is with Butler, Beaver, and Washington

1 snipers.

2 Q. Got it. And you called it into command,
3 and that was at 5:40?

4 A. Yeah. That's through a radio
5 communication.

6 Q. Through radio communication. And then this
7 [REDACTED] Exhibit 8, this is you talking just to the
8 Beaver colleagues?

9 A. Yes.

10 Q. And you send the photos about five minutes
11 after you called it in to your colleagues?

12 A. Yes.

13 Q. Just for the record, why did you decide to
14 send it again to just your colleagues?

15 A. Because I wanted to get the pictures of
16 this individual to [REDACTED], who is our deputy
17 commander, who I know has their commander's phone
18 numbers.

19 So I wanted to get the pictures to him
20 so he could send it to the command.

21 Q. Got it.

22 A. And the command could distribute them to
23 whoever.

24 Q. Got it. And so when you write, "[REDACTED]", if
25 you want to send this to whoever at command, "you

1 have a cell number.

2 Why did you send that text if you
3 already called command?

4 A. I called command via radio.

5 Q. Right.

6 A. So I sent these pictures via text to [REDACTED]
7 so he could send them to command because I don't
8 have anybody's number in command.

9 Q. Right.

10 A. I don't even know who is in command.

11 Q. Right. You wanted to make sure that -- you
12 wanted redundancy? Make sure people were, like,
13 focusing on this?

14 A. Yes, because I know [REDACTED] is going to send
15 these.

16 Q. Right. So then six minutes later [REDACTED]
17 sends it. It says Sent?

18 A. Yes.

19 Q. And then [REDACTED] -- who is [REDACTED]?

20 A. [REDACTED] is one of our operators that was -- he
21 was with [REDACTED].

22 Q. Okay. And [REDACTED] says, "They're
23 asking for direction of travel."

24 Did you understand what that meant?

25 A. Yes.

1 Q. What did that mean?

2 A. They're asking if I had a direction of
3 travel of Crooks.

4 Q. Who's "they"?

5 A. Command.

6 Q. Command. All right.

7 And then you write -- and that's at
8 5:59. So it's about eight minutes after [REDACTED] sent
9 it, [REDACTED] reports back. They're asking
10 for direction of travel.

11 A. So [REDACTED] started to text. This is where the
12 cell communication gets --

13 Q. Right.

14 A. [REDACTED] started to text because [REDACTED] was
15 sending texts. [REDACTED] has Verizon Wireless, and
16 [REDACTED] was sending texts and they were like -- they
17 weren't going through and they were taking forever.

18 So [REDACTED] then started because his texts
19 were going through no problem. He had FirstNet.

20 Q. Got it. Okay.

21 A. And that's kind of when [REDACTED] got involved.

22 Q. Right. So [REDACTED] getting involved.

23 A. And, plus, they were sitting right next to
24 each other.

25 Q. Yeah. So during this eight-minute period

1 there, they are trying to talk to command. [REDACTED]
2 texts are not going through because he has Verizon.
3 [REDACTED] is, so he's talking to them either by text
4 or cell. You don't know at that point?

5 A. Yeah.

6 Q. And then you respond, "Not sure. He was up
7 against the building."

8 A minute later you said, "Not sure.
9 He's up against the building. If I had to guess,
10 towards the back away from the event"; right?

11 A. Yeah.

12 Q. So now we're at 6:00. You reported this
13 in.

14 At this point have you seen any kind of
15 law enforcement on foot outside the building
16 looking for this guy?

17 A. No.

18 Q. When do you first see people start looking
19 for this guy?

20 A. So at about 6:06, 6:07-ish, as I was moving
21 around the building that I was in, I seen Crooks.
22 He would have been -- can I see this one here
23 (indicating)?

24 Q. Sure. That's [REDACTED] Exhibit 2.

25 A. All right. So I was in that back corner of

1 the second building.

2 Q. Why don't you make that a circle right
3 there.

4 A. (Indicating.) So I was in the back corner
5 of that -- it would have been in that top window,
6 the same one I took the picture of the bike from.

7 Q. Yep.

8 A. I got to that window, and when I looked
9 out -- and in this picture here (indicating) where
10 this sidewalk is on that building --

11 Q. Right.

12 A. -- there was a picnic table sitting there.

13 Q. Yep.

14 A. And when I looked out, I noticed that
15 Crooks was standing out beside that picnic table
16 and there was a backpack sitting on the ground.

17 Q. Okay?

18 A. When I looked, I seen him. He grabbed that
19 backpack, and then he took off running.

20 [REDACTED]: This is oriented north?

21 [REDACTED] North.

22 [REDACTED]: [REDACTED] Exhibit 2, as well
23 as [REDACTED] Exhibit 3, are oriented north-south.

24 A. So he started to run south, away from the
25 building I was in, and then in between the

1 building --

2 [REDACTED]: North?

3 Q. North.

4 A. North, away from the building I was in. He
5 was in between these buildings here (indicating).

6 Q. Why don't you draw on this just like a --
7 write what you recall as to where he started and
8 where he ran to.

9 A. He was here with a picnic table. When I
10 seen him, he grabbed the backpack and he took off
11 running and went in between these buildings here
12 (indicating).

13 [REDACTED]: For the record, the witness
14 has put an X where he saw Mr. Cooks and then drew a
15 line to where he saw him run. Okay.

16 A. And then from that position that I was
17 in -- and like I said earlier with these pictures,
18 you can't really tell the view that you had -- but
19 from here (indicating), once he got in between the
20 buildings there, I had no sight of him. The only
21 thing I could see was the top of the building.

22 Q. So you saw him at the picnic table, and you
23 saw him run with the backpack?

24 A. Yes.

25 Q. But then when he turned the corner, you

1 couldn't see him any longer?

2 A. Yeah. Once he went in between the
3 buildings, I could not see him anymore. And at
4 that point I had then radioed in to communication
5 command.

6 I said, "Hey, suspect spotted rear of
7 building. Grabbed the backpack and ran in between
8 the buildings."

9 Q. Okay.

10 A. And I communicated that through the command
11 on the radio. So that's... whatever.

12 Q. Right. And that was roughly at about 6:06,
13 6:07?

14 A. Yeah. 6:08, something like that.

15 Q. Okay.

16 A. So from where I was -- and like I said,
17 I've never been on this property before -- I
18 thought that this building, the area that he ran in
19 between, I thought that it wrapped all the way
20 around.

21 Q. Right.

22 A. I didn't know this building was connected
23 here.

24 So when he took off running and I lost
25 sight of him, I had moved from that corner of that

1 building on the second floor, and then I made my
2 way downstairs to the first floor.

3 Q. Can you mark with, let's say, a filled-in
4 circle where in the building you went to, the first
5 floor?

6 A. So this right here (indicating) was the
7 door on the first floor. That was the one that we
8 came in.

9 Q. Okay.

10 A. So pretty much the only door I knew.

11 Q. Right.

12 A. So I left at that point and I went down to
13 that door because like I said, I had thought that
14 that was open up here (indicating).

15 Q. Right.

16 A. I thought he was just running around the
17 building.

18 Q. Right.

19 A. I figure if I make my way down there, I'm
20 going to run into him; right?

21 Q. Right.

22 [REDACTED] Sorry to interject. Do
23 you mind if he just draws a path?

24 [REDACTED]: Yeah. No, I'm going to have
25 him draw a path.

1 [REDACTED]: My apologies.

2 Q. Can you draw --

3 A. Do you need an exact path?

4 Q. Yeah. To the extent you recall.

5 A. Yeah. So it would have been down the
6 hallway, and then steps went down.

7 Q. Down, yeah.

8 A. The steps are like right here (indicating),
9 and then I went through it like that (indicating).

10 Q. How long did it take you, would you say, to
11 get down there?

12 A. I'm not --

13 Q. Like a minute?

14 A. Maybe.

15 Q. A minute, okay. But it didn't take you ten
16 minutes?

17 A. No.

18 Q. And at this point, your job had been to
19 watch the crowd from that spot.

20 You had seen Crooks earlier now?

21 A. Yes, sir.

22 Q. But now you've left and have gone to the
23 first floor?

24 A. Yes.

25 Q. Is that because you were very concerned

1 that there was a security threat that this guy
2 represented?

3 A. Yes.

4 Q. And is it that protocol that if you see
5 something like that, that you can't do anything
6 from your vantage? That you need to go down and
7 figure out what's going on?

8 A. So I don't want to go as far as protocol --

9 Q. Right.

10 A. -- but it's an understanding that if there
11 is something suspicious that I'm tracking, that you
12 go with it until you can prove otherwise.

13 Q. And fair to say that you would not leave
14 that post that you were at unless you thought it
15 was a serious threat?

16 A. Absolutely. And like I said, prior to,
17 like, when I seen him and then command said they
18 were going to send somebody over to check on him, I
19 had not seen anybody at this point.

20 So it was like when I picked him up
21 again and spotted him for the last time, I took off
22 around the building. I was like, "I'm not losing
23 this guy again."

24 Q. Right.

25 A. So that's why I ran through the building

1 because like I said, I thought the buildings were
2 open.

3 So my thought was if I go back to this
4 door, I could watch him running around the
5 building.

6 Q. Right. You thought that he would circle
7 around and you would catch him?

8 A. I thought he was running around the
9 building.

10 Q. Right. And you mentioned that you had not
11 seen at that point any law enforcement outside
12 looking for this guy?

13 A. Yes.

14 Q. Is that one of the reasons why you decided
15 to leave your post and run down to see if you could
16 intercept him?

17 A. Yes.

18 Q. And let me ask you a hypothetical: Had you
19 seen law enforcement around the building looking
20 for him, would you have left your post to go find
21 him?

22 A. It depends. If I would have seen him run
23 around the building but I seen uniforms down there,
24 I would have probably stayed up there and been
25 like, "No, around the building there."

1 Q. Right.

2 A. But the strange thing with this was is
3 because of the communications being siloed, I had
4 no contact with patrol.

5 Q. Right.

6 A. And I was given a radio that I typically
7 don't use.

8 Q. Right.

9 A. Because it wasn't our radios.

10 So I was on 4, OPS 4, and patrol. So
11 all them guys that were down there would have been
12 on Channel 3.

13 Q. Right.

14 A. So we had no direct communications. It
15 would have had to have gone through --

16 Q. Right.

17 A. Because, you know, communications were
18 siloed.

19 Q. So if you had access to 3, right, would you
20 have called it in first and said, "Hey, listen.
21 This is where the guy is. Can somebody go over
22 there and find him?"

23 A. So I did. When I seen him, I called that
24 in to command.

25 Q. Right. In to command; right?

1 A. Yes. On the channel that I was on.

2 Q. Right.

3 A. I called that in and said, "Hey, you know,
4 he was spotted here. He ran around the building."

5 But there was no uniforms at that point
6 that I had seen. So it was like -- you know, a
7 decision at that point had to be made.

8 Q. Right.

9 A. And I made it to go and look for him. You
10 know, the cop in me kicked in, I guess.

11 Q. Right.

12 A. I was like, "I'm not losing this guy
13 again."

14 Q. Right. And were you surprised that you
15 called this in at 5:38, I think, based on the text
16 messages? Now we're talking it's 6:07, 6:08, and
17 now you spotted the guy and he's running.

18 Were you surprised at that point that
19 you didn't see any law enforcement out there
20 looking for him?

21 A. Yeah, because like I said originally, I had
22 assumed that there were some uniforms in the area.

23 Q. Right.

24 A. Because we were in this building. The
25 snipers are deployed inside the building, so I just

1 assumed. I never asked the question. I guess I
2 should have. I never asked the question of who's
3 got our security on the outside of the building.

4 Q. Right. Right.

5 A. Because like I said, I just had assumed
6 that there were some uniforms out there.

7 Q. Right, okay. Were you frustrated at all by
8 the fact that there was nobody out there, or it was
9 more just surprise?

10 A. I don't want to say frustrated. It was
11 more like what the heck is going on, you know.

12 Q. Right.

13 A. Like I said, it's one of the reasons that I
14 had left at that point and went down to try to find
15 him.

16 Q. Would [REDACTED] have seen you leave, or
17 did you tell him, "I'm leaving to go find this
18 guy"?

19 A. I didn't tell him. You know, I really
20 didn't have any communication with him at that
21 point. I don't want to say I didn't have
22 communication.

23 Q. Right.

24 A. I didn't talk to him at that point.

25 Q. Right.

1 A. When he took off running, I took off
2 running.

3 Q. You took off running because you were going
4 to react to the fact --

5 A. Yes.

6 Q. -- that you were not going to lose this
7 guy? Right.

8 A. You know, [REDACTED], I'm assuming, because I
9 don't remember seeing [REDACTED] The next time I seen
10 him was after the shots were fired, you know.

11 Q. Yeah.

12 A. But he was where he was positioned, and
13 that's why I went. I went. I didn't say, "[REDACTED],
14 I'm taking off after him." I just went.

15 Q. Okay. And then when you got down to the
16 first floor and you got to the entrance, what
17 happened next?

18 A. So when I got down to the first floor, I
19 knew that the door was locked.

20 Q. Right.

21 A. You needed a key card to get in. I didn't
22 have a key card.

23 So when I got down to the first floor, I
24 opened the door, and I was kind of holding the door
25 open with my foot, like looking. And when I looked

1 out, I noticed that two patrol units had pulled
2 into the parking lot.

3 Q. Okay.

4 A. There was a marked patrol unit. I'm not
5 sure who it was. And then there was an unmarked
6 patrol unit. But they were both uniformed
7 officers.

8 And when I looked out the door, they had
9 pulled up to -- I don't know how you want to
10 identify this building.

11 Q. Why don't you just put like a --

12 A. They had pulled up into the area where I
13 put the P on [REDACTED] 2, and there was an unmarked car
14 and a marked car.

15 They stopped there, and then the officer
16 in the marked car had got out and started walking
17 towards me.

18 Q. Right.

19 A. And I was leaning out the door, like my
20 foot holding the door open, and I was pointing. I
21 said, "He ran around the building down there."

22 Q. Right.

23 A. And he goes -- he looks at me and he's
24 like, "It's all one building."

25 Q. Right.

1 A. I said, "Well, then he's on the other side
2 because he went in between the buildings over
3 there."

4 Q. Right.

5 A. He was like, "Okay."

6 Well, he kept walking, and then walked
7 around past me and then went around the front of
8 the building, of the --

9 [REDACTED]: Complex?

10 Q. Complex, yeah.

11 A. And then the individual in the unmarked
12 car, he had kind of like started to roll down in
13 his car towards me, and I'm like, "He went around
14 the building down there." And he goes, "It's all
15 one building." I said, "I know that now, but he's
16 on the other side."

17 Q. Right.

18 A. So he was like, "Okay." So he then pulled
19 out of the lot and went around.

20 Q. And went around?

21 A. Went back out into the lot.

22 Q. Right.

23 A. And then I don't know where he went from
24 there.

25 Q. Got it.

1 A. So at that point I went back into the
2 building.

3 Q. Right.

4 A. And I stayed on the first floor.

5 Q. Yep. In the same spot?

6 A. Hmm?

7 Q. In the same spot?

8 A. So I went back into the building, and then
9 I'm not sure which route I took. I just was trying
10 to make my way over to --

11 Q. To the area that you had seen him running
12 to?

13 A. To the area that I had seen him from on the
14 first floor.

15 Q. Right, okay.

16 A. So this is all -- like I said, this was all
17 machines.

18 Q. Yep.

19 A. It was like a maze to me.

20 Q. Yep.

21 A. So I had taken off. I ran back into the
22 building and I made my way over. I believe it was
23 basically down the hallway like this (indicating).

24 Q. Right. You're trying to find -- you don't
25 know the inside of this building?

1 A. Not at all.

2 Q. You're trying to find your way to --

3 A. I actually walked with the binoculars.

4 Q. Right.

5 A. So I made my way over to the side of the
6 building where I had last seen him.

7 Q. Right.

8 A. And I'm now looking out the windows. I'm
9 like looking around, and I started to work my way
10 towards this side, you know, towards the event side
11 of the building.

12 Q. Right.

13 A. And I'm looking, looking, looking. Well,
14 when I got to this side of the building over here
15 (indicating), I was looking out the windows, and
16 that's when I noticed -- because I'm on the floor
17 at this point --

18 Q. Right.

19 A. That's when I started to notice -- I could
20 hear the president talking at this point.

21 Q. Right.

22 A. And I'm looking out the windows, and I
23 notice people looking at the building.

24 Q. Right. "People" meaning people who are in
25 the crowd?

1 A. People that were outside of the AGR
2 building.

3 Q. Right. Right.

4 A. They're like looking --

5 Q. I'm sorry. Not in the crowd but outside of
6 the event but who were just members of the public
7 who wanted to see it?

8 A. Yes. Outside the AGR building.

9 Q. Right, okay.

10 A. And I'm looking out the window at them, and
11 like they're looking towards the building at me,
12 and I'm like, "What is going on here?"

13 So I moved down. Like I said, I'm
14 moving down the building basically from window to
15 window.

16 Q. Right.

17 A. I'm looking, and I go down a little bit
18 further and I look again, and now they're all,
19 like, staring at the building and he would be
20 behind them.

21 Q. "He" being who?

22 A. Trump.

23 Q. Trump.

24 A. Talking. And I'm like --

25 Q. Why are they watching the building and not

1 Trump?

2 A. So in my head, what I thought at this point
3 is I'm like those guys found him out there and
4 they're dealing with him and everybody --

5 Q. Is watching the arrest?

6 A. Is watching them deal with him.

7 Q. Right. Right.

8 A. Well, and then I heard boom. Boom, boom,
9 boom. That's when I heard the gunfire.

10 Q. Okay.

11 A. And people started to run.

12 Q. All right.

13 [REDACTED] I've gone -- do you want to
14 keep going?

15 Do you want to take it over?

16 [REDACTED]: So I don't care. I have a
17 bunch of like kind of fill-in things.

18 [REDACTED] No, I figured that, yeah.

19 [REDACTED]: But how much longer do you
20 have until you're done with your initial set?

21 [REDACTED]: Why don't you do that now,
22 and then we can just --

23 [REDACTED]: Cool. I think that will
24 help.

25 [REDACTED]: Exactly.

1 [REDACTED] It's 11:32. This is
2 [REDACTED].

3 BY [REDACTED]:

4 Q. I'm going to have to fill in a few things,
5 but I want to clarify just a couple of points that
6 you just made just for me.

7 So on [REDACTED] 2 you've marked with like a
8 circle and an X. That is approximately where you
9 were when you heard the gunshots; is that right?

10 A. Yes.

11 Q. So you said you were unfamiliar with this
12 building.

13 You never got a tour of this building;
14 right?

15 A. No.

16 Q. So it would have helped had you had a tour
17 of this building?

18 A. Yeah.

19 Q. Had you had a tour of this building or had
20 familiarity with where it would have been, was
21 there an exit on that northwestern corner of that
22 second building in the AGR complex where you were
23 stationed?

24 A. Yes.

25 Q. So if you had, would you then have exited

1 that way upon looking for Crooks?

2 A. No. Probably not.

3 Q. And is that because you thought the
4 building, he had circled around?

5 A. Yes.

6 Q. Let's then rephrase that. Had you known
7 there wasn't a connection -- because having been in
8 that area where you have the end of the arrow on
9 [REDACTED] 2, knowing that there is no P-way there from
10 the west side to the east side -- would that have
11 been where you would have gone had you known that?

12 A. If I were to exit the building?

13 Q. If you were to exit the building, knowing
14 he couldn't connect through that way, would you
15 have followed him in that path?

16 A. I don't know that I would have.

17 Q. Hard to say?

18 A. If I had known the building was connected
19 and he just ran around there and didn't go nowhere,
20 I probably would have stayed on the second floor.

21 Q. Okay. And you would have just directed
22 people to that point?

23 A. Yes.

24 Q. Okay. That's helpful. Thank you.

25 Let me state -- before I go backwards,

1 let me just clarify a few things.

2 You have the P with patrol on [REDACTED] 2.

3 Do you know what law enforcement agency those
4 images were?

5 A. No.

6 Q. Okay.

7 A. I mean, I was pretty sure it was Butler
8 Township.

9 Q. Okay.

10 A. But at the time I didn't know who it was.

11 Q. On [REDACTED] 2 -- let's just do some arts and
12 crafts -- On [REDACTED] 2, could you write the word
13 "bicycle" approximately where you saw the bicycle?

14 A. (Indicating).

15 Q. Perfect, okay.

16 Give me the time one more time
17 approximately when you see Crooks at the table with
18 his backpack.

19 A. It was 6:06, 6:07.

20 Q. Got it. I am showing you a radio log that
21 we've been provided on my computer.

22 A. Well, that will give you a better time.

23 Q. Yeah. Fair enough. I want to direct your
24 attention to a marking where I have -- it's a
25 spreadsheet. And I'm not asking you to vouch for

1 this. I'm just asking you if this is correct.

2 It says 18:02:52 -- or 18:02:43 -- and
3 it says, "[REDACTED]. All right. Subject is in between
4 the AGR building with his backpack. Just went
5 around towards Sheetz."

6 Is that possible that it was at 6:02?

7 A. Yeah. I mean, I don't know -- yeah.

8 Q. Possible?

9 A. No. That was -- yeah, the 4 CR-2 was me
10 because we were identified by county and our county
11 number is 4, and then I was CR-2.

12 Q. Okay. So the timelines earlier, when you
13 thought it was about 1806, it's 18:02:43, shifting
14 a few minutes earlier?

15 Is that about right?

16 A. Yes.

17 Q. And you said he sees you looking at him, or
18 no?

19 A. No. Not that I know of.

20 Q. So what prompts him, in your mind -- I know
21 you're speculating -- what prompts him, in your
22 mind, to then run and circle around that building?

23 A. I have no idea. Just like it's time to go.
24 I don't know.

25 Q. Yeah. Something happened. But he's

1 sitting down. You're looking at him?

2 A. He wasn't sitting. He was kind of standing
3 beside the table, and then he just like grabbed the
4 backpack and boom.

5 [REDACTED] Can I ask him just one
6 question?

7 [REDACTED]: Please.

8 [REDACTED]: Had Trump started speaking,
9 or was he announced at that point?

10 [REDACTED]: I don't think he -- I don't
11 know. I wasn't paying much attention to that.

12 Like I said, the only reason I even
13 remember him talking when I was on the first floor
14 is just because I thought it was odd and I
15 remembered hearing his voice.

16 [REDACTED]: Right. Okay.

17 [REDACTED]: And then people all looking
18 at the building. I'm like, well, why is he out
19 there and they're looking in here?

20 [REDACTED]: Got it. Understood.

21 [REDACTED]: I believe it's slightly
22 later, but...

23 [REDACTED]: Yeah. No, I wasn't sure if
24 they even announced he's about to arrive.

25 [REDACTED] Yeah, I'm not -- I don't

1 remember

2 BY [REDACTED]

3 Q. Okay. So you're watching him. He takes
4 off. Goes around.

5 Anything you note about the backpack?

6 A. No. I just knew he grabbed a bag.

7 Q. I assume you would have told us this.
8 There wasn't anything poking out of it like a --

9 A. Not that I recall.

10 Q. I want to fill in some gaps in my mind.

11 I want to show you Exhibit Alpha again,
12 which I know you said you haven't seen. Maybe you
13 saw something similar. And I want to direct your
14 attention to on Exhibit Alpha there's an A-1 and
15 A-2 by the grandstands in Butler.

16 Are you familiar at all, either then or
17 now, with those grandstands where A-1 and A-2 are?

18 A. I'm trying to get my bearings on the --

19 Q. If you like, I can show you on [REDACTED] 3 they
20 are adjacent to, on both sides, this sandpit, I
21 suppose.

22 A. Okay.

23 Q. Are you familiar with that area?

24 A. Hmm.

25 Q. Generally but not excessively?

1 A. I don't know what you mean by "familiar."

2 Q. Well, let me ask you this: Do you know --

3 A. I believe it's a grandstand with, like, an
4 open press box or something on the top.

5 Q. Do you know? Have you been in those press
6 boxes?

7 A. No.

8 Q. Do you know or are you able to say with any
9 degree of certainty if someone in that press box
10 would have had a view over the AGR roof?

11 A. I have no idea.

12 Q. Do you know who was stationed there on that
13 day?

14 A. I believe Washington County was over there.

15 Q. Okay. But that wasn't -- because you
16 weren't in the command and you hadn't drawn up the
17 plans, you don't know?

18 A. I don't know.

19 Q. I want to ask you about your Commander or
20 Deputy Commander [REDACTED]. He was with the
21 counterassault team?

22 A. Yes.

23 Q. He wasn't in the command trailer?

24 A. No.

25 Q. When you've been referring to command,

1 you're referring to the local trailer; right?

2 A. Yes.

3 Q. You're not referring to the Secret Service
4 post?

5 A. No.

6 Q. From your understanding -- and, again, I
7 understand you may not know -- anyone from local
8 police, law enforcement, sheriff anyone that you
9 know of who was in that Secret Service headquarter/
10 command area?

11 A. I mean, now I know there was a trooper in
12 there.

13 Q. When you say "trooper," Pennsylvania State
14 Police?

15 A. Yes.

16 Q. No one from ESU?

17 A. No. Not that I'm -- I don't think so.

18 Q. Anyone in the command trailer from the
19 Secret Service?

20 A. No. Not that I recall, no.

21 Q. And what about from Beaver ESU? Do you
22 know if anyone had ever --

23 A. No.

24 Q. Okay. I want to talk about Butler ESU.

25 You had said earlier they basically gave

1 you -- you show up at AGR. They give you your
2 assignment; right?

3 A. Yes.

4 Q. They tell you where to be.

5 They tell you you're going to be in the
6 building?

7 A. Yes.

8 Q. Did they say anything about the roof?

9 A. No.

10 Q. No discussion whatsoever?

11 A. Not with us.

12 Q. And you guys are just like, "Fair enough.
13 That's where we are."

14 In your mind -- like you had been
15 prepped to go on the roof, right, if necessary?

16 A. Yes.

17 Q. There had been talk about the sunscreen?

18 A. Yes. I mean, that was what we were
19 expecting for the day.

20 Q. Yeah. Any sense of why you were told to be
21 inside by Butler ESU as opposed to outside?

22 A. No. That's where they said that they'd
23 identified positions that they wanted to cover and
24 observation of the areas of responsibility that
25 they wanted to be covered. So...

Q. So fair to say Butler says this is where we want to be. In your mind, you're like these guys know what they're doing. They're the ones calling the shots. Fair enough.

A. This is where they wanted us to be, and it was their game. We were there to help.

So to change something in the middle of it is not always the best, especially from a sniper standpoint, because if they say we have snipers in this window and that window and I decide to go on the other side of the building in that window, you know, it's not a good thing for me.

Q. Yeah.

BY [REDACTED]

Q. Also, to clarify, too, with the site placement, so after the morning briefing on the sniper briefing, you set up in the AGR building. You were brought over with the Butler ESU folks, and that was probably around 11:15?

A. It was earlier than that.

Q. A little bit earlier than that?

A. Probably 10:30.

Q. I guess then it seems like you would have potentially had time to do a site survey of where you are being posted.

1 Do you feel like you would have had time
2 to kind of look at the complex before setting up?

3 Is that like standard procedure?

4 A. Well, we were told they wanted us in place
5 by 10:30, I think it was. 10:30, 10:45. I think,
6 honestly, 10:30 for some reason.

7 Q. Would you typically go, if you're being
8 placed in a sniper capacity in a specific location,
9 would you typically tour the site beforehand or
10 kind of get your bearings around the area?

11 A. I mean, typically I would have been -- I
12 mean, if it was a project that I was running, I
13 would have had them up there a day or two prior to
14 just tour the whole site, not just that building.

15 Q. Okay.

16 A. So...

17 Q. Great.

18 BY [REDACTED]:

19 Q. You mentioned typically as a sniper/
20 counter-sniper, as someone basically focused beyond
21 your immediate vicinity, you would not be in a
22 building or location that is not secured by another
23 group of folks; is that right?

24 A. Yeah.

25 Q. Essentially, because if you're not looking

1 around you, someone could sneak up behind you?

2 A. Absolutely.

3 Q. Any relative concern about that being
4 inside versus on a roof, or similar, different
5 levels of danger?

6 What do you think?

7 A. I would assume the same, whether we were on
8 the roof or inside. I mean, I would assume that
9 somebody would have been on the ground in a general
10 area, at least.

11 Q. And that is because -- just to make it very
12 clear, can you say why you would have assumed that?

13 A. Because that's typically what is done. You
14 know, you have some type of security for your
15 personnel there set up.

16 Q. And you're saying that, based on your
17 experience of decades in law enforcement, that it
18 is common community knowledge that a sniper should
19 have some sort of surrounding protection?

20 A. Absolutely.

21 Q. A couple of quick-hitters here.

22 I want to direct your attention to [REDACTED]
23 1. I am pointing to a red object in the relative
24 middle of [REDACTED] 1.

25 Do you know what that was?

1 A. A combine.

2 Q. And a combine is like a piece of farm
3 equipment; is that right?

4 A. A large piece of farm equipment.

5 Q. Yeah. Was it in this position during the
6 rally, or was it extended larger?

7 A. No. It was exactly where it's at.

8 Q. Got it. How did that affect your sight
9 lines?

10 A. So I did not have sight of the stage
11 because of the combine. I couldn't see -- I
12 couldn't see the stage. I couldn't see the stage
13 or the middle grandstand.

14 Q. So that combine is pretty tall?

15 A. Yeah.

16 Q. Let me ask you this: Do you ever get up on
17 the roof where Crooks was eventually located?

18 A. No.

19 Q. Okay. But similar -- actually, it's a
20 lower elevation than where you were; is that right?

21 A. Yes.

22 Q. So fair to say that from Crooks'
23 perspective, obviously a different angle, but
24 whatever was in front of the combine within the
25 crowd would have been blocked?

1 He wouldn't have been able to see that,
2 in other words, because of the combine's height?

3 A. Whatever was in front of?

4 Q. The combine -- so you said the combine
5 blocked your view of the stage.

6 A. Yes.

7 Q. Okay. Had that combine been in front of
8 the stage from Crooks' perspective, he would also
9 have not been able to see the stage?

10 A. No, he wouldn't have been able to see the
11 stage.

12 Q. Okay, got it. Yeah, sorry. A bad question
13 asks for a negative answer.

14 A. I mean, he moved far enough down the
15 building that he was behind the combine.

16 Q. Right. Horizontally, he no longer was
17 worried about that?

18 A. Yeah. Absolutely.

19 Q. Got it. I want to just -- you know, many
20 people are going to read this, and I want to make
21 sure it's like super clear to me and to them about
22 the timeline.

23 So I'm going to just say some things.
24 If any of them are wrong, please interrupt me.

25 Your colleague [REDACTED] leaves around 1620?

1 A. Roughly, yes.

2 Q. Give or take. And sends the message about
3 "We're kind of blown cover-wise."

4 You first see Mr. Crooks around 1700.
5 That's just when he's kind of ambling about?

6 A. Yeah. Maybe a little bit after that, but,
7 yeah.

8 Q. Give or take. Then you leave. Come back.
9 [REDACTED] says, "Oh. I also saw this guy"; is that
10 right?

11 A. Yes.

12 Q. And you guys are like, "That's kind of
13 funky." And then you're looking around, and around
14 1715, you look down and see him immediately?

15 A. Yes.

16 Q. On the wall?

17 A. Yeah. He's sitting -- yeah.

18 Q. That's when that picture is?

19 A. Yeah.

20 Q. He remains there for about 20 minutes until
21 you see him take out a range finder; is that right?

22 A. No. I didn't remain there because he had
23 got up at one point and walked around the building,
24 and that's why I had got up and was going looking
25 for him, and that's when I seen the bike. The bike

1 was on the opposite side.

2 Q. Got it. Did he ever touch the bike?

3 A. No.

4 Q. Did he ever touch the backpack near the
5 bike?

6 A. Not that I know of.

7 Q. Did he have a different backpack?

8 A. So specifically the backpack that was at
9 the bike was not the one that he picked up because
10 after the whole shooting and everything, I went
11 back and looked at that bike and everything was
12 still there.

13 Q. Still there. Do you know where his
14 backpack was at another point?

15 Like prior to, when you see him with a
16 range finder, does he have a backpack on?

17 A. No. I don't where that backpack --

18 Q. You don't know where it came from. Got it.

19 And then after the range finder, you're
20 like all right. This is something. Then that's
21 when you send the picture, and the subsequent
22 events happen from there; is that right?

23 A. Yes.

24 Q. We talked about time, and I had the benefit
25 of looking at an Excel spreadsheet.

1 At around 1743 -- does that sound
2 right? -- when you radio over OPS 4, "Hey, there's
3 this guy lurking around"?

4 A. Yes.

5 Q. At 1745, you said someone from command
6 said, "Oh, someone's going to deal with it"; is
7 that right?

8 A. Yeah.

9 Q. Is it possible that that was someone in
10 command saying PSP and sheriffs are en route?

11 Did you ever see PSP or sheriffs at any
12 point, to your recollection, before the shots?

13 A. No. I mean, there was a PSP and some
14 sheriff's cars that were positioned in this open
15 field.

16 Q. Within the kind of no man's land?

17 A. Yes.

18 Q. And I want to ask you about that. Did you
19 ever see them interact with the crowd around AGR?

20 A. Not that I remember.

21 Q. Redirecting your attention kind of to 1730
22 to the 1745 timeline, still approximately about
23 hundreds of people, a hundred people?

24 Do you want to throw out an estimate?
25 Hundreds?

1 A. Yeah.

2 Q. Can you on, [REDACTED] 2, give kind of a circle
3 where the largest cluster of people were or sort of
4 circle where people generally were?

5 A. There was a big, large cluster that was in
6 this area (indicating), and I want to say it was --
7 I mean, there were people spotted all over because
8 of the trees. So I think most of them were trying
9 to get under trees. There were some over here
10 (indicating).

11 But I mean, the majority of the people
12 that I could see were in this area here
13 (indicating) and then there were some throughout
14 the fence line.

15 Q. It's just everyone kind of watching the
16 rally?

17 A. Pretty much, yeah.

18 Q. What were your thoughts on that? I may
19 have asked that earlier, but I'd like to ask again:
20 What were your thoughts on just there being that
21 many people who hadn't gone through security that
22 close along that fence line?

23 A. I mean, I thought the perimeter was kind of
24 small, you know, for that type of event. I mean,
25 we were able to see them, even though that wasn't

1 typically our assignment. You know, then with all
2 them people around, it was another reason that, you
3 know, I thought there were uniforms in that area.

4 Q. I presume you didn't see anyone with a
5 weapon during that time?

6 A. No.

7 Q. Either holstered or carried?

8 A. No.

9 Q. But that was an area where the general
10 public could access?

11 A. They could?

12 Q. They could access?

13 A. Yes.

14 Q. Okay. And they wouldn't have screened
15 through there; right?

16 A. No.

17 Q. I'm going through and trying to make this
18 as efficient as possible.

19 So in the conversations -- I want to
20 move you ahead a bit and my apologies again. It's
21 just the nature of the back and forth.

22 Moving ahead to like right before 1800,
23 [REDACTED] is having a conversation with command; right?

24 Command?

25 A. Yeah.

1 Q. That's the trailer command, local?

2 A. Well, one of Butler's commanders.

3 Q. Do you know?

4 A. I don't.

5 Q. Okay. [REDACTED] also was involved in that
6 conversation?

7 A. Yeah. Like I said, they were sitting right
8 with each other. So I don't know if [REDACTED] was
9 texting or if [REDACTED] was texting.

10 Q. And they were with the counterassault team?

11 A. Yes.

12 Q. And they were just by the entrance of the
13 AGR grounds?

14 A. No. They were on the opposite side of the
15 property.

16 Q. Is it within either of these two exhibits,
17 [REDACTED] 2 or 3? If not, that's fine.

18 A. Yeah. They were over here (indicating).

19 Q. Got it. And you've marked that with an X
20 in sort of the lower left-hand corner of [REDACTED] 3.

21 A. There's a hangar over there. That's where
22 they were.

23 Q. So, let's say, now having looked at when
24 you radioed in, fair to say around 1803 you're
25 like, "I can't see '[REDACTED]' anymore," and that's

1 when you proceed along the path that you've
2 demarcated in [REDACTED] 2; is that right?

3 A. Crooks?

4 Q. No, no. [REDACTED] 2.

5 A. I couldn't see Crooks anymore.

6 Q. Oh, did I say [REDACTED]?

7 A. Yeah.

8 Q. My apologies again.

9 So, yes, you no longer see Crooks, and
10 then you go along this path down to the front
11 entrance of AGR; is that right?

12 A. Yes.

13 Q. And I want to ask you about this radio.

14 So you're on OPS 4. Do you know how to
15 switch on that channel to other channels?

16 A. Not really.

17 Q. Okay. So no one familiarized you with that
18 equipment?

19 A. No. They put it on Channel 4 and handed it
20 to me and said, "Here."

21 Q. You weren't told that, "Hey, if you need to
22 go to OPS 3 to reach patrol, this is how you do
23 it"?

24 A. No.

25 Q. Had you known that, is that something you

1 would have done, or would you have kept it on OPS
2 4?

3 A. I don't know because, I mean, I'm sure I
4 could have figured out how to change the channel.
5 I was focused on him. So any communications I had,
6 I was going over the tactical channel.

7 Q. When you lose Crooks, did you communicate
8 with [REDACTED] at any time between then and the
9 shooting?

10 A. No.

11 Q. Did you hear anyone over -- and you have
12 OPS? You have the radio with you when you leave?

13 A. Yeah.

14 Q. Did you hear anyone say anything on OPS 4
15 about someone on the roof or doing anything from
16 the time period of, let's say, 1802 to the shots
17 fired at 1811?

18 A. The only time I think I remember hearing
19 anything about somebody being on the roof was after
20 the shots were fired on OPS 4, but I'm not positive
21 on that because like I said, I was running around
22 the building down there.

23 Q. Yeah. From the vantage point -- and, you
24 know, you've said this -- you, in no way, at any
25 point that day, were responsible for the roof of

1 the AGR complex, given your assignment; is that
2 right?

3 A. No. I mean, where he was sitting you
4 couldn't -- even if my gun barrel was hanging out
5 the window of the room that I was in, I still
6 wouldn't have been able to see him down where he
7 was at. I mean, you just couldn't see that far
8 down.

9 Q. If someone had alerted you -- and I don't
10 want you to speak for [REDACTED] -- but let's say you're
11 up in there and someone says, "There's someone on
12 the roof." At that point you have the ability to
13 put your head and rifle out the roof and look for
14 someone; is that right?

15 A. I could have found a way, yeah. I mean,
16 the windows, they were -- so those windows were
17 narrow and they opened right to left or left to
18 right, but they didn't open up and down. They had
19 screens on them.

20 But I mean, if somebody would have said,
21 "There's somebody on the roof with a gun," I would
22 have busted the window out.

23 Q. Yeah.

24 A. And if I would have known or heard that
25 there was somebody on the roof when I was up there,

1 I mean, there's a window I could have climbed out
2 of.

3 Q. So in the minutes prior to the shooting,
4 had someone radioed in over OPS 4, "There's someone
5 on the roof," you would have had the ability to
6 find a window suitable enough to get a viewpoint
7 over the roof?

8 A. I don't know if I would have because I was
9 down on the floor.

10 Q. Sure. Had you been there.

11 A. Yeah. Had I been there, yeah, I would have
12 found a way to get out on the roof.

13 Q. Yeah. So what do you -- I think we've now
14 caught up to where the Majority was. What happens?
15 Shots fired.

16 What do you do next?

17 A. Once I hear the shots were fired, I head
18 back to that because like I said, at some point, I
19 believe, after the shots were fired, I heard on the
20 radio, "Shooter on the roof of the AGR building,"
21 or something to that effect," because at that point
22 I was like, "Shit. I'm in the AGR building."

23 And then I made my way back to that
24 first, the door where I had stepped out and entered
25 from.

1 Q. The southeastern one?

2 A. Yes.

3 Q. And what happened from there?

4 A. When I got there, that's when -- I mean, he
5 had already been -- he had been taken out at that
6 point.

7 I came out the door, and when I came out
8 the door, you know, the door shut behind me. So I
9 was locked out.

10 Q. You don't -- sorry to interrupt -- you
11 don't have your rifle at this point?

12 A. No, I do not.

13 Q. Do you have a sidearm?

14 A. Yes.

15 Q. Okay.

16 A. So I came out the door. The door shut
17 behind me, and then I encountered -- there were a
18 couple troopers, Pennsylvania State Police, that
19 were in plain clothes, but -- I mean, they had TAC
20 vests on and stuff, but they were in plain clothes.

21 I knew them guys from dealing with them.
22 They were a lot of our drugs guys, and I just knew
23 them from dealing with them and that.

24 And then they came around the building
25 and they were like, "Hey, where's the evidence?"

1 "On the roof. You know, he's right up here."

2 And I just basically sat there or stood
3 out there until -- I don't know who or how they
4 got -- I don't know if somebody had a keycard and
5 opened the door.

6 But then once they got the door opened,
7 they kept saying, "We gotta clear this building.
8 We gotta clear this building."

9 At that point I was like, "Hold on. I
10 got a guy on the second floor." And they're like,
11 "Eh, we gotta clear the building."

12 As soon as they got the door opened, I
13 went back into the building to the second floor.
14 They were kind of yelling at me because I didn't
15 have a vest on.

16 Q. Who was yelling at you?

17 A. One of the troopers.

18 Q. One of the troopers?

19 A. Yeah. I know the guy, you know. He's
20 like, "Whoa, whoa, whoa. Get behind us, [REDACTED]. You
21 ain't got a vest on." I'm like --

22 Q. The dude's concerned for your safety?

23 A. Yes.

24 Q. Because you don't know how many people are
25 there? You know --

1 A. Well, they didn't know anything about the
2 building.

3 Q. Got it.

4 A. Because they were uniformed guys that had
5 nothing to do with anything. They didn't know
6 anything about the building. So, yeah.

7 But I was like, "I got a guy on the
8 second floor. I'm going. You're not going to just
9 go up there and whatever."

10 Q. Because you were concerned that maybe they
11 would think he was something?

12 A. Yeah.

13 Q. And you were worried about his safety?

14 A. Yeah.

15 Q. Do you eventually reencounter [REDACTED]?

16 A. Yes.

17 Q. What happened then?

18 A. So when I got back up onto the second
19 floor, as I was going up to the second floor, I was
20 yelling.

21 I'm like, "[REDACTED]! [REDACTED]! Coming up!
22 Coming up!"

23 And he was like, "Okay."

24 I said, "Where are you at?"

25 He said, "I'm in the first room on the

1 floor."

2 So when I got up there, he had --

3 Q. Sorry to pause you one more time. I deeply
4 apologize.

5 Can you circle on [REDACTED] 1 the window
6 where you saw [REDACTED], approximately?

7 A. That's a square (indicating).

8 Q. Do you know what? Actually -- and, yeah,
9 let's actually -- yeah. That's a square. A
10 square's good.

11 And you've circled the southeastern
12 window on that second building where you all were
13 posted up, and you've also done that on [REDACTED] 2 and
14 [REDACTED] 1. Cool.

15 All right. Please continue. My
16 apologies.

17 A. Yeah. So when I got up there, he had told
18 me, "I'm in the first room. I'm in the first
19 room."

20 So I got up there, and then when I seen
21 him, he was like kind of leaning out the window
22 covering down on Crooks, who was already
23 neutralized at this point.

24 So what I found out from [REDACTED] was that
25 after he heard the shots and somebody said that,

1 you know, the shooter was on the AGR, he had pulled
2 his rifle from the position that he was in, and he
3 went down into that first room and basically -- he
4 didn't break the window out, but he forced it open
5 because that was one of the windows that they
6 couldn't get open originally. So we just left it
7 closed.

8 He basically had forced that window open
9 and then leaned out and covered down on him until
10 somebody got up on the roof.

11 Q. Yeah. You know, I'm just asking you what
12 [REDACTED] reported to you.

13 So he is in that building -- sorry --
14 the window -- all the way down on the eastern side
15 with a pointed rifle out the window?

16 A. Yes.

17 Q. And has a view over Crooks?

18 A. Yeah. He was kind of like leaning out,
19 leaning a little bit at an angle with his gun
20 hanging out the top of the window.

21 Q. Pretty close to where Crooks was in the
22 relative scheme of things?

23 A. Yeah.

24 Q. Certainly, within a shot distance, that
25 would be no problem?

1 A. Oh, yeah. Yeah.

2 Q. Do you have a sense of why he left where
3 his rifle was initially positioned, going to get
4 his rifle, then repositioned in the other window to
5 go there?

6 Was there a difference in view, or are
7 you unsure?

8 A. Yeah. A lot. A big difference in view.

9 Q. Tell me about it.

10 A. I mean, the further down the building you
11 go, the harder it is to see down that far of the
12 building.

13 So if he would have stayed where he was
14 and tried to hold down on him, he literally would
15 have probably had to hang his body out the window,
16 as opposed to just kind of leaning out the window
17 from the first window.

18 Q. Got it. Just to make it clear, you're
19 saying the further west you are, you really need to
20 get a different angle where you're out the window;
21 whereas, on that window where he eventually was,
22 you could see where Crooks' body was from inside
23 the building?

24 A. No. Not really inside the building.

25 Q. But not as much outside?

1 A. Yes. You didn't have to, like, lay out the
2 window to see because I believe it's one of the
3 congressmen that were there that took his phone and
4 was doing the pictures.

5 He was, "Why didn't they just look left,
6 look left?" You know, they didn't tell you he was
7 holding his phone out the window at arm's length as
8 he was going, "Why didn't they just look left?"

9 Q. Yeah. And having been to the site, that's
10 understandable, from your perspective, that you
11 wouldn't have had that view.

12 [REDACTED]: So I'm done with my
13 questions relating to the event. I have some,
14 like, closeout, followup, and other general
15 thoughts. No more than five, ten minutes.

16 [REDACTED]: I'm good.

17 [REDACTED]: You're good?

18 So I'm happy to do those now and you
19 guys --

20 [REDACTED]: Yeah. Why don't you do
21 them. That's fine.

22 [REDACTED]: Okay.

23 BY [REDACTED]:

24 Q. So, first of all, is there anything from
25 planning the event, the immediate aftermath of the

1 event, or anything else that you think is relevant
2 that you want either on the record or we should
3 know that would be helpful to me that we haven't
4 asked?

5 A. I mean, not really. I wasn't involved in
6 any of the planning or pre-site assessment or
7 anything like that. So I don't think that's
8 something I should speak on because I don't know
9 what was done or what wasn't done.

10 Q. Yeah. And to be clear, I don't want you to
11 speculate, but you are allowed, you know, hearsay.
12 You can say what you've heard, and I think you've
13 done that.

14 So nothing else that comes up that you
15 are aware of you that you think we should know?

16 A. No.

17 Q. What other interviews have you participated
18 in like this that were, perhaps, more or less
19 pleasant?

20 A. There's been a couple with a couple
21 different senator groups. I'm not sure on the
22 ones, but four or five different ones, I think.

23 Q. What about FBI, the PSP?

24 A. So I did an interview with PSP and FBI the
25 Monday following the event.

1 Q. Anything else to this degree of formality?

2 A. No. Probably an independent review.

3 Q. There are many government groups, and we
4 are not always talking to each other.

5 A. It's --

6 Q. The Secret Service?

7 A. No. Well, Secret Service, they had
8 scheduled interviews with us. They didn't want to
9 talk to me yet, and then they had canceled.

10 I did it up in Butler at one of the
11 hotels.

12 Q. Okay. Homeland Security? I mean, I don't
13 know.

14 A. It might be a Homeland. Well, there's a
15 former -

16 Q. Was that the one where --

17 A. An independent review panel.

18 Q. -- led by the former --

19 [REDACTED]: Was it the Heritage
20 Foundation?

21 [REDACTED]: No. The appointee. She's
22 a former administration official. It was a DOJ
23 official.

24 [REDACTED] Yeah. I think that's right.

25 [REDACTED] [REDACTED]?

1 [REDACTED]: No, no. She's the DAG.

2 [REDACTED]: It's a bunch of former --

3 [REDACTED] DHS?

4 [REDACTED]: DHS and --

5 [REDACTED]: It's the one that

6 [REDACTED] is on.

7 [REDACTED] There was an independent one.

8 DOJ set up an independent one.

9 [REDACTED]: Right. Exactly.

10 [REDACTED]: I can't remember who the
11 chair was.

12 [REDACTED]: Here. I'll find it.

13 [REDACTED]: We'll figure that out, if
14 you guys don't mind, yeah.

15 BY [REDACTED]:

16 Q. So let me ask -- and this is DHS --
17 Napolitano? Was she the one who --

18 A. Yeah.

19 [REDACTED]: That's it, yeah.

20 Independent Review of 2024 Attempted Assassination.

21 [REDACTED]: That's the one.

22 Q. All right. They did talk to you. And
23 again, nothing from those are different in context?

24 A. No.

25 Q. You also did a media interview?

1 A. Yes.

2 Q. Can you talk about -- and I'm in no way
3 questioning it, but I'm just curious like how did
4 that come about? What was the purpose of that?

5 Why did you guys agree to do that?

6 A. So, I mean, that was more the boss's
7 decision.

8 Q. Detective [REDACTED]?

9 A. I think his boss, to be honest with you,
10 which would be the DA, [REDACTED].

11 So originally it was like we're not
12 speaking about this to the media, blah, blah, blah.

13 And then after one of the testimonies in
14 Washington, D.C., there was some stuff said that
15 kind of wasn't a hundred percent and it kind of
16 made it look like we didn't do something. So it
17 was asked to be corrected and it wasn't.

18 So that's how the media got involved.

19 Q. To your knowledge, was that the testimony
20 given by Director Rowe, or you're not sure?

21 A. It wasn't. It was testimony given by the
22 colonel from the state police. And it wasn't
23 anything on his -- like him throwing anybody under
24 the bus. I think it was just a question that was
25 asked about leaving post and some other things.

1 He basically said that both of us had
2 left their post and the building was left
3 unoccupied, and then a question was asked by -- was
4 it Bishop, the senator?

5 Q. Senator Bishop?

6 A. I don't know. One of the senators asked a
7 question that if the two snipers had stayed in
8 their position, would they have had a shot at
9 Crooks, and he said he doesn't know. So that left
10 some, you know, holes in it for whatever.

11 So our office had reached out to the
12 state police and asked them to clarify, and they
13 said, "No. We're sticking with the testimony."

14 So Butler had done some interviews,
15 basically, because they had some of the same
16 concerns and then left immediately.

17 Q. So fair to say basically --

18 A. I wouldn't have done it.

19 Q. Understandable.

20 A. I mean, I got requests from everybody but
21 Al Jazeera.

22 Q. Well, if they do make a request, let us
23 know, please.

24 And that testimony was like July still,
25 like pretty in the near aftermath?

1 A. Yeah. I think that was the first one, one
2 of the first ones.

3 Q. So let me clarify then. Your perception is
4 you guys are initially. Then you hear a bunch of
5 stuff that you know not to be true. And at a
6 certain point, the DA's like, "All right. We're
7 going to do something to make the record clear
8 because we were there. We know what happened"?

9 A. Yes.

10 Q. Big points of clarity are you guys didn't
11 abandon your post?

12 A. Yes.

13 Q. Based on your assignment, you had no view
14 over the rooftop?

15 A. Yes.

16 Q. Any other major points that you guys are
17 like, hey, this is something we need to get in
18 front of the public, in front of the media, in
19 front of the investigators now?

20 A. I don't think from our perspective, no.

21 Q. Do you have any other reflections -- and
22 this is just you personally or just if you have any
23 other thoughts -- any other reflections on the way
24 this has been covered by politicians or the media
25 in a way that you think is inaccurate at this point

1 and given what we've talked about, beyond what
2 we've talked about?

3 A. I mean, just -- I don't want to say -- I
4 don't know. Some of the speculation, but it's, you
5 know, rumor mill and conspiracy theory stuff that,
6 you know, I just -- it's politics.

7 I don't even know how to answer that.

8 Q. Yeah. A different line of work, huh?

9 A. Yeah.

10 Q. And from your perspective, nothing that
11 happened that day in terms of, you know, from your
12 vision, there was a single shooter, he takes a
13 shot, the counter-sniper on the CERT team responds.

14 Nothing to disprove or give you any
15 reason to doubt that narrative?

16 A. No.

17 Q. On that note with the counter-snipers, did
18 you have any communications with any of the
19 counter-snipers on Secret Service?

20 A. No.

21 Q. No communications with Special Agent

22 [REDACTED] ?

23 A. I don't even know who that is.

24 Q. Fair enough.

25 A. No communication with Secret Service

1 whatsoever.

2 Q. Did you have any view of Secret Service
3 from where you were in the AGR complex?

4 A. I could see them on the buildings.

5 Q. The counter-snipers?

6 A. Yes.

7 Q. From when you were up there, which I know
8 was a good deal before the shot was taken
9 relatively, did you view them looking at your
10 building?

11 A. Not really. I mean, I knew where they
12 were. It wasn't like I was watching them. So I
13 don't know what they were looking at.

14 I just knew -- because we had got a text
15 earlier on that said that they were onsite making
16 their way, and then once they were onsite, it was
17 kind of like okay, where are they at and then --

18 Q. You saw them?

19 A. I saw them, and then that was it. I knew
20 where they were, but I wasn't, like, monitoring
21 them.

22 Q. Which is important because, as a sniper or
23 even a counter-sniper, either way you want to know
24 where other people with guns are; is that right?

25 A. Yeah. Earlier in the day I had an idea

1 because they had told us that they were going to be
2 on those two barns, but originally I think we were
3 told they were going to be there at 10 or something
4 and didn't show up until, like, 2.

5 Q. To me, I'm thinking, as a sniper, I'm alert
6 for people with weapons. So I want to know where
7 all the good guys are with guns so that I don't
8 worry about it.

9 That's pretty critical?

10 A. Yeah. And like I said, I knew where they
11 were going to be prior to them getting there.

12 And then once we were told that they
13 were onsite, then, you know -- like I said, it
14 wasn't like I was looking for them, monitoring
15 them, but I knew they were there.

16 Q. Sure.

17 A. Because I had a view of both of them
18 buildings.

19 Q. Okay. That's helpful.

20 Last question -- last two questions.
21 You can't trust lawyers.

22 So anything you would have done
23 differently personally? I know hindsight is 20/20.
24 So other than, like, exiting the building a
25 different way, anything you look back on and you're

1 like hey, I wish our team, our Beaver team, or you
2 and [REDACTED], had done something differently than you
3 were able to do?

4 A. I never really thought about it that way
5 because if you think about stuff that way --

6 Q. Sure.

7 A. -- you're just beating yourself up. But I
8 mean, what happened happened, and what I did was
9 what I thought was right at the time.

10 Q. Yeah.

11 A. I mean, as far as everything else, I didn't
12 have any involvement in that, so I can't -- like
13 the planning, the prep, and stuff like that, like I
14 don't know what they did or didn't do. So I can't
15 really --

16 Q. Yeah. My apologies. Go ahead.

17 A. I can't really sum that up.

18 Q. Yeah. That's fair. But let me ask you
19 maybe an easier question.

20 One of the things, you know, at an event
21 like this moving forward, what are some of the
22 things that you wish they would have given you or
23 that would be necessary for you in a similar role
24 to be told in advance?

25 Like what are the top couple of things?

1 A. I mean, I don't want to say site
2 assessment, but site awareness is big for me
3 because like I said earlier, if this was a project
4 that we were running here in Beaver County and I
5 was having other sniper teams come in, I would have
6 brought them in a day or two before and not just
7 for -- you know, like brought you in and said,
8 "Okay. Here. In this building here. Have at it."

9 I would have brought you in and showed
10 you the whole site. Do you know what I mean?

11 And I don't know if something like that
12 wasn't done because of a last-minute thing, but,
13 you know, originally they didn't need snipers and
14 then they wanted snipers.

15 So I don't know if maybe that's why it
16 wasn't done. I can't answer that. But I mean, a
17 site visit to me is big.

18 Q. All right.

19 BY [REDACTED]:

20 Q. One quick thing.

21 Going back to the earlier mention of
22 usually you would have some other patrol or some
23 other unit behind you kind of watching your backs
24 as you were looking outwards, is that something
25 typically that would be given to you in advance or

1 someone would say, "Patrol X is behind you"? Or is
2 it more just an assumption that you know that
3 someone should be covering your back in the
4 planning process?

5 A. So I mean, the way we do things, somebody
6 would be there. So that's why I said I think I
7 assumed that somebody would be there.

8 Q. Gotcha.

9 A. And you know what they say about
10 assumptions.

11 Yeah. So, you know, when we do
12 something, we would have somebody watching that
13 building.

14 Q. Okay. So it wasn't -- it was just more
15 based off of your typical MO?

16 A. Yes.

17 Q. You assumed it. It wasn't something that
18 you would think to question, I guess, at that
19 point?

20 A. Exactly.

21 Q. Okay.

22 A. That's probably why I didn't ask that
23 question because I just assumed that it was done.

24 Q. Sure.

25 A. Because, you know, like we've done stuff

1 like this. We would've had -- prior to, we all
2 would've went into the building. I mean, the
3 outside of the building would have been checked.

4 Q. And then also an unrelated question:

5 From your vantage point with how the
6 combine essentially blocked your portion of the
7 stage, like you wouldn't be able to have a line of
8 sight there. You could still see the two barns
9 behind and the Secret Service sniper locations?

10 Is that accurate?

11 A. Yes.

12 Q. And I guess from where --

13 A. The combine's big, but the barns were twice
14 the size.

15 Q. Gotcha. And from where they were posted on
16 the rooftops, like, I guess, you guys were more in
17 a recessed -- you were back away from the window,
18 essentially covert.

19 The counter-snipers on top, were they, I
20 guess, more open?

21 A. Yes.

22 Q. Okay. So I guess did you find that odd
23 where you were?

24 A. No.

25 Q. Really?

1 Is there a particular reason why, you
2 know, they would have seemed a bit more exposed on
3 top than you guys were kind of back?

4 A. I mean, if you're going to put somebody on
5 a roof, you can't hide them, for one.

6 Q. Okay.

7 A. And, you know, events, I mean in my thought
8 on it and my interpretation and my experience, at a
9 large-scale event like this, typically you don't
10 want all your hands shown, but you do like to show
11 a presence.

12 So, you know, if you put counter-
13 snipers behind the stage, people are like, "Well,
14 shit. There they are." But not knowing you had
15 ten other teams out.

16 Q. Gotcha, okay. Great.

17 [REDACTED] Do you have any more?

18 [REDACTED]: No. That's it.

19 BY [REDACTED]:

20 Q. So then to not be on the roof for that
21 purpose, not unusual or preferred? Do you know
22 what I mean?

23 Like in terms of additional deterrent
24 presence, do you think it would have been helpful
25 to have someone on the roof?

1 A. Yeah.

2 Q. And, certainly, it would have helped your
3 visibility?

4 A. It helps visibility, and, you know, if you
5 can't cover the building, then get on top of it.

6 Q. And then the other question: So you're
7 basically in the AGR building and you're like,
8 "Hey, formal practice and procedure, Butler ESU has
9 already kind of cleared the space" -- right? --
10 "and there's someone outside watching my back."

11 And when you see all those people
12 milling about, you're assuming that some law
13 enforcement agency is at least cognizant of this?

14 A. Yeah. I mean, like I said, there was three
15 or four cars in this no man's land that were
16 parked.

17 Q. All right.

18 [REDACTED]: Do you have anything else?

19 [REDACTED]: No no.

20 Q. From our end, I think that's it, and, you
21 know, again, just for the record, we really do
22 appreciate it, and I'm sure this has been tough.
23 But we appreciate you being here.

24 BY [REDACTED]:

25 Q. You were answering a question about the

1 different conversations you had. I think I missed
2 a part.

3 Did you say you had a scheduled talk
4 with Secret Service but that was canceled?

5 A. Not us, no. No. Oh. Okay. My bad.

6 So the Secret Service there -- I don't
7 know what they call them -- their internal affairs
8 or whatever, their professionalism -- they had
9 reached out to us about interviews, and originally
10 we were going to the Federal Building in
11 Pittsburgh, and then they wanted to talk to
12 everybody. And then they said no, not me,
13 because -- I don't know why. They said, "We'll
14 talk to him at a later date." And then they had
15 then canceled all of them. They were supposed to
16 have one last week.

17 Q. Okay. So there ended up being no
18 conversations?

19 A. No conversations.

20 Q. Thank you, sir.

21 BY [REDACTED]:

22 Q. The Minority has covered most of what I was
23 going to ask in terms of concluding questions.
24 Just a couple of things.

25 One is do you have any knowledge of

1 whether or not the Secret Service had a clear idea
2 of where you were located?

3 A. Do I have direct knowledge? No, I have no
4 idea.

5 Q. Okay. And that wasn't part of the OPS plan
6 at the time to tell you the Secret Service knows
7 you're here and they know what you're --

8 A. Yeah, I have no idea.

9 Q. Was there any concern that you had?

10 You mentioned, you know, the counter-
11 snipers, of course, are looking for people with
12 guns; right? They're on the stage. You're there
13 with a gun.

14 Did you make an assumption that they
15 knew you were there and they weren't going to shoot
16 at you?

17 A. I had hoped because there was actually some
18 though of, whenever I was moving around the
19 building, that --

20 (Interruption.)

21 Q. I'm sorry. You were saying the idea of you
22 being in a location which was in the line of sight
23 of the Secret Service snipers, you were saying --

24 A. Yeah. As I was moving around the building
25 a couple of times, you know, I was thinking in my

1 head. I'm like, "Man, I hope I don't get shot."

2 Q. Right. Right.

3 A. But, yeah. That's typically why you don't
4 move once you're assigned somewhere, you know. You
5 don't --

6 Q. Right. Right. Okay.

7 A. Because they're looking for not necessarily
8 a gun, but if they see something moving in a window
9 that they don't know is friendly, it's a target.

10 Q. Right. Okay.

11 And you've covered a lot of the
12 questions I had about what you would have liked to
13 have seen happen that would have made things a
14 little better that day.

15 Let me ask you: After the shooting and
16 after the events occurred, has there been like any
17 kind of after-action type of review done by Beaver
18 County, that you're aware of?

19 A. I mean, other than our -- we did a debrief.
20 I think you guys had it. These pictures are from
21 it.

22 Q. Right.

23 A. So, yeah, that was all we basically did.

24 Q. Okay. To your knowledge, has there been
25 any plan or effort to kind of reconstruct what

occurred by Beaver County, by the people that you work with, to improve anything relating to protecting site visit, events, things like that?

A. I'm not -- other than what we did with that and, you know, just typical talk, not really. I'm not sure, but that would be a question, I think, for Commanders [REDACTED] and [REDACTED].

Q. Understood. What would you say, from what you've seen in the press and the days after that, was, from your perspective, the worst inaccuracy about describing your team's involvement in the events of July 13th?

A. I mean, I would say the question on the view of what we had: "Look to the left." Well, if I looked to the left, I'd be looking at a chair.

Q. Right.

A. You know, from where I was at.

But, yeah, just, I mean, the mis -- I don't want to say misinformation -- the lack of information that was put out.

Q. And what was that specifically?

A. The view from the building.

Q. The view from the building.

A. I mean, that's the biggest thing. You know, you can look at all these pictures and be

1 like how in the world could you not see that
2 person.

3 Q. Right.

4 A. But if you're in that building and you
5 look, you'd be like you can't see three feet down
6 the wall, you know.

7 Q. Right. Right. And also your task was to
8 actually look into the crowd at the stage?

9 A. Yes. But I mean, like even so, all these
10 people were like, "Even if you're looking out the
11 window, all you had to do was look to the left and
12 you'd see him."

13 Q. Right.

14 A. Well, no, you can't.

15 Q. Right.

16 A. Do you know what I mean?

17 Q. Right.

18 A. But nobody really touches on that.

19 Q. Right.

20 A. And explains that.

21 Q. Right.

22 A. And even some of the, you know, politicians
23 with experience. It kind of was upsetting but...

24 Q. Right. Okay. But, of course, you did
25 actually see him, and you took the actions that you

1 talked about.

2 A. Yeah. We seen him on the ground, not on
3 the roof.

4 Q. Right. Not on the roof. But you actually
5 saw Crooks, and you took actions you believe were
6 the right ones --

7 A. Yeah.

8 Q. -- to try to see what he was up to;
9 correct?

10 A. Yes.

11 [REDACTED] Sorry. I just realized I
12 have one more question along those lines.

13 [REDACTED] : Go ahead.

14 BY [REDACTED] :

15 Q. I'm not trying to put you in an
16 uncomfortable spot. I'm just trying to understand.

17 So you and [REDACTED] see Crooks and think
18 this dude's kind of weird, and that's why your
19 focus is on him and that's why you see -- but for
20 that initial focus, you wouldn't have seen the
21 range finder?

22 A. No. Probably not.

23 Q. Because he's right below you; right?

24 A. Yeah. No.

25 Q. Any other reason, other than your

1 involvement, [REDACTED] involvement, that anyone was
2 tracking Mr. Crooks?

3 A. Not that I know of.

4 Q. All right. But for that --

5 (Interruption.)

6 Q. So this is my ultimate question, I guess:
7 But for that initial involvement of you tracking
8 and singling him out, there is nothing that's
9 stopping Crooks from going unobserved onto the
10 roof, getting down, preparing the shot?

11 Obviously, other people outside your
12 perspective may have seen him, as they eventually
13 did, but no one else is tracking him for any other
14 reason other than your and [REDACTED] initial
15 assessment; is that right?

16 A. As far as I know, yeah.

17 [REDACTED]: Sorry. I appreciate it.

18 BY [REDACTED]:

19 Q. I think this is probably my last maybe set
20 of questions.

21 The range finder, you talked about
22 earlier that when you saw that, you're like there's
23 only one purpose to that, which is to measure the
24 range. You saw him tracking along the stage with a
25 range finder.

1 From your perspective, you've already
2 said that was a very significant thing to see and
3 you reported that; right?

4 A. Yes.

5 Q. Would you have expected more of a faster
6 response from command when you tell them there's a
7 range finder, a person using a range finder?

8 A. Yes. I mean, I think some of the issue was
9 manpower.

10 Q. Right.

11 A. Because it's my understanding that the two
12 initial officers that showed up were actually guys
13 that were posted on a traffic detail away from the
14 event.

15 Q. Right.

16 A. So I mean that just shows you the lack of
17 manpower. So, you know, that's probably the
18 biggest issue.

19 Q. Right. Did you have a sense, before the
20 event started or during the event, that law
21 enforcement, at large, was stretched thin?

22 A. Yeah. I mean, we always are, especially
23 now.

24 Q. Right.

25 A. It's hard to, you know, find people to work

1 events. But I mean, I assumed there would be a ton
2 of people there for this.

3 Q. Right.

4 A. You know, it being a presidential visit.

5 Q. Were you concerned, when you arrived at the
6 event or when you saw the number of people coming
7 in, that based on your -- and I know it was limited
8 knowledge of how many people were there -- were you
9 concerned about are we going to be able to cover
10 this number of people, this size of event?

11 A. I don't want to say I was -- I never
12 thought, "Oh, no."

13 Q. Okay. I don't want to retread old ground
14 because you've already been clear on that.

15 [REDACTED]: Anything else from the
16 Minority?

17 [REDACTED]: No, sir. I appreciate it.

18 BY [REDACTED]:

19 Q. I want to thank you very much, [REDACTED],
20 for coming in and spending, you know, three and a
21 half hours with us. We appreciate it very much.

22 A. Sure.

23 Q. And as my Minority colleagues mentioned, we
24 know this is not easy, certainly, to relive those
25 events, and we really appreciate your candor and

your honesty, and hopefully we will not be
bothering you again for an interview.

So we really thank you very much. On
behalf of the Task Force and the members on both
sides, we really appreciate it. Thank you.

A. Sure. Thank you.

[REDACTED]: We can go off the record.

(Interviewee excused.)


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
