[REDACTED]: Today is September 13, 2024, and this is the transcribed interview of -- is it [REDACTED] or [REDACTED]?

OFFICER [REDACTED]: Either/or is fine.

[REDACTED]: All right -- of [REDACTED] [REDACTED].

House Resolution 1367 directed this Task Force to investigate the facts and circumstances of the attempted assassination of Donald J. Trump on July 13, 2024 in Butler, Pennsylvania.

Pursuant to House Resolution 1367 Chairman Kelly and Ranking Member Crow have requested this interview as part of the Task Force Investigation.

Would you please introduce yourself and spell your name for the record?

OFFICER [REDACTED]: Yes, sir. The first name is [REDACTED], middle name, [REDACTED], and the last name is [REDACTED], [REDACTED], as in [REDACTED], and that is [REDACTED].

[REDACTED]: Thank you, [REDACTED].

My name is [REDACTED], and I am Special Counsel and a consultant with the Task

1 Force. I want to thank you for coming in today  
2 for this interview.

3 The Task Force recognizes and appreciates  
4 that you are here voluntarily. You are allowed  
5 to have an attorney present to advise during this  
6 interview. You have an attorney present.

7 Will the counsel please introduce  
8 yourself for the record?

9 [REDACTED]: [REDACTED],  
10 [REDACTED].

11 [REDACTED]: Thank you.

12 For the record, members of Congress are  
13 permitted to attend the interview if they so wish  
14 and ask you questions. There are no members here  
15 presently. We don't expect there will be today;  
16 but just so you know that for the record.

17 OFFICER [REDACTED]: Sure.

18 [REDACTED]: Next, would the Minority  
19 staff please introduce yourselves for the record?

20 [REDACTED]: [REDACTED]  
21 [REDACTED], Investigative Counsel. I am with  
22 the Minority.

23 [REDACTED]: [REDACTED],  
24 Researcher with the Task Force hired by the  
25 Senate.

1                   ██████████: And with me is ██████████  
2  ██████████, also with the Majority.

3                   OFFICER ██████████: Yes, sir.

4                   ██████████: ██████████, before we  
5 begin, I would like to go over the ground rules  
6 of the interview.

7                   The way this interview will proceed is as  
8 follows: The Majority and the Minority will  
9 alternate asking you questions, 30 minutes per  
10 side, until each side is finished with their  
11 questioning.

12                   The Majority staff will begin -- that's  
13 us -- and proceed for 30 minutes; and then the  
14 Minority staff will have 30 minutes to ask  
15 questions.

16                   We will then alternate back and forth in  
17 this matter until both sides have no further  
18 questions.

19                   If either side is in the middle of a  
20 specific line of questions, they may choose to  
21 end a few minutes past the half an hour to ensure  
22 completion of that specific line of questioning,  
23 including any pertinent follow-ups.

24                   In this interview, while one member of  
25 the staff for each side may lead the questioning,

1 additional staff may ask questions.

2           There is a court reporter taking down  
3 everything I say and everything you say to make a  
4 written record of the interview. For the record  
5 to be clear, please wait until the staffer  
6 questioning you finishes each question before you  
7 begin your answer, and the staffer will wait  
8 until you finish your response before proceeding  
9 to the next question.

10           Further, to ensure the court reporter can  
11 properly record this interview, please speak  
12 clearly, concisely, and slowly. Also, the court  
13 reporter cannot record nonverbal answers, such as  
14 movements or nodding or shaking of the head. It  
15 is important that you answer each question with  
16 an audible verbal answer. Do you understand  
17 that?

18                   OFFICER [REDACTED]: Yes, sir.

19           [REDACTED]: We want you to answer  
20 our questions in the most complete and truthful  
21 manner possible, so we will take our time. If  
22 you have any questions or do not fully understand  
23 the question, please let us know. We will  
24 attempt to clarify, add context to, or rephrase  
25 our questions. Do you understand?

1                   OFFICER [REDACTED]: Yes, sir.

2                   [REDACTED]: And if we ask about  
3 specific conversations or events in the past and  
4 you are unable to recall the exact words or  
5 details, you should testify to the substance of  
6 those conversations or events to the best of  
7 recollection.

8                   If you recall only a part of a  
9 conversation or event, you should give us your  
10 best recollection of those events or parts of  
11 conversations that you do recall. Do you  
12 understand?

13                  OFFICER [REDACTED]: Yes.

14                  [REDACTED]: Although you are here  
15 voluntarily and we will not swear you in, you are  
16 required pursuant to 18 U.S.C. Section 1001 to  
17 answer questions from Congress truthfully.

18                  This also applies to questions posed by  
19 Congressional staff or consultants like myself in  
20 this interview. Do you understand?

21                  OFFICER [REDACTED]: Yes.

22                  [REDACTED]: If at any time you  
23 knowingly make false statements, you could be  
24 subject to criminal prosecution. Do you  
25 understand?



1                   OFFICER [REDACTED]: Yes, sir.

2                   [REDACTED]: Is there any reason you  
3 are unable to provide truthful testimony in  
4 today's interview?

5                   OFFICER [REDACTED]: No.

6                   [REDACTED]: Please note that if you  
7 wish to assert a privilege over any statement  
8 today, that assertion must comply with the rules  
9 of the Task Force on the Attempted Assassination  
10 of Donald J. Trump.

11                  For the Chair to consider assertions of  
12 privilege over testimony or statements, witnesses  
13 or entities must clearly state the specific  
14 privilege being asserted and the reason for  
15 assertion on or before the scheduled date of  
16 testimony or appearance.

17                  You have an attorney present; and if your  
18 attorney has any privileges he would want to  
19 assert, he will do so during the course of this  
20 interview.

21                  Furthermore, if at any time during the  
22 interview, we ask any questions or you have an  
23 answer that you would like to consult with your  
24 attorney prior to answering the question, you are  
25 free to inform us of that. We will go off the

1 record, and then you and your attorney can  
2 consult privately. Do you understand?

3 OFFICER [REDACTED]: Yes, sir.

4 [REDACTED]: Finally, I would like to  
5 note the content of what we discuss today is  
6 confidential.

7 We ask that you not speak about what we  
8 discuss here today in this interview to any  
9 outside individual in order to preserve the  
10 integrity of this investigation.

11 For these same reasons, marked exhibits  
12 used today will be provided to the court reporter  
13 so that they may go in the official transcript;  
14 and any copies of those exhibits will be returned  
15 to us when we wrap up.

16 We plan to take five-minute breaks at the  
17 end of each 30 minutes of questioning, or as  
18 needed; but if you need to take a longer break or  
19 a break before that, please let us know, and we  
20 will be happy to accommodate you.

21 OFFICER [REDACTED]: Uh-huh.

22 [REDACTED]: To the extent there is a  
23 pending question, we would ask that you finish  
24 answering the question before we take the break.  
25 Do you understand?

1                   OFFICER [REDACTED]: Yes, sir.

2                   [REDACTED]: Do you have any  
3 questions before we begin?

4                   OFFICER [REDACTED]: No, sir.

5                   [REDACTED]: All right. Great. I am  
6 going to set a timer.

7                   (At 4:00 p.m., [REDACTED] began his  
8 questioning of the interviewee.)

9                   - - - - -

10                  OFFICER [REDACTED],  
11 the interviewee, having been called by Task Force  
12 on the Assassination Attempt of Donald J. Trump,  
13 was examined and testified as follows:

14                               EXAMINATION

15 BY [REDACTED]:

16                  Q.   [REDACTED], can you tell us what your  
17 fulltime job is?

18                  A.   I am a patrolman with Butler City Police  
19 Department here in Butler County, Pennsylvania.

20                  Q.   And you are also a member of the ESU?

21                  A.   Yes.

22                  Q.   And how long have you been a member of  
23 ESU?

24                  A.   Since I believe it was March of 2019.

25                  Q.   And what is your current position at ESU?

1 A. Assistant -- Assistant Squad Leader or  
2 Team Leader with Alpha Squad.

3 Q. And Alpha Squad is -- we understand there  
4 are two squads --

5 A. Yes.

6 Q. -- in ESU, and it's Alpha Squad and Beta  
7 Squad, and you are the Assistant Leader for Alpha  
8 Squad?

9 A. Correct. It's Alpha, Bravo.

10 Q. Alpha, Bravo. I'm sorry.

11 A. That's all right.

12 Q. Excuse me.

13 A. That's okay.

14 Q. Alpha and Bravo?

15 A. Yes.

16 Q. And who is the Leader of Alpha?

17 A. It's [REDACTED].

18 Q. [REDACTED]. So is he your direct --  
19 do you report directly to him?

20 A. Correct.

21 Q. And he reports to Commander [REDACTED]?

22 A. Oh, through chain of command, which would  
23 be [REDACTED] and then to [REDACTED].

24 Q. Okay. Got it. And how long have you  
25 been Assistant Leader?

1 A. (No response.)

2 Q. Just roughly. It doesn't have to be --

3 A. Two or three years.

4 Q. Two or three years. Okay.

5 Were you a part of the security -- or the  
6 ESU security support for the 2020 rally that  
7 Former President Trump had?

8 A. Yes.

9 Q. And at that time, what was your position  
10 at ESU?

11 A. I was just a general operator. I wasn't  
12 in a leadership position at the time.

13 Q. Okay. And as an operator, what are you  
14 specifically trained to do?

15 A. Oh, a lot of things. Mostly, entry, room  
16 entry, Blackbeard deterrence, door kickers,  
17 building clearing; and outdoor movements, such as  
18 manhunts through open terrain, woodlands; and I'm  
19 trained in less lethal weapons, such as batons  
20 and gas agents; trained in active shooter  
21 responses such as -- you know, a little bit of  
22 everything.

23 Q. Okay. Understood. You are, for lack of  
24 a better term, a SWAT operator?

25 A. Yes.

1 Q. And how many people report directly to  
2 you at ESU?

3 A. Roughly ten.

4 Q. And one of those -- one of those, your  
5 reports, is [REDACTED], correct?

6 A. Correct.

7 Q. All right. And you have been trained as  
8 an operator for -- you were trained and you  
9 received training as an operator during the time  
10 you have been at ESU?

11 A. Correct.

12 Q. All right. So I am going to turn now to  
13 the July 13th event --

14 A. Uh-huh.

15 Q. -- and I am going to start with the  
16 planning for that event.

17 A. Sure.

18 Q. And I just want to understand what your  
19 involvement was in the planning for the event.

20 A. Yes.

21 Q. First of all, do you recall that you  
22 first heard about the event roughly the Friday  
23 before? It was July 5th of this year?

24 A. It was around that time, yes. I first  
25 heard about it over the news. It was broadcast

1 on the Pittsburgh news.

2 Q. Okay.

3 A. One of the news channels is how I came to  
4 find out about it.

5 Q. Do you recall if you ever received any  
6 kind of text message or anything from Commander  
7 [REDACTED] or others at ESU that ESU was likely to be  
8 called in to support that event?

9 A. I believe -- so I was on duty, on patrol,  
10 when word started getting around. We were -- a  
11 group of us, we all happened to just work at the  
12 same time at the same shift, and we met up at a  
13 gas station in the middle of the night.

14 I believe we were on midnight shift, and  
15 we met up at a gas station in the middle of the  
16 night, and we started talking about it. We --  
17 you know, we figured that we would be asked to,  
18 you know, pull security for the rally.

19 Q. Right.

20 A. And then I don't remember there being a  
21 text message off the top of my head.

22 Q. All right. That's fine. But you became  
23 aware of that, not only from the news, but also  
24 from ESU, that there was likely that you would be  
25 called in -- not you specifically, maybe, but ESU

1 would be called in to provide support?

2 A. Yes.

3 Q. So I am going to ask you about a series  
4 of meetings that occurred prior to the event, and  
5 see which, if any, you were directly involved in.

6 A. Uh-huh.

7 Q. On Monday, July 8th, there was a meeting  
8 between the Secret Service and ESU -- and the  
9 Butler County ESU and other local law enforcement  
10 where the Secret Service gave a general briefing  
11 as to what they would need. Were you present for  
12 that?

13 A. No.

14 Q. On July -- on Tuesday, July 9th, there  
15 were -- not meetings, but there were -- some of  
16 your colleagues in ESU -- not necessarily in your  
17 group. Or I shouldn't say "not necessarily," but  
18 not operators, but snipers and others, who toured  
19 parts of the event site. Were you part of that  
20 tour?

21 A. No.

22 Q. On July 9th -- I'm sorry. On July 10th,  
23 Wednesday, there was further site tours. Were  
24 you part of that, those site tours?

25 A. No.



1 Q. And on July 11th, Thursday, there was a  
2 walk-through that occurred that the Secret  
3 Service was present for, some members of Butler  
4 County ESU, as well as other law enforcement was  
5 present for. Were you present for that?

6 A. Yes.

7 Q. Okay. So why don't we start with: When  
8 did you first learn that there would, in fact, be  
9 a need for ESU support, and your support, in  
10 particular, for this event? Again, I am not  
11 looking for exact times or days. Just generally.

12 A. I believe it would have been the Tuesday,  
13 so that would have been July 9th, if I'm -- if my  
14 math is correct.

15 Q. Yes. That's right.

16 A. After my daylight shift, I went to -- our  
17 team had training at a church. They were doing  
18 some sort of active shooter training there; and  
19 by the time I got to this church, the training  
20 was already concluded by the time I got there.

21 And then the walk-through for July 11th,  
22 that Thursday, was mentioned, and I was asked to  
23 be there, to be present.

24 Q. All right. Did you have any under-  
25 standing before the walk-through of what your

1 role -- and when I say "you," I mean you and your  
2 team -- what your role would be at the event?

3 A. I -- at the -- on Tuesday, I believe,  
4 before the walk-through, I believed that would  
5 just be Assistant Squad Leader, as I normally am.

6 Q. Okay.

7 A. And then Thursday, you know, to fast  
8 forward, I did the walk-through; and then after  
9 we got done with the walk-through, all of our  
10 team leadership went to Butler Township Police  
11 Department, and we started putting together this  
12 OPS Plan (indicating) that I believe you guys  
13 have a copy of.

14 Q. Yes.

15 [REDACTED]: Yes.

16 A. And that is when I learned my position  
17 for the rally would actually be Team Leader for  
18 the QRF.

19 Q. Okay. Got it. And let's start with this  
20 a little bit with the walk-through.

21 A. Sure.

22 Q. I am going ask you more about your  
23 impressions of the walk-through and then anything  
24 about conversations like that at this point.

25 A. Uh-huh.

1 Q. So the walk-through, as I mentioned the  
2 Secret Service was there, some members of the  
3 Secret Service and other law enforcement. Did  
4 you have a sense of was it a well-organized  
5 walk-through from your perspective?

6 A. No.

7 Q. Okay. And why do you say that?

8 A. There were -- it didn't seem like there  
9 was any designation for where we should all be  
10 paying attention to.

11 Q. Uh-huh.

12 A. We broke off from the main crowd. I  
13 believe they were talking -- the Secret Service  
14 and, like, fire department and fire -- you know,  
15 local firemen and EMS, I believe, they were  
16 talking about, like, where the food trucks were  
17 going to be.

18 Q. Right.

19 A. So a group of us broke off with a Secret  
20 Service sniper, a counter sniper. I don't  
21 remember the name off the top of my head. It  
22 will probably come back to me as I'm talking  
23 here.

24 We walked to -- we walked around the  
25 buildings, around the farm show grounds, to see

1 where everything was, where the layout was, what  
2 the layout was like.

3 We walked over to a building beyond the  
4 grandstands (gesturing). We found a building  
5 that would be suitable for Beaver County ESU that  
6 would be coming to assist us. We found a  
7 building that was suitable for them.

8 And then we walked back over to where the  
9 grandstands were going to be -- or I'm sorry --  
10 to where the actual rally was going to be, where  
11 the stage and where the bleachers were going to  
12 be set up, and they were actively being set up  
13 while we were there.

14 We walked over to the red barns that we  
15 all have seen now.

16 Q. Right.

17 A. And we decided that that far left barn,  
18 if you are looking at the barns from the stage  
19 area, that was going to be our position.

20 Q. Got it. And the decision about where you  
21 were going to be positioned, that was a decision  
22 that you all made?

23 A. Yes.

24 Q. Right.

25 A. And there was the Secret Service counter

1 sniper that was there with us; and I don't  
2 remember his exact words, but it seemed like he  
3 was okay with it.

4 Q. Right.

5 A. And then there was a female -- a Hispanic  
6 female Secret Service agent. I don't remember  
7 her name, either, off the top of my head. She  
8 made an appearance while we were at the barn, and  
9 she was okay with it, as well.

10 Q. Okay. So it's fair to say that they  
11 were -- that your impression was that Secret  
12 Service, they certainly weren't directing you  
13 where to be?

14 A. (The interviewee nods his head.)

15 Q. They were letting you tell them where you  
16 thought was best, and they were okay with it?

17 A. Yes.

18 Q. And can you tell us why you decided that  
19 that barn would be the best place for you guys to  
20 be deployed or to be positioned?

21 A. The space. Space for all of our  
22 equipment and guys over there, the location of  
23 it, and close to where, you know, where all the  
24 people were going to be, the crowd, and close to  
25 where, you know, where the Former President was

1 going to be. Just in the relative location, it  
2 seemed centralized.

3 Q. Right.

4 A. So --

5 Q. Do you recall -- at the time now we know  
6 it as the AGR Building. Do you recall discussing  
7 the AGR property at any time during that walk-  
8 through?

9 A. Yes.

10 Q. What do you recall about that?

11 A. I remember talking about the two fence  
12 lines that were in between the red barn and the  
13 AGR building. Myself and another guy from our  
14 team, we were looking at it, and we were talking,  
15 like, you know, "Hopefully, that's closed off to  
16 the public. Hopefully, there's not going to be  
17 people over there standing on the other side of  
18 the fence, because that's an issue."

19 Q. Uh-huh.

20 A. I believe it was the Secret Service  
21 counter sniper, I remember, that was there with  
22 us, he mentioned that there would be a black  
23 cloth, like, a blackout cloth --

24 Q. Right.

25 A. -- put all the way down the fence on that

1 outer fence.

2 Q. Separating the area that was -- at least  
3 the sight of the area where the AGR property was  
4 from the rally?

5 A. Yes.

6 Q. All right. Sorry about that.

7 A. Yes. Past that, I don't remember the  
8 rest of the conversation about the AGR Building.

9 Q. Okay. The Beaver County ESU folks were  
10 there. You said you found a building that was --  
11 you thought was appropriate for them?

12 A. Yes.

13 Q. And that was the AGR -- that was part of  
14 the AGR property?

15 A. No. That was on the farm show grounds  
16 property.

17 Q. Okay.

18 A. I believe if you guys have a map --

19 Q. Yes. So you are talking about not the  
20 Beaver County snipers?

21 A. Correct. Just the --

22 Q. Got it.

23 A. Just where their armored truck was going  
24 to be --

25 Q. Got it. I understand.

1       A.    -- and where their operators were going  
2 to stage.

3       Q.    Understood. Got it. Thank you.

4       A.    Uh-huh.

5       Q.    So during the course of that walk-  
6 through, did you have any concerns about your  
7 team's ability to provide the security that was  
8 being requested by the Secret Service?

9       A.    No. I had confidence in our abilities  
10 and -- yeah.

11      Q.    I got it. And can you just very  
12 generally tell us what were -- what was the  
13 responsibility that was being given to your group  
14 of SWAT?

15      A.    So what I learned later in the day after  
16 we were done with the walk-through, that's when  
17 we went back to, like I said, back to the Butler  
18 Township Police Department and sat down and  
19 started discussing who was going to do what.

20      Q.    Right.

21      A.    And that's when I was told I was going to  
22 be in charge of the Quick Reaction Team, or  
23 QRF --

24      Q.    QRF, right.

25      A.    -- or Quick Reaction Force.



1 Q. Right.

2 A. I learned that, you know, we would  
3 respond to outside the perimeter, if they are --  
4 you know, if anything went horribly wrong. You  
5 know, if there was something that anybody on  
6 regular patrol, if it got out of hand for them,  
7 we would respond accordingly.

8 Q. Right. Okay. Was it part of your  
9 responsibility to deal with a single act -- a  
10 single actor or a solo potential shooter,  
11 anything like that?

12 A. It's -- that is one of -- that falls  
13 under the umbrella of our duties I would assume.  
14 Yeah, I would say.

15 Q. Right. And also to retrieve any  
16 drones --

17 A. Yes.

18 Q. -- that anybody -- that any law  
19 enforcement saw?

20 A. Yes.

21 Q. And was that in the normal course for  
22 you, something that you were not surprised to  
23 learn, both of those things, both the single  
24 actor and also the drones?

25 A. In my career, that was the first time I

1 was ever told that I was in charge of recovering  
2 drones.

3 Q. Okay.

4 A. It just -- it has just never been a  
5 thing, so...

6 Q. Okay. So the single actor -- the single  
7 actor, that is sort of the normal course for the  
8 types of work you guys do?

9 A. Correct. Single actor. Multiple. Civil  
10 disturbances. Protests that get out of control.  
11 Yes.

12 Q. Right. Okay. Did you have any sense  
13 from your colleagues or directly from your own on  
14 whether or not there was any frustration or  
15 anything with respect to how the Secret Service  
16 was communicating with you all at that point  
17 about what their needs were?

18 A. Not that I recall at that time.

19 Q. Okay. And so then you mentioned you have  
20 the document in front of you; and I am going to  
21 try to go through a large part of the timeline,  
22 like, I might -- I believe my colleagues may go  
23 through some of that document.

24 So that document that you have in front  
25 of you, that is the response plan that you guys

1 put together that evening on the 11th?

2 A. Yes, sir.

3 Q. Okay. Got it.

4 A. Yes. This was our Operation Plan. This  
5 is standard any time we do any sort of -- any  
6 sort of operation, any sort of response. We come  
7 up with these plans any time we do a search  
8 warrant on a house or a building.

9 Q. Right.

10 A. We did some -- we did a similar OPS Plan  
11 back in 2020 for the first Donald Trump rally.

12 Q. Understood. Is that something -- is the  
13 OPS Plan, is that something you typically shared  
14 with other agencies or other groups of law  
15 enforcement?

16 A. It can be, yes.

17 Q. It can be. Do you know if it was shared  
18 in this particular case?

19 A. It was shared the day of the rally.

20 Q. The day of the rally.

21 A. I do know that.

22 Q. Okay. And it was shared with the Secret  
23 Service and others?

24 A. I do not know if it was shared with the  
25 Secret Service.

1 Q. Okay. Who do you know it was shared  
2 with?

3 A. So on the morning of the rally, we met at  
4 the Brady Paul FOP Lodge on the farm show ground  
5 property --

6 Q. Right.

7 A. -- for a briefing. I believe it was at  
8 9:00 a.m. In this room was members of Butler  
9 County ESU, Beaver County ESU, Washington  
10 County -- or Washington Regional SWAT, which is  
11 Washington County just south of Pittsburgh.

12 Q. Right.

13 A. I do not recall if there was fire  
14 department or medics in the room.

15 Q. Okay. Do you recall if Secret Service  
16 was present for that?

17 A. I do not recall.

18 Q. And that briefing was led by Commander  
19 [REDACTED] and [REDACTED], correct?

20 A. Correct.

21 Q. And at that briefing, they told the  
22 group, "Here's what we are expecting," they told  
23 everybody where they are supposed to be, and --

24 A. (The interviewee nods his head.)

25 Q. -- and did you have any concerns or hear

1 any concerns from anyone at that briefing about  
2 the plan that was put in place?

3 A. I had no concerns, and I do not recall  
4 any other concerns voiced.

5 Q. Okay. Now, your team, how many members  
6 of your team were active for this -- specifically  
7 your -- you know, the SWAT operators?

8 A. The SWAT operators? According to the  
9 line-up, there was guys coming and going  
10 throughout the day due to personal reasons and  
11 their regular fulltime jobs.

12 Q. Regular fulltime jobs, yeah.

13 A. There is a list on here (indicating) of  
14 the personnel on this slide here (indicating) --

15 Q. Right.

16 A. -- where it had the guys listed available  
17 that were present and what their positions were.  
18 For our QRF Team -- excuse me while I count real  
19 quick.

20 For QRF, there is ten of us, including  
21 myself.

22 Q. Right.

23 A. That included three SWAT operators from  
24 Washington County, that is Washington Regional  
25 SWAT, and one tactical medic.

1 Q. Right.

2 A. And then for the Counter Assault Team, on  
3 here (indicating), it was nine.

4 Q. Okay.

5 A. If that changed, I don't know off the top  
6 of my head.

7 Q. You don't know; but that is what your  
8 expectation was?

9 A. Yes, sir.

10 Q. And did you have any concerns at that  
11 time that you didn't have enough people to do  
12 what you were needed to do?

13 A. No.

14 Q. Okay. So just continuing through that  
15 day, once you had the briefing, were there any  
16 further briefings before you positioned yourself?

17 A. No.

18 Q. Okay. And so, roughly, what time did you  
19 get into position?

20 A. Probably around 10:00 a.m.

21 Q. All right. And you and the SWAT, the  
22 members of the SWAT QRF, you were in camo?

23 A. Yes.

24 Q. Or -- and sometimes you would wear the  
25 metal plates?

1 A. The ballistics, yeah.

2 Q. The ballistics?

3 A. Yeah, ceramic ballistics. Yeah.

4 Q. Right. And so you were not -- you were  
5 clearly, from your perspective, identifiable to  
6 the public, if someone saw you, even outside of  
7 the ballistics --

8 A. Yes.

9 Q. -- as a law enforcement?

10 A. Yes.

11 Q. Now you were going to be positioned in  
12 the barn --

13 A. Yes.

14 Q. -- during the event?

15 A. (The interviewee nods his head.)

16 Q. Had you been -- were you aware of a  
17 request that there not be an obvious show of  
18 force by law enforcement at the event?

19 A. From the brief, Commander [REDACTED], he stated  
20 that -- I believe it was the campaign staff, they  
21 were not concerned about us being seen by the  
22 general public, but they didn't want us in view  
23 of all the media, you know, the cameras and what-  
24 not from the media that was set up there so --

25 Q. Right. Got it. So in other words, was

1 it your understanding that they didn't want --  
2 what Commander [REDACTED] was saying was that they  
3 didn't want the stage itself, where the media  
4 would be focused, because that would be where the  
5 candidate and the speakers would be, to have  
6 obvious, I'd call it, show of force?

7 A. Yes. From my understanding, they didn't  
8 want our big armored truck parked right behind  
9 where Trump was, you know.

10 Q. Right.

11 A. They didn't want dudes standing there in  
12 camo and rifles and plate carriers and all that  
13 stuff -- they didn't want all that in the view of  
14 the, you know, media.

15 Q. Did you think at that time that not being  
16 staged in a position that would be in camera view  
17 for the media would impede your ability to do the  
18 job you had been asked to do?

19 A. No. I had full confidence that wherever  
20 we were at, we could perform our duties, yeah.

21 Q. Okay. So now when you are positioned in  
22 the barn at roughly 10 o'clock, roughly how many  
23 people were with you from your team in that barn?

24 A. I believe the full team was in there.

25 Q. The full team.



1 A. Except for our sniper teams.

2 Q. The sniper teams were out --

3 A. Yes.

4 Q. -- but your team, the QRF Team was there?

5 A. Correct. The QRF and our Counter  
6 Assault, the CAT team, was there.

7 Q. Got it. And was the instruction that you  
8 were to stay in that barn until called upon or  
9 were members of the team free to exit and, you  
10 know, check around or do whatever they were going  
11 to do?

12 A. We were free to exit, come and go, if we  
13 needed to.

14 Q. Right.

15 A. Myself and [REDACTED], I had a side-by-side, a  
16 big, like, a six-seater side-by-side --

17 Q. Right.

18 A. We hopped in that, and we drove around  
19 the grounds. You know, as soon as we started  
20 getting set up in that barn the first thing in  
21 the morning there, we drove around just to see  
22 how everything was set up --

23 Q. Got it.

24 A. -- because even though we were there on  
25 Thursday --

1 Q. Right.

2 A. -- only a small part of the place was set  
3 up for the actual event.

4 Q. Right.

5 A. So we wanted to get an idea if we had to  
6 go somewhere, how can we get there?

7 Q. Right.

8 A. You know, what's going to be in the way?

9 Q. Got it.

10 A. So we hopped in that, and we drove around  
11 in that.

12 Q. Got it.

13 A. And then throughout the day, like, if we  
14 wanted to step outside the barn, we could, you  
15 know.

16 Q. Right. Okay. And you had mentioned that  
17 the Secret Service agent had told you during the  
18 walk-through that they intended to put a black  
19 screen or an opaque screen in the area separating  
20 the actual event from the AGR property?

21 A. Yes. That was our understanding.

22 Q. Did you see that screen there that day?

23 A. No. No.

24 Q. Did that concern you?

25 A. Yes.

1 Q. Okay. And it concerned you because it  
2 didn't -- the issue that you had been concerned  
3 about during the walk-through had not been  
4 resolved with a screen?

5 A. I would say yes.

6 Q. Okay. And did you consider the AGR  
7 property to be an area where a potential threat  
8 could come from?

9 A. Yes.

10 Q. And you mentioned that there were chain  
11 link fences there?

12 A. Yes.

13 Q. So your jobs were not -- you were not  
14 snipers, right?

15 A. Correct.

16 Q. Your jobs were to actually deploy to  
17 where a threat might be, correct?

18 A. Correct.

19 Q. So did you figure out how you would get  
20 to the AGR property in the event there was a  
21 threat from that area?

22 A. The best way that I could figure was to  
23 leave the barn on the side-by-side and drive down  
24 Brady Paul Lane and exit -- it would have been  
25 exit to the east onto Meridian Road.

1 Q. Right.

2 A. And then from there, I wasn't sure how I  
3 would get over there, because I wasn't familiar  
4 with the layout.

5 Q. Okay.

6 A. Like, I believe there was house,  
7 residential houses, foliage, trees and all that  
8 stuff. I didn't know exactly how to get over  
9 there at the time, so...

10 Q. Right. Understood. Were you aware that  
11 there were Sheriff's Department and also State  
12 Police that were assigned to the event?

13 A. Yes.

14 Q. Did you have an understanding as to who  
15 would be -- if anyone, who would be patrolling  
16 the area near the AGR Building?

17 A. I was -- I was told that State Police  
18 would be handling the perimeter or anything that  
19 happened outside the perimeter; and I also knew  
20 that Butler Township patrol officers would be  
21 directing traffic all over the place.

22 Q. All around?

23 A. Yeah, all over the place, so...

24 Q. So you believed that the area would be --  
25 there would be a, call it, a police presence?

1 A. Yes.

2 Q. And did you have any concerns that that  
3 would not be sufficient for purposes of what you  
4 needed to do to secure the area?

5 A. To the best of my knowledge, I just had  
6 faith that there were guys there to take care of  
7 it, whatever, whatever the problem may be.

8 Q. Okay. Understood. So now in the course  
9 of -- and I am trying to cover a lot of ground,  
10 because we are getting late in the day --

11 A. Right.

12 Q. -- and we have actually learned a lot  
13 from various people.

14 A. Sure.

15 Q. So later that day, I think that the  
16 people were allowed into the event around 1  
17 o'clock or so in that afternoon, and the crowd  
18 started to build over the course of the day.

19 A. Uh-huh.

20 Q. Did you or your team, at that point as  
21 the crowd started to gather, did you go outside  
22 the barn to start looking around and just keeping  
23 sight on who was out and about?

24 A. Yeah. We were -- yeah. We were standing  
25 outside the barn. We were watching the crowds.

1 Q. Right.

2 A. You know, people started filling the  
3 bleachers and then the area in front.

4 And at one point, [REDACTED], [REDACTED]  
5 [REDACTED] and I, we -- [REDACTED] asked [REDACTED]  
6 [REDACTED] and I to go with him to meet with Secret  
7 Service, because he was tasked out with the  
8 Secret Service Counter Assault guys.

9 Q. Right.

10 A. He wanted us to walk over with him to  
11 find out where he was supposed to be for that.

12 Q. Okay.

13 A. And during that, [REDACTED] and I, we  
14 stood -- if you're looking at the stage from the  
15 crowd, we stood on the right-hand side of the  
16 stage between the center bleachers and the right  
17 bleachers. We stood there in the break in  
18 between the bleachers and looked out into the  
19 crowd (gesturing).

20 Q. Okay. Got it. During the course of the  
21 day, did you have trouble with your cell phone  
22 service?

23 A. Yes. It was slow.

24 Q. Slow?

25 A. Yeah. I just figured every time you go

1 to a football game or a hockey game or a concert,  
2 large concert, there's so many people -- I have  
3 been to a lot, been to a bunch of them.

4 Q. Right.

5 A. Every time I have gone to those, cell  
6 service is always real slow, just because there  
7 is -- it's congested. Cell service is congested.

8 Q. Right. Did you have complaints that you  
9 were hearing from either your team or from, you  
10 know, other security around the area about the  
11 difficulty communicating over cell phones?

12 A. Yeah. We were -- we were all talking  
13 about it, really, you know. "This sucks." You  
14 know, it was taking forever to send a text  
15 message, you know.

16 Q. Right. Understood. And were you -- you  
17 were using, I think it's called Butler OPS 4; is  
18 that right?

19 A. Police OPS 4.

20 Q. Police OPS 4.

21 A. On the radio?

22 Q. Yeah. They call it different things.  
23 Police OPS 4?

24 A. Yes.

25 Q. On your radio?

1 A. Yeah.

2 Q. And did you have any trouble with that?

3 A. No.

4 Q. So that worked fine, and you under-  
5 stood -- and anybody who was communicating over  
6 that, you understood? You heard what they were  
7 saying, and they could hear what you were saying?

8 A. Yes.

9 Q. Okay. So at any point -- some point  
10 during the day, did you learn about a suspicious  
11 person, who turned out to be Crooks --

12 A. Uh-huh.

13 Q. -- but at the time, of course, you didn't  
14 know who he was? Did you learn about that there  
15 was a suspicious person in the AGR area property?  
16 Did you learn about that at some point in the  
17 day?

18 A. Yes. [REDACTED], he -- I wasn't really paying  
19 attention to my phone.

20 Q. Right.

21 A. So he was relaying to me that there was a  
22 male with long hair with a supposed rangefinder,  
23 and he was telling me this by mouth --

24 Q. Right.

25 A. -- as we were standing outside the front



1 of the barn there. So I was looking around for  
2 him. I didn't have eyes on my phone whenever all  
3 of these supposed messages were going around,  
4 so...

5 Q. Right. Understood. Do you remember if  
6 [REDACTED] had told you, before he told you about the  
7 rangefinder, that he had spotted the person who  
8 turned out to be Crooks, and was watching him  
9 because he was acting in a way that was different  
10 than most people were acting on the grounds or I  
11 will say outside the perimeter?

12 A. I don't recall exactly what was said.

13 Q. Okay.

14 (Interruption by the timer going off.)

15 A. We were all -- Crooks, ultimately being  
16 Crooks, there was also several other people on  
17 that outside fence, on the outside of the fence  
18 over by AGR that we were also paying attention  
19 to, as well, including a kid wearing like a red  
20 T-shirt, a Sheetz T-shirt.

21 Q. Right.

22 A. He was running back and forth, so I was  
23 watching him. There was an older gentleman in,  
24 like, a yellow construction T-shirt.

25 Q. Right.

1 A. So we were just talking about all that,  
2 as well.

3 Q. Just a number of different people that  
4 were there?

5 A. Yeah.

6 Q. And just -- and then I am going to turn  
7 it over to the Minority. When you heard from  
8 [REDACTED] that one of the people that had been  
9 spotted or was being watched, I should say, had a  
10 range- finder, what was your reaction to that?

11 A. Oh, I thought it was weird.

12 Q. Right. Why do you think it was weird?

13 A. Why would you bring a rangefinder? You  
14 know, why not -- you know, I think in my mind, I  
15 was, like, okay, maybe that's all this guy has  
16 got to try to -- but, they -- every rangefinder I  
17 have ever looked through, they don't necessarily  
18 magnify.

19 Q. Right.

20 A. They just -- there's, like, a little  
21 laser (gesturing) in there that --

22 Q. That tells you the distance?

23 A. -- that tells you the distance, yeah. So  
24 I thought that was weird, because I figured,  
25 well, there is going to be all these people on

1 the other side of the fence from a distance there  
2 trying to look in and see Trump and see what is  
3 going on.

4 Q. Right.

5 A. And they'd probably have binoculars.

6 Q. Right. Right.

7 A. So, yeah, I thought it was weird.

8 [REDACTED]: I am going to turn it  
9 over to the Minority.

10 [REDACTED]: We can go off the  
11 record for a moment.

12 (Off the record at 4:31 p.m.)

13 (Discussion off the record.)

14 (Back on the record at 4:32 p.m.)

15 EXAMINATION

16 BY [REDACTED]:

17 Q. We are back on record. Thank you, again,  
18 for being here today. We really do appreciate  
19 it.

20 A. Of course.

21 Q. I'm going to ask you a few questions that  
22 are going to be very similar to what the Majority  
23 just asked you, just to make sure that I am clear  
24 on what went on in my head. So I apologize if  
25 there is a little bit of overlap with it.

1       A.     Okay.

2       Q.     But can you please give us a little bit  
3 more understanding about your background and  
4 career prior to becoming a patrolman with Butler  
5 City Police?

6       A.     Sure. I went to Marine Corps Boot Camp  
7 fresh out of high -- like, a week after I  
8 graduated high school.

9             I went through all that training. Then I  
10 went to military police school right after that.  
11 I got out of -- I graduated military police  
12 school, and I went into the Reserves out of  
13 Pittsburgh. I did that for eight years, I  
14 believe. I got out in 2019.

15            I had a lot of good opportunities with  
16 that. I trained all over the world. I went to  
17 South Korea, Morocco, Jordan, all over the United  
18 States; and I trained with a lot of good people,  
19 and I learned a lot over the years.

20       Q.     Okay.

21       A.     And, you know, with -- you know, training  
22 with, obviously, shooting water guns, having fun  
23 with that. Active shooter training, going back  
24 all the way to the military police school, I did  
25 a lot of active shooter training.

1 I did a lot of urban combat training or  
2 mouth training. You know, we did a lot of convoy  
3 security training. The guys that I got brought  
4 up by, they fought in Fallu -- not Fallujah.  
5 They fought in Marjah and Afghanistan, I believe.  
6 It was the big push with -- I believe it was one  
7 six.

8 So those guys, they brought me up through  
9 the ranks and everything, and they taught me a  
10 lot of stuff from that.

11 I tried going to college while I was in  
12 the Reserves, and I didn't like it. It wasn't  
13 for me. I went through, like, three semesters,  
14 and I hated it; and I was working fulltime at the  
15 time at UPS just to make money.

16 And my old man was a cop for 22 years,  
17 and I grew up in that atmosphere. He was a SWAT  
18 team guy, as well; and he always took me to  
19 training whenever he couldn't find a babysitter.  
20 So I just kind of grew up in that environment,  
21 and I always knew I wanted to do it eventually.

22 So I stopped going to college and I quit  
23 my job at UPS, and I went to the police academy.  
24 I graduated from that and worked down in  
25 Washington County for about two years, right down

1 south of here. I got hired fulltime in Butler  
2 County here in Butler City in 2018, and I have  
3 been here ever since.

4 Q. Thank you. And what year did you  
5 graduate from the police academy?

6 A. 2015 or '16.

7 Q. Okay. And one MOS in the Marine Corps?

8 A. Correct. Just military police, 5811.

9 Q. Okay. Thank for your service.

10 A. Yes, ma'am.

11 Q. So you mentioned that you were at the  
12 Trump rally in 2020. Have you done any other  
13 private security with any other rallies?

14 A. No.

15 Q. And do you have any experience with  
16 security details?

17 A. No.

18 Q. Okay. And do you have any experience  
19 coordinating with PSP or other Federal entities?

20 A. Through our patrol job. I mean, we  
21 coordinate with State Police quite often. I have  
22 been on drug warrants, drug raids with Federal  
23 agencies, DEA and I think FBI and State Police  
24 and all that stuff. So yes, I was familiar with  
25 working with them.

1 Q. Moving to the July 11th walk-through, did  
2 you guys walk around the fences and discuss  
3 vulnerabilities and talk about any anticipated  
4 security changes?

5 A. There was definitely the fence line, like  
6 I, you know, explained before, the fence line  
7 with the cloth put over it.

8 Q. Uh-huh.

9 A. Obviously, that is a concern, because if  
10 there is a crowd -- or I'm sorry -- a cover over  
11 the fence, there is probably not going to be a  
12 crowd gathering on the side of the fence because  
13 they can't see through it. So, obviously, that  
14 was a concern.

15 Q. Did you talk to anyone explicitly about  
16 why the AGR Building was left outside of the  
17 perimeter?

18 A. I think there was mumbling amongst the  
19 team, you know. "Is there going to be people  
20 over there, like, cops? You know, is that inside  
21 the perimeter, outside the perimeter?" It was  
22 all that stuff. The specifics, I can't remember.

23 Q. Okay. Now, do you know from living and  
24 working -- or excuse me -- from working in  
25 Butler, what types of events are typically held

1 at the Butler Farm?

2 A. Farm shows. That is about as far as I  
3 know.

4 Q. Okay. Any previous logistical issues  
5 with hosting large events at the farm, as far as  
6 you know?

7 A. Not that I am not aware of. I'm unaware.

8 Q. Okay. Moving to, kind of, just the OPS  
9 Plan and just the general QRF discussions, can  
10 you give us an example of when the QR team, the  
11 QRF Team, would have been deployed?

12 A. From our understanding, the QRF Team  
13 would be deployed if there was -- if there was an  
14 event outside the perimeter that patrol couldn't  
15 handle anymore, if it got out of hand, such as a  
16 civil disturbance, like a protest that got out of  
17 hand.

18 We were told, you know, if a drone was  
19 down, we were to recover a drone, or the drone.

20 Q. Uh-huh.

21 A. Obviously, what happened falls underneath  
22 that umbrella.

23 Q. Okay.

24 A. But, you know, what happened, what ended  
25 up happening with an active shooter, any type of



1 shooter, multiple shooter, single shooter,  
2 anything like that.

3 Q. Yes. And moving to the day of the event  
4 at the briefing that you were at in the morning  
5 of the 13th that you mentioned --

6 A. Uh-huh.

7 Q. -- did anyone at that briefing or any  
8 separate meeting that you had bring up the fact  
9 that the Secret Service was going to have counter  
10 snipers?

11 A. Yes. It was brought up that they would  
12 have counter snipers.

13 Q. Did anyone say why?

14 A. (No response.)

15 Q. Was there any sort intelligence given?

16 A. No.

17 Q. Did you hear, is it common for the U. S.  
18 Secret Service to have counter sniping at events  
19 like this?

20 A. They did at the one in 2020.

21 Q. Okay. And it was U.S. Secret Service  
22 that brought the counter snipers in 2020?

23 A. Yes.

24 Q. So were you aware of how many Command  
25 Posts were there that day?

1       A.     Yes. I was aware of ours, the local  
2 police and ESU, and then I was aware of the  
3 Secret Service Command Post, and I was told that  
4 it was the main office building for the farm show  
5 grounds (gesturing).

6       Q.     Okay. In your experience, both in the  
7 Marine Corps and law enforcement, is it normal to  
8 have two Command Posts?

9       A.     I have seen both. I mean, in my personal  
10 opinion, I think that there probably should have  
11 been -- I think it's more effective to have them  
12 all in one place for command and control.

13      Q.     Okay. Uh-huh. And can you kind of walk  
14 us through who your chain of command was the day  
15 of the 13th?

16      A.     Yes. So above me would have been,  
17 technically, [REDACTED] who is second in  
18 charge of the team, and then [REDACTED], the team  
19 commander.

20      Q.     Okay. And where were they located on the  
21 13th?

22      A.     [REDACTED] was with us at the barn,  
23 and also behind the stage area with Secret  
24 Service.

25      Q.     Uh-huh.

1       A.     And then [REDACTED] was at our Command Post.

2       Q.     Okay. So in that chain of command, what  
3 did you have the authority to authorize versus  
4 what would you have needed your Deputy Commander  
5 or Commander to authorize?

6       A.     I believe I had authorization to react  
7 appropriately to any threat; and then if there  
8 was, you know, something questionable, then I  
9 felt free to run up the chain of command and ask  
10 for their guidance, so...

11      Q.     Okay. And on the day of the 13th, did  
12 you see any drones?

13      A.     I don't recall.

14      Q.     Okay. And you mentioned earlier that you  
15 were on OPS 4. How would you characterize your  
16 interactions and communications with the local  
17 Command Post?

18      A.     I believe our communication was clear and  
19 concise. There was no radio problems. It was  
20 pretty standard for us to use a channel with  
21 that, a channel from patrol. They were on a  
22 different channel from us, you know, and that is  
23 pretty standard.

24      Q.     Yeah. Did you have any communication  
25 with the Secret Service that day?

1 A. Me personally, no.

2 Q. Did you have any communication with other  
3 law enforcement agencies?

4 A. If I wanted to, I could have. I could  
5 have just switched my channel if I needed to talk  
6 to them.

7 Q. Were you surfing the channels at all, or  
8 were you solely on OPS 4?

9 A. I was solely on OPS 4.

10 Q. And that day, did you use the Signal app  
11 at all?

12 A. No, not that I recall.

13 Q. Okay. Now -- and I know that we kind of  
14 started talking about this earlier, but just to  
15 make sure it's clear in my mind: When did you  
16 first become aware of report of a suspicious  
17 person?

18 A. I don't know the exact timeframe off the  
19 top of my head.

20 Q. Yeah.

21 A. It was probably before Former President  
22 Trump arrived. It was somewhere in that  
23 timeframe, maybe, like, half an hour or 45  
24 minutes to an hour before he arrived.

25 Q. And when you first became aware of that

1 there was a suspicious person, were you also  
2 notified that he had a rangefinder at the same  
3 time, or were those two different pieces of  
4 information?

5 A. Like I explained before --

6 Q. Uh-huh.

7 A. -- I was getting this information by word  
8 of mouth from [REDACTED], [REDACTED], because I  
9 wasn't on my phone.

10 Q. Yeah, on the phone.

11 A. Yeah. I was paying attention to what was  
12 going on, you know, in real life around me.

13 And so he was telling me about, you know,  
14 this kid with the -- you know, who ended up being  
15 Crooks, with the long hair, and I think he said  
16 he had a gray T-shirt on and supposedly had a  
17 rangefinder, so...

18 Q. Uh-huh. Did [REDACTED] show you a picture  
19 of him at all?

20 A. I don't recall.

21 Q. Okay. So can you just walk us through a  
22 timeline of what was happening when shots were  
23 fired with you and your team?

24 A. Of course. Myself, [REDACTED], and [REDACTED]  
25 were standing in the grassy area behind -- if you

are looking at the bleachers and the stage from the crowd, the left side bleachers. We were standing in the grassy area behind that in front of the red barn that we were staged in; and we were scanning the crowd that was -- we were watching the crowd that was outside the second fence, closest to the AGR Building.

And the next thing I knew, there were uniformed patrol officers running along the grass in front of the building, on our side of the building. They were running along the -- what would have been the South Side of the building.

And that is when I reacted. I saw that, and I was, like, "Oh, something is going down." So that is when I ran back to the barn. And our side-by-side that I was driving for our QRF Team was parked right inside of that front door of the barn, facing towards the crowd.

I yelled at our guys for QRF. I was, like, "Let's go. Something's going on," you know, "Hop in the side-by-side." So we all did that.

I started inching out, and I was trying to see what was going on over there; and as I started inching out, shots started going off.

1 Right away, I pulled out of there driving. We  
2 were all loaded up in the side-by-side.

3 And as I was pulling out, the rounds kept  
4 going. They were cracking pretty close. They  
5 was pretty close to us, and I thought we were  
6 getting shot at, and I was, you know, pedal to  
7 the floor.

8 I went around the building. I drove down  
9 along the north side of the building of the barn,  
10 and I headed east, back towards Meridian Road.

11 Q. Uh-huh.

12 A. I made a left on Meridian Road. I kept  
13 driving down. On the left-hand side, on the west  
14 side of the road there on Meridian Road, there  
15 was houses; and I wasn't sure how to get over to  
16 the AGR Building. I just knew I had to.

17 I was looking and looking and looking,  
18 and I didn't know if I was going to be able to  
19 get through these people's backyards because of  
20 fences or whatever might be back there, a tree  
21 line.

22 So I kept driving northbound on Meridian  
23 Road, and I found an access road that goes  
24 towards the big water tower that we have all  
25 seen.

1 I drove the side-by-side up that access  
2 road westbound towards AGR. I got up into that  
3 parking lot on the east side of the building. I  
4 made it to that side, pulled up towards like the  
5 loading dock area.

6 Q. Uh-huh.

7 A. We all jumped out. I was quick. I  
8 didn't even shut the doors on the side-by-side  
9 and left the engine running. We hopped out as  
10 fast as we could.

11 Q. So can we pause for just one moment --

12 A. Yeah.

13 Q. -- because I want to come back to this in  
14 one moment, but I have just a few follow-up  
15 questions from all of the information you just  
16 gave.

17 A. Sure. Yeah.

18 Q. Why were the three of you looking over at  
19 the AGR Building before you saw the people  
20 running? It sounds like you guys were staring at  
21 it before everything kind of started occurring.

22 A. Yes. So me, personally, I was watching,  
23 because [REDACTED] brought up about the suspicious  
24 person.

25 Q. Uh-huh.



1       A.     So I was looking for that. [REDACTED] also  
2     had mentioned -- he was pointing out the other  
3     people that were acting suspicious with the kid  
4     wearing the red shirt, the older gentleman  
5     wearing, you know, the yellow construction shirt,  
6     and I believe there was a female that was pointed  
7     out as, as well, that we suspected might have  
8     been distracting, used as a distraction tool for  
9     us, and then the other people walking around.

10            But we weren't sure. We were just  
11    looking, trying to pick threats out of the crowd  
12    that might be potential threats.

13       Q.     Yeah.

14       A.     So that is why we were watching the  
15    crowd.

16       Q.     Yes. So it sounds like you are the one  
17    who made the decision. You saw officers in  
18    uniform running, and you thought, "There is an  
19    issue there," and so you said, "Let's go"?

20       A.     Uh-huh.

21       Q.     Were you moving before you heard over the  
22    radio that [REDACTED] said, "QRF deploy"?

23       A.     So I didn't hear him say that on the  
24    radio.

25       Q.     Okay.

1       A.     I heard the shots go off as we were  
2 pulling out of the barn. I knew we had to go. I  
3 made the call.

4       Q.     Okay. And had you known, prior to seeing  
5 everything happen, that there was a man on the  
6 roof, knowing that there was a suspicious man  
7 with a rangefinder, would that information have  
8 been enough for you to say, "Let's go"?

9       A.     No.

10      Q.     No?

11      A.     No.

12      Q.     What was it that got you to the point  
13 where you felt confident saying, "We're running"?

14      A.     The shots.

15      Q.     The shots?

16      A.     Uh-huh.

17      Q.     But you were moving before the shots,  
18 so...

19      A.     We were pulling out of the barn before  
20 the shots.

21      Q.     Pulling out of the barn, so...

22      A.     I was inching out, because the side-by-  
23 side was pulled back into the barn a little bit.

24      Q.     Yeah.

25      A.     I was inching up on the side-by-side and

1 leaning out of the barn to see what was going on.

2 Q. Okay.

3 A. That's when shots were fired.

4 Q. So you basically said, "Everybody get in  
5 so" --

6 A. Correct.

7 Q. -- "so if we need to, we are ready to go  
8 from this moment"? Correct?

9 A. Correct.

10 Q. Had the shots not gone off, would you  
11 have just stayed in the barn?

12 A. Yes, because I didn't know that they  
13 were -- that the guy had a gun.

14 Q. Okay. So walk me through what happened  
15 when you arrived at the AGR Building. You pull  
16 up by the loading dock. You leave the vehicle  
17 on. And then what happens?

18 A. We started looking for a way to get on  
19 the roof. [REDACTED] jumped up on -- I saw him. He  
20 jumped up on a real rickety unstable storage  
21 shed, and he, I guess, couldn't up on the roof  
22 so...

23 And then one of the Butler Township  
24 police officers, [REDACTED], he was telling  
25 me, you know, "The guy's on the roof. He's got a

1 gun."

2 And then I heard some yelling saying -- I  
3 believe it was [REDACTED] saying that he was further  
4 down from where we were at on the loading dock.

5 Q. Uh-huh.

6 A. So we started going down, walking south  
7 along the building, on the east side of the  
8 building, and we found -- behind two tall pine  
9 trees we found a cut-in to the building, and  
10 there was a lower roof.

11 So we made a human ladder (gesturing) and  
12 hoisted each other up. A Washington Regional  
13 SWAT member team guy, he was in front of me. He  
14 got up first, and then I climbed up second.

15 And once I got up on the roof, I looked  
16 to my left, and I saw the body laying there, you  
17 know, towards the center of the roof, the ridge  
18 of the roof.

19 The Washington operator, he was giving  
20 verbal commands, like, "Show me your hands. Show  
21 me hands." I just kept my rifle up on the body,  
22 because you don't know if he's dead. I kept my  
23 rifle up on the body and just provided cover  
24 because while he is giving commands, I didn't  
25 want to start yelling, because if you get too

1 many people start yelling, it gets confusing for  
2 the bad guy, you know, the person you are giving  
3 commands to. Not so much, you know --

4 But anyways, and then two more guys got  
5 up there as commands were being yelled as I was  
6 providing cover on the body; and that's when I  
7 said to the Washington guy, "I'll provide cover.  
8 You go hands on and put him in restraints."

9 So we moved up together, up to the body.  
10 I kept my rifle on the guy, on Crooks, on his  
11 body. At this time, he was laying on his left --  
12 kind of on his left shoulder, (demonstrating), a  
13 long trail of blood running down the roof. I've  
14 seen enough dead bodies, and he looked very dead,  
15 you know.

16 Q. (Nods her head.)

17 A. I said on the radio, "The shooter is  
18 down, he's down hard." I stood over the body  
19 with my rifle while the Washington Regional SWAT  
20 guy, he put -- you know, he started going hands  
21 on with the body. He pulled the rifle away from  
22 the body, because, once again, you just don't  
23 know. You just never know, so you want to remove  
24 that weapon from the body.

25 Q. That is standard operating procedure --

1 A. It is.

2 Q. -- to take the rifle and the weapon?

3 A. It is.

4 Q. How far did he move it?

5 A. Approximately ten feet to the left of the  
6 body, which would have been in the direction east  
7 from the body on the roof (gesturing).

8 He laid it -- he laid the rifle about ten  
9 feet away from the body, and then he went to  
10 handcuff him. He put a -- the Washington guy  
11 grabbed the zip tie handcuffs, the flex cuffs.

12 I grabbed the shooter's legs, and he  
13 grabbed -- the Washington guy grabbed his torso,  
14 and we laid him out flat out on his stomach; and  
15 the Washington guy put the flex cuffs on his  
16 hands, subdued his hands.

17 Q. Do you know how the Washington State team  
18 got there to the AGR Building? Did they ever  
19 tell you?

20 A. The Washington team?

21 Q. Yes. Excuse me. The Washington team.  
22 Not Washington State. The Washington County  
23 team.

24 A. They drove a county SUV that was there.

25 Q. Okay. And so after you and the

1 Washington County individual put the zip ties on,  
2 what is your next move?

3 A. So from my training, you know active  
4 shooter training, we were always trained to, once  
5 you get to the shooter, if you are, like, the  
6 first or second guy there, you are stuck with him  
7 until a higher power comes along and relieves  
8 you, whether it be investigators or your command  
9 or whoever. Until somebody higher than you  
10 comes, you are stuck with that body until you are  
11 relieved, properly relieved.

12 Q. Yeah.

13 A. So the Washington SWAT operator and I  
14 stayed with the body.

15 Another standard operating procedure that  
16 we have is no matter what you see, you still call  
17 for a medic to come and treat any wounds or  
18 confirm that he is dead. So I called for a medic  
19 to come to the rooftop.

20 That is when a Beaver County SWAT  
21 operator and a Beaver County Tactical Medic came  
22 over and climbed up on the roof. By this point,  
23 I did call for a ladder so we can get up and down  
24 off the roof quicker.

25 Q. Uh-huh.

1       A.     They came over. They climbed up the  
2 ladder. The ladder was placed where we climbed  
3 up, where we hoisted each other up (gesturing).  
4 They climbed up that ladder and came up. The  
5 medic looked at the body of Crooks, and, "Yeah,  
6 he's dead." He confirmed that he was dead.

7       Q.     Do you know an approximate time that  
8 happened?

9       A.     No, I don't.

10      Q.     Okay.

11      A.     From there, we stayed on the roof with  
12 the body because nobody come to relieve us yet.

13             The gentleman that we have all seen in  
14 the Body Cam footage -- black suit, red tie -- he  
15 made his way up there, and he started asking  
16 questions about what happened. The Beaver County  
17 SWAT operator, he talked more than I did because,  
18 apparently, he knew more than I did. I don't  
19 know where he had gotten all of his information  
20 from.

21             I answered what I could. I told the  
22 Secret Service -- I believe -- I think he was a  
23 Secret Service agent, the guy in the red tie. I  
24 pointed out to him everything that we saw on the  
25 roof, the shell casings, the shooter's hair, that



1 was -- because the shot that impacted him had  
2 blew his hair off. That was it essentially.

3 There was a black backpack on the roof,  
4 as well; and we did -- the Washington SWAT  
5 operator went through Crooks' pants pockets and  
6 pulled out a remote control device. So we called  
7 that out, as well, and requested the bomb squad  
8 to come check out the device, you know, assuming  
9 the worst that it, you know, could have  
10 controlled explosives somewhere, so...

11 Q. And what happened after you called out  
12 for the bomb squad?

13 A. Allegheny County Bomb Squad responded.

14 Q. And is this a different bomb squad than  
15 the one that was in the barn with you?

16 A. The ones in the barn were unarmed guys  
17 with canines.

18 Q. Okay.

19 A. I believe they were talking to them. I  
20 believe they were, like, Army National Guard, and  
21 they were contracted in to do their work as bomb-  
22 sniffing dogs.

23 Q. Okay.

24 A. But no, they were not on the roof with  
25 us.

1 Q. Okay. So another team came in, and then  
2 what happened?

3 A. A member of the Allegheny County Bomb  
4 Squad came up on the roof, took a look at the  
5 remote control device. He took the battery out.  
6 It was powered by a nine-volt battery. He took  
7 it out, and I think he took a picture of it or  
8 something; and he mentioned something about how  
9 that particular device was featured in recent  
10 training that they went to, and he left the roof.

11 Q. Okay.

12 A. Time had passed. At this point, there  
13 was other Secret Service agents, I believe,  
14 coming up on the roof.

15 Q. Did they announce themselves as Secret  
16 Service, or is that your assumption.

17 A. So they -- some of them had vests on that  
18 said, "Secret Service" and stuff (gesturing). So  
19 I assumed.

20 Q. So it's a good assumption?

21 A. Yeah. And then at one point, a group  
22 showed up. I believe he was a U.S. Assistant  
23 District Attorney?

24 He showed up on the roof with his group  
25 of co-workers, associates, whatever you want to

1 call them. As soon as they got up there, it  
2 seemed like maybe only five minutes after they  
3 got up there, they started talking amongst each  
4 other -- and I don't recall what they were saying  
5 to each other -- I was then notified over the  
6 radio that the bomb squad indicated that there  
7 was a bomb in the building underneath of us.

8 Q. Okay.

9 A. So I said out loud, "Everybody get off  
10 the roof. Evacuate the roof." At that point, I  
11 waited until everybody got down. I made sure I  
12 was the last guy off the roof.

13 Q. During this time, did anyone move Mr.  
14 Crooks' body?

15 A. Not that I saw.

16 Q. Okay. So everybody gets off the roof.  
17 You are the last one on the roof. What happens  
18 with the body?

19 A. That was when I was off the roof. I have  
20 no idea.

21 Q. But you left the body up on the roof?

22 A. Right.

23 Q. Everybody got off the roof?

24 A. Yes.

25 Q. Okay. So once you are all off the

1 roof --

2 A. Uh-huh.

3 Q. -- is a perimeter set around the  
4 building, or what are the next steps with that?

5 A. So what we did was we took cover behind  
6 whatever we could, because we didn't know if the  
7 bomb squad was about to detonate whatever it was  
8 or what was going on, so we all took cover. I  
9 believe an "all clear" was called, I think.

10 Q. At how much time from when you got off  
11 the building to when the "all clear" was called?  
12 So just an approximation.

13 A. Thirty minutes.

14 Q. Thirty minutes? Okay.

15 A. Roughly, give or take. It didn't seem  
16 too long.

17 After that, what I believe to be State  
18 and Federal agencies, they took over the scene,  
19 and my guys never went back up on the roof.

20 Q. Okay. So you never went back up on the  
21 roof?

22 A. No.

23 Q. The last time that you saw Mr. Crooks'  
24 body was as everybody was getting off the roof  
25 due to the bomb threat?

1 A. Yes.

2 Q. Okay. Within 30 minutes, the "all  
3 clear," and then are there people that are  
4 heading back up onto the roof right after that?

5 A. Yeah, as far as I remember.

6 Q. Okay. So do you think maybe there was  
7 only a 30-minute period, give or take a few,  
8 where nobody was on the roof?

9 A. Sure.

10 Q. Okay. Backing up a little bit, I am  
11 interested in kind of just law enforcement  
12 thoughts, generally or specifically, about the  
13 fact that a rangefinder was announced.

14 In your experience in military and law  
15 enforcement, what does the fact that an  
16 individual with a rangefinder mean to you?

17 A. Through military experience and with law  
18 enforcement?

19 Q. Uh-huh.

20 A. Usually, a rangefinder is used for  
21 finding the distance of something to adjust your  
22 sights.

23 Q. When you heard that there was somebody  
24 with a rangefinder --

25 A. Uh-huh.

1 Q. -- I know you talked about it a little  
2 bit earlier; but can you explain what your  
3 thoughts were at that time?

4 A. I didn't think it was good.

5 Q. Okay.

6 A. So I didn't think it was good. I thought  
7 it wasn't normal. It was, like I explained, the  
8 people that show up trying to watch something  
9 from a distance, they don't use a rangefinder.  
10 They use binoculars, typically, because range-  
11 finders don't magnify. You can see from a  
12 distance.

13 Q. Okay. Sorry. That was a little bit of a  
14 sidenote; but going back, 30 minutes, "all  
15 clear," and then what do you and your team do?

16 A. I believe I said on the radio -- I asked  
17 command, I asked [REDACTED], or I told him, I said,  
18 "I've got five guys, five or six guys" -- however  
19 many were with me -- I told him, "We're looking  
20 for work," which means we are looking for  
21 something to do.

22 Q. Uh-huh.

23 A. And he told me to take my guys and return  
24 back the Command Post. So we got back on the  
25 side-by-side and we left the AGR Building and

1     went back to the Command Post.

2           Q.     Okay.  And how late were you there the  
3     evening of the 13th?

4           A.     I didn't get home until 5:00 in the  
5     morning.

6           Q.     Oh, wow.  Okay.  So were you interviewed  
7     that evening?

8           A.     Yes.

9           Q.     Who interviewed you?

10          A.     It was in our Command Post trailer, and  
11     it was individuals who identified themselves as  
12     Pennsylvania State Police and FBI.

13          Q.     And was it recorded?

14          A.     Yes, I believe so.

15          Q.     And when you got back to the command  
16     trailer, what work did Commander [REDACTED] have for  
17     you guys?

18          A.     To stand by.

19          Q.     Stand by?

20          A.     Uh-huh.  Take a break.  Stand by.  Drink  
21     water.  Eat something if you can.

22                     [REDACTED]:  I think I just  
23     barely got to my time, so I will --

24                     [REDACTED]:  You can continue on if  
25     you would like.  It's up to you.

1 [REDACTED]: Oh, you know what?

2 This is a good time. We can go off the record.

3 (Off the record at 5:02 p.m.)

4 (Discussion off the record.)

5 (Recess taken.)

6 (Back on the record at 5:11 p.m.)

7 [REDACTED]: We're back on now, and  
8 my colleague, [REDACTED], has some questions.

9 OFFICER [REDACTED]: Okay.

10 EXAMINATION

11 BY [REDACTED]:

12 Q. I have some follow-up questions.

13 Earlier, you mentioned a few of the persons that  
14 you thought might be of interest or concern, and  
15 I think you said, there was someone in a red  
16 shirt running around?

17 A. Yes.

18 Q. You said it was a kid. Did you mean it  
19 was a minor or a child or --

20 A. Yeah. It's a loose term.

21 Q. Right.

22 A. I didn't know his age, especially from  
23 the distance that we were at.

24 Q. Right.

25 A. He was running back and forth along the



1 fence line, acting erratic, I would say.

2 Q. Right.

3 A. So he would -- you know, he caught our  
4 attention, obviously.

5 Q. Right.

6 A. And then there was an older gentleman in  
7 a yellow construction T-shirt, like a fluorescent  
8 yellow T-shirt. He was walking back and forth,  
9 and he didn't seem like he was with anybody, in  
10 particular.

11 Q. Right.

12 A. So that stood out, yep.

13 Q. And the third person, I think you  
14 mentioned, and I think you said there was a woman  
15 that you said seemed like she might be a  
16 distraction?

17 A. Yes. Yes. Yes. There was a female that  
18 was dancing, dancing around. Just through  
19 experience on the job, people tend to try to  
20 distract you from what is really going on.

21 Q. Right.

22 A. People -- you know, working on the street  
23 on patrol, they -- if you're interested in a  
24 particular person, then sometimes their  
25 friends --

1 Q. Right.

2 A. -- start talking to you and get your  
3 attention off of what is really going on here.

4 Q. Right. Right.

5 A. So, yeah. So that is why she was a  
6 person of interest to us, anyways, to watch her.

7 Q. Right. And I think some other folks  
8 might have mentioned that there was a woman on  
9 horseback at some point. Did you see this, too?

10 A. Yes.

11 Q. But this didn't rise to any level of  
12 concern?

13 A. She -- I guess you could say she was. I  
14 mean, she caught everybody's attention. She was  
15 riding this giant horse, and she had a big  
16 "Trump" flag. She was holding a big "Trump" flag  
17 riding back and forth. So, of course, that  
18 caught everybody's attention.

19 Q. Right. Right. Was she riding around  
20 throughout the event, or was there a particular  
21 time?

22 A. She was -- I didn't see her earlier in  
23 the day. I only saw her closer to when Former  
24 President Trump was getting there.

25 Q. Right. That was kind of the rough timing

1 of when she was there?

2 A. Yes.

3 [REDACTED]: Okay. Thank you.

4 OFFICER [REDACTED]: Yes, sir.

5 FURTHER EXAMINATION

6 BY [REDACTED]:

7 Q. I want to go back just a little bit in  
8 time from when Crooks was actually engaged.

9 A. Uh-huh.

10 Q. So you covered some of this ground; but  
11 there are just a few just clarifying questions.  
12 You first heard about who we learned was Crooks  
13 from [REDACTED], right?

14 A. Yes.

15 Q. And you heard from him that the guy had a  
16 rangefinder?

17 A. Yes.

18 Q. At that point, QRF did not deploy to go  
19 engage with him --

20 A. Correct.

21 Q. -- or to find him and to engage with him?

22 A. Correct.

23 Q. And can you just tell us why that was?

24 A. Because he didn't -- so using a SWAT  
25 team, I'm sure you've heard this before --

1 Q. Yes.

2 A. -- it's a use of force.

3 Q. Right.

4 A. It's a show of force.

5 Q. Right.

6 A. Right? So just because this guy, yes,  
7 it's suspicious that he had a rangefinder, no  
8 doubt --

9 Q. Right.

10 A. -- but it did not raise to the level of  
11 sending a SWAT team. At that time, it was  
12 something that a reasonable cop, a reasonable  
13 person, would believe that a patrol officer,  
14 whether it be State Police or local police, could  
15 go out there and confront this individual and  
16 deal with the situation at hand.

17 Q. Right. Okay. And at the time that you  
18 learned about the suspicious individual with the  
19 rangefinder, was it your understanding that steps  
20 were being taken to actually contact State Police  
21 or the Sheriff's Department, whoever was  
22 patrolling outside the perimeter, to try to  
23 assist?

24 A. I assumed it was being done by Command.

25 Q. Right. By Command, because Command was

1 hearing the same thing you were hearing, you  
2 understood that, at that point?

3 A. To my understanding, yes.

4 Q. Right. And it was their job to make sure  
5 that all the -- that the right assets were being  
6 used to try to deal with that situation?

7 A. Yes.

8 Q. Okay. All right. We have a bunch of  
9 radio messages that you sent or received. I am  
10 not going to go through all of them. You have  
11 actually gone through the timeline.

12 A. Okay.

13 Q. One question I had was when -- when you  
14 actually -- when you got the message that there  
15 was a -- that the suspect was on the roof with a  
16 rifle and you were pulling out of the barn, the  
17 shots rang out; and then you drove around to  
18 the -- to get to the building, to the AGR  
19 Building -- you figured out how to get to the AGR  
20 Building, I think you testified?

21 A. Yes. I figured out on my own how to get  
22 there.

23 Q. Got it. Then was [REDACTED] with you, or was  
24 he driving separately?

25 [REDACTED]: Let me ask a point

1 of clarification.

2 [REDACTED]: Right.

3 [REDACTED]: You said when he  
4 got the message of the individual on the roof  
5 with the rifle. I don't remember him saying that  
6 today.

7 [REDACTED]: Oh, okay. I might be  
8 confusing witnesses.

9 [REDACTED]: So maybe if you  
10 ask him?

11 BY [REDACTED]:

12 Q. Let me ask you: Did you ever get a  
13 message -- did you ever learn either over the  
14 radio or from another person, that there was a  
15 person on the roof with a rifle?

16 A. I do not recall.

17 Q. You don't recall?

18 A. No.

19 Q. Okay. All right. Was [REDACTED] with you  
20 when you drove around?

21 A. Yes.

22 Q. Did [REDACTED] say anything to you about  
23 getting or hearing that message?

24 A. I don't recall.

25 Q. Okay. But as you were pulling out, that

1 is when you heard the gunshots?

2 A. So like I said, I was inching out of the  
3 barn --

4 Q. Right.

5 A. -- trying to get a -- trying to see what  
6 was going on over at the AGR Building.

7 Q. Right.

8 A. As soon as the shots went off, I made the  
9 call that we were going.

10 Q. Okay. Got it. Got it. And then where  
11 was [REDACTED] in physical proximity to you at the  
12 time that you were inching out of the barn?

13 A. As far as I know, he was in the  
14 side-by-side with me.

15 Q. Side-by-side?

16 A. I don't remember his exact seat.

17 Q. Got it. No, I understand. But he was  
18 there with you?

19 A. Yes.

20 Q. Did he have his radio on at that point?

21 A. Yes, I would assume so.

22 Q. Okay. All right. But you don't recall  
23 hearing anything about a suspect on the roof of  
24 the barn with a rifle?

25 A. By this point, we were just --

1 Q. You were moving?

2 A. We were just going.

3 Q. Okay. Got it. And you earlier said that  
4 when you were doing the drive-around, just to  
5 sort of figure out the layout of the area, was  
6 [REDACTED] with you during that?

7 A. Yes, he was.

8 Q. And when -- and you said that you weren't  
9 sure exactly at that point how you would get to  
10 the AGR Building --

11 A. (The interviewee nods his head.)

12 Q. -- or what we now know as the AGR  
13 Building at that point in time. Did that give  
14 you any concern at that time that you didn't  
15 really know exactly how to get to that building?

16 A. It was a concern, but I had confidence  
17 that we would figure it out --

18 Q. Right.

19 A. -- if the time came.

20 Q. Got it. And then you did figure it out  
21 when the time came when you pulled out when the  
22 shots were coming out?

23 A. Yes, sir.

24 Q. Do you remember -- do you know, roughly,  
25 how long it took you to get to the AGR Building?



1 A. It's quick.

2 Q. It was quick?

3 A. I do --

4 Q. I imagine you didn't have, like a --

5 A. I drove that thing like I stole the  
6 thing.

7 [REDACTED]: Okay. Yeah.

8 Understood. Can we just go off the record for a  
9 second?

10 (Off the record at 5:20 p.m.)

11 (Discussion off the record between  
12 [REDACTED] and [REDACTED].)

13 (Back on the record at 5:22 p.m.)

14 [REDACTED]: Back on the record,  
15 please. Just a few more questions for you.

16 BY [REDACTED]:

17 Q. So during the course of the day before  
18 the incident actually occurred, did you have an  
19 understanding of whether or not the AGR Building,  
20 the perimeter, on the outside, was secured,  
21 meaning, was it being patrolled, was it --

22 A. I wasn't -- I wasn't aware of where all  
23 the patrol units were.

24 Q. Okay. And did you -- at any point before  
25 the incident, were you involved in scanning the

1 AGR Building or that area of the overall site?

2 A. Like I said before, we were standing  
3 there in that grassy area looking over in that  
4 direction.

5 Q. Right. So did you recall seeing any  
6 patrol people or patrolmen or any other law  
7 enforcement in that area?

8 A. The first time I noticed the patrol  
9 officers was when they started running along the  
10 building.

11 Q. Right. Right as the incident -- right  
12 before the incident happened?

13 A. Yes, sir.

14 Q. Did it give you any concern when you were  
15 scanning that area earlier -- watching the area,  
16 you call it -- that you didn't see any law  
17 enforcement presence in that area?

18 A. I would say so.

19 Q. Okay. And just -- again, I have to ask  
20 you some obvious questions, because it is for the  
21 record.

22 A. Yes, sir.

23 Q. Why did it concern you?

24 A. Well, there is, you know, a crowd of  
25 people gathering over there, and they were

1 unchecked. It is not like they went through any  
2 sort of security, metal detectors, being patted  
3 down for, you know, obviously, like weapons or  
4 anything.

5 So, yeah, it was a concern. It felt like  
6 a wide open threat.

7 Q. Right.

8 A. It could have been anybody over there.  
9 They could have had anything with them.

10 Q. Yeah. Understood. And then other people  
11 we have spoken to who were -- and I think you  
12 testified a bit about this yourself -- who were  
13 watching the area did notice some people,  
14 including Crooks, who they thought might be  
15 people of interest, we'll call it, right?

16 A. Uh-huh.

17 Q. All right. And now I am going to ask you  
18 a hypothetical question. If there had been  
19 obvious patrol people in that area during that  
20 time, would you have been able to contact them,  
21 either indirectly or directly, to say, "Hey, we  
22 see this strange person doing this strange thing.  
23 Can you guys go and just talk to that person?"

24 A. Of course. It's always a possibility if  
25 they were there, yes.

1 Q. It's always a possibility. Based on your  
2 experience, is that something that you would have  
3 done -- if you knew that there were patrol people  
4 out there, would you have -- let's say it was the  
5 State Police or it was the Sheriff's  
6 Department -- would you have been able to contact  
7 directly somebody in the State Police Command  
8 Center or whoever, to say, "Hey, can you contact  
9 your patrol persons who are out here, the people  
10 who are out here, and ask them to contact -- you  
11 know, to engage this person"?

12 A. The State Police, no, because I know that  
13 we have different radios than they do.

14 Q. Right.

15 A. Our County radios are encrypted.

16 Q. Right.

17 A. Theirs are not, I don't think.

18 Q. Right.

19 A. But either way, like, when we are on  
20 patrol, we can't talk with them.

21 Q. Right.

22 A. Which is a huge -- that is a separate  
23 issue.

24 Q. Separate issue. But it is an issue?

25 A. Yes. But Sheriff's Deputies, yes, they

1 share the same radio as we do. So, yes, I would  
2 have been able to talk to them. I would have had  
3 to change to a different channel.

4 Q. Right.

5 A. But I stayed on my channel, because I  
6 thought it was most important. But, yes, I could  
7 have switched to a channel and spoken with  
8 Sheriff's Deputies or other local police.

9 Q. Understood. And, again, I'm sorry about  
10 the hypothetical. But had you seen a police  
11 presence, I will call it, in that area in the  
12 property outside of the perimeter near the AGR  
13 Building, could you have -- that day, could you  
14 have called into the Command Center and said,  
15 "Hey, can somebody make sure that the patrol  
16 people who are out there engage with this person?  
17 Here's a description. Can somebody have somebody  
18 talk to this person?"

19 A. Yes, I could have.

20 Q. Okay. All right. Let me ask you this  
21 question. I am not trying to make it too  
22 hypothetical, because then it gets into the realm  
23 of too much.

24 A. Yeah.

25 Q. The hypothetical, if, again, if there was

1 a noticeable police presence in front of the AGR  
2 Building -- you said that, "Yes, I could have  
3 called Command Center or contacted Command Center  
4 and said, you know, can we get somebody to talk  
5 to this person or that person" -- in your  
6 experience, do you think there would normally be  
7 a significant delay in getting a patrol person to  
8 be contacted through this Command Center to  
9 actually go and engage the person?

10 A. There very well could be.

11 Q. And why is that?

12 A. Due to my experience working on the job,  
13 there is almost always a delay between the time  
14 that somebody calls 911 and the time that 911,  
15 and the dispatcher lets us know and dispatches us  
16 to that call. There is always a delay.

17 Q. Right. Okay.

18 A. So...

19 Q. And the delay can be for many reasons?

20 A. Oh, yeah. It could be anything and  
21 everything.

22 Q. Okay. Let me ask you just a couple last  
23 questions, and then I will turn it back to the  
24 Minority.

25 From your perspective, looking back on

the day now, is there -- and I am not looking for, like, hindsight bias, pure hindsight bias at all. I will say it is not Monday morning quarterbacking as it is just based on your experience.

Is there anything that you think could have been done by your team to prevent this shooting from happening in terms of resources you would have had available or people you would have had available that at least would have -- might have prevented this from happening?

[REDACTED]: Are you asking him about the QRF Team specifically or --

[REDACTED]: QRF Team, specifically. His personal knowledge.

A. No.

[REDACTED]: Okay. Back to the Minority.

[REDACTED]: Just a few more and then it's Friday night. We understand this.

#### FURTHER EXAMINATION

BY [REDACTED]:

Q. Since the evening of the 13th, when we talked earlier, you had had an interview with two PSP individuals and somebody from the FBI was

1 there. How many other formal interviews have you  
2 been a part of?

3 A. This is the first individual interview.

4 Q. Okay. How many group interviews?

5 A. Two?

6 [REDACTED]: Well, it would  
7 have been at the --

8 OFFICER [REDACTED]: Center for  
9 Homeland --

10 [REDACTED]: Yes. That was the  
11 Homeland Security Investigative Group up at the  
12 Butler 911 Center. You were there for that?

13 OFFICER [REDACTED]: Yes.

14 [REDACTED]: Were you at any  
15 others?

16 OFFICER [REDACTED]: Mr. Kelly's. That  
17 would have been this.

18 [REDACTED]: This group at BC3.

19 OFFICER [REDACTED]: That was in Butler  
20 Township.

21 [REDACTED]: Oh, Butler  
22 Township? I'm not sure who that was.

23 BY [REDACTED]:

24 Q. When Chairman Kelly was in town, did you  
25 meet with the team that was with him a few weeks



1     ago?

2           A.     Yes.

3           Q.     Is that the one that --

4           A.     I believe so, yeah.

5           Q.     How many debriefs have you had about this  
6 internally with Butler ESU, with Secret Service,  
7 with any other law enforcement agency?

8           A.     Just within our team.

9           Q.     And when did that debrief happen?

10          A.     We had -- that would have been the week  
11 after, a few days later. They brought in CISM,  
12 which is like a post-traumatic incident-type  
13 people.

14          Q.     Uh-huh.

15          A.     And they came in, and we talked about the  
16 situation, you know, see how everybody was doing,  
17 and we talked about everything that happened  
18 within our team.

19          Q.     Okay. Our job is to not just figure out  
20 what happened, but to also make recommendations  
21 to Congress to make sure this doesn't ever happen  
22 again.

23          A.     Uh-huh.

24          Q.     And just talking with Majority, it  
25 doesn't sound like there is anything specific

1 that the QRF lacked.

2 Do you think there was any asset or  
3 resource that Butler ESU lacked that would have  
4 been helpful?

5 A. No, I don't believe so.

6 Q. Okay. Was there anything outside of your  
7 command or Butler ESU's control that you think  
8 would have made a considerable difference on  
9 this?

10 A. I don't think I can speak on their  
11 behalf, to be honest with you. Do you mean,  
12 like, FBI or Secret Service or any of them?

13 Q. Anyone. Just, I mean, you have been in  
14 law enforcement, between military and this, for  
15 quite a while.

16 A. Yes.

17 Q. Just in your experience, is there  
18 something that you saw that didn't go the way  
19 that it should have? I know earlier, you  
20 mentioned that one Command Post works better than  
21 two, generally.

22 A. It does.

23 Q. Anything else?

24 A. Communication, no matter who you are, can  
25 always be better. You can always use more

1 manpower.

2 Q. More manpower and more communication.

3 Any other reflections since this happened  
4 that you would like to share?

5 A. Of the incident itself?

6 Q. Anything.

7 A. I would do it all over again if I had to  
8 so...

9 [REDACTED]: Thank you. Do you  
10 have any questions?

11 [REDACTED]: No.

12 [REDACTED]: I think we are done,  
13 so...

14 [REDACTED]: Oh, I just have something  
15 I wanted to clarify.

16 [REDACTED]: Oh, sorry.

17 FURTHER EXAMINATION

18 BY [REDACTED]:

19 Q. I want to clarify just one.

20 A. Yes, sir.

21 Q. Earlier when you said you were referring  
22 to Homeland Security, were you referring to the  
23 Department of Homeland Security independent  
24 panel, or were you talking about Homeland  
25 Security Governmental Affairs Committee over in

1 the Senate?

2 [REDACTED]: It wasn't Senator  
3 Grassley's group, which is like the Senate Budget  
4 Office. It was Homeland Security -- it was Rand  
5 Paul's group.

6 [REDACTED]: Right. So probably the  
7 Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental  
8 Affairs, HSGA? Senator Paul is a ranking member  
9 of that committee.

10 [REDACTED]: Yeah. There's an  
11 agency under it. As I recall it, there is an  
12 agency under Homeland Security that has  
13 investigative function.

14 [REDACTED]: It's the subcommittee,  
15 ESI, I think?

16 [REDACTED]: That's it. That's  
17 the one.

18 [REDACTED]: Oh, okay. The ESI  
19 subcommittee?

20 [REDACTED]: Okay. Thank you.

Q. Okay. Did you notice anything out of place or surprising when you got up on the roof?

A. No.
