1 Force. I want to thank you for coming in today for this interview. 2 The Task Force recognizes and appreciates 3 that you are here voluntarily. You are allowed 4 5 to have an attorney present to advise during this interview. You have an attorney present. 6 7 Will the counsel please introduce 8 yourself for the record? 9 10 Thank you. 11 12 For the record, members of Congress are permitted to attend the interview if they so wish 13 14 and ask you questions. There are no members here presently. We don't expect there will be today; 15 but just so you know that for the record. 16 17 OFFICER Sure. Next, would the Minority 18 19 staff please introduce yourselves for the record? 20 21 , Investigative Counsel. I am with 22 the Minority. 23 2.4 Researcher with the Task Force hired by the 25 Senate.

1 And with me is , also with the Majority. 2 3 OFFICER : Yes, sir. 4 , before we begin, I would like to go over the ground rules 5 of the interview. 6 The way this interview will proceed is as 7 The Majority and the Minority will 8 follows: 9 alternate asking you questions, 30 minutes per side, until each side is finished with their 10 questioning. 11 12 The Majority staff will begin -- that's us -- and proceed for 30 minutes; and then the 13 Minority staff will have 30 minutes to ask 14 15 questions. We will then alternate back and forth in 16 17 this matter until both sides have no further 18 questions. If either side is in the middle of a 19 specific line of questions, they may choose to 20 21 end a few minutes past the half an hour to ensure 22 completion of that specific line of questioning, 23 including any pertinent follow-ups. In this interview, while one member of 24 25 the staff for each side may lead the questioning,

additional staff may ask questions.

There is a court reporter taking down everything I say and everything you say to make a written record of the interview. For the record to be clear, please wait until the staffer questioning you finishes each question before you begin your answer, and the staffer will wait until you finish your response before proceeding to the next question.

Further, to ensure the court reporter can properly record this interview, please speak clearly, concisely, and slowly. Also, the court reporter cannot record nonverbal answers, such as movements or nodding or shaking of the head. It is important that you answer each question with an audible verbal answer. Do you understand that?

OFFICER : Yes, sir.

: We want you to answer our questions in the most complete and truthful manner possible, so we will take our time. If you have any questions or do not fully understand the question, please let us know. We will attempt to clarify, add context to, or rephrase our questions. Do you understand?

1 OFFICER : Yes, sir. And if we ask about 2 3 specific conversations or events in the past and you are unable to recall the exact words or 4 details, you should testify to the substance of 5 those conversations or events to the best of 6 recollection. 7 If you recall only a part of a 8 9 conversation or event, you should give us your best recollection of those events or parts of 10 conversations that you do recall. Do you 11 12 understand? 13 OFFICER Yes. : Although you are here 14 voluntarily and we will not swear you in, you are 15 required pursuant to 18 U.S.C. Section 1001 to 16 17 answer questions from Congress truthfully. This also applies to questions posed by 18 19 Congressional staff or consultants like myself in this interview. Do you understand? 20 21 OFFICER Yes. : 22 If at any time you 23 knowingly make false statements, you could be subject to criminal prosecution. Do you 24 understand? 25

: Is there any reason you are unable to provide truthful testimony in today's interview?

OFFICER : No.

: Please note that if you wish to assert a privilege over any statement today, that assertion must comply with the rules of the Task Force on the Attempted Assassination of Donald J. Trump.

For the Chair to consider assertions of privilege over testimony or statements, witnesses or entities must clearly state the specific privilege being asserted and the reason for assertion on or before the scheduled date of testimony or appearance.

You have an attorney present; and if your attorney has any privileges he would want to assert, he will do so during the course of this interview.

Furthermore, if at any time during the interview, we ask any questions or you have an answer that you would like to consult with your attorney prior to answering the question, you are free to inform us of that. We will go off the

record, and then you and your attorney can 1 consult privately. Do you understand? 2 3 OFFICER : Yes, sir. Finally, I would like to 4 note the content of what we discuss today is 5 confidential. 6 7 We ask that you not speak about what we discuss here today in this interview to any 8 9 outside individual in order to preserve the integrity of this investigation. 10 For these same reasons, marked exhibits 11 12 used today will be provided to the court reporter so that they may go in the official transcript; 13 and any copies of those exhibits will be returned 14 15 to us when we wrap up. We plan to take five-minute breaks at the 16 end of each 30 minutes of questioning, or as 17 needed; but if you need to take a longer break or 18 19 a break before that, please let us know, and we 20 will be happy to accommodate you. 21 : Uh-huh. OFFICER 22 To the extent there is a 23 pending question, we would ask that you finish answering the question before we take the break. 24 25 Do you understand?

- 11 A. I was just a general operator. I wasn't 12 in a leadership position at the time.
- Q. Okay. And as an operator, what are you specifically trained to do?
 - A. Oh, a lot of things. Mostly, entry, room entry, Blackbeard deterrence, door kickers, building clearing; and outdoor movements, such as manhunts through open terrain, woodlands; and I'm trained in less lethal weapons, such as batons
- 21 responses such as -- you know, a little bit of

and gas agents; trained in active shooter

- 22 everything.
- Q. Okay. Understood. You are, for lack of a better term, a SWAT operator?
- 25 A. Yes.

- Q. And how many people report directly to you at ESU?
- 3 A. Roughly ten.
- Q. And one of those -- one of those, your reports, is ______, correct?
- 6 A. Correct.

- Q. All right. And you have been trained as an operator for -- you were trained and you received training as an operator during the time you have been at ESU?
- 11 A. Correct.
- 12 Q. All right. So I am going to turn now to 13 the July 13th event --
- 14 | A. Uh-huh.
- Q. -- and I am going to start with the planning for that event.
- 17 | A. Sure.
- Q. And I just want to understand what your involvement was in the planning for the event.
- 20 A. Yes.
- Q. First of all, do you recall that you
 first heard about the event roughly the Friday
 before? It was July 5th of this year?
- A. It was around that time, yes. I first heard about it over the news. It was broadcast

on the Pittsburgh news.

Q. Okay.

- A. One of the news channels is how I came to find out about it.
- Q. Do you recall if you ever received any kind of text message or anything from Commander or others at ESU that ESU was likely to be called in to support that event?
- A. I believe -- so I was on duty, on patrol, when word started getting around. We were -- a group of us, we all happened to just work at the same time at the same shift, and we met up at a gas station in the middle of the night.

I believe we were on midnight shift, and we met up at a gas station in the middle of the night, and we started talking about it. We -- you know, we figured that we would be asked to, you know, pull security for the rally.

- Q. Right.
- A. And then I don't remember there being a text message off the top of my head.
- Q. All right. That's fine. But you became aware of that, not only from the news, but also from ESU, that there was likely that you would be called in -- not you specifically, maybe, but ESU

would be called in to provide support?

A. Yes.

- Q. So I am going to ask you about a series of meetings that occurred prior to the event, and see which, if any, you were directly involved in.
 - A. Uh-huh.
- Q. On Monday, July 8th, there was a meeting between the Secret Service and ESU -- and the Butler County ESU and other local law enforcement where the Secret Service gave a general briefing as to what they would need. Were you present for that?
- 13 A. No.
 - Q. On July -- on Tuesday, July 9th, there were -- not meetings, but there were -- some of your colleagues in ESU -- not necessarily in your group. Or I shouldn't say "not necessarily," but not operators, but snipers and others, who toured parts of the event site. Were you part of that tour?
- 21 A. No.
- Q. On July 9th -- I'm sorry. On July 10th,
 Wednesday, there was further site tours. Were
 you part of that, those site tours?
- 25 A. No.

- Q. And on July 11th, Thursday, there was a walk-through that occurred that the Secret Service was present for, some members of Butler County ESU, as well as other law enforcement was present for. Were you present for that?
 - A. Yes.

- Q. Okay. So why don't we start with: When did you first learn that there would, in fact, be a need for ESU support, and your support, in particular, for this event? Again, I am not looking for exact times or days. Just generally.
- A. I believe it would have been the Tuesday, so that would have been July 9th, if I'm -- if my math is correct.
 - Q. Yes. That's right.
- A. After my daylight shift, I went to -- our team had training at a church. They were doing some sort of active shooter training there; and by the time I got to this church, the training was already concluded by the time I got there.

And then the walk-through for July 11th, that Thursday, was mentioned, and I was asked to be there, to be present.

Q. All right. Did you have any understanding before the walk-through of what your

- role -- and when I say "you," I mean you and your team -- what your role would be at the event?
- A. I -- at the -- on Tuesday, I believe,
 before the walk-through, I believed that would
 just be Assistant Squad Leader, as I normally am.
- Q. Okay.

- A. And then Thursday, you know, to fast forward, I did the walk-through; and then after we got done with the walk-through, all of our team leadership went to Butler Township Police Department, and we started putting together this OPS Plan (indicating) that I believe you guys have a copy of.
- O. Yes.
- 15 : Yes.
- A. And that is when I learned my position
 for the rally would actually be Team Leader for
 the ORF.
- 19 Q. Okay. Got it. And let's start with this 20 a little bit with the walk-through.
- 21 A. Sure.
 - Q. I am going ask you more about your impressions of the walk-through and then anything about conversations like that at this point.
- 25 A. Uh-huh.

- Q. So the walk-through, as I mentioned the Secret Service was there, some members of the Secret Service and other law enforcement. Did you have a sense of was it a well-organized walk-through from your perspective?
- A. No.

- Q. Okay. And why do you say that?
- A. There were -- it didn't seem like there was any designation for where we should all be paying attention to.
 - Q. Uh-huh.
- A. We broke off from the main crowd. I believe they were talking -- the Secret Service and, like, fire department and fire -- you know, local firemen and EMS, I believe, they were talking about, like, where the food trucks were going to be.
- Q. Right.
- A. So a group of us broke off with a Secret Service sniper, a counter sniper. I don't remember the name off the top of my head. It will probably come back to me as I'm talking here.
- We walked to -- we walked around the buildings, around the farm show grounds, to see

where everything was, where the layout was, what the layout was like.

We walked over to a building beyond the grandstands (gesturing). We found a building that would be suitable for Beaver County ESU that would be coming to assist us. We found a building that was suitable for them.

And then we walked back over to where the grandstands were going to be -- or I'm sorry -- to where the actual rally was going to be, where the stage and where the bleachers were going to be set up, and they were actively being set up while we were there.

We walked over to the red barns that we all have seen now.

Q. Right.

- A. And we decided that that far left barn, if you are looking at the barns from the stage area, that was going to be our position.
- Q. Got it. And the decision about where you were going to be positioned, that was a decision that you all made?
 - A. Yes.
- 24 | Q. Right.
- 25 A. And there was the Secret Service counter

sniper that was there with us; and I don't remember his exact words, but it seemed like he was okay with it.

Q. Right.

- A. And then there was a female -- a Hispanic female Secret Service agent. I don't remember her name, either, off the top of my head. She made an appearance while we were at the barn, and she was okay with it, as well.
- Q. Okay. So it's fair to say that they
 were -- that your impression was that Secret
 Service, they certainly weren't directing you
 where to be?
- A. (The interviewee nods his head.)
- Q. They were letting you tell them where you thought was best, and they were okay with it?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. And can you tell us why you decided that that barn would be the best place for you guys to be deployed or to be positioned?
 - A. The space. Space for all of our equipment and guys over there, the location of it, and close to where, you know, where all the people were going to be, the crowd, and close to where, you know, where the Former President was

going to be. Just in the relative location, it seemed centralized.

- Q. Right.
- A. So --

- Q. Do you recall -- at the time now we know it as the AGR Building. Do you recall discussing the AGR property at any time during that walkthrough?
- 9 A. Yes.
 - Q. What do you recall about that?
 - A. I remember talking about the two fence lines that were in between the red barn and the AGR building. Myself and another guy from our team, we were looking at it, and we were talking, like, you know, "Hopefully, that's closed off to the public. Hopefully, there's not going to be people over there standing on the other side of the fence, because that's an issue."
 - Q. Uh-huh.
 - A. I believe it was the Secret Service counter sniper, I remember, that was there with us, he mentioned that there would be a black cloth, like, a blackout cloth --
- 24 | Q. Right.
- 25 A. -- put all the way down the fence on that

- 1 outer fence.
- Q. Separating the area that was -- at least
- 3 | the sight of the area where the AGR property was
- 4 | from the rally?
- 5 A. Yes.
- 6 Q. All right. Sorry about that.
- 7 A. Yes. Past that, I don't remember the
- 8 rest of the conversation about the AGR Building.
- 9 Q. Okay. The Beaver County ESU folks were
- 10 | there. You said you found a building that was --
- 11 | you thought was appropriate for them?
- 12 | A. Yes.
- 13 Q. And that was the AGR -- that was part of
- 14 | the AGR property?
- 15 A. No. That was on the farm show grounds
- 16 | property.
- 17 | O. Okay.
- 18 | A. I believe if you guys have a map --
- 19 Q. Yes. So you are talking about not the
- 20 | Beaver County snipers?
- 21 A. Correct. Just the --
- 22 | Q. Got it.
- 23 A. Just where their armored truck was going
- 24 | to be --
- 25 Q. Got it. I understand.

- A. -- and where their operators were going to stage.
 - Q. Understood. Got it. Thank you.

- Q. So during the course of that walkthrough, did you have any concerns about your
 team's ability to provide the security that was
 being requested by the Secret Service?
- 9 A. No. I had confidence in our abilities 10 and -- yeah.
 - Q. I got it. And can you just very generally tell us what were -- what was the responsibility that was being given to your group of SWAT?
 - A. So what I learned later in the day after we were done with the walk-through, that's when we went back to, like I said, back to the Butler Township Police Department and sat down and started discussing who was going to do what.
 - Q. Right.
- A. And that's when I was told I was going to
 be in charge of the Quick Reaction Team, or
 QRF --
- 24 Q. QRF, right.
- 25 A. -- or Quick Reaction Force.

Q. Right.

- 2 A. I learned that, you know, we would
- 3 respond to outside the perimeter, if they are --
- 4 | you know, if anything went horribly wrong. You
- 5 | know, if there was something that anybody on
- 6 regular patrol, if it got out of hand for them,
- 7 | we would respond accordingly.
- 8 Q. Right. Okay. Was it part of your
- 9 responsibility to deal with a single act -- a
- 10 | single actor or a solo potential shooter,
- 11 | anything like that?
- 12 A. It's -- that is one of -- that falls
- 13 under the umbrella of our duties I would assume.
- 14 Yeah, I would say.
- 15 Q. Right. And also to retrieve any
- 16 drones --
- 17 A. Yes.
- 18 Q. -- that anybody -- that any law
- 19 | enforcement saw?
- 20 A. Yes.
- 21 O. And was that in the normal course for
- 22 | you, something that you were not surprised to
- 23 | learn, both of those things, both the single
- 24 | actor and also the drones?
- 25 A. In my career, that was the first time I

was ever told that I was in charge of recovering drones.

- Q. Okay. So the single actor -- the single actor, that is sort of the normal course for the types of work you guys do?
- 9 A. Correct. Single actor. Multiple. Civil disturbances. Protests that get out of control.

 11 Yes.
- Q. Right. Okay. Did you have any sense
 from your colleagues or directly from your own on
 whether or not there was any frustration or
 anything with respect to how the Secret Service
 was communicating with you all at that point
 about what their needs were?
 - A. Not that I recall at that time.
 - Q. Okay. And so then you mentioned you have the document in front of you; and I am going to try to go through a large part of the timeline, like, I might -- I believe my colleagues may go through some of that document.
- So that document that you have in front of you, that is the response plan that you guys

put together that evening on the 11th?

A. Yes, sir.

- Q. Okay. Got it.
- A. Yes. This was our Operation Plan. This
 is standard any time we do any sort of -- any
 sort of operation, any sort of response. We come
- 7 up with these plans any time we do a search

warrant on a house or a building.

- 9 Q. Right.
- 10 A. We did some -- we did a similar OPS Plan
 11 back in 2020 for the first Donald Trump rally.
- Q. Understood. Is that something -- is the
 OPS Plan, is that something you typically shared
 with other agencies or other groups of law
 enforcement?
- 16 A. It can be, yes.
- Q. It can be. Do you know if it was shared in this particular case?
- 19 A. It was shared the day of the rally.
- 20 Q. The day of the rally.
- 21 A. I do know that.
- Q. Okay. And it was shared with the Secret
 Service and others?
- A. I do not know if it was shared with the Secret Service.

- Q. Okay. Who do you know it was shared with?
 - A. So on the morning of the rally, we met at the Brady Paul FOP Lodge on the farm show ground property --
 - Q. Right.

- A. -- for a briefing. I believe it was at 9:00 a.m. In this room was members of Butler County ESU, Beaver County ESU, Washington

 County -- or Washington Regional SWAT, which is Washington County just south of Pittsburgh.
- 12 Q. Right.
 - A. I do not recall if there was fire department or medics in the room.
- Q. Okay. Do you recall if Secret Service was present for that?
- 17 A. I do not recall.
- 18 Q. And that briefing was led by Commander
- 19 and , correct?
- 20 A. Correct.
- Q. And at that briefing, they told the group, "Here's what we are expecting," they told everybody where they are supposed to be, and --
- A. (The interviewee nods his head.)
- 25 Q. -- and did you have any concerns or hear

- any concerns from anyone at that briefing about the plan that was put in place?
- A. I had no concerns, and I do not recall any other concerns voiced.
- Q. Okay. Now, your team, how many members of your team were active for this -- specifically your -- you know, the SWAT operators?
- A. The SWAT operators? According to the line-up, there was guys coming and going throughout the day due to personal reasons and their regular fulltime jobs.
- Q. Regular fulltime jobs, yeah.
- A. There is a list on here (indicating) of the personnel on this slide here (indicating) --
 - O. Right.

 that were present and what their positions were.

 quick.
- For QRF, there is ten of us, including myself.

- A. And then for the Counter Assault Team, on here (indicating), it was nine.

- Q. You don't know; but that is what your expectation was?
- 9 A. Yes, sir.
- Q. And did you have any concerns at that time that you didn't have enough people to do what you were needed to do?
- 13 A. No.
- Q. Okay. So just continuing through that
 day, once you had the briefing, were there any
 further briefings before you positioned yourself?
- 17 A. No.
- Q. Okay. And so, roughly, what time did you get into position?
- 20 A. Probably around 10:00 a.m.
- Q. All right. And you and the SWAT, the members of the SWAT QRF, you were in camo?
- 23 A. Yes.
- Q. Or -- and sometimes you would wear the
- 25 | metal plates?

- 1 A. The ballistics, yeah.
 - Q. The ballistics?
- 3 A. Yeah, ceramic ballistics. Yeah.
- Q. Right. And so you were not -- you were clearly, from your perspective, identifiable to the public, if someone saw you, even outside of
- 7 | the ballistics --
- 8 | A. Yes.

- 9 Q. -- as a law enforcement?
- 10 A. Yes.
- 11 Q. Now you were going to be positioned in 12 the barn --
- 13 A. Yes.
- 14 Q. -- during the event?
- 15 A. (The interviewee nods his head.)
- Q. Had you been -- were you aware of a request that there not be an obvious show of
- 18 | force by law enforcement at the event?
- A. From the brief, Commander , he stated

 - A. I believe the full team was in there.

- Q. But can you please give us a little bit more understanding about your background and career prior to becoming a patrolman with Butler City Police?
- A. Sure. I went to Marine Corps Boot Camp fresh out of high -- like, a week after I graduated high school.

I went through all that training. Then I went to military police school right after that.

I got out of -- I graduated military police school, and I went into the Reserves out of Pittsburgh. I did that for eight years, I believe. I got out in 2019.

I had a lot of good opportunities with that. I trained all over the world. I went to South Korea, Morocco, Jordan, all over the United States; and I trained with a lot of good people, and I learned a lot over the years.

- Q. Okay.
- A. And, you know, with -- you know, training with, obviously, shooting water guns, having fun with that. Active shooter training, going back all the way to the military police school, I did a lot of active shooter training.

I did a lot of urban combat training or mouth training. You know, we did a lot of convoy security training. The guys that I got brought up by, they fought in Fallu -- not Fallujah.

They fought in Marjah and Afghanistan, I believe.

It was the big push with -- I believe it was one six.

So those guys, they brought me up through the ranks and everything, and they taught me a lot of stuff from that.

I tried going to college while I was in the Reserves, and I didn't like it. It wasn't for me. I went through, like, three semesters, and I hated it; and I was working fulltime at the time at UPS just to make money.

And my old man was a cop for 22 years, and I grew up in that atmosphere. He was a SWAT team guy, as well; and he always took me to training whenever he couldn't find a babysitter. So I just kind of grew up in that environment, and I always knew I wanted to do it eventually.

So I stopped going to college and I quit my job at UPS, and I went to the police academy.

I graduated from that and worked down in

Washington County for about two years, right down

- south of here. I got hired fulltime in Butler
 County here in Butler City in 2018, and I have
 been here ever since.
 - Q. Thank you. And what year did you graduate from the police academy?
 - A. 2015 or '16.
 - Q. Okay. And one MOS in the Marine Corps?
 - A. Correct. Just military police, 5811.
 - Q. Okay. Thank for your service.
- 10 A. Yes, ma'am.
- Q. So you mentioned that you were at the Trump rally in 2020. Have you done any other private security with any other rallies?

- Q. And do you have any experience with security details?
- 17 A. No.
- Q. Okay. And do you have any experience coordinating with PSP or other Federal entities?
 - A. Through our patrol job. I mean, we coordinate with State Police quite often. I have been on drug warrants, drug raids with Federal agencies, DEA and I think FBI and State Police and all that stuff. So yes, I was familiar with working with them.

- Q. Moving to the July 11th walk-through, did you guys walk around the fences and discuss vulnerabilities and talk about any anticipated security changes?
 - A. There was definitely the fence line, like I, you know, explained before, the fence line with the cloth put over it.
 - O. Uh-huh.

- A. Obviously, that is a concern, because if there is a crowd -- or I'm sorry -- a cover over the fence, there is probably not going to be a crowd gathering on the side of the fence because they can't see through it. So, obviously, that was a concern.
- Q. Did you talk to anyone explicitly about why the AGR Building was left outside of the perimeter?
- A. I think there was mumbling amongst the team, you know. "Is there going to be people over there, like, cops? You know, is that inside the perimeter, outside the perimeter?" It was all that stuff. The specifics, I can't remember.
- Q. Okay. Now, do you know from living and working -- or excuse me -- from working in Butler, what types of events are typically held

at the Butler Farm?

- A. Farm shows. That is about as far as I know.
- Q. Okay. Any previous logistical issues with hosting large events at the farm, as far as you know?
 - A. Not that I am not aware of. I'm unaware.
 - Q. Okay. Moving to, kind of, just the OPS Plan and just the general QRF discussions, can you give us an example of when the QR team, the QRF Team, would have been deployed?
- A. From our understanding, the QRF Team would be deployed if there was -- if there was an event outside the perimeter that patrol couldn't handle anymore, if it got out of hand, such as a civil disturbance, like a protest that got out of hand.

We were told, you know, if a drone was down, we were to recover a drone, or the drone.

- Q. Uh-huh.
- 21 A. Obviously, what happened falls underneath 22 that umbrella.
 - Q. Okay.
- A. But, you know, what happened, what ended up happening with an active shooter, any type of

- 1 shooter, multiple shooter, single shooter,
- 2 | anything like that.
- Q. Yes. And moving to the day of the event
- 4 at the briefing that you were at in the morning
- 5 of the 13th that you mentioned --
- 6 A. Uh-huh.
- 7 Q. -- did anyone at that briefing or any
- 8 | separate meeting that you had bring up the fact
- 9 that the Secret Service was going to have counter
- 10 | snipers?
- 11 A. Yes. It was brought up that they would

- 24 | Q. So were you aware of how many Command
- 25 | Posts were there that day?

- A. Yes. I was aware of ours, the local

 police and ESU, and then I was aware of the

 Secret Service Command Post, and I was told that

 it was the main office building for the farm show

 grounds (gesturing).
 - Q. Okay. In your experience, both in the Marine Corps and law enforcement, is it normal to have two Command Posts?
 - A. I have seen both. I mean, in my personal opinion, I think that there probably should have been -- I think it's more effective to have them all in one place for command and control.
- Q. Okay. Uh-huh. And can you kind of walk us through who your chain of command was the day of the 13th?
- 16 A. Yes. So above me would have been,
 17 technically, who is second in
 18 charge of the team, and then commander.
- Q. Okay. And where were they located on the
- 22 A. was with us at the barn,
 23 and also behind the stage area with Secret
 24 Service.

- Q. Okay. So in that chain of command, what did you have the authority to authorize versus what would you have needed your Deputy Commander or Commander to authorize?
- A. I believe I had authorization to react appropriately to any threat; and then if there was, you know, something questionable, then I felt free to run up the chain of command and ask for their guidance, so...
- Q. Okay. And on the day of the 13th, did you see any drones?
- 13 | A. I don't recall.

- Q. Okay. And you mentioned earlier that you were on OPS 4. How would you characterize your interactions and communications with the local Command Post?
 - A. I believe our communication was clear and concise. There was no radio problems. It was pretty standard for us to use a channel with that, a channel from patrol. They were on a different channel from us, you know, and that is pretty standard.
- Q. Yeah. Did you have any communication with the Secret Service that day?

A. Me personally, no.

- Q. Did you have any communication with other law enforcement agencies?
- A. If I wanted to, I could have. I could have just switched my channel if I needed to talk to them.
- Q. Were you surfing the channels at all, or were you solely on OPS 4?
- 9 A. I was solely on OPS 4.
- 10 Q. And that day, did you use the Signal app
 11 at all?
- 12 A. No, not that I recall.
- Q. Okay. Now -- and I know that we kind of started talking about this earlier, but just to make sure it's clear in my mind: When did you first become aware of report of a suspicious person?
- A. I don't know the exact timeframe off the top of my head.
- 20 Q. Yeah.
- A. It was probably before Former President
 Trump arrived. It was somewhere in that
 timeframe, maybe, like, half an hour or 45
 minutes to an hour before he arrived.
- Q. And when you first became aware of that

- 1 there was a suspicious person, were you also notified that he had a rangefinder at the same 2 time, or were those two different pieces of 3 information? 4 Like I explained before --5 Uh-huh. 6 0. 7 -- I was getting this information by word 8 of mouth from , , because I 9 wasn't on my phone. Yeah, on the phone. 10 Yeah. I was paying attention to what was 11 12 going on, you know, in real life around me. 13 And so he was telling me about, you know, 14 this kid with the -- you know, who ended up being Crooks, with the long hair, and I think he said 15 he had a gray T-shirt on and supposedly had a 16 rangefinder, so... 17 18 Ο. Uh-huh. Did show you a picture 19 of him at all? I don't recall. 20 Α. 21 Okay. So can you just walk us through a Ο.
- Q. Okay. So can you just walk us through a timeline of what was happening when shots were fired with you and your team?
- A. Of course. Myself, , and were standing in the grassy area behind -- if you

are looking at the bleachers and the stage from the crowd, the left side bleachers. We were standing in the grassy area behind that in front of the red barn that we were staged in; and we were scanning the crowd that was -- we were watching the crowd that was outside the second fence, closest to the AGR Building.

And the next thing I knew, there were uniformed patrol officers running along the grass in front of the building, on our side of the building. They were running along the -- what would have been the South Side of the building.

And that is when I reacted. I saw that, and I was, like, "Oh, something is going down."

So that is when I ran back to the barn. And our side-by-side that I was driving for our QRF Team was parked right inside of that front door of the barn, facing towards the crowd.

I yelled at our guys for QRF. I was, like, "Let's go. Something's going on," you know, "Hop in the side-by-side." So we all did that.

I started inching out, and I was trying to see what was going on over there; and as I started inching out, shots started going off.

Right away, I pulled out of there driving. We were all loaded up in the side-by-side.

And as I was pulling out, the rounds kept going. They were cracking pretty close. They was pretty close to us, and I thought we were getting shot at, and I was, you know, pedal to the floor.

I went around the building. I drove down along the north side of the building of the barn, and I headed east, back towards Meridian Road.

Q. Uh-huh.

A. I made a left on Meridian Road. I kept driving down. On the left-hand side, on the west side of the road there on Meridian Road, there was houses; and I wasn't sure how to get over to the AGR Building. I just knew I had to.

I was looking and looking and looking, and I didn't know if I was going to be able to get through these people's backyards because of fences or whatever might be back there, a tree line.

So I kept driving northbound on Meridian Road, and I found an access road that goes towards the big water tower that we have all seen.

I drove the side-by-side up that access road westbound towards AGR. I got up into that parking lot on the east side of the building. I made it to that side, pulled up towards like the loading dock area.

- O. Uh-huh.
- A. We all jumped out. I was quick. I didn't even shut the doors on the side-by-side and left the engine running. We hopped out as fast as we could.
- Q. So can we pause for just one moment --
- 12 A. Yeah.

- Q. -- because I want to come back to this in one moment, but I have just a few follow-up questions from all of the information you just gave.
- 17 A. Sure. Yeah.
 - Q. Why were the three of you looking over at the AGR Building before you saw the people running? It sounds like you guys were staring at it before everything kind of started occurring.
- A. Yes. So me, personally, I was watching, because brought up about the suspicious person.
- 25 Q. Uh-huh.

- 1 So I was looking for that. Α. also had mentioned -- he was pointing out the other people that were acting suspicious with the kid 3 wearing the red shirt, the older gentleman 4 wearing, you know, the yellow construction shirt, 5 and I believe there was a female that was pointed 6 out as, as well, that we suspected might have been distracting, used as a distraction tool for 8 us, and then the other people walking around.

And then I heard some yelling saying -- I believe it was saying that he was further down from where we were at on the loading dock.

- A. So we started going down, walking south along the building, on the east side of the building, and we found -- behind two tall pine trees we found a cut-in to the building, and there was a lower roof.

So we made a human ladder (gesturing) and hoisted each other up. A Washington Regional SWAT member team guy, he was in front of me. He got up first, and then I climbed up second.

And once I got up on the roof, I looked to my left, and I saw the body laying there, you know, towards the center of the roof, the ridge of the roof.

The Washington operator, he was giving verbal commands, like, "Show me your hands. Show me hands." I just kept my rifle up on the body, because you don't know if he's dead. I kept my rifle up on the body and just provided cover because while he is giving commands, I didn't want to start yelling, because if you get too

many people start yelling, it gets confusing for the bad guy, you know, the person you are giving commands to. Not so much, you know --

But anyways, and then two more guys got up there as commands were being yelled as I was providing cover on the body; and that's when I said to the Washington guy, "I'll provide cover. You go hands on and put him in restraints."

I kept my rifle on the guy, on Crooks, on his body. At this time, he was laying on his left -- kind of on his left shoulder, (demonstrating), a long trail of blood running down the roof. I've seen enough dead bodies, and he looked very dead, you know.

Q. (Nods her head.)

- A. I said on the radio, "The shooter is down, he's down hard." I stood over the body with my rifle while the Washington Regional SWAT guy, he put -- you know, he started going hands on with the body. He pulled the rifle away from the body, because, once again, you just don't know. You just never know, so you want to remove that weapon from the body.
 - Q. That is standard operating procedure --

- 1 A. It is.
 - Q. -- to take the rifle and the weapon?
- 3 | A. It is.

- Q. How far did he move it?
 - A. Approximately ten feet to the left of the body, which would have been in the direction east from the body on the roof (gesturing).

He laid it -- he laid the rifle about ten feet away from the body, and then he went to handcuff him. He put a -- the Washington guy grabbed the zip tie handcuffs, the flex cuffs.

I grabbed the shooter's legs, and he grabbed -- the Washington guy grabbed his torso, and we laid him out flat out on his stomach; and the Washington guy put the flex cuffs on his hands, subdued his hands.

- Q. Do you know how the Washington State team got there to the AGR Building? Did they ever tell you?
- A. The Washington team?
- 21 Q. Yes. Excuse me. The Washington team.
- 22 Not Washington State. The Washington County
- 23 team.
- 24 A. They drove a county SUV that was there.
- 25 Q. Okay. And so after you and the

Washington County individual put the zip ties on, what is your next move?

- A. So from my training, you know active shooter training, we were always trained to, once you get to the shooter, if you are, like, the first or second guy there, you are stuck with him until a higher power comes along and relieves you, whether it be investigators or your command or whoever. Until somebody higher than you comes, you are stuck with that body until you are relieved, properly relieved.
 - O. Yeah.

2.0

A. So the Washington SWAT operator and I stayed with the body.

Another standard operating procedure that we have is no matter what you see, you still call for a medic to come and treat any wounds or confirm that he is dead. So I called for a medic to come to the rooftop.

That is when a Beaver County SWAT

operator and a Beaver County Tactical Medic came

over and climbed up on the roof. By this point,

I did call for a ladder so we can get up and down

off the roof quicker.

Q. Uh-huh.

- A. They came over. They climbed up the ladder. The ladder was placed where we climbed up, where we hoisted each other up (gesturing). They climbed up that ladder and came up. The medic looked at the body of Crooks, and, "Yeah, he's dead." He confirmed that he was dead.
- Q. Do you know an approximate time that happened?
 - A. No, I don't.
 - Q. Okay.

2.0

A. From there, we stayed on the roof with the body because nobody come to relieve us yet.

The gentleman that we have all seen in the Body Cam footage -- black suit, red tie -- he made his way up there, and he started asking questions about what happened. The Beaver County SWAT operator, he talked more than I did because, apparently, he knew more than I did. I don't know where he had gotten all of his information from.

I answered what I could. I told the

Secret Service -- I believe -- I think he was a

Secret Service agent, the guy in the red tie. I

pointed out to him everything that we saw on the

roof, the shell casings, the shooter's hair, that

was -- because the shot that impacted him had blew his hair off. That was it essentially.

There was a black backpack on the roof, as well; and we did -- the Washington SWAT operator went through Crooks' pants pockets and pulled out a remote control device. So we called that out, as well, and requested the bomb squad to come check out the device, you know, assuming the worst that it, you know, could have controlled explosives somewhere, so...

- Q. And what happened after you called out for the bomb squad?
- 13 A. Allegheny County Bomb Squad responded.
- Q. And is this a different bomb squad than the one that was in the barn with you?
- 16 A. The ones in the barn were unarmed guys
 17 with canines.
- 18 | Q. Okay.

- A. I believe they were talking to them. I believe they were, like, Army National Guard, and they were contracted in to do their work as bomb-sniffing dogs.
 - Q. Okay.
- A. But no, they were not on the roof with us.

- Q. Okay. So another team came in, and then what happened?
- A. A member of the Allegheny County Bomb

 Squad came up on the roof, took a look at the remote control device. He took the battery out.

 It was powered by a nine-volt battery. He took it out, and I think he took a picture of it or something; and he mentioned something about how that particular device was featured in recent training that they went to, and he left the roof.
- 11 | Q. Okay.

- A. Time had passed. At this point, there was other Secret Service agents, I believe, coming up on the roof.
- Q. Did they announce themselves as Secret Service, or is that your assumption.
- A. So they -- some of them had vests on that said, "Secret Service" and stuff (gesturing). So I assumed.
- Q. So it's a good assumption?
- A. Yeah. And then at one point, a group showed up. I believe he was a U.S. Assistant District Attorney?
- He showed up on the roof with his group of co-workers, associates, whatever you want to

- 1 call them. As soon as they got up there, it
- 2 | seemed like maybe only five minutes after they
- 3 got up there, they started talking amongst each
- 4 | other -- and I don't recall what they were saying
- 5 to each other -- I was then notified over the
- 6 radio that the bomb squad indicated that there
- 7 | was a bomb in the building underneath of us.

 - After that, what I believe to be State and Federal agencies, they took over the scene, and my guys never went back up on the roof.
 - Q. Okay. So you never went back up on the roof?

- Q. The last time that you saw Mr. Crooks'
 body was as everybody was getting off the roof
 due to the bomb threat?

A. Yes.

- Q. Okay. Within 30 minutes, the "all
- 3 clear," and then are there people that are
- 4 | heading back up onto the roof right after that?
- 5 A. Yeah, as far as I remember.
- 6 Q. Okay. So do you think maybe there was
- 7 only a 30-minute period, give or take a few,
- 8 | where nobody was on the roof?
- 9 A. Sure.
- 10 | Q. Okay. Backing up a little bit, I am
- 11 | interested in kind of just law enforcement
- 12 thoughts, generally or specifically, about the
- 13 | fact that a rangefinder was announced.
- 14 | In your experience in military and law
- 15 enforcement, what does the fact that an
- 16 | individual with a rangefinder mean to you?
- 17 A. Through military experience and with law
- 18 | enforcement?
- 19 Q. Uh-huh.
- 20 A. Usually, a rangefinder is used for
- 21 | finding the distance of something to adjust your
- 22 | sights.
- 23 Q. When you heard that there was somebody
- 24 | with a rangefinder --

 They use binoculars, typically, because rangefinders don't magnify. You can see from a distance.
 - Q. Okay. Sorry. That was a little bit of a sidenote; but going back, 30 minutes, "all clear," and then what do you and your team do?
 - A. I believe I said on the radio -- I asked command, I asked _____, or I told him, I said, "I've got five guys, five or six guys" -- however many were with me -- I told him, "We're looking for work," which means we are looking for something to do.

- A. And he told me to take my guys and return back the Command Post. So we got back on the side-by-side and we left the AGR Building and

- 1 Q. It's always a possibility. Based on your
- 2 experience, is that something that you would have
- 3 done -- if you knew that there were patrol people
- 4 out there, would you have -- let's say it was the
- 5 | State Police or it was the Sheriff's
- 6 Department -- would you have been able to contact
- 7 directly somebody in the State Police Command
- 8 | Center or whoever, to say, "Hey, can you contact
- 9 | your patrol persons who are out here, the people
- 10 | who are out here, and ask them to contact -- you
- 11 know, to engage this person"?
- 12 A. The State Police, no, because I know that
- 13 | we have different radios than they do.

Here's a description. Can somebody have somebody talk to this person?"
- A. Yes, I could have.
- Q. Okay. All right. Let me ask you this
 question. I am not trying to make it too
 hypothetical, because then it gets into the realm
 of too much.

- 25 Q. The hypothetical, if, again, if there was
