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Today is Friday, 1 : 2 September 13th, and this is a transcribed interview House Resolution 1367 3 4 directed this Task Force to investigate the facts and circumstances of the attempted assassination of 5 Donald J. Trump on July 13, 2024 in Butler, 6 7 Pennsylvania. Pursuant to House Resolution 1367, 8 Chairman Kelly and Ranking Member Crow have 9 10 requested this interview as part of the Task 11 Force's investigation. 12 BY 13 Can the witness please state their name and spell their last name for the record. 14 15 Α. 16 Ο. Thank you. , my name is , and I'm Senior Counsel with 17 the Task Force. I want to thank you for coming in 18 19 today for this interview. The Task Force 20 recognizes and appreciates that you are here 21 voluntarily. You are allowed to have an attorney 22 present advising you during this interview. 23 Do you have an attorney representing you 24 in a personal capacity present with you today?

Yes.

1 Will Counsel please identify himself for the record. 2 3 4 Is there also an 5 attorney present representing Adams Township today? 6 No. 7 For the record, next, : starting with the Majority and then Minority, can 8 the additional Staff Members please introduce 9 10 themselves with their name, title, and affiliation. 11 , Senior Counsel, 12 Task Force Majority Staff. 13 Investigative Counsel, Task Force Minority Staff. 14 15 Investigative Counsel for the Minority. 16 17 18 , before we begin, I would like Q. 19 to go over the ground rules for this interview. 20 The way this interview will proceed is as follows: 21 The Majority and Minority Staff will alternate 22 asking you questions, 30 minutes per side per round until each side is finished with their questioning. 23 24 The Majority Staff will begin and proceed for 30 25 minutes, and then the Minority Staff will have 30

minutes to ask questions. We will then alternate back and forth in this manner until both sides have no more questions.

If either side is in the middle of a specific line of questions, they may choose to end a few minutes past an hour to ensure completion of that specific line of questioning, including any pertinent followups. In this interview, while one member of the Staff for each side may lead the questioning, additional Staff may ask questions.

There is a court reporter taking down everything I say and everything you say to make a written record of the interview. For the record, please be clear, please wait until the Staffer questioning you finishes each question before you begin your answer, and the Staffer will wait until you finish your response before proceeding to the next question.

Further, to ensure the court reporter can properly record this interview, please speak clearly, concisely, and slowly. Also, the court reporter cannot record nonverbal answers such as nodding or shaking your head, so it is important that you answer each question with an audible verbal answer; do you understand?

A. Yes.

- Q. We want you to answer our questions in the most complete and truthful manner possible, so we will take our time. If you have any questions or do not fully understand the question, please let us know. We will attempt to clarify, add context to, or rephrase our questions; do you understand?
  - A. Yes.
- Q. If we ask about specific conversations or events in the past and you are unable to recall the exact words or details, you should testify to the substance of those conversations or events to the best of your recollection. If you recall only a part of a conversation or event, you should give us your best recollection of those events or parts of conversations that you do recall; do you understand?
  - A. Yes.
- Q. Although you are here voluntarily and we will not swear you in, you are required pursuant to 18 -- Chapter 18 of U.S. Code Section 1001 to answer questions from Congress truthfully. This also applies to questions posed by Congressional Staff in an interview; do you understand?
  - A. Yes.

- Q. Is there any reason you are unable to provide truthful testimony in today's interview?
  - A. No.
- Q. Please note that if you wish to assert a privilege over any statement today, that assertion must apply with the rules of the U.S. House of Representatives. For the Chair to consider assertions of privilege over testimony or statements, witnesses or entities must clearly state the specific privilege being asserted and the reason for the assertion on or before the scheduled date of testimony or appearance; do you understand?
  - A. Yes.
- Q. Finally, I'd like to note that the content of what we discuss today is confidential. We ask that you not speak about what we discuss here today in this interview to any outside individual in order to preserve the integrity of this investigation.

For these same reasons, the marked exhibits used today will be provided to the court

reporter so that they may go in the official 1 2 transcript, and any copies of those exhibits will be returned to us when we wrap up. 3 We plan to take a five-minute break at 4 the end of each 30 minutes of questioning. But if 5 you need a longer break or a break before that, 6 7 please let us know. We are happy to accommodate. To the extent that there's a pending question, 8 however, we would ask that you finish answering 9 10 that question before we take a break; do you 11 understand? 12 Α. Yes. 13 Do you have any questions before we begin? Ο. 14 Α. No, ma'am. 15 It is now 9:13. 16 Majority Staff will now begin its questioning. 17 EXAMINATION 18 ΒY 19 Sir, how long have you worked for Adams 20 Township Police Department? 21 Since 2011, so almost 14 years. Α. 22 What is your job title and responsibilities Q. 23 there? 24 I'm a police officer, sergeant rank. Α. 25 How long have you worked for Butler 0.

Emergency Services Unit? 1 2 About eight years. Α. And what's your title and rank there? 3 Ο. 4 I'm the Alpha team leader. How would you describe the difference 5 Q. 6 between the Adams Township Police Department and 7 Butler ESU? Butler ESU is a tactical unit. We only 8 respond to high risk or, you know, more emergent 9 10 situations, I guess. 11 In what capacity were you at the rally on 12 July 13, 2024? 13 So I was the CAT team leader, so I was in 14 charge -- I oversaw the two CAT teams, counter 15 assault teams for the rally. 16 Was that in your capacity as a member of Ο. the Butler ESU? 17 18 Α. Yes. 19 When did you first learn about the July 13th event? 20 21 I think the initial -- July 5th I got a 22 message from Bravo Team Leader that Butler Township -- he works for Butler Township 23

weren't yet at that point -- as ESU, we were not contacted, but we were told that that's whenever he was coming, or we were told that he was coming on July 13th. That was the first I heard that he was coming.

- Q. Was the one to communicate that to you?
  - A. Correct.

- Q. Was there any detail at that point about what you would be doing?
  - A. No, ma'am.
- Q. Were there any meetings or walkthroughs to prepare for the rally that you participated in in advance of the event?
- A. The only walkthrough we did was at the farm show grounds. I believe that was on the 10th or 11th. I think the 10th.
  - O. 10th.
- A. 10th or 11th. I can't remember what day it was. But, yeah, we did a walkthrough with -- well, Secret Service had contacted our commander, then, you know, myself and a few others from the team were on-site, and then met up with the head element of Secret Service.

There was like a -- it was a big group

of us, but that was about it. I mean, it was -- we 1 2 did our own walkthrough. We didn't -- we weren't taken around by Secret Service. Nothing like that. 3 It was -- we all met. We all got kind of 4 introduced to the few Secret Service people that 5 were there, and that was it. Like they kind of 6 7 went there own way, and then we kind of did our own walkthrough by ourselves without Secret Service 8 9 present. 10 Do you recall the names of the agents you 0. 11 spoke with at the Secret Service? There was three that -- I can't remember --12 Α. 13 I can never remember the third one. I know there , and then there was a third 14 female, blonde hair, but I can't recall her last 15 16 name. When you say "we" of those who broke off 17 and did your own walkthrough, who is that "we"? 18 Command staff of Butler ESU. 19 2.0 Q. Could you recall the particular 21 individuals? So Commander , commander , or 22 23 Deputy Commander , Deputy Commander 24 , Bravo Team Leader , Sniper

. I believe that was it.

- Prior to breaking off, what did they tell 1 0. 2 you to be looking for at your walkthrough? The only thing I was told -- I wasn't told 3 I was told like later on that we were 4 basically to be out of sight, so we had to somehow 5 get our armored vehicles for the assault teams like 6 7 in the buildings or something of that nature. That's all I was told. 8 Was it clear at that point that you were to 9 10 perform counter assault responsibilities? 11 Α. At that point, yeah, I knew my job Yes. 12 description, but I just didn't know where to put 13 the vehicles yet. 14 I'm going to introduce 15 Majority Exhibit 1 for the record. This is a map 16 of the Butler Farm Show grounds. 17 BY Sir, if you can with the pen that you have 18 19 with you, could you draw the walkthrough that you 20 took with your colleagues on that day? And if you 21 can, denoting the start point and the end point. (Marking document.) Do you have a marker 22 Α.
  - A. You could see it, but it's just very thin.

- Q. You can see it? Okay. That's fine. Thank you. During that walkthrough, were you able to establish or were you and the group able to establish what assets you needed in order to accomplish your job for that day?
- A. Yes. The assets were already -- like, we already knew what was coming. So, like I said, my job for counter assault was two armor vehicles and then two counter assault teams. So I knew Beaver County ESU was coming for one, and then I had ours for the second one.
- Q. How many people were in the counter assault team based on your understanding at that time?
  - A. Twelve.

- Q. Twelve. Per team?
- A. Six per team.
- Q. Six per team. And was one vehicle assigned to each team?
  - A. Correct; yeah. The Butler -- so CAT Team

    1, which was over with me at Building 16 behind the

    stage, since we were at the main element, I was

    stationed there with that vehicle. We had six

    personnel in that vehicle, not counting myself.

- And then the Beaver team was -- I can't remember now. Five, six -- six personnel, and they were over by Building 3, their vehicle.
  - Q. Sir, would you mind noting on the map which building is Building 16 and which building is Building 3?
    - A. (Marking document.)
  - Q. Thank you. Did you participate in any other meetings or walkthroughs in preparation for the rally before Saturday?
    - A. No, ma'am.

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- Q. At the conclusion of that walkthrough, is it fair to say you established that you would be behind Building -- you and your team would be behind Building 16, a counter assault team, and then the other counter assault team would be behind Building 3?
- A. Yeah. We were in Building 3 and Building 16, so, yes.
  - Q. I'd like to go to the morning of July 13 at this point. Did Butler County ESU host a briefing?
    - A. Yes, ma'am.
- Q. Were you a part of that briefing?
- A. Yes, ma'am.
- 25 Q. Do you recall who else attended?

It was all the local Butler 1 Α. Well, yes. 2 ESU, the Beaver ESU guys, the Washington County SWAT members that were there. I know there was 3 some -- Butler Township, the sheriff, Butler 4 Like all the local elements were in the 5 Sheriff. 6 briefing. 7 I'll now introduce into the record Majority Exhibit 2. 8 This is the Butler ESU Donald J. Trump Detail. 9 10 BY 11 Does this look familiar to you? Q. 12 Α. Um-hum. It's our Op plan. Is this an Op plan that you received during 13 the July 13th briefing? 14 15 I'm assuming it is. Α. 16 Please feel free to take your time to look 0. 17 through it. (Witness reviews document.) Yeah, it looks 18 19 to be that same brief. 20 Q. Did you only ever receive one Op plan that 21 day? 22 Yeah. I received one via e-mail whenever 23 the mission was -- when the plan was finished --24 not finalized but finished, just for us to review

was given out the day of the briefing. 1 2 Approximately what time did you review that finished but not final version of the plan? 3 4 I believe it was the night prior. The 5 12th, maybe. Do you recall whether your role was 6 0. 7 different between that finished but not final e-mail and --8 No, ma'am. 9 Α. 10 Ο. -- and the --Same role. 11 Α. Same role. 12 Q. At any point had you been 13 assigned to work -- to be listed as driving the 14 UTV? 15 As for the Α. 16 Is the UTV associated with the 0. Correct. 17 Α. 18 Q. Then yeah. 19 Α. No. 20 Q. To your understanding, at every point in 21 preparation for the rally, you were assigned to the 22 counter assault team; is that correct? Now, I did drive the UTV a couple 23 Correct. 24 points during the morning of just to get logistical

stuff in place, but it wasn't during the rally

- itself. Like once I was -- once everything started, I was by the -- my counter assault team the rest of the time.
  - Q. How would you describe your role in using the UTV if it's not what you would describe as your main job that day?
  - A. What do you mean? I'm not tracking here. I took the ATV or the UTV, whatever, the four seater, to over to the CAT team. Two, make sure they were good, if they needed anything, and then drove back.
- 12 Q. It was a means of transportation. Is that 13 the --
  - A. Correct.
    - Q. Is that a good way of describing it?
- 16 A. Yes.

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- Q. About what time did you post for your role in the counter assault team?
- A. Everyone was post up by -- everybody was, like, basically ready to go by 1100. I was in Building 16 basically after the briefing.
- Q. When you say "in," do you mean that you were physically inside --
  - A. Inside Building 16.
- Q. -- the building?

A. Yes.

- Q. Does that include the vehicle?
- A. Negative, no. The building -- the vehicle was parked -- the vehicle was parked behind Building 16, but the operators were in Building 16.
- Q. What did you understand your role to be? When would you activate in order to perform your counter assault responsibilities?
- A. So our job, the way it was explained to us from Secret Service, is that the CAT teams were to only deploy if there was a coordinated attack on the presidential candidate.
  - Q. Did they define coordinated attack?
  - A. Not to me, they did not.
- Q. I don't mean to get too far ahead, but would the shooting that took place later that day have fallen within that definition or understanding of a coordinated attack?
  - A. No, ma'am.
    - Q. Why would that be?
- A. Because that's basically a -- well, I mean, it could have turned into that, if it was a rude or something like that. But, no, that was a single actor, basically an active shooter. So that wasn't. A coordinated attack would be more so

multiple personnel, vehicles or whatever attacking the stage or, you know, whatever. Like attacking the presidential candidate.

- Q. Thank you. I'd like to flip to the page for "Execution" in the Execution -- excuse me, in the "Operations Plan" for Majority Exhibit 2. It's accurate to say that your sector of responsibility was Building 16; correct?
  - A. Correct.

- Q. Thank you. And I'm correct in understanding that there were two counter assault teams and one team --
  - A. Correct.
- Q. -- on the day of the rally. Was there a Secret Service agents or agent attached -- for the lack of a better word -- to your counter assault team?
- A. No, ma'am.
  - Q. Are you aware of any Secret Service agents attached to either the other counter assault team or the team?
  - A. Neither on both. Yeah, neither of them had any Secret Service.
- Q. Did you have any responsibilities, you, meaning the counter assault team, have any

- responsibilities besides responding to a 1 2 multi-prong attack? As far as a counter assault team? 3 4 Ο. Yes. 5 Α. No. 6 Q. Was there any meeting with -- did you 7 attend any meeting with the Secret Service before you posted for your event at 1100 hours? 8 No, ma'am. 9 Α. 10 Are you aware of any meeting between Secret Ο. 11 Service and local law enforcement? 12 Α. No, ma'am. 13 I'd like to return to the "Operations 14 Plan, and the page for "Command and Control." 15 Operations Plan lists frequencies. Is it correct 16 to say that you were on the OPS 4 frequency? 17 Α. Yes, ma'am. Are you listening to any other channel at 18 any point during the day? 19 2.0 Α. No, ma'am. 21 Could you describe what A-1 means? 0. 22 Α. Alpha-1. That's my call sign.

No, ma'am.

with Secret Service on your radio?

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Did you have any ability to communicate

Had you received any means to communicate 1 Ο. 2 with Secret Service that day? Not the Secret Service, no, ma'am, but I 3 4 know we -- I know our commander offered radios to Secret Service which, from my understanding, no one 5 ever came to retrieve them. 6 7 Had you heard that from someone? Ο. 8 Yes, my commander. 9 Your commander. Do you know the agent to 0. 10 whom he made that offer? 11 No, ma'am. Α. 12 0. Do you know at approximately what time he 13 made the offer? 14 Α. No, ma'am. 15 Were you aware that Butler County Emergency Q. 16 Services provided a trailer for Butler ESU, Butler Sheriff's Office, and Butler EMS to monitor 17 communications? 18 19 Our Command Post? 20 Q. To my understanding, yes, that would be 21 your Command Post. 22 Α. I mean, I'm sorry, what was your Yes.

For the sake and convenience -- I'll call

Did I know they gave it? Yes.

knew we had that asset, yes.

it a trailer. What role did it play in your work?

- A. So a Command Post -- obviously, the Command Post is where our commander and the hired staff will be to monitor the entire area of operation, and then also for communication purposes as far as like radios or like that, those kind of things.
- Q. Were you aware that Secret Service had its own Command Post?
- A. Not until that day, yeah, that I found out that they had their own Command Post up at the main office building of the farm show grounds.
- Q. Do you recall at what point that day you learned that information?
- A. Not the exact time. I'm assuming it was during the briefing, the 0915 briefing.
- Q. Were you ever instructed to contact the Secret Service Command Post under any circumstance?
  - A. No, ma'am.
- Q. Had you ever at any point heard reports of a suspicious person?
- A. Yes.

- Q. When?
- A. I don't know the exact time. I would say it was like -- so my time -- so I kind of lost track of time whenever they said Trump was running

late. Our understanding was that he was to be there at 1620, do some meet and greets till 1700. Go on stage at 1700, speak for 75 minutes, and then be out of there at 1815. So once he was late, my mental clock kind of went.

As far as time hacks go, it was somewhere like probably between 1600 and, like, 1620, somewhere in that ballpark where one of my operators -- well, actually, he wasn't my team member on the team, but he was assigned to the team, Officer. He's the one that brought to my attention that there was a few guys on the side -- outside the perimeter that were just acting weird. Nothing was going on. It was just the way they were acting around the property owner who kept coming by to kind of chase them off the fence line. He made me aware of that. Like I said, it was shortly after 1600.

But, again, at that point it was nothing criminal or suspicious. It was just they were just kind of acting weird. They were running from this way. Then when he'd come back up this way, he would push that guy that way and then this guy would come back up. Like they were playing cat and mouse with the property owner.

1 If I may ask, what building or property are you referring? 2 3 : AGR Building. SGT. 4 BY5 was referring to multiple individuals acting suspiciously? 6 7 Correct; yeah. At that point we had a gray Α. shirt -- which later on turned out to be the 8 shooter -- a red shirt, and a yellow shirt. Hibis 9 10 That's how we described them. Had those all emerged as -- had reports of 11 Q. 12 those individuals emerged around the same time? Yes, ma'am. To me, yes. 13 Α. To you. 14 0. 15 Yeah. Α. And you only learned about these because 16 Ο. 17 verbally communicated these to you? Yes, ma'am. Yes. So he was over there 18 Α. 19 with me at Building 16. Like I said, he was part 20 of the team. So he would have been one of 21 those guys on that UTV. If they needed to respond, 22 that's the vehicle they would use. 23 So I was positioned at Building 16 24 pretty much all day. But, like I said, every now 25 and again I would leave that area to do logistical

things or, you know, meet up with Deputy Commander

for this, or, you know. A few times I had

to leave that position just to go do something for,

you know, admin reasons. But when I came back the

one time, that's whenever Officer pulled me

aside. He goes, "Hey, I got this going on."

Like I said, at that point, he was like,
"He's acting weird," that kind of stuff, you know.

I was like, "All right. Just keep eyes." That
wasn't even his job to do so. He just took it upon
himself. He seen it, observed it.

Q. "He" being ?

- A. Yes. He observed it. Didn't like it.

  Went and got binoculars on his own and just started watching the situation, you know, on his own accord, basically. I'm like, "All right. Just keep eyes on and just let me know of anything" -- "if it ramps up at all."
  - Q. Why did he tell you?
- A. Because, as I said, they were acting just not like everybody else. Everybody else was kind of like hanging on the fence, just kind of watching, and these guys are just kind of like -- they were like back and forth with, like I said, the property owner. They weren't acting right

around him.

Then gray shirt, which ended up being Crooks later, he was more so towards the fence and then back away. Come towards the fence and back away. Nothing was in his hands at that point.

Like I -- we never -- like, me, I never saw a range finder. I never saw anything in his hands. I saw him for a few minutes when he first pointed him out to me. I'm like, "All right. Keep eyes on," and then he disappeared, and I never saw him again until later.

- Q. Were you able to see him without the aid of any kind of visual enhancers? Him, being either gray shirt, red shirt, or yellow shirt?
- A. Yes. Yeah, we were approximately 100, 105 meters away, which is roughly 115 yards.

## 18 BY :

- Q. Just to clarify, between Building 16 and the AGR Building?
- A. Yes. So where I was standing would have been in front of Building 16, maybe 50 feet in front of the building. Yeah.
  - Q. Facing the crowd?
  - A. Facing the AGR Building -- like facing the

AGR Building where like the shooter was, I was approximately 100, 105 meters away. Is that what you're asking?

- Q. Yes, sir. Thank you. So at your post at Building 16, you were located outside Building 16, and you could see AGR from your post.
  - A. Yes, sir.

- Q. And you could see at the time that Officer said that there were guys on the perimeter of the AGR Building acting weird, you could identify --
- A. On the fence line, yeah. Officer , he was there with me at Building 16.
- Q. Do you recall around what time that communication between you and Officer --
- A. The original? Like I said, it was sometime like shortly after 1600, 1620, 1615. I'm not real -- I don't know the exact time, but he says, "Hey, I got this going on." Like I didn't timestamp it. You know what I mean? But somewhere in that -- a little after 1600. I'd say probably before 1630, but I wouldn't say quite 1630 yet.
- Q. Can you describe for us your identification of other suspicious individuals or the same suspicious individuals for the remainder of the

day?

- A. I'm not sure what you're asking. What do you mean?
- Q. So after you had that initial contact with Officer about the suspicious individuals, did those suspicious individuals come up again during the event?
- was very tuned in on them. He just kept -- like wouldn't -- didn't stop watching them. And then we -- again, all those times. At one point, we were talking about -- we went over to the trooper and tried to get the trooper to go over and see what was going on, try to talk to him, but he wasn't supposed to leave his post. He was only one person. He does eventually go over and try talking to him.

A female deputy sheriff comes over eventually. He meets up with us outside the fence, and we talked to her with that trooper. They both go over at one point. You know, because at this point we're tying to get somebody over there to interact with these individuals, you know, see what's going on.

Now, at this point, the gray shirt guy,

he's like -- Crooks is gone. I don't see him again until later. Well, when everything, you know, pumps off. So as far as the red shirt and yellow shirt, again, they just keep -- they're just up and down the fence line. The red shirt, his phone was constantly recording. Once it got to a certain time, I'd say probably -- I don't even know how long. Definitely after 1700. He just kept recording, kept recording. Looked like he was watching us, for the most part. It didn't even look like he was watching the rally. It looked like he was more so recording us.

But as far as the suspicious stuff goes, they were just kind of back and forth, I guess. So the property owner come over. He'd go after the one person; they would take off one direction. The other guy would come back up, then he'd go back down that way to talk to that other guy, like red shirt. Red shirt would run -- no, that was yellow shirt. Yellow shirt would run down -- that would be -- what direction would that be? East. He would run, like, east, and then probably when he'd come back up to this guy, he'd run west on the fence line.

That was the whole makeup of that

suspicious activity with the red shirt and yellow shirt. Like I said, at this point, gray shirt -- I saw him about three, four minutes and then he was gone. I never saw him again.

- Q. But you did see gray shirt again, Crooks again. What happened when you saw Crooks again?
- A. That would have been at, obviously, 1811.

  So roughly about 1811, our -- again, we kept asking

  -- I might as well just go right in. It kind of

  matches up.

So finally we get a couple cruisers to go over there, like township officers. A couple guys exit their vehicle, and this is probably 1810, 18 -- not quite that late. I don't know a good time. 1807, somewhere in that ballpark, a couple cruisers come up. So one officer walks in front of the building, like on my side in between me and that AGR Building, the building that the shooter was on. Went around. Another officer pulled in then and took this -- so they were basically -- they were kind of like cat and mouse.

I couldn't hear anything. I couldn't hear verbal. I couldn't hear yelling, shouting.

It was just all visual. I just see them bouncing back and forth on each side, like looking for

something. I couldn't hear "Roof." Couldn't hear people screaming, you know, "He's on the roof."

Couldn't hear any of that stuff. At this point, I don't think he -- he wasn't on that building at this point. But then at 1811, that's whenever we hear over the net that "On the roof," and then I hear our commander call for -- deploy

So at that point, Officer is still with me. I tell him, I'm like, "Hey, go, go, go."

So he takes off. I do an eye-to-eye contact with the team leader. I tell him to go. I'm like, "Hey, go, go, go. So Officer runs over, jumps in the UTV, they take off.

Seconds after that is whenever the first three shots were fired. So I hear the first three, "Crack, crack, crack." And at this point I'm like, "Okay, where we at here?" I happen to look up, and that's when I see Crooks. I got his head, his shoulders, and I could see a rifle.

At that point, I hear another crack.

That's when I start pulling my weapon up. He gets three off. As I'm getting my -- as I'm acquiring my target, like I'm getting my red dot up, I can see the gas emit from his barrel, his muzzle. Then right after that I hear the snap of his fifth shot

go off. Then immediately after that, I press one off, and that's whenever he immediately goes down.

When I say he goes down, it wasn't like he was ducking to get out of the way. I mean, like, I know I hit him. Like there's no doubt about it. He goes down. He kind of jerks to the right, and then he kind of slumps over slowly and then kind of slowly rolls backwards out of my field of view.

So at that point, I did not have a second shot. At that point, he tries to recover. I could see like the very top of his head. So on my target, too, like, I had obviously his head and the upper part of his shoulders. I tried to aim for the lower part of his head so it gave me more room to work with if I did pull a shot -- up, down, left, right. I didn't want to send the round over his head, obviously, into wherever. I'd rather shoot low on him and, you know, worst case scenario hit the roof. Either skip it up or, you know, get him down below. Throat, mouth, you know.

But in this case, I -- like I said, though, when I hit, he kind of like jerked to the right, and then he slowly rolled out of my field of view. So I could see the top of his head still

kind of bouncing around like that. Not enough for me to -- I mean, very, very small amount. Like a quarter inch, half inch of -- you know, I could see of his head. Not enough for me to take a shot.

So he's starting to recover. Now I'm up about the forehead, about the eyes, nose. I'm like, "All right, come on, come on, come on, come on." I'm just -- I'm standing. I'm not on anything. I'm in the middle of the field waiting, waiting, waiting. That's about roughly ten seconds after I engaged.

That's whenever I hear the crack of the Secret Service sniper rifle go off next to me, because they were up -- they were just up -- right up -- so where I was standing, I had a team on Building 16, which is our building. I had two guys up on top of the Building 16 and then two buildings down behind the stage was the second team.

I originally thought it was the team to my right, so if I'm -- I'm on him, Crooks drops, and then I wait a couple seconds. He did not recover, so I made a handoff signal. I yelled up to the Secret Service guy. I'm like, "Hey, good hit. Good hit. Confirmed." And then -- he didn't say anything. We made eye contact, and that was

Then I turned and went back to work. I was 1 it. 2 doing other stuff. I was helping civilians and that kind of stuff. 3 But I also know, like -- and then -- I 4 5 knew I hit him, too, because, like I said, you know, I'm prior service military, so I have combat 6 7 experience. His demeanor was not -- like, he was definitely disrupted or hit, you know. 8 wasn't like him getting out of the way. He wasn't 9 10 ducking, trying to reposition. Like he went down. 11 And then, like I said, about ten seconds later, Secret Service then put the end shot on. 12 13 Um-hum. Thank you, 14 I want to note that we're at time 15 for Majority during our first --16 Sure, but I'm happy to -if there's more while we're speaking on this. 17 know it's difficult, so if you'd like to continue 18 19 your train of thought, I'm happy to have you --: Oh, no. I mean, 20 SGT. 21 Whatever you guys need. 22 : If it's okay with you, we'd 23 like to ask a few questions and continue for a 24 short time. 25 Sure. Go ahead.

And we'll afford the same 1 2 time to you all. 3 Thank you. 4 BY 5 What kind of weapon were you using that day? 6 7 It's an AR-15 M4 style rifle, 556. Α. Do you remember the rounds that you used 8 0. 9 that day? 10 Yes, sir. So I load 28 in my magazine. That was 28 in a 30-round mag. It's just something 11 12 that we had always done in the service, because if 13 you load it with 30, you can get double feeds. So 14 we always load our mag with 28. Then I alternate my rounds. So I run two bonded and then a hollow 15 16 point. Two bonded, hollow point. So, actually, when I end with 28, it's a bonded, hollow point, 17 and then my -- so my first shot is a bonded round. 18 19 So the first round I shot, engaged him with, would

- Q. Thank you, sir.
- A. Um-hum.

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Q. How many total shots did you fire at Crooks?

have been a Hornady TAP Barrier 62gr round.

A. One, sir.

Q. Can you describe again Crooks' reaction after you fired your shot?

A. Yeah. So, again, when I saw the top of -the gas coming from his rifle, I heard the snap. I
engaged. I pressed one. And then if you can try
to, I guess, imagine, like -- so up on that rooftop
you see like a head, some shoulders. And then I -you know, he's on the rifle; okay. He's in the
prone position. On an elevated position.

I was slightly -- so if I'm -- if I'm Crooks and straight ahead is the candidate, I was kind of like off to his 11 o'clock. So I was kind of angled on him. So he wasn't -- he wasn't directly over me, but it was just off to like 11, 11:30-ish, if you're looking at a clock, you know.

So when I engaged, again, from the angle, it hit his low right. So he -- I could see his body twitch, and then, like I said, he slowly, like, collapsed over to the right. I'm like, "Okay, good. I got him." Throat, neck, something, shoulder. You know, whatever. And, like I said, he kind of rolled up. It looked like he was trying to recover. He was struggling. I'm like, okay, you know, maybe it was his neck. Maybe it was his shoulder. He was having a hard time coming back

up.

You know, he wasn't trying to reposition, because if he would reposition, he just would have got down and moved, you know. But he wasn't doing that. He was trying to like -- it seemed like he was trying to, like, push himself up on his shoulders or whatever, his arms. And, obviously, if it was hit, you know, you're not going to be able to move real good, you know, pushing on your right shoulder if your right shoulder is hit. But, yeah, that was -- that was that.

## EXAMINATION

BY:

Q. Thank you, sir, for recounting that. I have a few follow-up questions based on my colleagues' questions. Sorry to go back in time a

bit, but just trying to walk through this entire chronology.

A. Um-hum.

- Q. So as I understand, you first found out that Mr. Trump would be visiting the Butler Farm Show grounds on July 5th, and you heard that from a message you received from Bravo Team Leader
- . In that first notification, did you understand that you would be working that event, or was that just an awareness that this --
  - A. Yeah.
  - Q. -- campaign event was happening?
- A. Yes, ma'am. So, yeah. We had -- that was not for us, that was for -- so with with Butler Township. So Butler Township -- Lt. got contacted that he was coming. Then just put it out to us as command staff for the team. He said, "Hey, he is coming. This is the date." We got notified. Just be prepared. We're probably going to get, you know, mobilized or deployed, as far as the team goes. But that was not for ESU. That was just a heads-up from Butler Township.
  - Q. Do you know who contacted Butler Township?
- A. No, ma'am.

- Ο. Do you know if was in direct contact with U.S. Secret Service about the event? I don't know that at all, huh-uh. Ο. You mentioned that there was a walkthrough on either July 10th or July 11th. I'm not sure which date in particular. At that point, I think I understood you to say that Secret Service had contacted your commander. Would that be Commander 3 Yes, ma'am. Α. then starts bringing the team Q. together, and at that meeting, you met with members of Secret Service. If I understood you correctly, you did your own walkthrough after meeting with Secret Service but didn't actually walk the grounds with Secret Service; is that correct? Yes, ma'am. I don't know if you have that Α. map still in front of you. 0. Sure. Α. So I guess for everyone's, I guess, knowledge, so if we start -- so like here's this building right here.
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24 No, I'm sorry, this building right here. My apologies.

Q. For the record, we're looking at a building that is -- how would we identify this? You've marked it earlier.

- A. That's the starting point. Yeah. So this is the building where Secret Service -- I believe, Secret Service and PSP were for their CP, like their Command Post. Do you see that? It would have been -- yeah, that building right here. So that's where -- that building right there is where we met Secret Service; okay?
- Q. And what type of building is that? Do you know?
- A. This building here? It's just like a white farm office building, whatever, that the farm should have.
  - O. Just part of that farm show grounds.
- A. Yeah. So that's where we -- so we all parked down here at Brady Paul. That's where our -- roughly the area where our CP was. We walked up here. Like I said, this is where all the Secret Service, I'm assuming state police -- all the department heads were, I guess, for this meeting, this walkthrough. That's where we were introduced to , and then, like I said, I can never remember their last name, that female's name. I

can picture her, but I don't know her name.

So we all hung out there for, I don't know, 20, 25 minutes, just kind of like -- everyone was just kind of like just talking, "Hey, this is happening," whatever, you know. Then, finally, people started breaking off. Like some people went this way. Some people went that way. Some people when this way.

and that blonde lady and then a couple guys, they started walking towards -- so, again, this is where we're at. They start walking towards the entrance. So they walked up here and then they made a right. Well, actually, they stopped here first. So we followed them first. We thought, "Okay, this is going to be our walkthrough." They made a right here. They came down to these -- like whatever these are here. I'm not sure what these -- there were some food trailers there, like vendors. Not set up, just sitting there for like -- not storage, but they were just there for, I guess, a place to just kind of keep them out of the way for the farm show. They started talking about them.

So the two gentlemen and then the two -I'm assuming they were Secret Service as well. I

don't know. But the two female Secret Service agents and then the two males were talking about those -- where're the food trucks going to go. I know there were food trucks going to be on the grounds. We were told that. Not that it had any meaning to us. But they started, like, "Okay, hey, where are the food trucks going?" So they started like calling everybody about where the food trucks were going to be placed during this event.

After about ten minutes of that, them on the phone, there was myself and three others from the team that broke off from our main group here.

I'm like, "We'll just go with them and see what this is all about." After they talked about food trucks for like ten minutes, I'm like, "I'm done here." So the four of us left and came back up to our group here at the main gate. That's where that SP -- the start point, and that's where we started.

We sat there for another five minutes talking. No one else came up to us. We did have a Secret Service sniper with us. I believe he was the TL, the team lead, but he had no -- he did not know what we were doing. He had no idea what the CAT team -- not that he didn't know what the CAT team's job was, but had no, I guess, information

for us, where we were going to be placed or where they wanted us. Nothing like that. So we ended up -- he walked with us, but had no -- he didn't say anything about the mission, you know. So at that point, then we all started walking again like this way toward Building 3 -- I'm sorry, this road up here. Came back down. Came up this way.

- Q. Building 3, I recall is -- I think where you said that Beaver --
- A. Yeah, that's where CAT Team 2 was, which was the Beaver armor.
- Q. Because I didn't see it very well earlier, where is 16 where you would be?
  - A. Then we traveled this way around the pond, and then Building 16 was -- yep.
  - Q. Thank you. In that first, I think, the 20, 25-minute briefing where you're all together --
    - A. I wouldn't call it a briefing, but --
  - Q. What would you call it then?
    - A. A gaggle.

- Q. What was discussed in the gaggle?
- A. Nothing really. I mean, there was really nothing discussed. As far as -- I mean, I know as far as I was concerned, nothing was discussed.
- Now, our commander did go over with a couple people

off the side, so I'm sure something was talked about there.

- Q. There were people, meaning Secret Service?
- A. I have no idea. All I know is they called the commander over. He went over there with a handful of people. Whether it was Secret Service -- I'm assuming it was department heads of everybody -- I'm assuming -- that met with some Secret Service, but, again, I wasn't -- I wasn't over there, so I don't know who was all over there or what was discussed.

But, yeah. Then, obviously, our commander came back to us, and that's whenever we kind of started off and took it upon ourselves to do our own walkthrough.

- Q. You took it upon yourselves to do this walkthrough. At that point you knew that you were being called upon to be a counter assault team; is that correct?
  - A. Yes, ma'am.
- Q. What were your concerns? What were you looking for that prompted you to do your own walkthrough?
- A. So as far as -- so for the counter assault team, like, I'm looking for, obviously, coordinated

attacks. I want to be able to have a clear line of, like, to infil or exfil our vehicles, you know, to get guys there and then, obviously, to get whoever out, if need be, you know. So that was my main thing. Then, obviously, as a whole, you know, we were looking for, like, soft -- like, you know, soft spots like where there could be potential hazards or, you know, that could be easily compromised, you know. So we kept eyes out for those as well.

- Q. Did you identify any soft spots or hazards in your walkthrough?
- A. Yes, ma'am. So, actually, that whole -- like this whole corridor like -- so, again, you come outside the fence line. This whole AGR area we said that we didn't like.
- Q. And this AGR area, just to be clear on the map, is sort of below the -- maybe you could mark it on the original exhibit, if you don't mind.
- A. (Marking document.) So basically everything outside that fence line.
  - Q. Um-hum.

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A. And then like -- so what we would have liked to have seen was that -- like this right here, this is Whitetown Road, and this is Meridian

Road, and this is 68. So, like, what we wanted to see was actually this part of Whitetown that connected Meridian to 68 to be shut off -- shut down. Then this whole entire AGR Building or AGR property to be like -- basically, like locked down. You know, you don't necessarily have to, like, tape it off, but, like, put units out throughout that property. At least the fence line.

And I know -- I don't who, and I'm not going to speculate, but I know it was put up and we were told that, like, "We'll take care of it."

That "The Secret Service will be able to take care of it." Then we were also told that there was going to be, I guess, like, black fabric, like landscaping paper or fabric paper put up on the fence line so people wouldn't be attracted to the fence, so they couldn't see through it, and that never happened.

- Q. Did you, personally, raise that concern about the AGR complex to Secret Service, or do you know who did?
- A. I don't know who did, no. I know one of the snipers did. I know -- it was . I know he did. He told them -- because there was also like a little valley right here, so like -- you

can't see it here with this map. But like in this area right here (marking document), it's like a little valley, kind of like. It's like a little --

O. Where this water tower is?

- A. Yeah. If you go, like, more so like at an angle, like -- like this way (marking document), it's a little -- like a little -- you wouldn't call it a valley, but it's a little -- you know, and --
  - Q. The landscaping sort of slopes down there.
- A. Correct. And it would be -- and there was a blind spot, too. Like the way everyone was facing, somebody could easily come up from that side. And, you know, at that time, too, the stage wasn't built, so we didn't know really where the stage was going to go. So we were like, hey, depending on where it's going to go, somebody could come up through there and, you know, either, if they do have a gun, take a shot, or somehow some way do something without us even maybe knowing about it.
- Q. Do you know who at Secret Service said that they had this covered?
  - A. No, ma'am.
- Q. Did you have an understanding of what that would mean that they had it covered?

- A. No. No, I have no idea.
- Q. Do you have any understanding of who selected this site?
  - A. No, I have no idea.

- Q. Any understanding of who set the perimeter?
- A. I'm assuming Secret Service did.
- Q. Earlier you mentioned that I think

  Pennsylvania State Police were perhaps in the room

  at some point. I don't want to misstate that.

  What were your interactions with Pennsylvania State

  Police?
- A. I had no interaction with state police. I just know that there was PSP on-site. I don't know how many. Then the only thing I knew of was that PSP was to -- anything, like, if there was like a fight or anything that was going on as far as like outside of like an active shooter or coordinated attack, like if there was a fight -- any kind of disturbance outside of like attempt on the former president, PSP was to handle it. So if there was a fight, then PSP would go out. Uniformed officers would go out and interact, not tactical officers.
  - Q. So sort of a more traditional patrol --
  - A. Correct.
  - O. -- function?

- A. As far as PSP, that's what I understood their job was. The only PSP I saw was, again, the officer or the trooper that was right outside that fence line to where we were that was on a -- they were on the post.
- Q. And I do want to come back to that trooper, but --
- A. Yeah. He would have been posted right -he would have been posted right at the corner of
  this fence (marking document).
- Q. And would you like to mark it on that version of the exhibit, please.
  - A. Yeah. (Marking document.)

- Q. And I believe you said there was perhaps a sheriff deputy.
- A. Yeah. I don't know where she was originally. I want to say she was down here in a car and then she drove over to him later, but I don't know where she was posted at. But, eventually, though, she does drive up to the trooper's vehicle, and I do make contact with her.
- Q. Okay. I do want to come back to that, but
  I don't want to take us too far out of the
  chronology. Staying on that pre July 13th meeting,
  I think you mentioned either there or later you

would told to be out of sight. Who told you that?

A. So our commander was told that from Secret Service. Now, that was later debunked by another Secret Service agent. So when we did our walkthrough and our setup -- and that's how we picked Building 3 and Building 16, was to be out of sight, out of mind. Okay, that's how we -- we were under the understanding that that's what they wanted.

As we were leaving the walkthrough, our commander made contact with -- or someone made contact with our commander, being that third agent that I don't remember her name, the blonde. She asked the same thing. She goes -- and our commander told her, "Well, we were told to be out of sight, out of mind." And she said, "Who told you that?" And we couldn't -- our commander, he didn't know who told him that, either, because I think that came from the original briefing that was down in Pittsburgh. I think it was down in Pittsburgh. I there. I know and went to that.

- Q. So this is a separate briefing from the July 10th, July 11th walkthrough?
  - A. Correct. I was not there, so I don't know.

But believe that's where that information came from, to be out of sight, out of mind. But don't quote me on that; that would be something for the other guys. But that other agent that I don't know the name of, she then told our commander, "No, that's not true. We don't want you out of sight, out of mind. We just want you out of sight of the media." Like, "We don't want guns and armor and all this stuff right in the line of " -- "Like if we're shooting Trump with the cameras, we don't want you guys to be plastered, you know, behind him or whatever. We just want you out of sight of the I guess that's what they meant. But, I don't know. We stayed where we originally picked.

- Q. You said that you picked the sites. Did --
- A. We did, yeah. We did.

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- Q. You picked the two sites for your counter assault team. Did Secret Service have any comment on where those would be? Did they approve it in any way?
  - A. Not that I'm aware of, no.
- Q. How did you make Secret Service aware that those were your site selections?
  - A. I'm assuming the commander did.
- Q. The third agent who I know you said is a

woman, blonde hair. Might her name have been

A. Yeah, that's it. Yep. Yep.

- Q. There we go. Thank you for that. You also mentioned that you knew what assets were coming at the time of this meeting. What does that mean, what assets were coming?
- A. Well, support assets. So, basically, we knew that we had the sniper element from Washington. I knew I had a counter assault team coming from Beaver, an armored truck coming from Beaver. That's -- those are assets.
- Q. And who determined what assets would be on-site that day?
  - A. The commander.
- Q. Again, did he communicate that, to your knowledge, with Secret Service?
- A. Yes. So the Secret Service, again, to my knowledge, obviously contacted our command, requested two sniper teams and two counter assault teams. We ended up giving them two counter assault teams, three sniper teams, and then other assets to be available. We gave them extra medics. We gave them more than what they wanted or what they requested.

- Q. Had you ever worked a similar event either generally, a presidential rally, a large campaign event before?
  - A. I have not, no, ma'am.
- Q. Have you worked any other events at this particular site, the farm ground?
  - A. No, ma'am.

- Q. Between the time of the July 11th walkthrough and the event, do you recall receiving any other sort of operational plan? I know we've talked about this Butler ESU Detail Plan, which we'll come back to in a moment. Anything else that you received in terms of maps or other law enforcement operational plans?
- A. No, ma'am. The day of is whenever I got my maps, my aerials. So no maps prior as far as Op plans, no.
- Q. You've spoken about a few different tactical elements. We've got counter assault teams, we've got the we've got snipers. Are you all coordinating to figure out your positions?
- A. Yeah. I mean, snipers kind of did their own -- and, like, not that they did their own thing, but they have a totally different mission than us. They got to have eyes on the crowd.

Okay, so our snipers and just -- so we have snipers. Just so we're clear, we do not have counter snipers.

- Q. Thanks for that clarification. What is the difference between a sniper and a counter sniper?
- A. Snipers are going to -- so whenever our snipers are deployed, like in our world here, they're on the offense. They're looking at the objective. They're looking at the bad guy already. We already know the bad guy's in here. You know, they may be looking to get that shot or just gathering intel.

Counter sniper is where you're basically facing out trying to find other snipers that are trying to engage into the -- you know, into the AL. So, basically, you have a basic counter sniper that you're trying to find other snipers before they find you or they find -- you know, they get their target. Like, you know, in this case it would have been the candidate.

- Q. And I believe earlier you mentioned that there were some counter snipers there that day from U.S. Secret Service?
- A. Correct. There was two counter sniper -two counter assault sniper teams from Secret

Service; correct.

- Q. Did any other law enforcement agencies provide counter snipers?
  - A. No, ma'am.
- Q. When did you become aware that Secret Service would provide counter snipers?
  - A. I don't remember the exact date.
- Q. Was it before the day of the event on July 13th?
- A. Yes. Because we were told prior to -- I don't know where this came from. I believe it was counter sniper -- Secret Service sniper to our sniper, but, basically -- or it could have been the commander, I guess. I'm not sure, but it was told to us that this was the first time that the Secret Service was ever deploying counter assault sniper teams for a non-sitting U.S. president.

That's why that kind of -- that,
obviously, raised our awareness more. It's like,
"Whoa, what's going on here? Was there threats
made?" You know. And then we were told that -- we
were told it was, yes, but they were not credible.
Then according to those guys, like the sniper team,
the Secret Service sniper guys, it was like, "This
is like a first for us. We've never been deployed

for something like this."

- Q. And who was involved in that discussion about the potential threat?
  - A. I believe the commander.
- Q. Do you know who from Secret Service said the threats were not credible?
  - A. No, ma'am.
- Q. Earlier you said that you had a concern, others had concerns, about the lack of coverage of the AGR area during your walkthrough. Could the counter snipers' position cover AGR?
- A. Secret Service?
- Q. Yes.
  - A. I was never up on those roofs. I have no idea.
  - Q. Is it possible that that was a response to the concerns raised about the AGR Building, the decision to deploy counter snipers that day?
  - A. Again, I have no idea. I'm not part of the Secret Service. I have no idea.
  - Q. Understood. Did Secret Service or any other agencies deploy counter assault teams, sort of analogs to your team's position, or were you the only counter assault teams that day?
  - A. Was there extra assets -- extra teams?

O. Yes.

- A. No, ma'am. No, there was only -- so Butler

  ESU had command as far as tactical operations.

  Well, I shouldn't say we had command. We fell

  under Secret Service, but we had the command as far

  as like control of boots on the ground. We had two

  counter assault sniper teams, one and then our

  sniper elements.
  - Q. When you say you fell under command of Secret Service, how were they directing your activity?
  - A. Well, this is their -- I mean, this is their mission. We were asked just to assist.
  - Q. So who would have been the point of contact with Secret Service, from your perspective? Are you supposed to be in contact with them?
  - A. Me, personally? No. Our command was.

    Well, I mean, we were supposed to be in contact

    with them. I'm pretty sure he was via phone

    leading up to the day. As far as in charge, I

    believe it was -- I believe was the special

    agent in charge, but I'm not sure.
  - Q. And if they're sort of organizing the event, they're in command, what other assets is the Secret Service providing that day? How would you

describe their role day of?

A. As far as I'm concerned -- as far as I know, they didn't provide. I mean, besides your counter assault -- your counter sniper teams, two of them. The counter assault team that was actually traveling with the president, that didn't show up until, obviously, when he showed up. Then a few -- like I said, there was a handful of plain clothes. I want to say maybe around eight.

I don't know if they were agents -Secret Service agents or they were Homeland
Security Agents, I'm not sure, but they were in
that Building 16 with us. They were there as well,
but they were just kind of -- I don't know, maybe
they were kind of walking around. Like, they
really didn't seem like they had like an actual
mission per se.

I don't know what their mission was. I didn't -- you know, we talked to a few of them just more so like, "Hey, how's it going?" Just kind of -- you know. But they were just kind of in and out of the building like all day. Like two would go out, come back in. I don't know if they were just doing a walkthrough. They'd come back in, a couple other guys would leave.

Q. But fair to say they were visible to you that day.

- A. Oh, yes, ma'am. They were in our building.
- Q. So getting to July 13th, I believe you said you arrived, you had this morning briefing. I think we jumped ahead a bit to reports of the suspicious person later in the day. What are you doing between showing up first thing in the morning until, let's say, 1600?
- A. So, basically, just to keep my guys ready. So, at 10:45, we -- me and the Bravo team leader called -- We called the guys back. We said, "Hey," over the Signal app. Have you guys heard of the Signal app? Okay.
- Q. Heard of it, but, please, if you wouldn't mind, who is -- for the record, how are you using it? Who are you communicating with?
- A. So we had like a group message thread, whatever. It has everybody on the entire team. So even guys that weren't there that day, you know, like, they were still getting those messages, you know, because it's just the whole entire team.

  Medics. Everybody. So what we did was -- so and I at 10:45, we're like, "Hey," we texted on the Signal app. "Come back." At 10:45

we had PCCs and PCIs -- that's pre-combat checks, pre-combat inspections. So all the guys came back. Then we knew gates weren't opening up to the public until 1300, but we wanted all of our guys in place ready to go with at least 50 percent security at 1100.

- Q. What does that mean, 50 percent security?
- A. So if you have two guys in a foxhole, one guy can sleep, one guy can be up.
- Q. Okay. So everybody is on-site, but one person is definitely on the -- on the post.
- A. Fifty percent, yeah. Yeah, so if there are six, seven, eight guys on a team, then there's four guys ready to respond. So as far as -- take the
- for example. So there were six guys in the
- We wanted three to four guys on that UTV, even though it wasn't -- time wasn't -- you know, he wasn't here yet, but we wanted guys on there just in case something did break out in the crowd like way before he even showed up.
  - O. Understood.

A. So 1100 hours we had guys ready to go, like, duty purposes. Like they were on duty. They were good to go. The other guys could take their kit off, you know, get some air, drink some water,

go to the bathroom, go grab something to eat,
whatever. Once got there, we broke -- you
know, "Hey, you two guys go get chow." "You guys
stand on security." When they came back, the other
two would go.

After that, then come 1300 when gates opened, then it was a hundred percent on. So at 1:00, it was -- everybody was on. If you had to take a break, you just told your team lead, "Hey, I have to go to the bathroom," "I have to do this," "I have to do that," then you could go. "I need a break"; take your kit off, whatever; somebody else would jump into your place and cover for you.

- Q. Why use Signal for those types of discussions?
- A. Because everybody -- because everybody is getting in like right now.
- Q. But why Signal as opposed to text message or using the radio?
- A. Because the Signal app is just -- it's already set up for the whole team. Instead of me going through there and putting each person in there to text message, like 50 people, okay -- this person, that person -- it's already set up.
  - Q. So this is something that you -- it sounds

like you use regularly with the whole team as opposed to something that was just set up for the July 13th event.

A. Yes, ma'am. Yep.

- Q. As you're discussing with -- maybe go to the time the crowd starts coming in around 1:00. Any concerns? Anything you're observing at that point?
- A. Not really. I mean, just -- well, the only thing that was started -- not quite that early, but, like, we were like, "Hey," you know, "we thought they were going to have fabric on the fence line." Just things like that, you know. But, whatever. I mean, it is what it is. I mean, you're not going to -- we're not going to go seek somebody out to go put up fabric people now. You know, you just adapt. You know, so --
- Q. Do you recall any discussions about other ways of obstructing sight line, maybe large farm equipment, anything like that that had be discussed potentially being in use that day?
- A. Not from our standpoint, no. I mean, not from the counter assault side.
- Q. Did you ask anybody why they didn't use that black fabric?

A. No, ma'am.

- Q. Then between crowds coming in at around 1600, anything else that jumped out to you?
- A. No, not really. I mean, we had -- like we had like a fence line by the one bleacher that broke open. Like it just kind of like came off the hinge. And the crowds were -- there was a lot of people. So, like, they were stuffed in there, so we had to kind of like push people back and get the gate resecured.

A lot of medicals. I think we had over 200 and some, like, heat injuries, so the medics were kind of running back and forth, back and forth. We even ran out a few times to help, whatever, take water out to people, you know, that kind of stuff.

But as far as that goes, no. I mean, at that point there was really no concern as far as the people coming in now. Like nothing was -- you know, nothing rose to our attention, you know.

- Q. Then around 1600, 1620 -- appreciating you don't have the exact minute in your mind --
  - A. Yeah, I don't know.
- Q. I think you said \_\_\_\_, who had been assigned to \_\_\_\_ brought to your attention that

there were some folks acting weird at the fence line. How did he notify you?

- A. In person face to face.
- Q. Was he on the patrol seeing this --
- A. No.

- O. -- or how did he become aware?
- A. Again, he was attached to so he was standing right there in front of Building 16 like I was. And I was -- like I said, again, I was off.

  I was -- I'm not sure what I was doing at the time when I came back to him whenever he first told me.

  Like I said, I was running -- I had to run a logistic thing over to the other CAT team, make sure they're okay. I'd come back. I'd hit a Command Post stop. You know, so I was doing a couple admin logistical stuff.
- Q. So you're sort of going between Building 16 and Building 3 over the course of the day?
- A. I went between Building 16 and Building 3

  twice. I did have -- I also had phone

  communication with them, with the one -- the one

  operator. I texted him at least once. I said,

  "Hey, you guys good over there?" He responded,

  "Yes, we're good." But, yes, it was twice I

  actually went to Building 3 to check on those guys.

Then I went to the Command Post probably three or four times to see what was going on as far as -- I wasn't going to tie up the net to get a sit rep, a situation report, or, you know, "Hey, what's going on," because at this point Trump was running late, this and that, you know. Now we were getting time hacked over the net.

Q. Meaning over the radio?

- A. Over the radio, yeah. But as far as when he first informed me -- I don't know where I was returning from, but when I came back, he goes, "Hey, , check this out." And then, like I said, he took it upon himself. He seen something that didn't look right. Went to the armor. Got the binos out and then just started monitoring those three individuals.
- Q. I think you said you told him to keep eyes on the individuals?
- A. Yes, ma'am. Yes. "Just keep eyes on," and then, you know, "If anything changes or if anything rises up, just let me know." He's like, "All right."
- Q. What would be some indicators of "rising up"? What would --
  - A. Well, now we have, you know, weapons or

setting things -- I mean, something that's just way out of the ordinary. You know, people were even -- if we did see the range finder -- like we never saw it, but that would be an indicator. Like, "Hey, that kid's using a range finder over there."

"Okay," like, "Let's go see detain him."

- Q. You never personally saw Mr. Crooks with the range finder. How did you become aware that he may have had one?
- A. I believe it was over the Signal app whenever one of the sniper teams put it out that he had a range finder.
  - Q. Do you recall around what time that was?
  - A. No, ma'am.
  - Q. But sometime after this sort of 1600, 1620?
- 16 A. Correct.

- Q. Then you received a Signal and --
- A. I want to say it was after 1700 is whenever the information came out about that. But, again, I -- I don't know if I have it in here or not, as far as like a quick timeline.
- : And, for the record, has brought in some notes that he's referring to.
  - A. No, I don't have that.

- Q. Okay. But approximately after 1700, you come to hear over Signal that this individual has a range finder. Did you understand that to be one of the same people that had been identified earlier at the fence line, or might this have been a different individual?
- A. Right. And I think shortly thereafter is whenever the pictures came over, of like the elevated position above him. Him sitting there with a gray shirt. I believe he was on his phone. There was no picture of the range finder. That's when we confirmed to the snipers -- Officer did -- that, "Yes, that is him a hundred percent. That is the guy that we saw earlier."
  - Q. And how did you receive photos?
  - A. Through the Signal app.
  - Q. What happens next?

- A. What time are we at?
- Q. You've received now photos of this person.
- has confirmed this is the same person you saw earlier. This person might have a range finder.
- A. At this point, gray shirt's gone. Like he's not even been -- we haven't seen him now. So on that original -- on that initial contact that --

I'm not sure how long saw him for, but when he had told me about it, I saw him for about three to five minutes and then -- for me, and then he was gone. I never saw him again until he was up on the rooftop. And then -- I'm trying to think.

At this -- at some point, like I said, you know, like I said earlier, we contacted, you know, the trooper. "Hey, go over and talk to red shirt and yellow shirt." At this point all of our eyes are on -- focused on yellow shirt and red shirt, because, like I said, gray shirt's gone. So our focus now is on those two individuals and trying to get somebody over there, a trooper, sheriff, deputy, whatever, try to get them over there to make contact to see, "Hey, what are you doing?" They went over and tried to talk to them. Every time they would get close -- same thing they did with the property owner -- they would just disperse.

- Q. How did you communicate with that Pennsylvania State trooper?
  - A. Face to face.

2.0

- Q. Do you recall that trooper's name?
- A. Trooper
- Q. What did you say to Trooper ?

A. Well, he saw it, too. I mean, you know, he saw the same activity we saw going on. And we said, "Hey" -- you know, we had -- we were inside the second fence line. He was in between the first fence line, and the two, red shirt, yellow shirt. So he had the ability to go over to that next fence line and talk to them. He couldn't get to them, but, you know, he'd be able to talk to them through the fence.

We, obviously, couldn't move anywhere.

Our fence is right there right outside Building 16.

But we basically went, "Hey, these guys" -- he's

like, "Yeah, I see it, too." And on the initial,

he's like, "I really can't leave my post." And

then eventually -- I mean, it wasn't like -- he

wasn't like that very long. He was like, "Okay,

I'm going to go over and talk to this guy," you

know. So he does shortly thereafter go over there

and talk to them. He comes back. Never made

contact because, like I said, they just kept moving

back and forth.

Then the second time is whenever the sheriff deputy came up, and then those two were never together. I do believe Trooper did end up talking to the guy in the red shirt, but he

was kind of -- he was still kind of hesitant of talking to him, you know. I don't know what was discussed, but it was -- it didn't come to anything.

- Q. Other than face to face, would you have any way of communicating with Pennsylvania State Police that day?
- A. We didn't, no. We know they deployed two vice guys, plain clothes vice. Because, again, we asked for guys to be sent over there, and Trooper did call somebody. I don't know if it was radio or phone. He did say that they were going to send over a couple vice guys. Eventually, a couple vice guys do come over, and he points them out to us. And he goes, "There they are. There's Trooper So and Trooper So and So." They end up walking down, like, past red shirt, yellow shirt, and kind of turned around and come back. They didn't make any contact with either one.
- Q. Do you know which or if Pennsylvania State Police is represented in either of the two Command Posts?
- A. I know that Trooper was in the Secret Service Command Post, and he had a direct line -- not a direct line, but phone -- cellphones

1	with our Commander . I know Commander and
2	him are I mean, we're all friends, but they're
3	good friends. So any time would call
4	or would call , they would answer,
5	because they knew something was going on. It
6	wasn't to call to talk. It was calling because
7	they need something.
8	Q. Understood. So even if you didn't
9	personally have a direct line to the troopers other
10	than face to face, your commander, you understood
11	what was
12	A. Correct. Or I'd tell Trooper , "Hey,
13	can we get this?" And then he would try to call
14	somebody.
15	: Thank you. And I think
16	we've gone a few minutes over, if you would
17	: We can go off the record.
18	(Off the record.)
19	EXAMINATION
20	BY :
21	Q. I'd like to go back to what
22	you were describing seeing Crooks on the AGR
23	rooftop and your actions surrounding that.
24	A. Um-hum.
25	Q. Can you help clarify with us your certainty

about striking Crooks with the bullet from your rifle?

A. Yeah. So, you know, again, with my past, you know, being in the service, law enforcement, fire instructor, all that stuff, I know I'm very familiar with a weapon. I'm very good with weapons. And like I know -- so when I engaged, my reticle never left Crooks' body, even after my -- even after I shot, so I didn't have to realign -- my dot never left his body, my target. And, again, which basically verified that my muzzle never would have left that target area.

Then it was his reaction. Again, like, when you hear a bullet fly over your head past your head -- again, I've experienced it. At first -- that very first time, it's like -- you're like, "Oh, holy jeez." Like, you're ducking. You're getting out of the way. There could be more coming, you know. You're not going to just get out of the way once and, like, that's going to be it. You're going to get out of the way. Take cover. You know, get down.

Like I said, he had no urgency. When I hit, like I said, there was that jerking motion.

Like, you know, it was more like on the right side,

like he kind of like jerked down to my left, his right. And, like I said, then he slowly rolled like he just had no strength, whatever, and kind of slowed -- slowly rolled over, you know, off to his right side. He then kind of like then rolled out of my -- rolled down the hill, like, you know, down the roof. Not rolled down, but just kind of went down outside of my view. Yeah, I mean, is there anything else that I can --

- Q. Yeah. Did you see any blood from Crooks after you fired your weapon?
- A. No. That was too far for me to see anything like that. Like I said, the only thing I did see was obviously him, and then the gas emit from his barrel, his muzzle break, when he engaged. I heard the snap. Right after I heard the snap or that round go off, is whenever I engaged, which, obviously, was after his eighth round -- after his eighth shot. Then from there, like I said, he -- it neutralized him, because he never -- he never shot again. And then ten seconds later is whenever the Secret Service then engaged.
- Q. About ten seconds after your shot fired before the Secret Service counter sniper fired?
  - A. Yeah, because mine was -- from what I've

been told, what the analyses are saying is like 5 seconds for Crooks to shoot eight. Then I was like 5.77 after his eighth shot. I was like a half a second. It was like a half a second after his eighth shot, I engaged, which made me like 5.77, like that.

Then he engaged like -- Secret Service had engaged at like 15 something, which is like 10 seconds after, you know. So from shot one to shot ten is 15 seconds. So Crooks got his eight out in 5. I engaged shortly after his 5 seconds, 5.77, something like that, and then at 15 something is whenever the Secret Service had engaged the tenth shot.

- Q. When you were at the Building 16 and you made an approach on Crooks, who was on top of the AGR Building, do you know if anyone witnessed your actions on Crooks when you began to move towards him?
- A. There was a -- so Lt. -- yeah,
  there was -- there was a few people. No operators.

  I was there -- so at that point, I was there by
  myself, as far as operators go. So my CAT Team 1,
  the guys went back to the vehicle behind Building
  16, got into our armored vehicle and moved up

around the side to where the candidate made his entrance with the motorcade and staged the armor back there, which would be -- I mean, if you're looking at the map -- basically, if you're looking at that -- so we're in Building 16. If you come down two buildings, that's 15, 14. So 14 is the building where the next sniper's element is.

They pulled up just -- if you're looking at the stage or looking at the building, it's to the right of that building. So if you're looking at it this way, they pulled up and parked that armored vehicle right there to the right of this building there. So at that point, I mean, I don't know if you guys -- I'm basically -- at this point I'm standing -- so when I engaged, I'm like right here (marking document).

The witness has marked outside of Building 16 sort of to the side of the stage.

A. Yeah. So, yeah, the stage is like up in here. It's like a bleachers, whatever. I was somewhere like in the middle here. Then, obviously, Crooks is right here on that building. So, like I said, it was approximately -- I said 100 meters. They ranged it like 115 yards. Do you see

the dot? 1 2 Can you also mark the exhibit that's in front of you, sir? We've 3 acquired some markers. 4 5 How about blue? 6 Can we go off the record 7 for a second? (Off the record.) 8 9 BY At the location that you fired at Crooks, 10 11 can you describe the other local law enforcement entities or Secret Service or other law enforcement 12 13 that were around you at the time that would have 14 seen you fire at Crooks? 15 And, again, at this point, I don't --16 there's nobody around me. Like I said, my Counter Assault Team 1 got in the vehicle, moved itself. 17 Repositioned to the right of that Building 14 --18 19 again, if you're looking at the stage. 20 was gone. 21 The only people that were in Building 22 16, there may have been some of them Homeland 23 Security people or Secret Service guys. I'm not

sure if they were in there still. Well, I know

there was someone still in there, because some did

24

come out later after I engaged. But I know there were some medics in there. There was a doc in there from AGH or AGM, whatever. The only -- there is a video out there from Lt. body cam that actually one guy dissected and broke it down, like, frame by frame where it actually -- he actually catches me -- not so much engaged, because LT kept moving back and forth behind cover on this one -- I believe it was the one crane that was there holding up one side of the flag.

One view sees me actually, like, turning square up to the target. In another view he moves again, and then it shows me looking up at him.

Then I come down and I give like the thumps-up to the Secret Service sniper. I said, "Hey," you know, "Good hit. Good hit." That's the only person I know that -- whether he saw me shoot or not, I know his body cam picked up some of it. You know, not so much the engagement whatever, but a lot of the movements I had going on over there.

Other than that, I don't know of anyone who actually saw me shoot per se. I know people were saying -- like the medics that were inside, they know I shot, but I don't know if they actually saw me shoot. But that's, I guess, about it.

Q. Did you speak with anyone about this, about firing at Crooks at the July 13th campaign rally site?

A. Yes, sir. So basically -- so immediately after, I tried to radio up to my command that I engaged, but the net -- the radio, it was just -- it was blowing up. Every time I tried to cue my mic, it was just -- you get this tone. It's like a "Boop, boop." You know, and I just kept getting that tone. So I said, "Hey, whatever. I'll make contact with my commander later."

So when I got back later on that evening around like 10:00, because then I got -- I got redeployed to go secure the parking lot, the L-Z, and the hospital, outside perimeter of the hospital for Trump's exfil. So I didn't get back from the hospital until, I think, around like almost 2200.

So at that point I immediately went in to our CP, and Commander was in there talking to another person. And I said, "Hey, can I steal you for a second?" So he -- the other guy left, and then I had a one on one with the commander. I said, "Hey, just an FYI. I engaged. I hit him. He went down," blah, blah, blah. You know, and then we kind of -- I gave him the story I just told

you guys. Then he says, "All right. Good job.

Don't leave. They're going to want to talk to

you." I'm like, "I figured." But I didn't tell

him until -- he was the only person I told that

night, you know. It was around 2200.

- Q. Had you spoken with anyone about it prior to returning to the local Command Post and speaking about it with Commander in person?
  - A. No, sir.

- Q. When you signaled to Secret Service snipers that you were recognizing, "Good hit," did they receive -- did they recognize that you were signaling to them?
- A. Yes, but I don't -- I mean, which kind of makes sense now, but that was the other team member that engaged. I don't know if he knew what I was talking about or what or what I was trying to confirm. Because he was looking -- we made eye contact. I'm like, "Hey, good hit. Good hit." I know he heard me, because, like I said, he's right above me, but he didn't acknowledge anything.

So whether that's just their protocol or if he didn't know I was -- like, all that he knew there was engagements, or maybe he didn't know what I was -- exactly what I was talking about, you

know. But, yeah, he didn't -- he didn't acknowledge anything, though. He just -- we made eye contact. I talked to him, gave handoff signals, and he just looked at me and then looked away. Looked back over towards where Crooks was.

- Q. After you spoke with Commander back at the local Command Post, after you returned to the campaign rally site, you mentioned that you were going to discuss firing at Crooks with someone later that evening. Who were those individuals or what individual was that?
- A. Yeah. So eventually I met up with

  Pennsylvania State Police and the FBI. That's

  where the FBI ended up taking my rifle. We did a

  round count. They went through all my rounds.

  They took it -- you know, they took everything.

  Apparently, it's still down in Quantico or

  whatever.
- Q. After the FBI took your rifle, they haven't returned it to you yet?
  - A. No, sir.

Q. In discussing your rounds that were used firing at Crooks that day, did you relay similar information that you discussed with us earlier that --

A. Yes.

- Q. -- you fired one round.
  - A. Yes, sir.
  - O. Correct?

A. Yes, sir. Yes. Kind of the same thing I told you earlier. Like they had me go through my weapon. I didn't touch it after I shot the weapon. So the entire time I let the weapon go, I had it slung on my kit, my person. It was loaded on safety the entire time until I made contact with the feds. At that point when they told me to clear it, make it safe, that's when I did that.

Dropped the magazine, cleared it, racked it, set it down. I had my weapon on safe. Dropped the bolt, everything, all that stuff. Put my magazine down. Then at that point they had me go -- they had me empty the magazine, then we did a count. Then I explained to him same thing I told you, like, you know, how I do my rounds. You know, two bonded, one hollow point, two bonded, one hollow point, two bonded, one hollow point, bonded. Told them that my first round would have been a Hornady TAP Barrier -- all the same stuff -- and then they boxed everything up and it was gone.

We did try to go back to my area to

locate the brass casing. We did not find it that night, but they did tell me that next morning when they brought the team out to look, they did find the brass casing. Because I knew that I -- my spent casing that I engaged with. Then they have that as well.

Q. Do you recall who informed you that they had found the brass casing?

Yeah.

It was the -- so that -- I believe

- it was that Wednesday I had to go to Moon Township down by the Pittsburgh Airport, PSP barracks, with , the other attorney, and we had a -- I had my interview with state and feds. That's whenever the state police -- because I asked -- because that trooper was there with me that night. I asked him, I said, "Did you find my casing?" He goes, "Yeah, they found it." So it was PSP that told me.
- Q. Just for the record, that brass casing would have been at the position where you fired at Crooks; correct?
- A. Approximately. I mean, obviously, the ejection travel was going to take it to my right. So wherever I was, it was going to either go kind of 2 o'clock to a 4 o'clock position of where I was

1 standing at. 2 Do you know if the bullet that you fired 3 was recovered? 4 Α. No, I have no idea. 5 Q. Did you participate in helping locate the 6 brass casing? 7 The night of we looked, but, like I said, Α. there was I think three of us -- three troopers and 8 myself, but we didn't find it. 9 10 Who were the troopers that were with you? 0. I have no idea, sir. 11 Α. 12 Q. Were they Pennsylvania State Police? 13 Α. Yes. 14 EXAMINATION 15 BY 16 Sir, you referred to these analyses about the shots fired, and I'd like to know if you could 17 describe what those analyses are. 18 19 Α. What do you mean? 20 Q. Who provided the analyses? 21 For --Α. 22 The shots fired, the timeline. Q. 23 Α. You mean like the 5 seconds, 10 seconds, 24 15? 25 Yes. Q.

- A. It was something that was -- someone had that on -- like an online thing, whatever.
  - Q. It was a private --
  - A. Correct.

- 0. -- actor?
- A. Yeah. I want to say it was the guy who does Peak Prosperity. I think that was the first one that we saw, that he timed it out, but I --
- Q. Are you aware whether he spoke with law enforcement in order to make that analysis?
- A. I have no idea. Apparently, they have these -- I have no idea if it's an actual, like, good analysis. But that's what -- if you go by time -- like, if you go by like stamped times, I guess, is what he went by, that's what it was.
- Q. Once you fired the shots, what transpired between -- the shot, singular -- what transpired between that time and the time at which you made your departure for the hospital?
- A. So after I confirmed with the Secret

  Service, I started walking -- I go then to my CAT

  Team 1. That's when the civilians were calling -they were calling for help. So at that point I

  responded over to the bleachers that was to my,

  like, 6 -- really like my 7 o'clock. I went over.

They said, you know, "He's been shot. He's been shot." So I jump up on the bleachers, and I saw the gentleman that was shot in the head. I knew for me, because I was -- at that point I'm still alone by myself. At that point I knew I was going to be no help to him.

So I jumped off, ran back towards

Building 16, started yelling for medic. Yelled for

medic for a few times. Medics came out. One medic

and a doctor came out. Got those two over to him.

That's whenever they started treating him.

At that point is whenever I started seeing the troopers and some of those -- either Secret Service or Homeland Security guys come out of the -- also come out of that barn area, or at least around that area. Maybe the tent. They came out also to assist with injured.

At that point I walked back to Building

16. Was then contacted by Charlie 2, which is

Deputy Commander , requesting me to bring a

CAT team up to a hospital. Then from there, like I said, maybe over the next three or four minutes,

for me to get there to -- inside the armor, and then we exfil to the hospital.

Q. How did contact you?

- A. He tried to get me over the radio, but it was too busy. So he actually contacted me via phone, cellphone. He called me. He was with -- he was en route to the hospital. He was embedded with the Secret Service counter assault team that was in the motorcade with the former president.
- Q. Do you know whether the individual in the red shirt was ever detained for questioning?
- A. I believe he was. I believe yellow shirt and red shirt were both detained. From my understanding, their phones were seized, and then, obviously, like, they went through them or whatever, and they were questioned.
- Q. Going back to your personal observations, did you observe gray shirt, who you eventually appreciated to be Mr. Crooks, interact with anybody?
  - A. No.

- Q. And comments to you, did he describe gray shirt interacting with anybody?
- A. No. The way he -- the way I remember it was he was basically telling me how he was just back and forth. Like he would walk like towards the fence, away from the fence, towards the fence, away from the fence, towards the fence,

here's, like, the buildings, he was kind of walking back and forth this way. Not that far. I'm just -- I'm overexaggerating. But kind of put him at the fence line walking back towards like Whitetown Road here, then he's going back.

- Q. North and south on the east side of the AGR Building?
- A. Would that be east side or west side of the building? Would that be west side of the building over here? That's north; right?
  - Q. Yes.

- A. Yeah, it would be the west side of the building.
  - Q. Got it, thank you.
- A. Yeah, just north and south, west. But, like I said, just like the length of like the front of that building. Then eventually when he walks north that last time -- for me at least -- that's the last time I see him.

- A. Honestly, no, because, like I said, once I got medics and the doc to the victims, I went behind the stage, spoke to Deputy Commander

Then I exited through Building 16 at the end and then walked over to the -- I was unaware of where my vehicle was. It was with CAT Team 1. I didn't know where they moved it to exactly, so I ended up going to Building 16 to the rear, and then walked over to, you know, to the right to meet -- to link up with that vehicle. So I had -- I did not see anything but the crowds.

As far as I was concerned, was that they were holding the crowd basically -- basically, they were keeping everything, like, contained until everything was situated and they got the candidate out of there. Then at some point they ended up

evacuating everybody. I don't think it was an immediate evacuation right after everything took place. There wasn't like a big scramble. Like, people weren't, like, fleeing. Everyone was just kind of like standing there, hunkered down, just kind of watching.

Then, eventually, like I said, that's when they started filing people out. But, again, I don't know for sure, because, like, again, I wasn't there at that point. That's just my understanding in talking to the guys that were still there on-site.

- Q. Prior to your engagement of Crooks with your rifle, I understand that earlier you were discussing that you had seen different Secret Service personnel in and around Building 16. Prior to engaging Crooks with your rifle, can you describe the whereabouts of Secret Service near your position?
- A. And, again, like when I took -- when I engaged Crooks, like there was nobody around me.

  Like I -- like, I'm pretty sure Trooper was still around the area where he was posted up by the fence. But, again, I can't confirm or deny that.

  Other than that, I mean, I saw no other agents, no

other officers, troopers, operators. It was literally just myself.

There was something -- the reason I was still there was there was something -- I don't know what it was, but there was something there just keeping me there. Like I didn't return back to my guys yet. It was just kind of keeping me there for some reason. I'm like, "I got to see what's going on here so I can send up intel," whatever, you know, talk to the commander. Then, literally, that's whenever shots started ringing out, and it happened pretty quick.

- Q. Can you describe your advance on Crooks?

  Did you receive any instruction from radio or

  Secret Service to advance on Crooks with your

  rifle?
- A. No, huh-uh. So, again, we got the call for I told to go. I'm like, "Go, go, go."

  He linked up with the I gave the TL to handoff to the -- you know, to get out of here.

  And then, literally, you know, seconds after that is whenever, you know, Crooks engaged.

There was two fence lines in between me and Crooks, obviously. So it really wasn't like -- it really wasn't like an advancement. I was

- literally standing there. I heard shots fired.

  I was basically all -- it's all me just staying

  there in a single position in the middle of that

  field, you know, in front of Building 16.
  - Q. Okay. Do you recall viewing any drones, hearing any drones that day?
    - A. No, sir.

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- Q. Did you receive any instructions on identification of any drones at the campaign rally site?
- A. No, I didn't.
  - Q. Do you recall drones being discussed during the campaign rally site?
- A. Yeah, I know we brought them up. I know we had one available, but it never went up.
  - O. And that was a Butler County ESU drone?
  - A. I believe so, yes, sir.
  - Q. Do you know why that didn't go up?
  - A. I don't know -- again, I can't confirm or deny, but I know, like the radios, it was offered as an asset, but it was not utilized. I don't know why it wasn't utilized. I'm not sure.

Q. when we were just speaking, our colleagues asked about an after action review. You said that you had completed one, but your commander doesn't yet have it. What did you find? What does that report say?

A. Honestly, the same thing here. I mean, just basically just going through my involvement.

You know, it's like a -- kind of like a timeline, you know. Like "On July 5th," you know, "I was notified by Commander that we were going to be participating in the Trump Rally," you know, "at the Butler Farm Show grounds." Then, you know, it kind of just goes through like a -- I guess like a timeline of what my involvement was.

You know, on the 10th or 11th or whatever it was, we were doing the walkthrough of the farm show grounds. You know, July 13th I arrive the 09. You know, the briefing at 9:15 at the Brady Paul Building. Then from there around, you know, 1811 mark, you know, shots fired. Then from there going to the hospital, securing the hospital site, and then returning back to the farm show grounds around 2200.

Is there anything in that report or in your 1 0. 2 general reflections that we've not covered yet today that you'd like to add to the record? 3 4 No. You guys probably have more than I 5 have in my after action review. It actually helps 6 jar -- you know, bring things out, you know, 7 discussing it, instead of me sitting there trying to think of everything that went on. 8 9 Have we jogged anything else that we 10 haven't touched upon yet today? 11 Not really. I don't think. Α. had body 12 Q. You mentioned that camera footage of you taking the shot. 13 14 I believe it's Lt. Α. 15 You believe it is. Might it be somebody 0. 16 else? I don't think. - A. I was overseeing both teams, yes. So, basically, if something happened, I was to then deploy -- I would use my judgment -- it would be my call to where I would have those vehicles or those teams deploy. How they would deploy. How they would infil. How they would exfil. That kind of stuff. I basically had command and control of both teams.
  - Q. And you were directly reporting to
- A. Yes. So, yeah, I would report directly to Commander
- Q. What about the team, who did they report to?
- A. Commander or like myself or, you know, my -- I'm a team leader for ESU. My ATL is , and he was a team leader of But he would then report -- like he would -- it would be his job, if he had anything, either to come to me, who I'm his team leader, or go to the commander

for something. You'd basically do the chain of 1 2 command. Did you consider the ESU sniper team to be 3 4 sort of a third bucket? - Q. And you started answering this, but if you're inside the barn, can you see out to the crowd? Can you see out to the back of the barn? Like what can you see if you're inside?
- A. Nothing really around you. Like you have -- there's a front entrance and a rear entrance. It's basically like a large cattle barn. There's no, like, windows on the sides. It's fully

enclosed except the barn doors. So, no, you're not going to see anything until you get outside of one of those doors.

- Q. You said that earlier but before Former

  President Trump arrived there were people helping

  out with medical emergencies, like maybe giving out

  water and things like that?
- A. Yeah, like local EMTs, paramedics. We had like -- I don't know where it was, but they had like a casualty collection point, like CCP set up where they would take them for like a triage whatever. Get them hydrated. Maybe do IVs, that kind of stuff. Yeah, there were EMTs, paramedics like all over the place just running, assisting people for having heat exhaustion or some kind of heat injury or whatever.
- Q. Were members of CAT or helping with that?
- A. Negative. We'd take some waters out. Like if someone in the crowd there, they were like, "Hey, do you have any water," we'd run a bottle of water out to them or whatever. But they weren't a casualty, though. They were just asking for water.
  - Q. At some point you mentioned that CAT and never saw the range finder.

A. Correct.

- Q. But if they did, they would have thought to detain him, or are you saying --
- A. It would have ramped up like our suspicion now. So, you know, you see somebody with a range finder, you know, a laser with a range finding a target, in our world, you know, that's a different -- it's a different clue, you know. So we're going to -- okay, now we definitely need to get somebody over there and get this guy detained or at least questioned. "What are you doing?" You know, "What's going on here?" "Why are you here?" "Who are you?" You know, that kind of stuff.

But, again, at this point, there was no -- we didn't see a phone. We didn't see a range finder. Like, we didn't see anything. Then once it came out that he had the range finder, that's when we're -- now we're trying to get people over there to now locate this guy.
