We're on the record. 1 Today 2 is Wednesday, September 11, 2024. This is the transcribed interview of Beaver ESU member, 3 House Resolution 1367 directed this Task 4 Force to investigate the facts and circumstances of 5 the attempted assassination of Donald J. Trump on 6 7 July 13, 2024 in Butler, Pennsylvania. 8 Pursuant to House Resolution 1367, 9 Chairman Kelly and Ranking Member Crow, have 10 requested this interview as part of the Task Force 11 investigation. 12 BY Can the witness please state their name and 13 spell their last name for the record. 14 15 Α. 16 Thank you, . My name is Ο. 17 I'm a senior counsel with the Majority for the Task Force. I want to thank you for coming in 18 19 today voluntarily for this interview. You're 20 allowed to have an attorney present to advise you. 21 Do you have an attorney present today 22 representing you? 23 I don't need one. 24 : Next, starting with the 25 Majority and then the Minority, can the additional

Staff Members please introduce themselves with 1 2 their name, title, and affiliation. 3 , Senior 4 Professional Staff Member, Task Force Majority. 5 6 Investigative Counsel, Minority. 7 Investigative Counsel, Minority. 8 9 Thank you, all. 10 BY11 , before we begin, I'd just Q. like to go over the ground rules for the interview. 12 13 The way the interview will proceed is as follows: 14 The Majority and Minority Staff will alternate asking you questions, 30 minutes per side per round 15 16 until each side is finished with their questioning. The Majority Staff will begin and proceed for 30 17 minutes, and then the Minority Staff will have 30 18 minutes to ask questions. We will then alternate 19 back and forth in this manner until both sides have 20 21 no more questions. 22 If either side is in the middle of a specific line of questioning, they may choose to 23 24 end a few minutes past 30 minutes to ensure 25 completion of that specific line of questioning,

including any pertinent followups. In this interview, while one member of the Staff for each side may leave the questioning, additional Staff may ask questions.

There's a court reporter taking down everything I say and everything you say to make a written record of the interview. For the record to be clear, please wait until the Staff Member questioning you has finished each question before you begin your answer, and the Staff Member will wait until you finish your response before proceeding to the next question.

Further, to ensure the court reporter can properly record this interview, please speak clearly, concisely, and slowly. Also, the court reporter cannot record nonverbal answers such as nodding or shaking your head, so it's important that you answer each question with an audible verbal answer. Do you understand?

A. Yes, ma'am.

Q. We want you to answer our questions in the most complete and truthful manner possible, so we'll take our time. If you have any questions or do not fully understand the question, please let us know and we will attempt to clarify, add context

to, or rephrase our questions; do you understand?

A. Yes, ma'am.

- Q. If we ask about specific conversations or events in the past and you're unable to recall the exact words or details, you should testify to the substance of those conversations or events to the best of your recollection. If you recall only a part of a conversation or event, you should give us your best recollection of those events or parts of conversations that you do recall; do you understand?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. And although you are here voluntarily and we will not swear you in, you are required pursuant to 18 USC 1001 to answer all questions from Congress truthfully. This also applies to questions posed by Congressional Staff in an interview; do you understand?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. If at any time you knowingly make false statements, you could be subject to criminal prosecution; do you understand?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. Is there any reason you are unable to provide truthful testimony in today's interview?

A. No, ma'am.

- Q. Please note that if you wish to assert a privilege over any statement today, that assertion must apply to the rules of the U.S. House of Representatives. For the Chair to consider assertions of privilege over testimony or statements, witnesses or entities must clearly state the specific privilege being asserted and the reason for the assertion on or before scheduled date of testimony or appearance; do you understand?
- A. I do not. I don't know what an assertion is.
- Q. Okay. An assertion of privilege, but you don't have an attorney here today, so --
 - A. Okay.
- Q. Finally, I'd like to note that the content of what we discuss here today is confidential. We ask that you not speak about what we discuss here today in this interview to any outside individual in order to preserve the integrity of the investigation.

For these same reasons, the marked exhibits used today will be provided to the court reporter so that they may go into the official transcript, and the copies of those exhibits will

1 be returned to us when we wrap up. 2 We plan to take a five-minute break at the end of each 30 minutes of questioning, but if 3 4 you need to take a longer break or a break before 5 that, please let us know and we will be happy to accommodate you. However, to the extent that there 6 7 is a pending question, we would ask that you finish answering the question before we take the break; do 8 you understand? 9 10 Α. Yes. 11 Do you have any other questions before we Q. 12 begin? 13 Α. No. 14 Okay. It is now 1:09 p.m. 15 Majority Staff will now begin its questioning. 16 EXAMINATION 17 BY 18 Q. , how long have you been a part of 19 the Beaver ESU? 20 Approximately 16 years. Α. 21 What is your role with Beaver ESU? 0. 22 Currently, sniper team leader. Α. 23 When you are not a part of the Beaver ESU, 0. 24 is there a secondary law enforcement agency you

work for?

- Yeah. My primary job is I'm a sergeant at 1 Α. 2 Economy Borough Police Department. I have 20 years of service there. 3 4 0. Okay. And with that particular agency, 20 years, to confirm for the record? 5 6 Α. Yes. 7 Thank you. And could you please repeat Ο. 8 your specific title. 9 , Economy Borough Α. Sergeant 10 Police Department. 11 Q. Thank you. We're going to move to advanced 12 planning prior to the rally. When did you first 13 learn that the former president was coming to 14 Butler? The Sunday prior to the 13th, whatever --15 Α. 16 is that the -- I don't have the exact date. I can 17 pull it up on my phone. And I believe you have the text message thread, so it's all there. Sunday the 18 19 7th. 20 Thank you. And how did you first learn of Q. 21 it, sir? 22 Via text message. It came out as
 - A. Via text message. It came out as essentially a warning order. You know, we didn't have anything hard. It just said that they were requesting assistance, Butler was, and they needed

approximately six operators.

- Q. And that warning order came from Butler --
- A. Beaver County Assistant Commander.
- Q. Thank you. Were you involved in any advanced planning for the visit prior to July 13?
 - A. I was not.
- Q. Did you participate in any planning meetings?
 - A. No, ma'am.
- Q. Did you receive any resource requests from the U.S. Secret Service or other law enforcement agencies related to the July 13 rally?
- A. Not from the Secret Service. I guess the only thing that I -- initially on the 7th, they were only asking for operators. I immediately texted and asked him if they needed any snipers. His response was no, not right now. They are only asking for overwatch from the BearCat. It wasn't until Thursday the 11th somewhere around noon, I believe -- I could look at my text thread -- I received a text message that now they are requesting sniper assistance.
- Q. And could you sort of expound upon who operators would include?

Α. Operators are anyone that is not a medic, sniper, or negotiator. So those are the guys that kick the door in and go in and clear the house. When was that request? Could you repeat that for the record? For the snipers or for the --For general --Ο. The 7th was the warning order for the operators, and it wasn't until the 11th when they requested snipers. During that -- I'm just going to tell you everything. During that timeframe when they did not need snipers, they were not getting enough operators. We were going to stand down. So myself

- Q. Thank you, sir. So did you approve those requests, and could you sort of describe in detail?
- A. I mean, there was no approval. The request was sent out.

1 people I could get. When I sent the message out to 2 my team, the only people that were still available were myself for part of the shift and 3 4 Ο. Is there a reason for that in terms of, you had mentioned, "still available"? Did other folks 5 6 drop out, or were they taken off into other 7 assignments? 8 So some of the guys on my team have not been to a basic SWAT, so they cannot do operator 9 10 , myself, and I believe one other guy jobs. 11 are the only ones that could operate as operators. Can I use that double word? 12 Yeah. It makes sense. 13 Ο. Fill the role of operator, yeah. 14 Α. 15 Were you aware of anyone else from Beaver Q. ESU that was on an advanced planning team? 16 17 No, I was not. Α. Prior to July 13, did you do any 18 19 walkthroughs of the campaign rally location? 20 Α. No, ma'am. 21 Did you request to? Ο. 22 Α. No. 23 How did you plan on familiarizing yourself 0. 24 with the location if you hadn't done any

walkthroughs?

A. Well, I knew that we would be having a giant meeting prior to the deployment. That happened at approximately 8:00 a.m. During that time, Butler was going to give us our assignments, which I believe was approved by the Secret Service.

This was an away away game, so for me to be involved in the planning, I don't think was necessary. It wasn't requested. If they would have asked me, I would have went up there. I live really close, so --

- Q. Would it be routine for you to do sort of a walkthrough of a site that you would be working?
- A. No. I've done other presidential details, and I've never been asked to do a site walkthrough. That would have been a commander and the local chief of police wherever that was at.
- Q. Thank you. Were you aware that there would be two Command Posts on July 13?
- A. No. And that was not brought up during the command -- the meeting.
- Q. When did you learn that there were going to be two Command Posts?
 - A. Never did.

Q. Did you know of any Command Posts for that day?

A. I knew that there was going to be a command post because it was on their -- I believe it was on their briefing map, but I didn't -- I didn't know who was going to be in there or anything about that. I knew my specific role and where they were sending me.

- Q. Okay. Did you ask any questions with respect to who would be at the Command Post or what it would be used for?
- A. Command Post, no, but I did ask questions during the briefing.
- Q. Okay. We'll stick with questions. What questions did you ask during the briefing?
- A. So I have to give you the full picture of -- during the briefing, they put out a picture of where everyone was supposed to be, and they really didn't even have us on there. They had to pull up a second one. And they had mentioned -- and I don't know who gave the briefing. It was one of the Butler guys. But this was the first time that the Secret Service snipers were ever going to be deployed for a noncandidate. That resonated with me because I thought there might be a threat.

At the end of the briefing, I raised my hand because nobody asked the question, and I said,

"Hey," you know, "what is the threat" -- and this is the first time in history of the Secret Service snipers coming out -- "What is the threat?"

Their response was, "Well, we asked the same question, but the Secret Service said there's always a threat but nothing in particular." They said at the conclusion of this brief the snipers were going to get their own briefing altogether, and then we were going to do a face-to-face whenever the Secret Service snipers arrived. None of that ever happened.

- Q. Thank you very much for noting that, sir. We're going to circle back to that point. Did any discussion of the AGR Building come up in any planning conversations or briefings?
- A. So during the main briefing, the team

 leader from Butler, , I believe his name is,

 he had mentioned that -- he had showed us where

 Beaver and Butler ESU were going to be, and it was

 at the AGR Building. He mentioned that his -- he

 was not at the walkthrough. He said the assistant

 team leader had done the walkthrough with the

 Secret Service. That is [sic]. And he

 said initially was supposed to be stationed

 with us, but for whatever reason, got

reassigned the night before and he was not going to be with us.

Q. Was there any discussion of any sort of aerial surveillance or anything of that nature, sir?

2.0

- A. Yes. So one thing they asked us to keep an eye on was for drone activity. And if we had seen a drone, we were supposed to call out the location per the map, the approximate size and height of the drone, and that was going to be relayed to the Department of Homeland Security that had some drone -- drone team that were going to disable it. I don't know who they were. I had no contact them, but that's what was brought up in the briefing.
- Q. Other than looking out for drones, was there any discussion of local law enforcement or anyone else that would be conducting any sort of prior or concurrent aerial surveillance during the event?
 - A. No, there was not.
 - Q. Did anyone inquire as to why?
- A. I don't believe so.
- Q. Were you aware of any conversations regarding what the day of communications between the Secret Service and local law enforcement would

look like?

- A. I do, because that was brought up. We asked how we would get ahold of them. Their briefing guy said that the Secret Service was able to patch into our radios and would be listening to us.
- Q. Can you go into detail about what your understanding was in terms of what the Secret Service could hear, what they'd be patching into, what channels?
- A. So what channels we were -- we were on Butler OPS 4, is what we were told to be on. We had no idea there was any other operational channels that anyone else was on. So the radios that we were given were already turned to Butler OPS 4. We did our radio check once we got in position with the -- I'm assuming it was one of their dispatchers. They were doing half an hour to an hour safety checks to make sure that we were good to go. And my call sign that day was 4Sierral.
- Q. Thank you. So based upon what you had just indicated, it is your understanding that the Secret Service was patched in to 4, and that they were able to hear what was going on over that radio

channel?

- A. Because that's what we were told, yes, ma'am.
- Q. Okay. And prior to that, were you aware of any plans for the Secret Service to use or listen in to local law enforcement radios?
- A. No, I was not. We are handed a briefing guide, and their call signs were on our radio dispatch, but there was no contact phone number for any of them or their names.
- Q. Did the Secret Service provide Beaver ESU any advanced planning team with detailed information about what was needed from your agency?
- A. No, they were not. Up until last week, I had not spoke to the Secret Service at all.
- Q. Did you express any concerns about that at any time, sir?
- A. I did not. I thought it was a little bit odd whenever they had our time to be in position in the meeting time face-to-face with the Secret Service. They did not -- they weren't -- they didn't coincide. And being prior Marine, I like to follow the plan and stick to the timetable.

Our SWAT team, our ESU team, is very big on time. So we have a time to do our practice. We

have a time to get dressed. We have a time to be -- so I believe in following a plan until a plan fails. So I was following the plan that was given to me.

- Q. Understood. So fair to say the Secret Service did not provide Beaver ESU with any advanced information?
 - A. Zero, to my knowledge.
- Q. Did the Secret Service have any type of approval process for your agency's OPS plan?
- A. I have no idea. I wasn't involved in the planning.
- Q. Okay. So we're going to move to the day of the rally. And thank you for all of the information so far.
 - A. No problem.

- Q. So can you please start off by briefly discussing a timeline of events for that day. You had indicated there was a briefing that morning, and I think for purposes of efficiency, I'd just like to introduce as Majority Exhibit 1 the Butler ESU Donald J. Trump detail, sir.
- A. Thank you. Does this have our time on target and everything?
 - Q. This may, sir, have a -- yes, about six

pages in there's an execution page, sir, with a timeline of events. Next page I think you'll see the actual hours. There we go.

A. Thank you.

- Q. Okay. So we're going to drill down here a bit further. So do you recognize this slide deck, sir?
- A. I do. I do have something to mention about the briefing.
 - O. Yes.
- A. So in my 16 years in the ESU, it was the worst briefing ever, except maybe the Pennsylvania Attorney General's SWAT team. Theirs is really bad. But, basically, they glossed over every single page of this. The didn't even read their use of force.

The only reason that I read every single page was, as a team leader, I was given a hardcopy. I knew our job was going to be important, so I read every single page, every single slide, every "When this happens, this should happen." But as far as anybody else on the team, I don't know if anybody else read it.

Q. And just to clarify for the record, sir, who is "they"?

Any of the other team leaders. 1 Α. So 2 everybody that was in that briefing -- so that was Washington ESU, Butler ESU, Beaver ESU, and any of 3 4 the supporting elements were in there. Because 5 Butler was just clicking over -- whoever was giving the briefing -- and that is not usual. 6 7 videotape ours. There wasn't even a sign-in sheet. 8 : Do you know who else received a hardcopy besides yourself? 9 10 : I know was to 11 receive one and probably one of the operators. I'm 12 not sure who was in charge that day. Maybe 13 , but I'm not sure. 14 BY 15 And to be clear, when you say it was glossed over, that would be the individual that was 16 delivering the briefing from Butler? 17 18 Α. Yes, ma'am. Yes. 19 Following the briefing, would you say that 20 the general consensus among Beaver ESU or attendees 21 was that this briefing was glossed over? 22 Α. Yes. Did anyone ask for additional detail or 23 24 express concern over how quickly they had gone 25 through the briefing?

A. Only myself.

- Q. Did you express this to the group or privately?
- A. No, I asked -- I was the only one that asked questions or additional direction on why the snipers were there. And then once we left, and I were kind of standing around waiting for this secondary sniper brief with everybody, and it wasn't happening. And I was looking at the timeframe for us to get over there, draw our radios, and get in position. We ultimately made the decision, "All right, we're going to go get our radios. We're going to get in position. Because if we don't do something now, it's never going to happen."
 - Q. Okay. And was anyone from the Secret Service at the briefing?
 - A. No, they were not.
- Q. Okay. So let's circle back to this briefing that the U.S. Secret Service was supposed to be providing face to face and they never did. Can you please walk us through, again, how you learned that this face-to-face briefing was supposed to occur and what time it was supposed to occur?

- A. I don't recall the exact time, but I learned about it during the briefing when I asked the question on "What is the threat? Why are the snipers here?" That's when they brought up that we were going to have a direct face-to-face with the Secret Service snipers.
- Q. And the Secret Service snipers never showed up?
- A. They were not there. I believe they came late. I believe they showed up later, approximately 1:30, if I had my text messages to look.
- Q. And at that juncture, there was no attempt by the Secret Service to have a face-to-face briefing with you?
 - A. Not that I'm aware of.
- Q. Are you aware of any attempts by the Secret Service to conduct that face-to-face briefing with other Beaver ESU members?
 - A. Not that I'm aware of.
- Q. Did anyone explain why the Secret Service failed to deliver that face-to-face briefing?
 - A. No, ma'am.

Q. Sir, if you could please turn to the yellow flag in this deck. So under "Contingencies" here,

we see "Assault on Former President Trump," "Butler 1 2 County ESU Counter Assault Team Responsibility." Sir, did you fall under that group? 3 4 I was not a counter assault. No, I was 5 not. 6 Q. Okay. And if we page back to the blue, 7 this page lists personnel under "Sniper Elements, Beaver ESU." We have you, sir, and 4Sierral; 8 is that accurate? 9 10 Α. Where is that located at? 11 Q. The blue? 12 Α. I don't see my name there anywhere. 13 Q. Next page. 14 Α. Next page. 15 Q. There you go, yeah. Yeah, we were both 4Sierral as far as the 16 Α. 17 Four designation for Butler County, Sierra radio. 18 being sniper, and we were the only team that was 19 there, 1. 20 Q. Okay. So what, if any, role did you have 21 with the counter assault team? 22 Α. Nothing. So in terms of neutralizing threats or 23 24 anything like that, did you have any

25

responsibilities?

A. Yes. Of course, we were not considered counter assault, but -- so it's a weird way. If something would have happened and we would have identified a threat, we would have been responsible for taking out the threat. As snipers, we don't have to ask questions or ask for "Hey, should I do this?" If we see -- if we see something where if we fail to act, someone's going to die, under Pennsylvania law we are authorized to take that shot.

- Q. At what juncture, sir, would a threat have risen to the level of force that you described?
- A. Visible weapon. Pointing it at somebody.

 A vehicle driving at an excessive rate towards -to make entry, we'd have attempted to take out the
 vehicle if we could have.
- Q. And we'll get back to that. Did you have any responsibility as to detainment efforts of suspicious individuals?
- A. No. That is not a role that snipers do or counter snipers in this case that they call us.
- Q. Let's go back to any maps that you were provided of your assignment and other law enforcement posts. So could you please go into sort of any maps that you were given.

1	A. So we were provided with on overhead map of
2	everyone's locations. They had a shaded area with
3	different coordinates, like sectors of
4	responsibility. I don't know if that's in here.
5	If you have any of the yes, that's it right
6	there.
7	: It's in the brief we got
8	from Butler ESU. If you want to use it as an
9	exhibit, I'll be happy to tear and out and give it
10	to you.
11	: Can I see it? I want to
12	make sure that is the same one. That is not the
13	one they provided us.
14	BY :
15	Q. I think I know the one you're talking
16	about.
17	A. So if you have the photo of my sniper
18	position, I have the two maps that were well,
19	one map was provided to me, and printed
20	off an overhead and I put it yeah, that's it
21	right there.
22	: Okay. I'd like to
23	introduce for the record Majority Exhibit 2, the
24	FPOTUS After Action Beaver County ESU/SWAT.
25	

BY :

- Q. Sir, so Page 3 in this deck, "Materials

 Provided by Butler Command" with various sectors

 and colors. Is this the map that you're referring

 to?
 - A. Yes. Very similar, if not the exact one.
- Q. Okay. At any point in time on July 13, was there any information shared with you by the Secret Service regarding communications to the agency if you saw something suspicious or needed to alert them of something?
- A. No, ma'am. I had no communication with the Secret Service at all.
- Q. If you needed to communicate with them, how would you have done so?
- A. According to my briefing, they were Hercules1 and 2.
- Q. So you would have been able to communicate over the radio?
 - A. That was my assumption, yes.
- Q. Did the Secret Service provide you with any information about how to handle suspicious persons?
 - A. No, ma'am.
- Q. During the morning briefing or in any operational plans you were aware of, was there any

information about the AGR Building? 1 2 Α. No. Let's go into your assignment in a bit more 3 Ο. 4 detail. So what was your assignment for that day? 5 Α. They kept calling us counter snipers, but basically our assignment was to cover Section 1 and 6 7 Section 3 in this overhead map. The yellow and the blue, being Section 3 is the blue. 8 Just to be clear, for the 9 10 record, is referring to Page 3 of the 11 materials proceeded by Butler Command map in 12 Majority Exhibit 2. 13 14 Who gave your assignment to you? 0. 15 from Butler. Α. 16 What was his position? 0. Team leader for Butler snipers. 17 Α. Had you worked with him in the past? 18 Ο. 19 He had apparently been in a sniper school 20 that I was hosting, so, yes. 21 What time did you get to your assigned Q. 22 post? I believe we are in position around 10:40, 23 24 I believe. 25 Was that in line with the timeline that you Q.

were given at the briefing?

2.0

- A. We were 20 minutes ahead of our timeline in position.
- Q. What other instructions or instructions in general were you given about your assignment?
- A. So when we arrived, and I took our personal vehicles over to the AGR Building. We were supposed to be met by Butler. Nobody came.

 So we had to swipe card. I seen where a swipe card could go. We assumed we'd walk over and we would let ourselves into the building and unload our gear and proceeded to wait for Butler.

Several minutes later their assistant team leader and Butler Sniper arrived. Took us up and put us on the floor and into the -- showed us three different cubicle office buildings where we could take our positions, the best covered what we were given to in the briefing.

- Q. Did you think that the instructions you were given were sufficient?
- A. No, I do not, because had not even been in the briefing. He had no idea what radio frequency we were supposed to be on or what we were supposed to be looking at, so and I had to

fill him in. Basically, we were kind of left to your own to try to figure out where to cover these gray corners or these shaded areas.

- Q. Is it fair to say that Beaver ESU, due to a lack of specific detail provided by Butler ESU, had to make its own decisions as to responsibilities?
- A. We knew what our responsibility of coverage was. It ended up being tasked out to us to find the best position that we could cover. So what we ended up doing was we built a overlapping field of fire from our positions to the best that we could, and we held those positions.

We did move amongst the different windows whenever we seen something that we thought was suspicious, leaving our main rifle on our tripods -- at least and I did -- and moved along. We had our sidearms, but we had our guns positioned in the area that we were assigned.

- Q. And did you feel confident that, you know, based upon your years and years of experience that you had sufficiently laid out a coverage area?
 - A. Absolutely not. No, I didn't.
 - Q. Can you expand upon that?
- A. So as soon as we got there, and I started discussing that we were in the wrong

positions. That they were calling us counter snipers and they were using us as a traditional sniper. So traditional sniper, hidden, having a view of the crowd, shooting from outside in, we did not have a view inside out.

So then I felt -- kind of felt like we were part of a puzzle that I didn't have the big picture of, and as long as I did my part, the puzzle was complete. Because the state police -- we were watching out, the state police was watching us, and the Secret Service snipers were watching. It all made sense to me at that point.

Q. Would you say that there were silos of assumptions that were going on between local law enforcement, PSP --

A. Yes, because we were told that PSP was going to handle everything crowd outside of a secure area. That's what we were told in the briefing, but there was no state troopers that I knew of that were in the briefing.

- Q. How would you have supplemented the coverage? You stated that you had assumed Secret Service was sort of helping to supplement that coverage or to cover areas that were uncovered. How would you have remedied that?
- A. Well, prior to us arriving, we were told to be prepared for an outside deployment. So we came prepared with all of our gear, extra water, sunscreen. Everything that we could do to maintain. Then we were placed inside that building per their plan. I believe that we were in the exact wrong location.

I would have -- if this was my -- I would have picked that cellphone tower and inside the secure area as one of our positions, and I'd have found an additional area to place somebody else, either at a ground hide with some elevation -- it was relatively flat other than one -- well, where the cellphone tower was, so I think that we probably could have covered the danger area from

the ground or even a vehicle.

Prior to the state troopers pulling in,

I asked , I was like, "Do you want to take your

unmarked and go set up a vehicle hide?" Then the

state police took that area, so that was out.

- Q. You had indicated you assumed that the Secret Service was going to be covering additional territory. Did you seek to confirm that in any way with anyone?
- A. I did not. I kind of kept waiting for the briefing that the Secret Service was going to give us and it never happened.
- Q. Okay. You also indicated you would have, you know, picked the cellphone tower. Did you indicate this to anyone as to, "Hey, guys, I think we need," you know "someone else over there" or -- you know?
- A. I did not, because as soon as _____, he was running late. As soon as a dropped off _____ and showed us where to be, he was gone. And, like I said, I was drafting the text message. Had the state troopers not pulled in at that exact time -- I did not end up sending that message. I deleted it. I was like "Oh, (indicating), "Now it's making sense."

1 Q. So were there any changes in posts made --2 No. Α. -- after you showed up to your assigned 3 Ο. 4 area? 5 Α. No. 6 Are you aware of any other changes in posts Q. 7 by any other Beaver ESU members? Oh, secondhand, yes. So where 8 No, ma'am. they were told the BearCat was going to be 9 10 positioned is not where they ended up. They got 11 backed up outside of -- I believe they were using 12 the BearCat as a show of force per the briefing, 13 but they were -- I don't know who told them to back 14 up and kind of get out of the way. 15 One more question, sir, and then my time is Q. 16 up for this round. Did you ever communicate with the U.S. Secret Service counter snipers on July 13? 17 18 Α. No, ma'am. 19 Did you receive any OPS plans or information from the U.S. Secret Service counter 20 21 snipers? 22 Α. No, ma'am. 23 Thank you. That's my time. 24 Real quick. If you're : 25 close to a breaking point, feel free to continue.

No, we're going to switch 1 to the operational period our next round. 2 All right. Do you need a 3 4 break? 5 No. 6 EXAMINATION 7 BY All right. It's 1339. This is 8 9 with the Minority. So this is a unique 10 thing in that a lot of these questions are going to 11 be just -- would have been the same. I'm not going 12 to ask them again. This is a very collegial 13 bipartisan thing. 14 What I'm going to try to do now, there 15 are a couple things I kind of want to go through, 16 fill in, make sure I'm understanding. 17 Α. Sure. Very much the same thing where if you -- if 18 19 I'm not saying something that's completely clear, 20 because this is for the record, please correct me. And like you just did, if there's anything that you 21 22 think, "Hey, he asked this," "He asked X, but Y is relevant, " "I want to insert that, " or "Some people 23 24 said this on the news about that, " jump in. This

is kind of a give and take. All sound good?

A. Yes.

- Q. Super. All right. So quickly, you're a Conway Borough sergeant?
 - A. No, Economy Borough.
- Q. Economy. Can you spell that for me? I'm sorry.
 - A. E-C-O-N-O-M-Y.
- Q. Okay, yeah. Economy. Not Conway.

 Economy. And my understanding, tell me if I'm wrong, is that's your day job, and then you also have a separate job with the Beaver ESU.
- A. Yes. So I'm employed by Beaver County as a -- this is my second employment, but, yes. Not for training, but for callouts.
- Q. That's something where when you're needed in particular as a sniper, you were needed to do something to support a particular mission that requires it. You're called in. You go do that.
- A. Yes. So basically every municipality in the county has signed an agreement should something happen while we're on duty -- say I'm working in Economy and something happens in one of the other communities, we go directly as a SWAT team. The on-duty guys are the first to go. Once more people come, if we have to leave, we would go back to our

own departments, if that makes sense. It's a quicker response than waiting eight or ten hours for the state police.

- Q. Understood. And then this was even beyond that, because this was a different ESU who then says, "Hey, we need some more people."

 or Deputy calls you in, and they need operator snipers, as you said, and now you're kind of -- would you say detailed over to Butler?
- A. So I'm not going to talk bad about them, but they're not to the level -- Butler is not to the level of our team. We're a Tier 1 team.

 There's things that we can do that they cannot. So we work with them. We assist them on operations.

 Prior -- two weeks prior to that, we were out, they had an active shooter. They called us in and we helped isolate the guy and eliminate him. So it's not unusual for us to work with those guys and Washington County.
 - Q. Tell me what Tier 1 means.
- A. Tier 1 is the top tier, so, basically, we can do just about everything. The only thing we don't have access to is helicopters. We don't have them.
 - Q. So is tier about quality or capability or

- Year and capabilities. Α.
- Okay. Butler, do you know what tier they Ο. 4 are?
 - Α. I believe they're a Tier 3.
 - What lack of capabilities and/or gear do Q. they have?
 - I don't believe they have night vision. have a hundred percent night vision. They purchase their own armor. We are given armor through Domestic Terror -- or Region 13 of Terrorism --Counter Terrorism Force. And I don't believe that they do hostage rescue, and we do.
 - Are they a newer team? 0.
- 15 Α. They are.
 - So in a sense, is it fair to say they're a Ο. newer team so they're building up their capabilities and gear. But in emergency situations where more is required, they call you in?
 - Α. They call us and the state police, yes.
 - If this event had been in Beaver County, 0. it's a possibility you guys could have handled it; is that fair?
 - It's possible, yeah, but we still may have tasked out for roles of snipers. Like we might try

or need to get extra snipers. We never have enough.

- Q. That's just manpower. You need more folks.
- A. Exactly.

- Q. Big event like this, lots of things to cover.
- A. Well, and there's not a lot of snipers. So I believe the state police, they try to have eight for the entire state and they can never have eight. So we have eight assigned to me, and I only have five. But the real guys, by the time you take out someone on vacation, someone injured, there's usually two or three of us.
- Q. Yeah. Who did you consider like -- how to say this -- your boss or your direct report on July 13th? Who would tell you what to do?
- A. Ultimately, it would have been who I would elicit direction from. That day, through our text message chain, was kind of our direct supervisor for any sniper-related questions.
- Q. And I want to also make it clear, so your ESU duties you're doing out here, you've also just come off a shift from your Economy duties; is that right?

- A. Yes. I finished up this morning.
- Q. All right. So you had a busy day. We appreciate that. All right, my colleague very helpfully took us through a lot of these questions, so I'm going to kind of hit you with anything I feel like I need to fill in. For instance, you said you were signed up initially do be an operator; is that right?
 - A. Yes.

- Q. And that's because an operator -- I don't want to say has lesser skills, but just different folks can be an operator, whereas a sniper, you need to be a great shot and have other things; is that fair?
- A. Yeah. It's not that they are less trained or not as good as us. We can do their job. They can't do ours because of the gear.
- Q. Makes sense. I want to also ask about this: Would it be fair to describe the role as you understood it on July 13th to be sort of crowd oversight?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. Is that a typical role?
- A. It is. So I have worked other presidential details, and a lot of it is just watching the crowd

for anything that you deem suspicious or out of nature.

- Q. In that role, they typically have snipers fill in?
 - A. They do.

- Q. Would that role typically require someone to be more in public and visible, or would you want someone a little more inconspicuous?
 - A. I've done it both ways.
- Q. Let me ask you about those prior events. What prior presidential events have you done?
- A. Donald Trump's event when he came, I believe, in 2019. I had done -- I did President Obama's. The night of the election for Biden, I did his first stop in Beaver County. Palin. I can't even think of them all, honestly.
 - O. A bunch.
- A. Yeah.
 - Q. In those events, were you in a similar type of either sniper, counter sniper role?
 - A. So, yes and no. So I've always been in the sniper role, but depending on the Secret Service directors, sometimes they have us with our rifles hidden. We can be up there. They want us using our binos. And unless something bad is happening,

we cannot touch our rifles.

- Q. Did you have direct interaction with the Secret Service in those other ones, for those other events?
- A. Not really. And, honestly, when the Biden came, they let us walk right by with four sniper rifles on our shoulders and put us up on the roof right above Biden and never even IDed us. Didn't talk to us. They just said, "Hey, guys, be careful up there." And I mentioned -- I wasn't a team leader at the time, and I looked at my team leader, and I was like, "Man, this feels really weird."

 Like, why would they just not even ID us.
- Q. You weren't even, like, vetted in that case.
- A. No. No. They were just standing there.

 We just walked with our rifles. We had multi-camo

 on. I guess we looked like SWAT guys and they just

 let us go up.
- Q. In this event, to your awareness, did anyone ever ask for your IDs?
- A. Yes, they did. So I was IDed, but they were not Secret Service. It was Butler sheriffs. For us to get in the law enforcement parking, we had to show our police IDs.

- So that was the morning of the 13th? 1 Q. 2 The morning of the 13th. Α. Prior to the brief? 3 Ο. Prior to the brief. 4 Α. What time did that brief occur again? 5 Q. We had to be there at 8:00. 6 Α. 7 All right. How would you describe level of Ο. organization, the structure, the planning from this 8 How would you compare it to prior 9 event? 10 presidential events? 11 So, initially, I was impressed because, Α. 12 like I said, they had a special parking area. 13 had it vetted. They had security set up. 14 wasn't until the briefing itself, which I thought was less than it should have been. 15 16 You, in fact, said it was, other than maybe 0. one from the AG, the worst you've ever seen. 17 Yeah. No one had their game faces on. 18 19 And that briefing was given by a Butler ESU officer? 20
 - A. Yes.

21

- Q. Do you remember whom it was?
- 23 A. I did not know his name.
- Q. If I showed you a picture, would you potentially recognize him?

A. Potentially.

- Q. I'm showing you a picture of an individual on my computer. Was it this individual here?
- A. Not that I -- no, because he didn't have a hat on.
- Q. Okay; fair enough. I showed a picture of Sergeant --
 - A. Who is that?
- Q. Sgt. Do you remember if he was there or his name?
- A. I believe he was in the Command Post, only because I overheard that, but he was not the one that gave the briefing.
 - Q. Do you know if he was at the briefing?
- A. I don't.
- Q. Let's talk a bit more about that briefing. You said that ESU -- you believe the ESU plan was approved by the Secret Service; is that right?
- A. Yes. Only because I talked to post incident. Mostly it was about why we weren't put on the roof. I talked with him -- I was -- I knew it was going to be difficult for those guys with the media and everything coming down on them. So as one of my roles in the county here, I'm a peer to peer support and I'm a crisis intervention team

- member. So I kind of did an impromptu phone call.

 I was lifting weights one day, and I was like, "I better check on him. I haven't seen him." So I called him, and then he disclosed some information on that phone call.
 - Q. All right. And we'll get back to that phone call, very much.
 - A. Yeah.

- Q. But real quick, the morning of the brief you assumed it was approved by ESU because of --
- A. Every one that I've ever done before, you basically -- the Secret Service tells you what to do and you do it.
- Q. Yeah. That is -- all right, I want to talk about -- and I believe -- is _____? Do you know?
 - A. It might be , yeah. Sorry
- Q. No, you're fine. Different individual. So I'm looking at the Majority Exhibit 1, and I'm looking at "Personnel Sniper Element." Oh, I'm sorry. No, I'm not. But do you know if was supposed to be with you the day of?
- A. We were told he was supposed to be with us that day. He got transferred out.
 - Q. Do you know what his role would have been

had he been there with you?

- A. Well, he was the assistant team leader for Butler ESU snipers, so I'm assuming he would have been directing us or our point of contact should we need something additional or additional resources through Butler.
- Q. Had he been at the walkthrough that you're aware of?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. And he would have been AGR second floor?
- 11 A. Yes.

- Q. Who told you at the briefing that the Secret Service could hear your radio?
 - A. Whoever was giving the briefing that day, I don't know his name. And I believe it was backed up by
 - Q. But they were clear that whatever you say on your radio, Secret Service will hear?
 - A. They said they were patched in.
 - Q. Are you aware, is that the OPS 4 channel, is that something --
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. So OPS 4, Secret Service patched in, you say something -- you're like, "Hey, Secret Service, how you doing," someone at Secret Service should be

able to respond over OPS 4?

- A. That was my belief.
- Q. I want to talk briefly about the switch from operator to sniper -- or sniper/crowd overwatch. Is it your sense that was because -- well, tell me why there was that original switch between the operator to then being a sniper. Like why was there that role change?
- A. Why? Because when I asked if they needed snipers, they did not need snipers at that point. That was that Sunday, and it wasn't till that Thursday afternoon or early evening that they had requested snipers coverage. And I don't know if that came at the direction of Secret Service, or if that was just something Butler realized they could not provide on their own. So that, I don't know.

So when they were not being able to staff -- fully staff the BearCat or armor unit with operators, and we were going to be put on standby by or commander, _______, I was like, "Well, I can chip in and be an operator and help fill this position so we don't" -- because I thought being on standby, should something happen, was not going to be helpful.

Q. The role that you had as crowd oversight,

do you have any notion of whether Secret Service knew that's what you guys were doing or had that role in mind? Α. I have no idea. I can't testify to that. Q. Fair enough. But, again, your presumption based upon your past experience and the process is that Secret Service would have had an input in that? Α. Yes. I'm looking now also -- and sorry to jump Ο. around a little bit, but I'm looking at these text messages with the sniper groups. Is that -- are you familiar with what I'm talking about? Yes, I am. Α.

- Q. You were -- I'm looking at one that has been provided in the production. It's image -- img_0533. I just want to be clear, you're the one who provided these text messages?
 - A. I was.
 - Q. You're in the green?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. We'll get to the content later. I just want to make sure I'm oriented to you're the one who did those. There's someone named . Is that

1 Α. Yes. 2 And then there's also a Do you know who that is? 3 4 Α. 5 Q. , yeah. I believe he's one of the Butler snipers. 6 7 One of the younger guys. Do you know where he was on that day? 8 Q. 9 Α. No. 10 Did he ever have any input that you recall Ο. 11 offhand from that? 12 Α. No. 13 I want to move on from planning to your 14 initial perceptions of the AGR Complex. When you saw that that's where you would be and had been 15 16 taken to the second floor inside, what were -- did 17 you have any general concerns or general thoughts? I know you addressed it a little bit, but what were 18 19 they about that location for your role? 2.0 Α. So general concerns was that we were listed as counter snipers, and they were using us as a 21 22 traditional sniper role. Is that just a nomenclature thing, or were 23

A. Having time to think about it, I guess they didn't really understand how we would operate, maybe, whoever designed that plan.

- Q. And that plan was the Butler ESU plan?
- A. The plan that was -- yes.
- Q. Yeah, okay.

A. So maybe they didn't understand how or what we were supposed to be looking for. Initially, when we went up there, I thought that the only position that could have been a counter sniper position was the window in the hallway that I ended up putting my rifle in, because I had a good coverage of the crowd. I had 400 and some yards out to the parking lot. I had a 300-yard shot to where everyone came in the main gate, the magnetometers.

Everyone walked towards me and then they turned at approximately a hundred yards. And then I had the fence line to the L, so I watched a bunch of people on the edge of the fence line, because it was just a chain link fence.

So you had a double fence at some of it.

At the one corner where the vendor area is, it's

just a chain link fence to keep people out, and

they were allowing people to go right to the chain

link fence, and anything could have been passed 1 2 through that fence, under it or over it. I'm going to show you --3 4 this may help. This will be Minority Exhibit 5 Alpha, is that how we're doing it? 6 BY 7 I'm going to give you a pen. Can you just 0. mark what your position was? 8 9 Α. My position? 10 So I'm asking the witness : 11 to mark with an "X" his position that he initially 12 set up at, which is on the western side of that 13 second building in the AGR. 14 Can I put my proximately -- can I put a --Α. 15 Absolutely. Q. In front of what I could see? 16 Α. 17 Yes. Ο. (Marking document.) 18 Α. 19 When you were talking earlier about the 0. 20 cellphone tower -- thank you. When you were 21 talking earlier about the cellphone tower, is that 22 -- do you want to circle those on Exhibit A? 23 (Marking document.) 24 And what would you think -- would folks --Q. 25 would there be someone on that base or would they

1 be all the way up? Where would you think someone 2 should be? Somewhere on top of that hard building here 3 4 (indicating). 5 Q. Yeah. Maybe even both of us, so we could have a 6 7 different -- one of us could be looking each way. And you were initially thinking to do that, 8 but then at some point the PSP guys came up and you 9 10 abandoned the plan to text that thought to 11 Α. Correct. 12 0. What time did the PSP folks roll up? 13 Had to be right before 11:00. Α. 14 When you are deployed as a sniper or Ο. 15 counter sniper, are you responsible for the 16 security in the immediate vicinity of where you 17 are? 18 Α. Only your own security. 19 So that you weren't in any way responsible 20 for securing the AGR complex. 21 Α. No. 22 You weren't responsible for patrolling around it? 23

- A. I believe it was already secured because they said it was blocked off, and we were going to be alone over there, so I assumed it was already done prior to us entering that building.
 - O. Who said it was blocked off?
 - Α.
- Q. At that point you're thinking, "Okay, there shouldn't be a lot of people here, and I don't have to kind of watch my back."
 - A. Correct.
- Q. And that's important as a sniper because you are looking far away from you, generally; is that fair?
 - A. Fair, yes.
- Q. Did you ever see or hear any talk about opaque fencing along that line, along the fence line?
 - A. Could you repeat that question?
- Q. Sure. Did you ever hear anyone talk about putting up some sort of opaque covering to prevent a view?
 - A. No.
- Q. Because at some point there were people -- citizens started coming in. I know we're moving a

little ahead, but people started milling about around there; right?

A. Yes.

- Q. What was your view and how did you react to seeing all those folks around?
- A. So the first person showed up shortly after we got in, so a little bit after 11:00. It was one individual, and I think that was a key -- it was a key failure on my part.

So that was the first person that walked across that field, and he was highly intoxicated.

He was all dressed in black. Bald gentleman,
carrying a bottle of liquor. He walked directly
into the fence like he couldn't even see it. Then
he slowly followed the fence up towards the main
gate, and I think that would have probably been a
good time, looking back now, to test the
communications.

- Q. Do you mind marking with a -- let's say a filled in circle approximately where that individual came in?
- A. So he came straight down here -- can I put an arrow?
 - Q. Yeah, an arrow's great.
 - A. He came from this way, and he walked into

the fence line approximately here (marking document). And then he went up that way.

- Q. Did that individual have a bicycle, by chance?
 - A. I did not see one.

- Q. Okay. So you really didn't give any concern to the -- who was responsible for securing around AGR, patrolling it to make sure people didn't walk up to that fence line, because said they had it blocked off?
- A. Yes. And other than the state troopers, I did not see any patrol units the rest of the day.
- Q. Let's talk about the rooftop quickly. You said you were ready to go to the roof; is that right?
- A. So we were told to be prepared for deployment outside, so, yeah, I was preferred for whatever we needed. This is Western Pennsylvania. It can be cold and rainy -- just like anywhere, you have to be prepared for the elements, you know.
- Q. Would you have had any issue going up on the roof?
- A. No, I would not have had an issue. I think with our manpower, we would have just had to rotate in and out. I think that if we would have been on

the roof like the Secret Service for the short period of time they were there, that was sustainable. But to be on there from 11:00 until, you know, 5:00 or 6:00 in the afternoon probably was not sustainable for a sniper because once you're up there, you got eye fatigue, you got everything else that starts building up. It's not just being there. You have to be vigilant. Like, having a body there is nothing.

- Q. Right. You wouldn't be able to do your job the optimal way you need to be able to do your job.
- A. Yes. So we would have figured something out. We might have only had one guy on the roof at a time, 20 minutes, 30 minutes max, rotating in and out. That's what I would have done.
- Q. I want to get back to that last thing you just said. I mean, you would have had no problem doing that.
 - A. No.

- Q. You just said, "That was what I would have done." Is that something where when you got there, you would have been on the roof? If so, why? Why was the roof the optimal point for you guys?
- A. It was a high vantage point that, you know, looking at where we were at with the windows, the

windows did not open up like a general window, so you had that break in the middle. So you kind of had to work your rifle around that should you have to take a shot. So the windows that we had to use were not optimal, and, clearly, the rooftop would have been a better location for us.

- Q. How strongly did you feel that way when you arrived? I know that's a difficult question to maybe say, but like was that something you were like, "Oh, man, we got to do this, "," or was it just kind of like, "I should have been up there"?
- A. Well, I mean, I think even that location as a counter sniper probably would not have been the best. I still -- I'm going to stand by that the cellphone towers would probably have been our best location. I don't think the water tower would have been a good location, personally.
 - Q. Sure. Why is that?

- A. It's a very difficult steep angle for someone to shoot. Not that we couldn't do it, but if I had to shoot from that location at that angle into a crowd and not hurt anybody else, I don't know. I know I could do it. I know probably could. I don't know about the other guys.
 - Q. So visibility good. Angle for shot, not

ideal. 1 2 Α. Not ideal. A couple quick hitters then. Let's talk 3 Ο. 4 drones. Did you ever see a drone that day? I did not. 5 Α. 6 What would you have done had you seen a 0. 7 drone? I would have called it in. 8 Α. 9 Q. Why? 10 Because that's what you're told to do. Α. 11 Sure. Is that a concern you guys had, that Q. 12 anyone can be having visibility on you? 13 Α. No. 14 Well, what's the concern with the drone, 0. 15 then? 16 Well, I think -- now, I mean, with being Α. 17 able to arm the drones and drop bombs from them, it's a little bit different than even two years 18 19 ago. 20 Q. Sure. 21 Before it was more about security, like we 22 don't want drones flying around us. Now it's --23 they can hurt you.

questioning. Why did you guys communicate via cellphone as opposed to OPS 4? What's the reason behind that?

- A. Well, there were so many people on the OPS 4, we generally do not like to tie up the radio channel with gibberish or things that may be not all that essential.
- Q. OPS 4, did it also include counter assault?
 - A. Yes, it did.
- Q. Okay. So there was a broad spectrum beyond the snipers on OPS 4.
 - A. Correct.

- Q. Okay. Please go on.
 - A. So we had that up as a backup, and it's always best to have a secondary communication. You never know. Like, radios can go out. You lose a battery. You've got to have an extra battery. Yeah, things can happen.
 - Q. How was the cellphone coverage that day?
 - A. Mine was perfect. I have FirstNet, and I never lost anything.
- Q. That was my next question. You do have FirstNet. So when you sent stuff, got stuff, it came in pretty quick?

- A. A hundred percent. I didn't even know there was a problem with other people's.
- Q. Why doesn't everyone have FirstNet? Why don't all -- like why didn't or other folks have FirstNet?
- A. I just recently changed over to it myself, because it was a -- for lack of a better term -- pain in the ass, because you get two different cellphone bills. You get your AT&T bill and you get a FirstNet bill, and that's just an added -- my wife pays all the bills, so that's just an added step. For the savings, it wasn't worth it, but now it's all on one bill together, so --
- Q. Let me ask you this: Do you pay, like personally pay for FirstNet?
- A. We do.

- O. You don't get reimbursed for that?
- A. Unfortunately, no.
 - Q. Okay. But I assume you only have FirstNet for your work purposes.
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. So that's something that if local law enforcement, especially in a federal event, were to reimburse for FirstNet, more folks would get it?
 - A. I think that your department should give

some money back to you, because it is your personal cellphone. I don't think they should pay a hundred percent of my cellphone bill, but that's outside of the scope so -- that's a contract issue.

- Q. But, I mean, you had FirstNet for your job.
- A. Yes.
- Q. It's not something that you get for fun.
- A. No.

- Q. We talked about the text message thread.

 We talked about -- you have Secret Service over the radio.
- A. I'll expand on the text messages. That is something that I do with my own guys. So we have an emergency operation. As soon as they get in position, I have them -- this is -- this is 2024. It's not 1985. We don't have to do a sketch. So I have them take a picture of their location, send it me. That way when they're telling me what they can see, I know what they're actually looking at.
- Q. Okay. I want to show you -- I'm not going to mark this, but it is a page from the Butler ESU OP plan -- or, sorry, postop review plan. Have you seen this document or this picture?
 - A. First time I'm seeing it.
 - Q. Okay. Then we don't need to talk about it.

I want to ask you, though, from your perspective, 1 2 -- his perspective, and 's perspective, was anyone able or was anyone operationally 3 4 supposed to be covering the roof from where Mr. Crooks ended up taking a shot? 5 6 Α. No. 7 Can you just expound on why that is? Ο. From the positions that we were at -- this 8 9 was my position, those guys were on these windows 10 From those positions, there was not coverage 11 on that roof. 12 0. Now, I'm asking you here -- I know you 13 weren't in any way involved with the Secret Service 14 planning on this. But in your mind as a counter sniper with experience in that, would it have been 15 16 important for someone to be able to see on that 17 roof? 18 Α. Yes. 19 Q. Would it be important for someone to be 20 watching that roof? 21 Α. Yes. 22 Especially if that building weren't secure, 23 is that something that would have needed to be done

Q. I want to leap ahead a bit, because I do have a few minutes, and I've kind of reached where I can now move ahead in the timeline. Anything of note -- I know you leave, let's say, approximately 1620; is that right?

- A. Yes, 1619 is when I had my gear on and was walking out, yes, sir.
- Q. And that was a scheduled thing you had to depart by that time?
- A. Yes. So I was up in the air about staying. And whenever we got the notification that Trump was running an hour or more late, I started doing the math in my head, and I wasn't going to be able to make the next event that I had to go to.
- Q. Understood. Anything of note -- and I know there are things that happened after 1619.

 Anything of note happen in the period between when PSP cars driving in that no man's land between the fence and when you leave?
- A. Other than heat-related injuries, no. I just watched a bunch of people drinking alcohol all day, so I spent my time using my binos, glassing their front pockets. Everyone wore cargo pants.

 Two beers in each pocket and then two beers in the back. And they were carrying their -- they were

1 drinking six-packs right there. 2 Is this inside the secure area or near AGR? Q. Near AGR. 3 Α. 4 Ο. How many folks about were around AGR? 5 Α. Throughout the day, probably 300. What was your thought about that many 6 Ο. 7 people being along a fence line that has a transparent view into the secure area? 8 Well, I believe had it not been as hot, it 9 would have -- I don't think the traffic would have 10 11 been as bad, because there was trees there, so 12 people were getting out of the sun. Everyone kind 13 of congregated under the trees. There was, I 14 think, picnic benches, too, in the back corner. 15 Did you have any security-related concerns Q. about that many people being there? 16 17 Α. Not really, because I didn't see anything suspicious, like -- there were some strange things, 18 19 like a bunch of Amish girls came. I thought that 20 was weird. 21 Okay. I want to show you 22 one more exhibit which we'll do as Bravo. And my

apologies for doing this to the reporter and not having this pre-made.

1 : B, sorry. Minority 2 Exhibit B. 3 BY 4 Ο. I want to direct your attention to the 5 middle of this page, a red piece of farming equipment. Is that a combine? 6 7 Yes, it is. Α. Do you recall that being there on the day? 8 0. I do. 9 Α. 10 What impact did it have, if not on your Ο. 11 sight line, on other sight lines? 12 Α. So they had said that that turned up over 13 night and that wasn't supposed to be there, but now 14 it was. Who said that? 15 Q. 16 Whoever was giving the brief from Butler. Α. Got it. 17 0. And that was not supposed to be there and 18 19 the American flag wasn't supposed to be there, 20 either. They said those were not there the days 21 prior and they popped up over night. 22 So from our location, they did -- two of 23 our snipers, it was obscuring their location, their 24 vision on the interior. So as far as a blocking 25 thing, I think it did work for anybody outside, you know.

- Q. My last question before I turn it over to Majority and just kind of stop it for you, but you mentioned things that would cue you to take a shot. You said a visible weapon or something?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. How does that work in an area where this is outside the secure perimeter? People are legally allowed to be there with, I assume -- first of all, did you see a weapon in your time?
- A. This was an unusual one. No, I did not.

 At most events, I do see tons of -- Pennsylvania is an open-carry state, but I did not see anybody with a weapon.
- Q. Got it. And I'm very much not asking you to opine on gun policy or anything along those lines. I'm just curious, from an operational perspective, how do you compromise your duties in assessing threats when seeing someone who, you know, if they're legally carrying, obviously, you cannot just shoot them. At what point -- how do you balance those two things?
- A. I mean, I have years of experience in dealing with people like this. This is -- like I said, Pennsylvania is an open-carry state. People

try to get you to do the wrong thing all the time 1 2 so they can sue you. So based on my experience of a regular daily law enforcement officer, I would 3 4 look for things out of nature. Having it, seeing a rifle, having a rifle slung, is that odd at a Trump 5 even or any event? Yes. People do it. When you 6 7 pick it up and start pointing it, that's a 8 different story. I assume at that point, clearly, you would 9 0. 10 have engaged. 11 Α. Yes. 12 Q. So, basically, you're saying, "I'm able to 13 do that because I have years of experience, and 14 there are things that clue me in to when that becomes an issue." 15

15	Butler. I don't believe the operators had that. I

17	got our own radio. And then we had we could
18	have used our ESU radios, the Beaver County ESU, as

I did after I was gone. 6 Who did you receive the text from? 0. 7 It was in a group Snap -- not Snapchat --Α. 8 group message and came across -- I believe 9 sent it. 10 Do you recall approximately what time you Ο. 11 received that photo? 12 Α. I was just getting in the shower. I don't 13 recall the exact time. I did not have my contacts or glasses on, and we were in a rush to get to 14 15 where we were going, so I didn't look at it until a 16 little bit later. 17 When you say group chat, was that just Beaver ESU group chat? 18 19 It was the sniper chat that 20 was set up by , so it had Washington County 21 guys, Butler County guys, and Beaver County ESU 22 guys. 23 BY 24 What did you do next, sir, after you 25 received the photo of the shooter?

A. I didn't do anything because those guys -it had already happened and that point, and I knew
that they were going to be super busy. My wife
urged me to go back before -- before the shooting
she urged me to go back I guess when the text
message came across about the range finder. And
then she's like, "Oh, go back." And I'm like,
"There is no going back. Like there is miles of
traffic trying to get in there."

- Q. Did you send either via text or e-mail the photo you received to anyone else?
- A. I believe Grassley's office, but I don't think I sent it to anybody else.
- Q. And when did you send those photos to Senator Grassley's office?
- A. Either the next week or week after. I don't -- I could look, if you want me to.
- Q. No, that's okay. Thank you, sir. So we had briefly discussed it was, you know, not within the scope of your responsibilities to seek -- to detain any suspicious individuals. When you received the photo, did you -- you said you did nothing. To your knowledge, were there any attempts by anyone to detain the suspicious individual?

receive any other descriptions of suspicious 1 2 individuals or any communications regarding suspicious individuals? 3 4 Not suspicious, just medical calls. operators where they were positioned, people were 5 coming up to them looking for aid, help. They were 6 7 directing medical response over the radio. So to be clear, sir, just for timeline 8 purposes, you had already departed the campaign 9 10 rally location by the time you received the photo 11 of Mr. Crooks? 12 Α. Yes. 13 And can you specify again what time Ο. Okay. 14 you had departed? I packed up my stuff, and I was walking out 15 Α. 16 around 4:19, and I believe I was on my way home a little bit after 4:26. 17 18 So was it only then that was at 19 your post that was left? 20 Α. and 21 0. . Did you ever see anyone on the 22 roof of the AGR Building during your assignment? 23 Α. No, ma'am. 24 So, normally, sir, in your daily work, if

you needed to share any information with someone

Using direct communications, which I prefer, by phone or radio, 6 7 or sometimes text message. 8 Okay. 9 EXAMINATION 10 BY11 You had mentioned before we started, I Q. 12 believe, that you had spoken with the Secret 13 Service recently; is that correct? 14 They did our debriefing last Friday. Okay. What kind of information was covered 15 0. 16 in that? 17 Basically, everything we're talking about right now. They were interested more in failures 18 19 of their department that we observed. I didn't 20 have much to say because I didn't see them. 21 You also mentioned that post incident 0. 22 you've had a conversation with Butler ESU member 23 24 Α. Yes.

What did that conversation consist of?

- A. Yeah. So I talked to Butler Sniper , and , I believe, from Washington County. I don't know how to say his last name.
 - O. Related to failures?

A. Related to failures? Not really. just was more or less questioning who was all on our text message thread. I was just doing a check-in with to see how he was doing. He had me send him a text message, because I believe he got deleted on his phone. That's all I can think of right now.

 - A. That day, no.
- Q. Did you at any juncture after July 13 have any conversations with

- Q. Did express any regret as to operational failures that day?
- A. No. The only thing he said was -- and it was related to the picture of the window. This was something I didn't mention earlier. You know, when we got there, the maintenance guy had told us that he had opened all the windows that were available to be open. The ones that were not open would have to be broken and replaced should we try to open them. So mentioned that where had provided overwatch coverage after Crooks was shot, they had to kick that window open so they could get

I do. 8 Α. 9 You buy your gear, your optics? Ο. 10 I buy my optics, buy my rifle, buy my Α. 11 pistol, buy all of the stuff that goes on your gear 12 to hold it all. - Q. And this is Minority Exhibit Alpha or A with a circle directly south of a red building in the parking lot to the east of the AGR Complex. Please go on.
- A. So when I open the door, I had seen a vehicle parked next to ours. So it was my personal vehicle, an unmarked vehicle, and then a Jackson Township police car that was 's. There was a vehicle that was parked there, but no one else was supposed to be in there. So I was more -- I was

more focused on the vehicle being there than anything else.

I walked out. I opened my car. Started airing in out. Put my gear in. Started it. Shut the -- turned on the air-conditioning. Got inside. I looked around, and then I noticed a male sitting at the picnic table with his back to us.

- Q. All right. Can you, again, circle the area on Exhibit A where he was?
 - A. Approximately in here (marking document.)

: If you guys want to see this, I'll describe it. It's directly south of the central point of the parking lot to the east of the AGR Complex.

- O. Were you able to see the face of that male?
- A. I was not.
 - Q. From what you were able to see, are you later able to assess who that individual was from what you know now?
 - A. Yeah. I believe that it was Crooks. The only difference is -- and now with that video of him walking through -- the male that I seen had pants on.
 - Q. Okay. So perhaps it's your assessment that

it was not Crooks?

- A. I still believe it was him, but he had pants on.
- Q. Got it. What did you do when you saw that male?
- A. So I didn't really -- like I said, I wasn't focused on the male. I was focused on the vehicle. So I sent a text message, "Hey, guys" -- I believe you have text messages. "Someone followed our lead. They parked" -- "they parked in here with us and they know that we're in that building."

All my gear was contained inside covert bags. It wasn't like I walked out with a rifle and a pistol. I didn't want to get shot by the Secret Service snipers, so I had everything contained. But I was in multi-cam, and I looked like a cop. So I sent that text message out, and I did not get a reply.

Subsequently, I went back in the building and made direct conversation with ______, and relayed that "That guy is out there. You should probably get the guy checked."

- Q. So you sent the text message saying essentially, "Hey, this guy knows where we are"?
 - A. Yes.

You sent that to the sniper thread? 1 Q. 2 Α. Yes. 3 And then you went back into the --Ο. No, I sent it directly to and 4 Α. 5 They were in the AGR Building. They were the only ones that really needed to know about it. At that 6 7 point, it was just suspicious because the vehicle The guy wasn't doing anything. 8 didn't make eye contact. He didn't eyeball me, but 9 10 clearly he heard the double doors (indicating) open 11 up. 12 Q. What time did you send the text message, 13 give or take? 14 Α. 4:26. 15 Okay. What time did you go back in and Q. 16 talk to 17 Α. It had to be right around then, like a minute later, 4:27, 4:28. 18 19 And that -- I mean, to do that, did you go 20 back in through AGR, back up the stairs to where 21 you'd been? 22 Α. Yes. Did you tell , "Hey, check it out. 23 24 This guy's there. Check him out"?

been to two or three national tactical officer sniper courses, urban sniper courses and -- it's now shut down, but it was the National Law Enforcement training facility that was in Wheeling, West Virginia. I went to the sniper school there.

Then I've hosted and I've been a point of contact for several different sniper courses working with the NTOA, making sure we have ranges, everything that they need to teach the new guys.

- Q. And you were active-duty Marines?
- A. Yes, I was.
 - Q. What did you do in the Marines?
- A. Infantry.

- A. So would have been who I would have -- if I had any major questions, I would have asked him. He could have run around -- he knows those guys. He could have run around the chain of command. And I work with him, so I'm comfortable, like.
- I do not know that well. He was at our school that I hosted, but other than that, I was -- I didn't have his phone number in my phone. He's not somebody that I talked to, so -- not that I don't trust him, but like if I had any pertinent questions, I was going to ask . Then any immediate questions like "We need to know something now," probably . That way all the snipers would know.
- Q. Okay; thank you. And on those other presidential events that you've been a part of, you mentioned that there were snipers at those events. You don't recall there ever being counter snipers at any of those events?

- A. As far as Secret Service? I don't know.
- Q. As far as local, state, Secret Service.

 Anyone.
 - A. No, I don't recall them ever being called counter snipers before.
 - O. Okay. And then --
 - A. Can I put something for the record?
- O. Yes.

- A. I have not had any training in counter snipering. Just on the job, figuring it out, what we need to do, so -- we are going to remedy that, though. Our entire team is going to get some type of training whether we have to travel or not.
- Q. You mentioned that when you were first taken out to the AGR Building, you were shown three different cubicles and said, "Figure out the best plan of action"?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. Where were those cubicles, the three different ones, compared to where you guys actually set up?
- A. So I was the only one that was outside of the cubicle area, because I wanted to have -- the windows that were in that cubicle where I would have been positioned were not usable. One was

totally locked.

and I came up with a plan, should we have to shoot through one of the windows that were locked, we were going to use our sidearm to break the glass, and then our sniper rifles to make a distance shot.

If it was something close, we could have probably shot with the sniper rifles, but the closer an object is to the bullet when it comes out of the barrel, the more it diverts the trajectory of it, so -- if that makes sense to you.

- Q. It does.
- A. Okay.
- Q. Thank you. Final question for me, you mentioned that there should be things that cue you in to taking a shot, and that Pennsylvania's an open-carry state and that there's a lot of factors that go into that decision. Where does a range finder fall into that analysis for you?
- A. I mean, I believe it would be highly suspicious, but it's not something that you're going to take action and shoot.
- Q. Absolutely, but when it's highly suspicious, what are next steps with that?
 - A. Next steps is get patrol out there and

scoop that guy up and talk to him. Why does he 1 2 have it. See what else he has. Whatever you can do legally. Pat him down, you know. 3 4 Ο. Absolutely. And then by get patrol there, 5 do you mean state, PSP, sheriffs? It was my understanding it was going to be 6 7 In Pennsylvania, sheriffs cannot question or We're not like the south. So it probably 8 would not have been a sheriff. If a sheriff would 9 10 have got there, they can hold them. And then if he 11 needed to get some additional information, we could 12 have gotten a regular police officer there to do 13 the investigation. 14 Thank you. 15 You're welcome. 16 EXAMINATION 17 BY A couple more quick ones. A. Well, I think that the secure perimeter was much too small. The only one that I've ever seen smaller was Biden when he came the night before the election before he was president, but his was contained in shipping containers, and he had buses surrounding him. So even though it was a smaller secure perimeter, it would have been difficult to get to him.

But I think all those buildings and as open as that was, they needed a much larger perimeter. I think that they definitely lacked

patrol resources. Because I did not -- like I said, looking inside from outside, I did not see patrol at all, even walking amongst the crowd. Patrol is 101 security, you know. At the front gate, walking amongst people, if you don't have patrol, you have chaos.

- Q. When you say lack of patrol, are you talking about within the perimeter or outside by AGR?
 - A. Both.

: All right. Well, we also very much appreciate your being here and the grace and difficulty that you have handled it. So thank you so much.

would like to add is immediately following the shooting, shortly after -- you know, I mentioned a comment to ______, I said, "Two things, if the Secret Service or someone doesn't talk to me tonight, this is going to be a travesty of law enforcement." And I was like, "And, secondly, they're going to blame this on communication."

The Secret Service asked me why I said that, and I'm like, "Ever since 9/11, any time something bad happens" -- and this is going to be a

lack for a better term -- the easiest cover-all or coverup is going to be communication, although it is exactly what needed to happen. I was in D.C. a few weeks ago. I did an interview that was by phone, and it happened to have -- they were having a conference, Emergency Law Enforcement Technology. I happened to sit down with a bunch of guys from MIT. And I told them, "You guys need to figure these radios out. There is no reason that we should not have communication in 2024."

BY :

- Q. Can I ask a question? When you say blame it on communications, like the technological capabilities, the usage of it, both?
- A. The technology, there's no reason that we should not be able to talk everybody else. But outside of this Trump event -- you know, I was at a shooting the other night on my normal job. I crossed the county line, and I had zero communication with anybody. I happened to be the senior police officer there.

It was my first day working there, and all these guys were 25 and younger, and I had to direct them how to do it. I had no idea who they were. I had no radio communication. That's

dangerous for everybody, not just for police, but, like, the people that were trying to help. If you can't call anybody, if you can't talk to somebody, then you're kind of screwed.

- Q. So you think -- and maybe I misunderstood this in that conversation with _____. You're saying you blame it on technology. You think that's a fair assessment that technology's player.
- A. I believe it's a fair assessment. We've had 23 years since 9/11. Look at us now, we're still treading water. I will say communications in my county has gotten worse. We were in the middle -- we were already supposed to convert over to this digital communication.

I was injured last year, so I was off for approximately a year. I came back and got issued a new radio. The very first night we had to chase somebody, they couldn't hear us on our portables. I had to keep running back to my patrol car so they could hear us. It's getting worse. I don't understand it. Thanks. That's my ranting.

- Q. No, that's what we're here for. Anything else you want to add?
 - A. No.
