: So we are now on the record. Today is September 6, 2024, and this is a transcribed interview of Butler Township police officer

House Resolution 1367 directed this Task Force to investigate the facts and circumstances of the attempted assassination of Donald J. Trump on July 13, 2024 in Butler, Pennsylvania.

Pursuant to House Resolution 1367,
Chairman Kelly and Ranking Member Crow have
requested this interview as part of the Task
Force's investigation.

- Q. Can the witness please state their name and spell their last name for the record.
  - A. Last name .
  - Q. Thank you,

My name is \_\_\_\_\_\_, and I'm a senior counsel with the Task Force. I want to thank you for coming in today for this interview. The Task Force recognizes and appreciates that you are here voluntarily.

You're allowed to have an attorney present to advise you during this interview. We see that you have an attorney representing you in a

1 personal capacity here today. 2 Will counsel please identify themselves for the record. 3 4 5 6 So next, starting with the 7 Majority and then Minority, can the additional staff members please introduce themselves with 8 their name, title and affiliation. 9 , Senior 10 11 Professional Staff Member, Task Force Majority. 12 13 Investigative Counsel, Task Force Minority. 14 , Legislative 15 Attorney with the Congressional Research Service, 16 but I'm supporting the Task Force. 17 Minority Staff Director. 18 19 Thank you, all. 20 ΒY 21 , before we begin, I would like Q. 22 to go over the ground rules for this interview. The way the interview will proceed is as 23 24 The Majority and Minority staff will follows: 25 alternate asking you questions, 30 minutes per side per round, until each side is finished with its questioning.

The Majority staff will begin and proceed for 30 minutes, and then the Minority staff will have 30 minutes to ask questions. We will then alternate back and forth in this manner until both sides have no questions.

If either side is in the middle of a specific line of questioning, they may choose to end a few minutes past each half an hour to assure completion of that specific line of questioning, including any pertinent followups.

In this interview, while one member of the staff for each side may lead the questioning, additional staff may ask questions.

There's a court reporter taking down everything I say and everything that you say to make a written record of this interview. For the record to be clear, please wait until the staff member questioning you finishes each question before you begin your answer, and the staff member will wait until you finish your response before proceeding to the next question.

Further, to ensure the court reporter can properly record this interview, please speak

clearly, concisely and slowly. The court reporter cannot record nonverbal answers such as nodding or shaking your head. So it is important that you answer each question with an audible, verbal answer.

Do you understand?

A. I do.

Q. We want you to answer our questions in the most complete and truthful manner possible, so we will take our time.

If you have any questions or do not fully understand the question, please let us know and we will attempt to clarify, add context to, or rephrase our questions.

Do you understand?

- A. Yes, I do.
- Q. If we ask about specific conversations or events in the past and you're unable to recall the exact words or details, you should testify to the substance of those conversations or events to the best of your recollection.

If you recall only a part of a conversation or event, you should give us your best recollection of those events or parts of conversations that you recall.

Do you understand?

A. Yes.

Q. And although you are here voluntarily and we will not swear you in today, you are required pursuant to 18 U.S.C. § 1001, to answer all questions from Congress truthfully. This also applies to questions posed by congressional staff in an interview.

Do you understand?

- A. Yes.
- Q. If at any time you make knowingly false statements, you could be subject to criminal prosecution.

Do you understand?

- A. Yes.
- Q. Is there any reason you are unable to provide truthful testimony in today's interview?
- A. No.
- Q. Please note that if you wish to assert a privilege over any statement today, that assertion must apply within the rules of the Task Force on the attempted assassination of Donald J. Trump.

For the Chair to consider assertions of privilege over testimony or statements, witnesses or entities must clearly state the specific

privilege being asserted and the reason for the assertion on or before the scheduled date of testimony or appearance.

Q. Finally, I'd like to note that the content of what we discuss here today is confidential. We ask that you not speak about what we discuss today in this interview to any outside individual in order to preserve the integrity of the investigation.

For these same reasons, the marked exhibits used today will be provided to the court reporter so that they may go in the official transcript, and any copies of those exhibits will be returned to us when we wrap up.

We plan to take a five-minute break at the end of each 30-minute section of questioning, but if you need a longer break or a break before that, please let us know and we are happy to accommodate.

However, to the extent that there's a pending question, we would ask that you finish answering the question before we take the break.

Do you understand?

2 Do you have any questions before we begin? I do not. 3 Α. 4 Ο. Okay. The time is now 2:40 p.m. Majority 5 staff will now begin its questioning. 6 , how long have you worked at 7 the Butler Township Police Department? 8 Going on 18 years. 9 And how long have you been in your present 0. 10 role? 11 Since I started. 18 years. Α. 12 Q. And what are your daily responsibilities in your current role? 13 14 Patrol. Patrol has multiple aspects: Α. We do details. To enforce traffic 15 violations. To enforce crime. Responding to calls 16 Protect and serve 17 coming through the 911 Center. the public. 18 19 Ο. When did you first learn that the former 20 president was coming to Butler? 21 Approximately a couple weeks prior, I Α. 22 believe. And how did you learn of it? 23 Ο. I believe it was someone at the station 24 25 said there's a detail coming up.

Yes.

1	Q. And were you involved in any advanced
2	planning prior to July 13?
3	A. No, I was not.
4	Q. Did you know who from the Butler Police
5	Department was a part of the advance planning team?
6	A. My assumption was just Lieutenant
7	Q. Why is that your assumption?
8	A. Because he's in charge of the department.
9	Q. Prior to July 13, sir, did you do any
10	walkthroughs at the campaign rally location?
11	A. I did not.
12	Q. We've been told that there were two command
13	posts. One was the Emergency Department trailer
14	and one was the Secret Service command post.
15	Is that in line with your recollection?
16	A. I was informed there were command posts. I
17	didn't have the details of the different command
18	posts, but I knew there was an operations center.
19	Q. Okay. And when did you become aware of
20	this?
21	A. That morning when I was given the briefing
22	of my detail.
23	Q. And do you know who made the decision to
24	have the two posts?
25	A. I do not.

And were you in either of those posts --1 Q. I was not. 2 Α. -- or those locations before July 13? 3 Ο. 4 Α. Not in that capacity. I'm familiar 5 with the Farm Show grounds. Did any discussion of the AGR building come 6 0. 7 up in advanced planning conversations? I was never part of the advanced planning 8 9 program or conversations. 10 Were you aware of any conversations Ο. 11 regarding the day-of communications between the Secret Service and local law enforcement? 12 13 I was not. I'm not. 14 Were you aware of any plans for the Secret Ο. Service to use local law enforcement radios? 15 16 I was not. Α. 17 One last question: Were officers given an Ο. option in terms of comp or overtime to work the 18 19 rally that day on July 13? 2.0 Α. Could you specify what you mean by 21 "option"? I can elaborate. 22 There was a posted detail of overtime, 23 if available, to help out. So whoever was 24 available could sign on for the overtime detail. 25 And it's our understanding, sir, that Q.

initially overtime was the presented option. 1 2 However, that was changed to comp time. Is that your understanding, as well? 3 4 No. I have no workings with that. no idea. 5 Okay. So for purposes of the record, this 6 0. 7 detail was offered under the quise of overtime? Correct. To me, that's what my 8 9 understanding is, yes. 10 Ο. Okay. Thank you. 11 I'd like to move to the campaign rally 12 the day of July 13. 13 Can you briefly discuss a timeline of 14 events for that day, starting with any operational briefings that may have occurred? 15 16 The initial operation briefing for me was Α. at 9:30 that morning, approximately. We went over 17 with the chief the Butler Township Operation Plan, 18 19 which is sitting in front of me. I believe you 20 guys have a copy of it. 21 We went over the details of that. I was assigned my post, which was at Whitestown Road and 22 Meridian Road, and by roughly 10:00 in the morning, 23 24 I was stationary at Whitestown Road and Meridian 25 Road.

And could you go into whether there was a 1 Ο. 2 briefing or the details of that briefing? Sure. I mean, the Operation Plan broke 3 4 down that our duty was to do traffic control to get 5 motorcade in and out safely, shut down the 6 roadways, and we were given assignments. Different 7 officers were given different intersections to maintain and stay at. 8 Who conducted this briefing, sir? 9 0. 10 Lieutenant Α. 11 And who was present at the briefing? Q. 12 Α. I'm going to go with the list of the people you have on the list for operation planner: 13 14 It would be Sergeant . I believe 15 Detective might have been there. people work night turn into daylight. Probably 16 17 Patrolman . That's all that can come to my 18 head right now. 19 There were, I believe, five of us, plus 20 a lieutenant. So... 21 0. Thank you. 22 Α. I didn't take note of who was in the room 23 with us. I'd like to introduce as Majority Exhibit 1 24 25 the Butler Township Operation Plan.

(Majority Exhibit No. 1 was marked for 1 2 identification.) Sir, was anyone from the Secret Service at 3 4 this briefing? 5 Α. No. Was anyone from any other law enforcement 6 0. 7 agencies at this briefing? 8 Α. No. Was there any information about any known 9 0. 10 or suspected threats toward former President Trump 11 discussed during the briefing? 12 Α. No. 13 Was any information shared with you Ο. regarding how a potential shooter should be handled 14 15 or how responsibility would be split up? 16 No. Α. 17 What about other emergencies? We were on Operation Channel 3. Anything 18 that needed attention, as in an emergency, we can 19 20 talk amongst ourselves. Traffic detail was relayed 21 on OPS 3. On OPS 3, we went to the command center 22 and they would handle it. Were there any other handouts at the 23 24 briefing other than the Operation Plan? 25 Α. No.

Oh, yes, there was. The vehicle code on 1 2 parking violations because we had information that if people tried to park alongside the road, we 3 needed to make sure -- and I'm not sure if that is 4 part of the packet you handed me or not -- I didn't 5 go through it -- make sure there would be a 6 7 citation and the vehicle would be moved off the 8 highway. It's in there. 9 10 It's in there? Okay. 11 you. 12 Q. Sir, I'd like to draw your attention to Page 3, if you could, of the Operation Plan. 13 14 Α. Okay. 15 Page 3, the heading here, Detail Q. 16 Encounters, goes over suspicious activity and behavior and provides instruction that the member 17 will contact the command post to advise them of the 18 19 issue. 20 Which command post was that? 21 I had one command post I know of at that Α. 22 point. 23 And which one was that, sir? 0. 24 I believe the command post I was informed Α.

of was at the Brady Paul Lodge. At least that's

25

the one I'm familiar with. 1 2 And who was present at that command post? I have no idea. 3 Α. 4 Ο. So how would you contact that command post? On OPS 3 radio. 5 Α. On OPS 3. And you did not know who you 6 Q. 7 would be radioing to? 8 Α. Correct. 9 Was that of concern to you? 0. 10 No. That was operations. I wasn't part of Α. 11 the planning. Obviously, the operations site has 12 people that man the radios, communicate amongst 13 themselves. 14 Sir, moving over to Page 6, if you could, 0. 15 please. At the bottom of Page 6 --16 Mine aren't numbered. I'm sorry. Α. 17 That's okay. You're on the correct --Ο.

- A. Medical Unit?
- 19 | Q. Yes.

- Q. At the bottom here, sir, you'll see a
  section under Command/Control where it specifies,
  "Team 400 will be responsible for all active
  threats, civil disturbances, motorcade vehicles
  while at Farm Show grounds."

Sir, who comprised Team 400? 1 2 I have no idea. Team 400, my Α. 3 understanding, working in Butler County, is that's 4 the Special Response Team. 5 Q. Sir, did you see or have access to any operational plans from the Secret Service? 6 7 Α. No. Did you see or have access to any other 8 0. operational plans from other law enforcement 9 10 agencies? 11 Α. No. 12 0. Did the Secret Service provide you with a 13 map of your assignment and other law enforcement 14 posts? 15 Α. No. 16 At any point on July 13, was there any information shared with you by the Secret Service 17 regarding communications with the agency if you saw 18 19 something suspicious? 2.0 Α. No. 21 Or if you needed to alert them of 0. 22 something? I had no interaction with Secret Service at 23 24 all that day. 25 So it's fair to state that the Secret 0.

Service did not provide you with any information 1 2 about how to handle suspicious persons? Correct. 3 4 Ο. Now, if we could go back briefly to the 5 morning briefing or any operational plans that you 6 were aware of. 7 Was there any information about the AGR building? 8 9 Α. No. 10 Since you stated that you were familiar Ο. 11 with the grounds, was that of concern to you, sir? 12 Α. No. I had no planning at this rally. 13 I'd like to note for the 14 record if the member present could please introduce himself. 15 16 Representative Mike Kelly, MR. KELLY: PA-16, Chair. 17 18 Thank you, sir. 19 BY 20 Q. , what was your assignment for that 21 day? 22 Traffic detail at the intersection of Meridian Road and Whitestown Road. I was to make 23 24 sure the motorcade got through. 25 Upon instructions of my lieutenant, I

was to shut down the roadway, clear all the cars 1 2 off the road so the motorcade could get through. 3 Ο. Thank you, sir. 4 And if we could please 5 introduce the other member. 6 Just for the record, I'm 7 , Deputy Staff Director for the 8 Majority Task Force. 9 Thank you. 10 BY11 And how were you given your assignment that 12 day, sir? 13 Α. By Lieutenant What time did you get to your assigned 14 Ο. 15 post? Approximately 10:00. 16 Α. 10 a.m. 17 And what instructions were you given about Ο. 18 your assignment? 19 With the Operation Plan in front of me, I 20 could briefly go through the whole section, but the 21 synopsis was to help with any traffic congestion, 22 if possible, so the people attending the rally 23 could get in and out if any type of emergency would 24 happen on the roadway; remove any vehicles that 25 would be blocking the roadway prior to the

motorcade arriving; to make sure I shut down 1 2 traffic and I could get a clear path to the Farm Show grounds; and also to stay there, if the 3 4 motorcade had to leave at any point, to make sure I 5 could shut down the roadway. 6 Q. And that day, was your radio number 7 Α. Yes. Okay, sir. I'd like to move now to the 8 0. 9 operational period of July 13. 10 To the best of your ability, sir, can 11 you describe your assignment location? 12 It's a four-way intersection just northeast 13 of the Farm Show grounds. I believe there's probably some type of map in the Operation Plan, 14 15 which is tough to read. 16 And, sir, to assist you, I'd like to 0. introduce for the record Majority Exhibit 2. 17

- Q. I'll ask you, with this pen, if you can mark, your location on the map you were just provided.
- A. I can (indicating). I'm not sure if that helps or not because the dots -- I'm assuming this (indicating) is 68.

- 1 0. Mm-hmm. 2 And down below it is Whitestown Road, which is at that point almost parallel to Route 68 and 3 Meridian Road. 4 5 Q. Okay. I'm not sure if that's sufficient to where 6 7 you want it. 8 Q. Thank you. And, sir, do you know where the other 9 10 Butler police personnel were located during the 11 campaign rally? 12 For the detail, there was an officer at the 13 entrance of the Brady Paul Lodge Lane, which goes 14 in the back entrance of the Farm Show. Then there was an officer sitting at 15 16 Buttercup Road off of Meridian Road to help with traffic. 17 And there was another Butler Township 18 19 officer at Route 68 and Whitestown Road, and when 20 the motorcade came in, officers responded to 21 Greenwood Drive and South Benbrook to shut down 22 traffic.
  - Q. Do you know, sir, how many Butler police personnel were working the campaign rally?

A. That were just assigned to that rally?

1 Q. Yes, sir. 2 Six, I believe, plus my lieutenant. Would you say that there were a sufficient 3 Ο. 4 amount of officers at the event? For the detail I was performing? 5 Α. 6 Yes, sir. 0. 7 Two officers per intersection. Α. Yes. 8 And once at your assigned post, how did you Q. 9 communicate with others from the police department? 10 On OPS 3, and I believe there were some Α. 11 phone calls or text messages. 12 Shortly, I guess, at or prior to Trump arriving, I lost all service with T-Mobile. 13 14 was radio for me. 15 Thank you, sir. We're going to move into Q. phone communications. 16 17 So was it common among the officers, 18 generally, to communicate via text or, you know, 19 calling to one another rather than the radio? 20 Α. We like to keep -- yes. We like to keep 21 the channel open for emergencies. 22 Okay. So would you say it's fair that, you Q. 23 know, texts would be a quick, you know, 24 communication option that officers used to keep the 25 radio clear?

1 Α. Yes. 2 Okay, sir. Q. Were there any other means or manners of 3 4 communication used that day other than radio and 5 cellphone? 6 No, there isn't. 7 So, sir, you had mentioned T-Mobile. Ο. So could you please describe phone or service issues 8 9 that you were experiencing? 10 I had no service. I had no signal. 11 And could you give an approximate window of Q. 12 when the no-signal issues began and finished 13 occurring? 14 I could not. I couldn't give a fair Α. estimate. 15 16 Did you have service in the morning? Ο. I did. 17 Α. Okay. But you could not give an 18 Ο. 19 approximation as to when the issues began? I could not. 2.0 Α. 21 Did you have concerns with the fact that 0. 22 you had no service? No, because I still had my radio. 23 Α. 24 was communicating. 25 And if officers needed to send any kind of Q.

text message and you were unable to receive those 1 2 text messages, how were you able to cover that information that wasn't coming through? 3 4 If something important had to come through, 5 they would just call us on the radio. I mean, that's how it was. 6 7 Sir, did you ever receive any pictures of 0. the eventual shooter via text or e-mail on July 13? 8 I did not. 9 10 Did you, yourself, sir, send, either via Ο. 11 tech or e-mail, any pictures of the eventual 12 shooter to anyone on July 13? 13 I did not. Α. 14 Once at your assigned post, did you ever Ο. 15 receive any communications or updates from the 16 Secret Service? 17 Α. No. And how did you understand or what was your 18 19 understanding regarding how you would receive event or security-related updates? 20 21 Α. Via radio. 22 Did the Secret Service or anyone else from 23 law enforcement advise you to watch for drones? 24 Α. Yes. 25 Ο. Who?

Lieutenant during our briefing. 1 Α. 2 Did you see any drones flying during the day of the rally, sir? 3 4 Α. I did not. 5 Well, I believe a drone went up in the I think they put their own -- someone in 6 evening. 7 the law enforcement sent a drone up, but that was after the rally was -- during the investigation. 8 So to be clear for the record, sir, that 9 10 was on the evening of July 13? 11 Α. Yes. 12 0. And who sent the drone? I don't know who sent it up. It was ours, 13 Α. 14 law enforcement. 15 But prior to shots being fired, you saw no drone? 16 17 : Correct. And, sir, did the Secret Service ever make 18 0. 19 it known that their unmanned aerial system, 20 detection system was delayed in being operational? 21 Α. No. 22 So moving to suspicious individuals, sir, 23 do you recall how many descriptions of suspicious 24 individuals were communicated to you on July 13? 25 Α. One.

1 Q. One, okay. 2 , it's our understanding that around 5:42 p.m., it was relayed over the 3 4 radio that there was a younger white male with long hair that was lurking around the AGR building and 5 that he was viewed with a range finder. 6 7 Do you recall when you first heard about a suspicious person near the campaign rally 8 location? 9 10 Yeah, he has a copy of 11 the Police Incident Report, which Lieutenant 12 provided on a thumb drive this morning. 13 So it's the same document. He's just 14 going to refer to that. 15 Great. 16 He did a supplemental. 17 Thank you, sir. I believe in my timeline I have at 1754 18 19 hours I was made suspicious of a male wearing a 20 gray tee shirt and khaki shorts and possibly had a 21 range finder. 22 Can you repeat that time? 23 I have it in my report as 24 1754 p.m. 25 BY

Now I'd like to introduce, as Majority 1 0. 2 Exhibit 3, an Area of Operation map, sir. (Majority Exhibit No. 3 was marked for 3 4 identification.) Sir, if you could please mark with an X 5 Q. where you were located when you first heard about a 6 7 suspicious person near the campaign rally location. It's not on here. 8 It's not on here? Okay, sir. 9 Ο. 10 I'm trying to find it. Α. 11 And in terms of a description that was Q. 12 radioed of the suspicious person, was that in line 13 with the description of Mr. Crooks? 14 Of what I've seen far away. Α. Yes. And where did that information come from, 15 0. 16 sir? It came over OPS 3, I believe. 17 Α. And can you state from whom? 18 Ο. 19 I can't clarify who it was from. I would 20 have to be guessing at this point. 21 And you indicated you did not receive, Q. 22 personally, any photos of this individual --23 Correct. 24 -- via text? Q. 25 Α. Correct.

1 Q. What about over e-mail? 2 Α. No e-mails. Do you have any knowledge or awareness of 3 Ο. 4 photos being circulated? 5 Α. Yes. And who circulated those photos? 6 7 To the best of my knowledge, it was sent by Α. 8 Officer to certain members of the 9 department. 10 Do you know who those members of the Ο. 11 department were, sir? 12 Α. At this point, to the best of my knowledge, 13 it was two officers: Sergeant ; Sergeant 14 15 Sir, are you aware of who was then tracking 16 Mr. Crooks? 17 Α. I wasn't. And what steps were then taken by officers 18 19 in order to locate and detain this individual? 20 Α. Officers or myself? 21 Officers, in general, or once they became 0. 22 aware. I believe that Officer was stationed 23 Α. 24 with me at that intersection. Prior to updates, he 25 left to start -- he started walking up towards the

AGR building. I think that was the last time someone seen the individual.

Sergeant showed up at my location briefly after that who had a photo. To the best of my recollection, Sergeant showed me a photo of Mr. Crooks.

At that point there was another radio transmission. They were looking for him at the AGR building. Sergeant departed. He was in a patrol unit, in a patrol vehicle.

He left and drove towards the AGR building, which would have been northwest of my location, and I started walking in the area where I was posted.

Then another radio transmission came that they last seen him walking towards Sheetz by the AGR building, which would have been towards where my location was.

So at that point I started -- between my intersection to southwest, say, there's a treeline. So I started searching that area.

Q. Thank you, sir. And if we could kind of go into a bit more detail here, it's our understanding that around 6:03 p.m. you inquired as to whether there were two officers and whether the suspicious

individual with a range finder had been detained. 1 2 Do you recall this transmission, sir? Two officers? I'm sorry, ma'am. 3 Α. 4 Ο. That you had radioed. Were there two officers and whether the suspicious individual had 5 been detained? 6 7 You're asking that guestion off the radio log information you obtained? 8 9 0. Yes. 10 I did briefly look at that radio log. Α. 11 the best of my recollection, I was still near the intersection of Meridian Road and Whitestown. 12 13 What I thought I transmitted over the 14 radio was does the Secret Service want this individual detained. Reading the log, it did not 15 16 reflect on what I thought I said on the radio. Thank you, sir. And it's our understanding 17 Ο. that at approximately 6:06 p.m., you started 18 19 heading into the woods behind the cruiser. 2.0 Majority Exhibit 3, are you able to draw 21 a line to the area that you started going to? 22 AGR is at the top; 23 right? 24 Yes. 25 Correct.

14	know what time you left your post?
15	A. When I radioed if the Secret Service wanted
16	that individual detained, it would have been when I
17	was starting to walk into the woods, up towards the
18	woods, and then briefly when I started leaving my
19	area.
20	Q. And, sir, did you see any other law
21	enforcement or Secret Service head towards the AGR
22	building when you did?
23	A. I was isolated by trees. It was only
24	myself in the area.
25	O. And were other officers also seeking to

locate this suspicious person? 1 2 Two that I know of, yes, at that point. Α. How many people did you see by the AGR 3 Ο. building when you arrived? 4 5 Α. When I got into the area of the AGR building when I hit the parking lot, three on my 6 7 side. And, sir, given the proximity to the 8 0. campaign rally location, as well as the stage, did 9 10 you find it odd or concerning that so many 11 non-screened people were so close? I was focused on the AGR building and the 12 13 individual that I at that point would have seen on 14 the roof. 15 I didn't really pay attention to what's 16 the fence line or anything like that. 17 Okay, sir. When you approached the AGR building, did you see anyone on the roof? 18 19 Α. I did. 20 0. So with the two minutes we have left, it is 21 our understanding, , that at 6:08 p.m., you 22 are radioed that somebody was on the roof and that there was someone on the roof with white shorts. 23 24 Do you recall making this transmission? I do, yes. 25 Α.

1	Q. And where were you when you made this
2	transmission?
3	A. I would have been in the power line,
4	walking up the tree line. A good hundred plus
5	yards away from the building.
6	Q. And did the person that you saw on the roof
7	match the description of the suspicious individual
8	that had been ID'd over the radio moments prior?
9	A. Yes.
LO	Q. When you saw someone on the roof, sir, what
L1	did you then do?
L2	A. I made a radio transmission that the male
L3	was on the roof. Someone's on the roof.
L4	Q. And once you radioed the suspicious
L5	individual on the roof, what was the protocol in
L6	terms of next steps?
L7	A. I was seeking to locate him, get the
L8	location.
L9	Q. And once you acquired the individual's
20	location, what would then be the next steps?
21	Would it be detainment?
22	A. Correct. It was to detain him, as I
23	questioned earlier on the radio, if Secret Service
24	wanted him detained.
25	Q. Was it any one officer's responsibility to
	1

detain the individual, or could you please describe 1 2 for the record who would sort of be responsible for detaining the individual? 3 4 My perception was whoever got to him first. Did you see any officers or other law 5 Ο. 6 enforcement seeking to get on top of the roof to 7 detain the individual? 8 Α. Yes. 9 And who did you see trying to get on the 0. 10 roof, sir? 11 I personally didn't see them. When I was Α. 12 approaching the building, I made contact with two 13 officers I work with and gave them a location the last time I seen the person on the roof and we need 14 15 to get on the roof. 16 Thank you, sir. Our time is up. Ο. Thank 17 you. (Off the record.) 18 19 BY 2.0 Thank you again for being here today. Q. 21 just kind of want to go back and ask a few 22 questions about your background. 23 So you've been at your current location for 18 years? 24 25 Approximately 18 years, yes. Α.

1 Q. 18, okay. Awesome. And did you have any 2 experience with rallies before July 13th? To this extent of a major rally, no. I 3 4 can't think of any. 5 Q. Okay. So you weren't involved in the 2020 6 rally that I know a few people were involved in 7 with that campaign? 8 Α. No. Okay. What kind of smaller rallies have 9 0. 10 you been involved in? 11 Nothing with Butler Township. Α. 12 0. Okay. Do you have any experience with security details? 13 14 Α. No. 15 With your role, is there any coordination Q. 16 that you do just in your normal duties with PSP or 17 any other agencies? We have a mutual pact. If anyone needs 18 19 assistance, we help each other out. 2.0 Okay. And does that go from officer to Q. 21 officer? Is that more a lieutenant level? 22 How do those conversations generally 23 happen? 24 So my interaction is with state police, 25 because that's usually the next jurisdiction we

have because they are around Butler Township.

Or the City of Butler is when we have any type of incidents where we need more manpower, anything like that, we would radio.

And/or if they monitor the radiofrequency and there's something, what we call a hot call, come in, you know, people usually just start responding to it.

- Q. And then hearing these words a lot, I'm just wondering. So Butler Emergency Services versus Butler ESU, in your experience, do people usually get these confused, or is it pretty obvious that they're two different organizations?
  - A. Emergency Services?
- Q. Emergency Services versus Butler emergency services unit.
- A. I'm not really aware of the difference. I mean, I know ESU is more of a tactical thing.

  Emergency Services I would associate with 911

  Center OPS plan.
- Q. So, to your knowledge, do you know? Did the Secret Service reach out to anyone else in your organization about having officers patrol the AGR complex?
- A. I had no planning of the situation. I have

no information on it. 1 2 And you did not -- you weren't involved in the July 8th walkthrough or the July 11th? 3 4 Nothing prior to the 13th? 5 Α. Correct. Is it safe to say that the first meeting 6 7 that you had with everybody was the morning meeting that you told us about the briefing where 8 went over the OPS plan? 9 Lieutenant 10 Α. Correct. 11 Me pausing means I'm just not going to ask 12 the questions, so... I appreciate it. I'm here. 13 14 Ο. So can you go over your posts, where your 15 post was for us? 16 That was at the intersection of Α. Sure. Whitestown Road and Meridian Road, which was, as I 17 stated before, the southeast corner of the office 18 19 of the Farm Show grounds. 2.0 Our understanding, I'll add, was the 21 motorcade was supposed to come off of 422 and would 22 be coming on Meridian Road to the Farm Show 23 grounds. 24 So we were to shut down traffic and

notify to not let any traffic come through.

Q. Okay. And was there any situation in which you were told during the briefing that you should leave your post, or what was the guidance that you were given about that?

- A. We were assigned to the post, and if we seen, as I said, anything suspicious or anything we needed assistance with, we were supposed to notify the OPS on Channel 3, OPS 3, and they would disseminate who they needed to to handle the situation.
- Q. Okay. And what was your understanding of who was manning OPS 3 for your department?
  - A. I'm assuming it was Lieutenant .
  - Q. And did you communicate with Lieutenant over OPS 3 at all on the 13th?
- A. We did, during the transmission of when the motorcade was coming in.
- Q. And I believe under the OPS Plan that you have in front of you -- and I believe this is Majority Exhibit 1 -- on Page 3 on the Suspicious Activity/Behavior, it reads, "Members will contact the command post to advise them of issues and provide description of actor and behavior. If not threatening, member will continue with their detail."

So in either the briefings that you received or in your experience, what does that mean, the word "threatening" right there?

- A. It would mean immediate action to stop anyone from getting hurt.
- Q. Okay. So for us lay people, what would the threat level need to be? Or maybe, if easier, is there an example you would give where it would be appropriate to leave your post to deal with it?
- A. I would say the simplest way to put it, if you would see someone protest or something like that, get in an altercation, you know, you would try to intervene and stop the altercation.
  - Q. Makes sense. Okay.

So turn here a little bit to the communication tools. You had your radio. You had your phone. T-Mobile, there was no service. So you did not receive any text or e-mail of the shooter.

Did you have access to any of the other channels on that radio?

A. Yes.

2.0

- Q. And did you listen to any other channels throughout the day or was OPS 3 --
  - A. In my portable, which I would be carrying

on my person, myself, was on OPS 3. 1 2 The vehicle that I was assigned to that day was scanning. So it would be scanning Channel 3 4 2, which is a primary police channel for that for our location for Butler Township in that area, and 5 it would be OPS 3, and I believe I might have 6 7 picked up OPS 4. And OPS 4, that was Team 400 that had 8 control of it? 9 10 Α. Correct. 11 Now, you mentioned earlier that had 12 a picture that he sent out. Do you know why he only sent it to two 13 of the team members as opposed to everybody? 14 I have no idea. I don't know who he sent 15 Α. it to at that point when it was sent out. I did 16 not have service. 17 18 Do you know? Was anyone on your team using 19 the APS signal? 2.0 Have you ever heard of the APS signal? 21 I have not. I'm sorry. So that would be Α. 22 no then. 23 Ο. Absolutely. 24 So you mentioned earlier that you 25 weren't involved in any of the decisions with the

1 command posts. Generally, just with your law 2 enforcement background, how were command posts 3 4 supposed to function? 5 Α. Through my experience, I have never been in a command post in that situation. 6 7 Ο. Okay. So my understanding is it's manned by 8 someone who listens to and makes decisions. 9 10 Ο. Okay. 11 Can I ask just a quick 12 one on that? 13 Please. 14 BY So, in general, if you're communicating on 15 16 that day into the command post on OPS 3 and you say whatever it is, whatever the case may be, is the 17 expectation that after you finish your message, 18 19 does somebody from inside the command post say "Copy," "Over," "Confirmed," or, like, some type of 20 confirmation of receipt of whatever it is you --21 22 Α. Sure. Is that how it normally works? 23 Ο. 24 Α. Yes. 25 Okay. Got it. That's the general system? Q.

1 Α. Usually, you know, someone would have Yes. 2 got it. Makes sense. I don't know if you 3 Ο. Yeah. 4 recall -- you may not -- for the 6:08 transmission 5 that you got eyes on the individual up on the roof, you put that out over OPS 3? 6 7 Α. Correct. Does somebody from inside that command post 8 ever end up, if you remember, coming back and 9 10 saying, "Got it"? 11 I don't recall. I treated that at that Α. 12 point as -- I was trying to relay as much 13 information as possible to everybody in that area. 14 Makes perfect sense. I was just curious if that second part of the back and forth ended up 15 16 happening on the 6:08 transmission, if somebody 17 from the command post says, "Received"? You just don't recall? 18 19 I don't recall. 20 Q. Thanks. 21 BY 22 Prior to the 13th, do you know? How were 23 assignments made about who would cover which 24 responsibilities? 25 Α. No duties were planned.

So you all just showed up, and Lieutenant 1 Q. said, "You're going to be here and" --2 I did. 3 Α. 4 Ο. Okay. 5 Α. I have no idea who was all part of the 6 planning, but when I showed up, they gave me my 7 assignment. Are you aware of what steps were taken by 8 any law enforcement to monitor and secure the site 9 10 after the stage was constructed on, I believe, 11 July 12th? 12 Α. I do not. 13 And do you know which law enforcement agency had the overall responsibility to coordinate 14 radio communications between the Secret Service, 15 16 state police and local police on the 13th? 17 I do not. Α. So moving to what actually happened on the 18 19 13th and the threat that Crooks posed, just 20 generally with law enforcement prior to the rally, 21 what did a range finder mean to you? 22 Α. Suspicious. I mean, it puts you on alert. 23 And would you keep that in the suspicious 24 person category? Would that move somebody up to a 25 higher category?

What's the law enforcement kind of escalation of force or rules of engagement around something like a range finder?

A. Obviously, that information was provided, I believe, as a possible range finder, and that's where later on in my transaction that was provided.

My radio communication was asking if they wanted him detained because, obviously, the information that was provided to us -- patrol -- it caused a concern. So I had to, you know, see if they wanted him detained or not.

Q. Yeah. According to the kind of transcripts that we have, it was at 1754 that the command notified the township police department on OPS 3 of the suspicious person.

What was it, after that came in at 1754, that specifically triggered you to start heading over towards the AGR building?

A. I believe there was some type of radio communication, some type of communication that he was last seen at the AGR building, in the area of the AGR building, and I believe the transaction, radio transaction or -- I'm not sure if it was even a phone call -- Sergeant was up there already and he was with me.

So at that point, as I said earlier, 1 2 was with me in patrol. He already had showed me a picture of Crooks, and he, you 3 4 know, immediately departed to assist in trying to locate Crooks. 5 Okay. So had you seen -- when 6 0. 7 received the picture, was he with you where he could show you what the picture looked like? 8 I don't recall. He thought -- he said he 9 10 showed it to me. I believe that Sergeant 11 showed the picture to me. 12 That was the first time I had seen it, 13 but like I said, that was within minutes. 14 So you already explained that at 1803 when it said we have two officers, your recollection of 15 that is asking, "Does the Secret Service want this 16 individual detained"; correct? 17 Correct. 18 Α. 19 And then at 18:06:18, you said, "Can you 20 keep an eye for that person south of Meridian Road? 21 I'm going behind in the woods behind the cruiser." 22 So is it 1806 where you started? Excuse I think I said 1806. 18:06:18. 23 Is that when you start from your cruiser 24

through the woods?

1	A. At that point I would have I believe
2	I've already started looking in my area, immediate
3	area, and then before I left my post, I wanted to
4	notify the person at any other intersection that I
5	was leaving. "Check on; keep an eye on my
6	intersection."
7	Q. Who was the other person at your
8	intersection?
9	A. That person at my intersection above me?
10	Q. Yes.
11	A. So the person I was radioing that to was
12	Sergeant , who was at the intersection of
13	Route 68 and Meridian Road.
14	Q. So at that time you're saying to Sergeant
15	, "I'm going to head in. Keep an eye out."
16	Was Lieutenant involved in any
17	of these discussions?
18	A. No.
19	Q. At 1808, this is when you let everybody on
20	OPS 3 know that someone's on the roof and they have
21	white shorts.
22	At 18:08:45 you said, "South side.
23	Coming around the bend right now towards the
24	stage."
25	What were you describing at that

timeframe?

- A. His movement.
- Q. And then at 18:09:17, you said, "We got him. We don't have him in custody yet, but he's right stage in front of me by the pine tree standing upwards. He had a backpack."

So was he off the roof at that time, or was it somebody -- were there -- can you explain?

A. I will. I seen the radio communication, and I was trying to relay as much information as possible.

Upon, prior to that radio transmission,
I spotted him. You have the timeline. I was still
back in the power line.

I observed a trooper coming on the other side of the tree line, coming, approaching the building.

The trooper stopped in the area the last time I seen Crooks because he disappeared off the corner of the roof.

My perception at that point across the parking lot, that the trooper was making contact with him on the roof. And that's the only thing I can elaborate on why that was transmitted.

I haven't broken down the timeline since

that log came out.

- Q. Okay. So just to confirm that I understood, you had seen him on the roof, and then the trooper was moving in, another trooper, and you thought he's going to get there and he is going to be able to make connection?
- A. The trooper arrived at the last point I seen him, dropped down off the roof. Obviously, you guys are familiar with the building. There are multiple buildings, and they're connected somehow or another. At that point I didn't know how they were connected.

He dropped off the corner of it, and there were two large evergreens. I call them pine trees to make it simple.

The troop car came at an angle and stopped in the area where the pine trees were at and he got out, and whatever I perceived at that time, I thought the trooper had him in and was talking to him. Obviously, I was not correct.

- Q. Very helpful situational awareness.
- (Minority Exhibit A was marked for identification.)
- Q. For Minority Exhibit A would you just mind -- here is a map -- walking us through where

you were and what you had seen at that time? 1 2 I would say that this picture does not depict my viewpoint very well. 3 4 Ο. Okay. 5 Α. It really would be hard for me to read. 6 0. Is that a better -- and maybe it's not 7 but --8 Α. I hope. I can't see that far away. many lines. 9 We will introduce this Minority Exhibit B. 10 Ο. 11 (Minority Exhibit B was marked for 12 identification.) 13 This photo (indicating) is a better photo 14 than this. 15 Okay. We'll use that photo. 0. 16 So the top corner where the yellow line Α. 17 is -- I'm just making sure we have the right road here -- I don't want to give you bad information --18 19 was my intersection. The water tower's here 20 (indicating). Obviously, the AGR building's here 21 (indicating). 22 The power line, which is in the photo --23 it's not a great photo because the trees are 24 blocking it -- is over here (indicating). 25 So I was in this area (indicating) when

I seen the actor get on the roof. My observation 1 2 was he was heading, in the description I gave you, toward the stage, to make it simple, and there were 3 4 two large evergreens. I'm guessing 20, 25 feet 5 tall. 6 What I seen was a -- I'm not sure at 7 this moment -- I seen video, so I kind of know where it came from -- a troop car came through the 8 parking lot and stop in this corner (indicating). 9 That was the last time I seen the actor. 10 11 And I was still back in there (indicating) when I made that radio transmission. 12 That's very helpful. 13 Ο. Thank you. 14 BY 15 A clarifying question: So you said you saw him drop off the corner of the roof? 16 I did. 17 Α. Was he moving from one roof to another 18 19 roof, or was he dropping down to the ground? 20 Α. There was, obviously, a walkway. Not 21 knowing exactly what he dropped down to, but he 22 disappeared off the corner of the roof. 23 Then at 18:09:27, "Someone get over by 24

Whistletown Road. That's where he gained entrance:

1 Up on the roof." 2 I'm sorry. Could you repeat that? Oh, yes. Absolutely. So at 18:09:27, the 3 Ο. 4 radio transmission, "Someone get over by 5 Whistletown Road. That's where he gained entrance: 6 Up on the roof." 7 So just telling other individuals that were on OPS 3, providing them some context and 8 encouraging them to come closer to where you were 9 10 at? 11 Α. Okay. 12 Q. Is that what your intent was with --13 : Do you recall? 14 Oh, I'm sorry. Α. That was my transmission? 15 Yes, that was your transmission. Q. 16 I don't recall the transmission. Α. 17 apologize. 18 Q. No, no. Okay. 19 And then at 1811, that's when you let 20 everybody know the actor has a long gun and he's on 21 the roof; is that correct? 22 I repeated what, I believe, Officer 23 said; that he had a long-gun rifle, and someone on 24 OPS 3 was trying to clarify that he had a firearm, 25 I believe, and I confirmed that he had a firearm.

- Q. Is there any other context to the transmissions, radio transmissions, that you'd like to provide?
  - A. I don't believe so.

- Q. Okay. So post the shooting, Lieutenant earlier today said that at that point you were at the AGR building and that Homeland Security had detained a few individuals and then turned them over to you; is that correct?
- A. My understanding, I believe it was -- I thought it was the state police, but they had a group of individuals on the southwest corner, I guess, in the woods waiting for someone to talk to them.

They did have one young male detained that was being handcuffed. Myself and another officer, which I don't even recall -- I believe maybe it was Detective -- we transported them back to the beginning of Whitestown Road and had them waiting for someone to talk to them.

So whoever detained them, according to the few people I talked to -- I did not take their names down -- took their ID and their cellphones from them at that point.

Q. Okay. But it was the state police that

A. That was my understanding at the time. I never followed up. I never gave the information back to them.

I got them to a safe point. Then there was another alert while they were being detained at the front of the building, being Whitestown Road.

Something else was suspicious, so I made sure they were in a safe place, and I went back to the perimeter of the AGR building.

- Q. What was --
- A. I thought it was something about explosives or something like that. I don't recall what it was, but it was something to secure the area.
- Q. Did anyone let you know why they had detained this individual?
- A. No.
- Q. Are you aware of Crooks' firearm being moved by anyone other than the FBI?
  - A. No.
- Q. Do you know where Crooks' vehicle was found?
- A. Information provided to me later, which I think it was actually brought up in here, it was Whitestown Road.

I mean, I can't really testify where it 1 2 was at because I didn't see it. It was not in my 3 area. 4 Ο. And after all of this occurred, have you had any debriefs with other law enforcement 5 officers? 6 7 What would be a debrief? FBI and the 8 Pennsylvania State Police. 9 10 Α. Yes. 11 Q. And was that a debrief or an interview? 12 It was a criminal 13 investigative interview. 14 Okay. And that was with the FBI and who? 15 16 Pennsylvania State Police. 17 18 Thank you 19 20 Since this happened, have you made any 21 public statements? 22 Α. No. Any social media posts? 23 Ο. 24 Α. No. 25 To your knowledge, on that date, did local Q.

and state police officers follow all directions of 1 2 the Secret Service? No communication with Secret Service. 3 can't answer that. 4 5 Q. Okay. Now, based on our visits to Butler, it seems like former President Trump has a lot of 6 7 support here and that it's very unlikely that law enforcement officers were part of some conspiracy 8 to hurt him. 9 10 Do you have any thoughts on some of the 11 things that have been --I don't follow social media. It's not part 12 Α. 13 of my game plan. 14 So, no, I have no idea what you're 15 talking about. 16 Okay. I think at this time, that's all of 0. 17 the questions that we have right now, unless... 18 Do you have any : 19 clarifying? 20 21 BY Two questions: What did you understand 22 your assignment to be after the president's 23 24 motorcade arrived but before he departed during the 25 rally?

1	A. Still traffic detail. Just keep traffic

Secret Service would be doing that day, July 13? 1 2 Protecting the person. I can't think of Α. the words right now. 3 4 Candidate? 5 Yes. That would be 6 candidate, yes. 7 Former president? 8 Yes. 9 BY 10 So we are going to go back, sir, now to --11 we had picked up as to when you had seen someone on 12 the roof and you began to approach the AGR 13 building. 14 We briefly touched upon sort of what was 15 protocol at that juncture, and you had indicated 16 that once the suspicious individual had been ID'd, officers and others sort of approached the roof, 17 and the intention was to detain this individual; is 18 19 that correct? 20 Α. That was my intention, yes. 21 Okay. Did you see anyone from Secret 0. 22 Service as you approached the AGR building? 23 Nothing that stuck out in my mind, no. 24 not sure how they're supposed to be dressed all the 25 time.

And, did you radio that the 1 Q. 2 individual on the roof had a gun? I reconfirmed it after Officer 3 4 , Detective , relayed it, yes. 5 Q. Thank you. And can you briefly recount for us the moment you first heard gunshots? 6 7 What was your location, sir? I would have been looking, surveying the 8 parking lot to try to get a roof line of anybody on 9 10 the roof. 11 If you can give an approximate distance, 12 sir, whether that be in feet or otherwise, how far 13 away were you from the AGR building when you first heard qunshots? 14 15 20 to 30 feet, approximately, maybe. Α. 16 And what was your reaction, sir, when you Ο. first heard the shots? 17 I continued to look for the -- to figure 18 19 out what was going on because, obviously, I had no 20 eyes on what was going on. 21 So is it fair to say you proceeded to move 0. 22 closer to the sound of the shots and where they 23 were coming from? 24 There was a trooper to the left. I 25 continued where I was at to the right. I was

moving to the right to get a look on the roof. 1 2 At that juncture, sir, could you describe for us your awareness as to any sort of counter, 3 4 kind of, shots that were being fired, or could you describe for us what you heard? 5 6 I heard like two volleys of shots. That's 7 it. The first volley coming from the AGR roof; 8 0. is that correct? 9 10 It sounded like it came from the roof, yes. Α. 11 And then you heard return fire; is that 12 correct? I heard gunfire. I had no idea where the 13 Α. shots were coming from at that point. 14 15 Once the shots began, sir, did you or any Q. other law enforcement proceed to continue to try to 16 17 get up onto the roof? I was still scanning where I was at on the 18 19 I believe there was law enforcement to the 20 left of me. I had no idea where anybody else was 21 at. 22 Did you see any other individuals try to 23 get on the roof once shots rang out? 24 Yes. I was approached by, I believe, other Α.

members who were approaching the building.

volley of shots were very quick and short. 1 They 2 were stopped, it seemed like, immediately, and other law enforcement approached the building and 3 4 were trying to get access to the roof. 5 Q. And, sir, if you could clarify. When you say law enforcement, was this PSP? Other local law 6 7 enforcement? Secret Service? As I stated before, there was a PSP member 8 there at first. Then I had a couple Butler 9 10 Township officers. Then another township officer. 11 And then shortly -- obviously you guys have a timeline -- I call them ESU members show up 12 13 on a UTV. Multiple members deployed off the UTV trying to get access to the roof. 14 15 Did you see any law enforcement shoot at Q. the AGR roof? 16 17 Α. No. And, sir, within a minute of the first shot 18 19 being fired, someone stated over the radio that the shooter was down. 20 21 Do you recall hearing that? 22 Α. I do not. 23 Sir, how did you learn that the shooter was 0. 24 down?

Briefly. I mean, a verbal communication

with other people. I was still looking for the shooter and a second shooter, if there was anybody else, still trying to look inside, locate anybody else who might have been on the roof.

Q. Sir, after the Secret Service sniper shot
Mr. Crooks, were you able to see him on the roof?

A. No. I did not see Mr. Crooks until later on in the evening. I was able to be back far enough in a parking lot to get the angle to see what appeared to be a person up on the roof.

- Q. And if you could expand a bit on what you indicated, sir, that it wasn't later until the evening, is this after Mr. Crooks was deceased?
- A. Which, I assume, was deceased, yes, and there's members, other members of law enforcement were on the roof. I was still holding the perimeter and they were still searching the buildings.

I'd have to say at least an hour or so until I moved from where control in my area was located to the time I went out in the parking hot.

Q. So you remained in the vicinity of the AGR building once Mr. Crooks was shot for the duration.

What would you say? An hour after he

was shot?

A. I held the perimeter at the AGR building until roughly nightfall. I have no idea the law enforcement personnel who showed up from different locations.

We were doing the investigation, the scene was secure, and I actually returned to my traffic detail on Whitestown Road and Meridian for a brief time.

- Q. Did anyone give you instruction to stay, you know, in the perimeter, or did you make that call on your own?
- A. I did. I just stayed there and held the perimeter until instructed to leave.
- Q. And did any Secret Service approach you at any juncture following the shooting as you were, you know, keeping on the perimeter?
  - A. I do not believe so.

- Q. And after the shooting, sir, did you receive any communications or updated information from the Secret Service regarding what you should do?
  - A. I had no communication with Secret Service.
- Q. Did you have any communication with Secret Service whatsoever following the shooting?

Charlie 1, Lima 1. Everybody says yeah, they were up there. Everybody's onboard. Right?

But as it continues to go on, all of a sudden it becomes, "Well, we weren't able to communicate."

So I don't know what happened from the early part where everybody checked in and there's communications. "We'll check in in another hour or two just to make sure we're still communicating."

I'm assuming that's what the process was.

So did you have any back and forth with anybody when you're communicating with them, say, "I'm not getting the transmission"? I know one thing: I sent you pictures; I haven't received them."

So if we know there's a failure of communications somewhere early on, would you have known that or not known it?

I'm amazed that we have all this stuff set up and we don't realize until 6:00 that we can't communicate.

I'm trying to get it to fit together, and I'm thinking you're on the ground. You're performing what you've been assigned to perform.

But then as you're going on and you're seeing this stuff unwind and you see this guy on the roof and you're talking about it, I keep coming back to the same thing: At what point does somebody in the control tower actually say, "We've got a problem.

Keep Trump in. Don't let him come out"?

Because it seems to me that you could see something was wrong. Other people -- I have friends that were on the outside of that building and they were pointing up saying, "There's a guy up there with a gun." And it seems everybody, except the command center, understood there was something wrong that had gone awry, and at some point the ability to communicate all of a sudden was blurred and we couldn't get a clear picture of it.

So I'm not pointing the finger at

anybody. I'm just trying to find out what went 1 2 wrong that day and make sure it never happens The "never happens again" is the hard part 3 4 about this -- right? -- because at some point 5 somebody has to look at the game plan and figure out why did it break down and when? Why did it 6 7 break down at that point. 8 : I don't know if you 9 can answer that or not since you weren't involved 10 in the planning. 11 I wasn't in planning. I wasn't involved in 12 planning. My experience that day, my assignment 13 14 was OPS 3, and we were communicating okay. 15 text messaging and the cellphone usage, we weren't 16 really using it. We had radios. 17

Our hands weren't in the arena. You know, we were traffic detail. So I didn't get to see what maybe you're reading. But obviously I did testify that I lost phone service. I didn't think much of it. If anyone has T-Mobile, it's just T-Mobile.

Sorry. That's on the record; right?

A. But with me not doing the investigation,

not having all the information on me, I can't give you a good answer.

My side of it, I was radioing and trying to brief in quick information as possible so everyone knew what was going on on my side.

Q. And I understand all that. But the team who was quarterbacking the whole thing is the Secret Service.

I would have to assume that in the years and years and all of the experience they have had -- I can't tell you the number of Trump events I've been at -- but I'm trying to get this to fit, and I don't want to be boring on this.

There has to be, in their whole compilation of what they've done over the years, the idea is you better get people in ahead of time for any event. Measure twice, cut once. You can't be casual about this. You can't take it for granted, because nothing else has happened before, that nothing's going to happen today.

But I would say the key to almost everything in this life is, first of all, being prepared for whatever it is you're going to do and then, secondly, the ability to communicate while you're going through that.

I think there's things -- there's assets available that would make it easier to communicate, and I'm just trying to understand why, on that day.

Listen: I don't rely on my cellphone that much for anything because where I live, where you live, I lose coverage a lot. I would not rely on this (indicating) to be my way of communicating.

A. Correct.

I hate to be boring of this, but when you have the most elite group that we could possibly put out there to protect our elected people or whoever it is we decide to put this coverage on, I would just think that ahead of time you would know that on those grounds -- and I'm very familiar with them because I've lived there -- you know there's a failure of communication if you're just relying on what the regular citizens rely on every day.

At that point we're not regular citizens. You're working with the most elite group, and certainly -- certainly -- somebody would

have recognized the fact that that's not the place 1 2 that we would ever rely on cellphones. should be some other way of communicating. 3 4 First of all, what you all did that day 5 was incredible. There was nobody that got beat up more than local law enforcement in this whole deal. 6 7 Thank you. Α. It was very unfair. Very unfair. 8 0. appreciate what you did and everybody else that was 9 10 involved. And I know too many of you, and I know 11 the aftermath of all this has really damaged some people a lot deeper than you can imagine. 12 13 So I'm sorry to go on like this. got to tell you it really bothers me. It just 14 15 really bothers me. 16 Thank you. 17 We'd like to thank you, sir, again for coming in today to speak with us. 18 We greatly appreciate you taking the time. 19 2.0 We can go off the record. 21 (Interviewee excused.) 22 (The interview concluded at 4:20 p.m.) 23 24 25


