House Resolution 1367 directed this Task
Force to investigate the facts and circumstances of
the attempted assassination of Donald J. Trump on
July 13th, 2024, in Butler, Pennsylvania. Pursuant
to House Resolution 1367, Chairman Kelly and
Ranking Member Crow have requested this interview
as part of the Task Force investigation.

- Q. Can the witness please state their name and spell their last name for the record.
- A. The last name is spelled .
 - Q. Thank you,

My name is _____, and I'm a Senior Counsel with the Task Force Majority Staff. I want to thank you for coming in today for this interview. The Task Force recognizes and appreciates that you are here voluntarily.

You are allowed to have an attorney present to advise you during this interview. Do you have an attorney present representing you in a personal capacity with you today?

1 Α. No, I do not. 2 Is there also an attorney present representing the Butler County Sheriff's Office 3 4 today? 5 Α. No, there is not. Next, starting with 6 7 Majority, then Minority, can additional staff members please introduce themselves with their 8 name, title, and affiliation. 9 10 Task Force Majority Senior Counsel. 11 12 : I'm 13 legislative attorney with the Congressional 14 Research Service, but I'm providing support to the Task Force. 15 16 I'm an Investigative Counsel with the Task Force Minority. 17 18 Thank you, all. : 19 20 , before we begin, I would Q. 21 like to go over the ground rules for this 22 interview. The way this interview will proceed is 23 24 as follows: The Majority and Minority Staff will 25 alternate asking you questions, 30 minutes per side per round until each side is finished with their questioning. The Majority Staff will begin, proceed for 30 minutes, and then the Minority Staff will have 30 minutes to ask questions. We will then alternate back and forth in this manner until both sides have no more questions.

If either side is in the middle of a specific line of questions, they may choose to end a few minutes past 30 minutes to ensure completion of that specific line of questioning, including any pertinent follow-ups.

In this interview, while one member of the staff for each side may lead the questions, additional staff may ask questions.

There is a court reporter taking down everything I say and everything you say to make a written record of the interview. For the record to be clear, please wait until the staffer questioning you finishes each question before you begin your answer, and the staffer will wait until you finish your response before proceeding to the next question.

Further, to ensure the court reporter can properly record this interview, please speak clearly, concisely, and slowly. Also, the court

reporter cannot record non-verbal answers such as nodding or shaking your head; so, it's important that you answer each question with an audible, verbal answer. Do you understand?

Q. We want you to answer our questions in the most complete and truthful manner possible; so we will take our time. If you have any questions or do not fully understand the question, please let us know, and we will attempt to clarify, add context to, or rephrase our questions.

- Q. If we ask about specific conversations or events in the past and you are unable to recall the exact words or details, you should testify to the substance of those conversations or events to the best of your recollection.

If you recall only a part of a conversation or event, you should give us your best recollection of those events or parts of conversations that you do recall.

- Q. Although you are here voluntarily, we will

not swear you in. You are required pursuant to 18 U.S. Code Section 1001 to answer questions from Congress truthfully. This also applies to questions posed by congressional staff in your interview.

Yes. 6 Do you have any other questions before we Q. 7 begin? Α. 8 No. It is now 9:02. Majority 9 10 Staff will now begin its questioning. 11 BY 12 Q. , thank you very much for 13 being here today. As an initial matter, can you 14 help us describe your role at the Butler Sheriff's Office. 15 16 Yeah. I am the chief deputy. Α. 17 Okay. And what are your job Ο. responsibilities as chief deputy? 18 19 My job responsibilities, I oversee the 20 operation of the office. It's mostly 21 administrative duties assigned by the Sheriff. 22 Q. Uh-huh. When did you first learn about the 23 July 13th event? 24 Monday of that week; so that would have

been -- I believe it was Monday, the 8th of July.

2024. 1 2 Uh-huh. And how did you become aware of Q. 3 the event taking place? 4 Α. From Sheriff Okay. And what were you told at that time? 5 Ο. That we would be attending a meeting in 6 Α. 7 Allegheny County with the Secret Service. Uh-uh. 8 Q. And he would be visiting -- Former 9 10 President Trump would be visiting the Butler Farm 11 Show grounds --12 Ο. Uh-huh. 13 -- on July 13th. Α. 14 Uh-huh. Did you attend that meeting with 0. 15 Sheriff ? 16 Α. T did. Who all was there? 17 Ο. There was a lot of people from all 18 19 different agencies that were involved in the -- in 20 the rally. 21 Uh-huh. And can you describe what was Ο. 22 discussed at that meeting. 23 It appeared to me they were trying to 24 establish the groundwork to see what resources were 25 available.

- A. They had breakout sessions --
 - Q. Uh-huh.
- A. -- depending on what specialized duties or responsibilities that each agency may partake or have or offer.
 - O. Uh-huh.
- A. So they broke out into those groups, and then they came together at the end, just a round open discussion about what may take place or what may be available to help, any agency could help or assist in the event.
- Q. Uh-huh. And at that meeting, what did you understand the Sheriff's Office to be at the July 13th event?
- A. That we would be assisting the Secret Service and the Pennsylvania State Police with security within -- within the event itself.
 - Q. So --
- A. We weren't sure on that date what our exact role on responsibility was going to be --
 - Q. Uh-huh.
 - A. -- not knowing what they were needing.
- Q. Uh-huh. So after that -- that meeting, it was unclear what the Sheriff's role would -- the

Sheriff's Office role would be in the July 13th 1 2 event? 3 Α. Correct. Okay. At that meeting, who did you assume 4 Ο. 5 was in charge of the July 13th event? 6 Α. A female secret service agent 7 . Something like that. or 8 Q. Uh-huh. She facilitated the discussion. 9 Α. 10 And did provide the briefing at the Ο. 11 meeting? Was she leading the discussions? 12 Α. Mostly. It appeared to me that she may or 13 may not have had little or no information at the 14 time as far as the visit. 15 Uh-huh. Did you attend any particular Q. 16 breakout meeting that followed that initial meeting with all the agencies? 17 18 Sure. Sure. requested I attend the 19 meeting with the folks that were going to be at the 20 airport. He was under the assumption that Former 21 President Trump would be flying into the Butler 22 County Airport, not the Pittsburgh International 23 Airport. 24 So once I found it was the Pittsburgh 25 International Airport, because he had offered s

deputy to assist in the motorcade, the motorcade 1 2 meeting was right next to the airport meeting, so I went over and offered assistance, if needed, to the 3 4 motorcade meeting. Uh-huh. 5 Q. 6 Which was led by the State Police and the 7 Secret Service as well. Okay. Did you attend any other breakout 8 Ο. meetings --9 10 Α. No. 11 -- that day? Q. 12 How long, roughly, did the meeting with 13 everyone and the breakout meetings last on that 14 date? I -- I recall it to be an hour to an hour 15 Α. 16 and a half. 17 Did you have any Secret Service counterpart working in, you know, in tandem with the Sheriff's 18 19 Did you know who to report to or to communicate with from the Secret Service? 20 21 Other than Miss stating she was Α. 22 overseeing it, no. So, total from the Sheriff's Office, 23 Okav. 0.

I understand that there weren't a lot of known details at that time about the July 13th event in terms of the setup. Can you describe what details that were available to you guys at that initial briefing.

- A. Other than he was arriving at the Pittsburgh International Airport, the State Police and the Secret Service were facilitating the motorcade to the location, and the agencies were discussing how they were going to secure what was possibly going to be needed to secure the Farm Show grounds for his visit.
 - Q. Uh-huh.
 - A. The resources that they had.
- Q. Was any paperwork disseminated by the Secret Service at that briefing?
 - A. I didn't receive any.
 - Q. Did you receive any written guidance?
 - A. I didn't receive anything.
- Q. Uh-huh. Was there any PowerPoint presentation delivered for the groups there?
 - A. I don't believe.

Q. Okay.

- A. They pulled up a map on Google on the big screen and looked at the map to see what the area looked like but --
- Q. Uh-huh. So that -- that briefing occurs on what date?
- A. That was I guess it would be July the 9th. It was the Tuesday.
 - O. Uh-huh.
 - A. Yes.
- Q. Okay. Did you attend any -- before July 13th, did you attend any other briefings or meetings that were led by Secret Service in preparation for the July 13th event?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. Can you describe those.
- A. Yes. July 11th at 10:00 in the morning,

 Sheriff asked that I attend the walk-around

 meeting with the Secret Service and the State

 Police and other agencies at the Butler Farm Show

 grounds to determine what resources were going to

 be needed or requested to see how we could assist.
- Q. On July 10th, 10 a.m., the walk-through, do you recall who from Secret Service was leading that walk-through?

1 Α. It was July 11th. 2 Sorry, July 11th. Do you recall what 3 Secret Service representative was leading that 4 walk-through? 5 Α. was there, And there was a couple others, but I don't recall their 6 7 names. I would like to introduce an exhibit for 8 0. This will be Majority Exhibit 1. We 9 the record. 10 will use the map there. 11 (Majority Exhibit No. 1 was marked for 12 identification.) 13 To the best of your recollection, can you -- can you help us understand the path of the 14 15 walk-through on July 11th. I can give you --16 Yes. Α. 17 Ο. -- a pen. We met -- we met at the office at the main 18 19 entrance at the intersection in the -- inside the 20 fairground, inside the gates (indicating). We 21 started to walk east toward the AGR building 22 between the fences (indicating). 23 The discussions were led by Lieutenant 24 and Lieutenant , as well as 25 Secret Service Agent , Lieutenant

from Butler Township Police Department, 1 2 myself, Major from the Pennsylvania State Police, and I think there might have been 3 4 someone from 911 with us. It might have been 5 at the time. I know he was up with us at the end, but I don't know if he came up after if 6 7 he was -- I can't -- I can't recall. Uh-huh. 8 0. I didn't -- I can't remember. 9 Α. 10 Ο. Uh-huh. 11 At any rate, we walked the perimeter of Α. 12 the -- between the two fences to determine where we 13 were going to station or we needed posts for to 14 maintain security. Uh-huh. And is that the extent of the path 15 0. 16 of the walk-through is between the fences there 17 qoing east? Correct. And we walked around the entire 18 19 complex (indicating). 20 Q. Okay. Would you mind with this pen just 21 tracing that walk-through for us. 22 Α. Uh-huh. (Witness drawing on exhibit.) 23 24 We got in between -- I can't remember if it Α.

was at this point or maybe it was (indicating).

The pen is running out of ink there.

Q. Sorry. This might be better.

(Continuing to draw.)

- A. Scratch that. Move it up this way (indicating).
 - Q. Thank you so much.
 - A. You're welcome.
- Q. So, along the walk-through -- I'll just keep it here for your reference in front of you.
 - A. Uh-huh.

- Q. During the walk-through, can you describe what was discussed, you know, by local law enforcement entities that were there, the Secret Service. What were you all doing on the walk-through?
- A. They were sharing concerns about where to put the posts, how they were going to be manned. It was determined that they were going to be in a car. We determined how far apart would be, you know, logistically reasonable with the circumstances.
 - Q. Uh-huh.
- A. The main goal was to keep people from jumping the fence. I mean, the fence -- I don't know if you've been out there, the fence is -- is

old. It's -- it's a fence, but it's, as far as security goes, it's really just to keep people out. It's not meant to be a barricade of really any big significance.

But at any rate -- so, we looked at some possible vulnerabilities where people could sneak in. Really, that's what our main thing was.

Q. Uh-huh.

- A. That's what it appeared to me.
- O. Uh-huh.
- A. The discussions were, like, with the State

 Police and the Secret Service, I shared a couple of

 concerns but --
- Q. Do you recall what concerns that you shared with the Secret Service and State Police?
- A. Yeah. Whenever we were walking -- whenever we were doing the walk-around, I just felt personally that coming in Brady Paul Lane just seemed like a really unsecure area to bring a motorcade in there with the Former President of the United States. Just me personally.
 - Q. Uh-huh.
- A. It seemed like there was a lot of places that could be ambushed.
 - O. Uh-huh.

But the State Police advised, well, we'll 1 Α. 2 have someone walk and make sure that, you know, nothing suspicious. 3 4 Lieutenant said he talked to all the residents there and he didn't see an issue with 5 6 anything; so --7 Were your concerns about that entrance Ο. satisfied before July 13th? 8 9 Could you repeat that. 10 Were your concerns alleviated, addressed Ο. 11 before the event took place on July 13th? Yes. 12 Α. I mean, I -- I -- I worked in law 13 enforcement in Butler County for 32 years. 14 Uh-huh. Ο. 15 And, you know, I don't have any training in Α. 16 dignitary protection other than -- other than my background in law -- local law enforcement here in 17 Butler County; so --18 19 You know, there were members from our 20 local ESU teams there that have specialized 21 training in tactics beyond -- beyond my training 22 and knowledge. 23 Ο. Uh-huh.

So, they were doing their own walk-around.

A. So I kind of felt that, you know, that's what they were doing.

- Q. Uh-huh. During the walk-through on July 11th, at any point were concerns about the AGR building discussed?
- A. I don't recall. I do recall Lieutenant having a discussion with the State Police about what manpower he had available to him -- or to them. And he said that they were able to man the control -- traffic control points for the motorcade coming in.

But beyond that, he did not have -- he did not have the manpower to secure the property around the AGR building.

- Q. Uh-huh. Were -- were his concerns addressed by Secret Service and State Police to your knowledge?
- A. To my knowledge, I -- you know, I mean, we were walking around. But sometimes we were spread out, and I didn't hear what everybody was saying.
- Q. Uh-huh. During the walk-through, were there any conversations about snipers or counter snipers?
- A. I do recall them speaking of their teams being in the building behind the stage.

1 Ο. And by "them," do you mean the Secret 2 Service? Secret Service and the State Police, yes. 3 Α. 4 Ο. Okay. Do you recall any discussions about elevated surfaces, elevated -- elevated positions 5 as -- as possible vulnerabilities for the event? 6 7 Α. I don't recall. Thanks. 8 0. Have you ever worked an event like a 9 10 campaign rally for a presidential candidate before? 11 Α. In 2020, President Trump came, visited the 12 county at the Butler County Airport. I was a 13 sergeant at the time working a K9, and I was 14 assigned to a post outside of the airport grounds. 15 Uh-huh. And for your assignment to the 0. 16 post at the 2020 rally, who did you assume was in 17 charge of planning that event? I was given -- I was assigned a post from 18 19 then-Chief -- Chief Deputy . So I'm not 20 sure where he got his directives from. 21 Q. Thank you. 22 Can you describe any -- any briefings or materials that followed the July 11th walk-through. 23 24 Yes. After we determined -- or they 25 determined how many posts that the Sheriff's Office would be able to fill, Lieutenant said

I will put together a -- post assignments, so and
so forth, and e-mail them to you and we can -- and
then I could assign our staff appropriately.

So, on Friday, I received that from him in the morning around 10 via e-mail. I made the assignments with our -- with our staff and e-mailed it to the staff, and him as well so he knew who was going to be working where and what.

- Q. Uh-huh. Can you describe the assignments that you assigned for the Sheriff's Office that day.
- A. Yes. It was determined that they were going to stagger the Pennsylvania State Police with the Butler County Sheriff's Office around -- around the perimeter. I think there were approximately five posts that we manned around with the State Police. So I --
- Q. Uh-huh. For -- one particular post for Sergeant was in the local command post trailer.
 - A. Right.

- Q. Do you recall assigning that post?
- A. Yeah, I assigned that post. We wanted to put someone in the command center; so I -- him

being a supervisor, I -- I assigned him to that post.

- Q. Did you know before the July 13th event that there would be a separate Secret Service command post?
 - A. Yes.

- Q. When did you know that -- of that determination that there would be --
 - A. In the walk-around.
 - Q. In the walk-around on July 11th?
 - A. Uh-huh.
- Q. Can you describe how the Secret Service command post was described compared to the local command trailer.
- A. I merely recall that the Secret Service and the State Police were going to have a command post in the office and the county was going to bring their mobile command post, and it was going to be stationed down by what they call the barns down here (indicating) behind the Paul Brady FOP Lodge.
 - O. Do you recall who made that decision?
- A. I don't know who made the decision. That's just what I heard was going to be going on. So who determined that, I couldn't tell you.
 - O. Uh-huh.

1 Do you recall who you 2 heard it from? THE WITNESS: It was in general 3 4 discussion whenever we were doing the walk-around. 5 Q. Had you worked in a setting before where 6 there was two separate command posts? 7 Α. No. What was the rationale for having the local 8 0. 9 command post and the Secret Service command post 10 separate? 11 I -- I don't know. 12 0. Uh-huh. Was that discussed at all during 13 the walk-through on July 11th? 14 I would assume that it wasn't together 15 because there wasn't enough room. 16 Uh-huh. 0. 17 I wouldn't know. I've only worked a handful of details when there was a command post, 18 19 and, generally, there's only been one. 2.0 Q. Uh-huh. And do you recall when 21 communications for the July 13th event were first 22 discussed? I don't recall. 23 24 Do you recall --Q. 25 I didn't learn of any frequency assignments Α.

until the morning of the event when I arrived. 1 2 Q. Uh-huh. I assumed and knew that the Sheriff's 3 4 Office would be communicating on our own channel. 5 Q. Uh-huh. If you had to get in contact with Secret Service on July 13th, did you know how you 6 7 would get in touch with Secret Service? Well, they were -- they were everywhere --8 Uh-huh. 9 Ο. 10 -- within -- within the event. So, it Α. 11 wasn't terribly hard to find one if you needed one. 12 Ο. Uh-huh. How would you radio to the Secret Service official? 13 I would probably -- if -- if I wasn't near 14 15 one, I would probably have to radio to Sergeant in the command post. 16 17 Uh-huh. Did you know who all was in the Ο. local command post trailer prior to the event? 18 19 I -- I know of a few that were in there, 20 but I can't say who all was in the command post. 21 Uh-huh. Did you receive any briefing 0. 22 materials or diagrams or slides or aerial pictures 23 prior to the July 13th event? 24 Just the instructions, the map, and

It was. 17 All right. And what -- what led you to Ο. consult with the state trooper about the 18 19 operational plan from the State Police Department? 2.0 Α. I don't recall. I think it was just 21 general conversation about something, and he --22 Q. Uh-huh. -- he pulled it from his vehicle, and I 23

My role and responsibility was to ensure 11 that the -- I didn't -- we didn't have anyone 12 floating to give my staff breaks throughout the 13 day, so that was going to be my -- my post --14 Uh-huh. 15 0. -- to relieve and fill in whatever needs 16 Α. 17 filled in. I was an available person, as well as support for Sergeant if that was needed. 18 19 Uh-huh. With Sergeant being a supervisor and 20 A. him being able to work the detail, I didn't want to 21

I was essentially the OIC for us. I mean,

On Exhibit 1 -- on Exhibit 1, can you describe to us where you were located on July 13th at your post. Were you around the campaign site, were you at one particular spot?

- A. When the shooting took place?
- Q. In general throughout the day.
- A. In general, I was all over the place.
- Q. Uh-huh.
 - A. It literally took me an hour and a half to make the perimeter to relieve my guys and girls.
 - Q. Uh-huh. And were you -- were you walking or --
 - A. I was in a vehicle.
- 19 Q. Vehicle.
- 20 A. We were able to drive vehicles around.
- 21 O. Uh-huh.
 - A. And with the heat, it was great because we -- our staff was mostly able to stay in the air conditioning, and it made us more mobile --
 - Q. Uh-huh.

- A. -- in that area.
- Q. Were there other vehicles manned by local police entities, Secret Service, that were traveling around the campaign grounds -- the campaign rally grounds during the day?
 - A. In the inner perimeter?
 - Q. Uh-huh.
- A. Yes.

- Q. What entities were also mobile?
- A. There was a magnitude of golf carts that were being used by the Secret Service, the State Police.
 - Q. Uh-huh.
- A. And I don't know other agencies that had them. I -- I can't answer that.
 - Q. Uh-huh. For your communications for July 13th, were you in possession of a radio that you wouldn't originally have that day? Did you receive any personal radios from any other local police entity or Secret Service?
 - A. No.
 - Q. There were reports that there were personal radios located near, in the local command post trailer that were available for Secret Service officials. Are you aware of those reports?

Just after the event, I heard that they 1 Α. 2 were available. Uh-huh. At your initial briefing with 3 Secret Service and other local law enforcement 4 entities on July 9th or at the walk-through on July 5 11th, were you advised on any situation when you 6 7 should directly reach out to Secret Service? 8 Α. No. Did Secret Service participate in any 9 0. 10 briefings or walk-throughs with the Sheriff's 11 Office on the day of the event? 12 Α. No. Did you -- which entities? The Secret 13 Service? 14 Secret Service. Ο. 15 Α. No. 16 BY Did the Sheriff's Office have an internal 17 Ο. meeting on the day of the event? 18 19 I had a discussion with Lieutenant 20 to see if they were going to have a 21 debriefing meeting type before the beginning of the 22 event, and he said no, he was going to advise his

troopers to respond to their posts by 10:45.

was going to talk with them about what their roles

and responsibilities were going to be, but there

wasn't going to be an official briefing meeting at the beginning.

So I said, okay. So I advised our deputies what their responsibilities were going to be, where to respond. I did have two deputies that weren't familiar with maybe where their posts were going to be; so I got there early, and I took them to their posts, talked to them about what we needed to do.

and I -- actually, I jumped in his car, and we rode around and reaffirmed and spoke with everyone at their posts.

After that, once all the deputies and

- Q. Were any of your team responsible for magnetometers or screening?
- A. We had a deputy assigned to assist the two troopers at that location.
 - Q. And what about explosive ordnance disposal?
 - A. We didn't have anyone assigned for that.
 - Q. What about K9 assets?
 - A. We didn't have any of that either.
- Q. And for your description of the -- the walk -- the brief overview with your deputy sheriffs, you mentioned how to respond at their

posts. What did you -- what do you mean by that?

- A. Like, what their roles and responsibilities were going to be. We didn't want anyone -- we were more concerned with someone coming in that didn't go through the magnetometers. So their role was to make sure that the people didn't come in, and if they needed assistance, they were supposed to reach out via radio.
- Q. How would you describe the inner perimeter versus the outer perimeter?
- A. It was almost -- the inner perimeter obviously is within the whole fence of the Farm Show, and then they have another line of fences kind of like the inner perimeter. It's a -- it varied mostly.

Probably 75 yards in width, you know, around most of the grounds, with the exception of once you meet the -- on the west side of the building, or west side of the property, it's pretty wooded and there isn't -- it kind of goes down to one fence, because the Farm Show grounds use that area for parking whenever they have the Farm Show.

: Thank you. That's it for us.

: We can go off the record.

Q. Well, thank you for being here. We really appreciate you making the time to talk to us.

How many of these formal investigative interviews have you done since July 13th?

- A. This is probably my fourth one.
- Q. Fourth. Can you say who you did those interviews with.
- A. The first interview was conducted by the State Police and the FBI. Maybe only three. There's -- there have been some informal ones in the Sheriff's Office with some people but -- and then the second one would have been with another committee. I assume it was another branch of you folks.
- Q. Uh-huh. Do you recall if it was the Senate part of the House?
 - A. I don't recall.
- Q. Okay. So, you had said that you've participated in a handful of details of this level. I don't know if they were all political rallies, but can you say a little bit what your past experience with these types of big events was.
 - A. The first one I talked about was in 2020

1 when President Trump came to Butler Airport.

Q. Yep.

A. Vice President Pence came to Oberg

Industries after -- that might have been -- that
was before 2020. I don't remember what year he
came to Oberg. It might have been that year prior.

Probably an election year, I'm sure.

And I was a sergeant at the time. I went with the Sheriff, and he had -- he assigned me -- he and I were there, as well as I think we had two other deputies out just doing traffic control.

- O. Uh-huh.
- A. And I was in the command post on that event.
 - 0. Okay.
 - A. And then the July 13th event this year.
 - Q. And did you have a planning role in any of those earlier events --
 - A. No.
 - Q. -- or was it -- no. Okay.

And was there, you know, just in your experience, was there anything that stands out as different about the approach to this July 13th event as opposed to those earlier events that we

just talked about from sort of a planning 1 2 perspective? Well, clearly when President Trump came and 3 4 he was president, there was a lot of security. 5 Q. Yeah. 6 It was very secure. This one seemed very 7 loose to me. But, you know, I didn't have a lot of -- I don't have a lot of experience in planning 8 these; so I -- you know. 9 10 Okay. So, it seems like there were more Ο. 11 resources there available when President Trump came 12 in 2020 as opposed to the July 13th rally? 13 Α. Yes. 14 So, who would you say was in charge of Ο. Sheriff's personnel at the July 13th event? I know 15 16 was there. But was he there in sort Sheriff 17 of an unofficial capacity? No. He -- he's ultimately in charge all 18 Α. 19 the time. 2.0 Q. Uh-huh. 21 But he had assigned me to oversee our staff 22

- and the resources that we were providing.
- Okay. So he had specifically delegated Ο. sort of planning responsibility --
 - Α. Yes.

- Q. -- and operational?
- A. And I reported back to him with what was going on for approval.
- Q. Okay. Going back to those early meetings with Secret Service and the Pennsylvania State Police, I think July 8th/July 9th, would you say that Secret Service or the State Police were assigning the Sheriff's Office a role?
 - A. Yes.

- Q. And did you have any input in that role at that early stage?
- A. I know what resources we had available; so, I offered those resources, and they utilized that.
 - Q. Okay.
- A. Actually, it was they needed less than we had available.
 - Q. They needed less than you had available?
- A. Uh-huh.
- Q. And just to confirm on something that you said earlier, you had not received a Pennsylvania State Police ops plan prior to July 13th?
- A. The only portion of the ops plan that I received, and I noticed it after the trooper showed me because we were talking about our assignments, maybe was the map of assignments. This -- these

1 two pages (indicating) was what I received from the 2 State Police. Uh-huh. 3 Ο. 4 Α. Via e-mail. 5 Q. Okay. 6 Just for the record, the 7 two pages are? 8 THE WITNESS: Pages 4 and 5. Pages 4 and 5 of what was 9 10 introduced as Majority Exhibit No. 2. 11 Α. That's what I used to assign our deputies, 12 and what that's what I e-mailed our deputies --13 Ο. Right. -- as far as who was going to be where and 14 Α. 15 what their roles were going to be. 16 Okay. Did you find that to be odd at all Ο. 17 that you did not receive an operations plan from the Pennsylvania State Police, or was that --18 19 Yes and no. We had assisted the State 20 Police -- we do it every year. Slippery Rock 21 University has a homecoming celebration, and 22 usually in the evening it gets a little crazy; so, 23 we have assisted them in the past for many years. 24 It varies from year to year. Typically 25 they want us there to assist them if they have to

- 1 make arrests because we have some transport 2 vehicles that can haul more than -- you know, multiple people. 3 4 Ο. Uh-huh. 5 And -- and I've seen their operational plans for those events. They've shared them at 6 7 that point in time. Maybe -- maybe they just felt that we didn't need -- need the whole plan. 8 Uh-huh. 9 Ο. 10 I don't know. 11 Okay. Q. Α. I know -- I've known Lieutenant for
- 12 A. I know -- I've known Lieutenant for 13 a long time, and I don't think he's someone that 14 would keep anything from us intentionally. I think
- Q. Yeah. So you and Lieutenant work together regularly?
- A. I wouldn't say regularly. I've just known him. He's a local -- he grew up here --
 - Q. Okay.
 - A. -- in Butler County.

he just gave us what we needed.

 - Q. Do you know how many Sheriff's personnel were assigned to the July 13th rally?
- 16 A. Yes. I believe we had, including myself,

 - A. There was five -- including me, probably eight, because we had five posts around the perimeter, one at the magnetometer, and one in the command post.
 - Q. Okay. And you had mentioned that you had additional staff available, but that it wasn't requested?

A. We -- right.

- Q. Is that typical? I mean, would -- would the Pennsylvania -- sorry. That request came from Pennsylvania State Police or U.S. Secret Service?
- A. The Secret Service and the State Police I guess --
 - Q. Uh-huh.
- A. -- in conjunction with our walk-around determined how many posts we were going to need, determined we were going to do every other post.
 - Q. Okay.
- A. Which I thought was reasonable because the two posts could drive together and communicate; so it wasn't like -- even though we don't have radio comms together, and phone numbers were provided on (indicating) -- on this sheet of the troopers that were assigned to the post.
 - O. Uh-huh.
- A. So there was that, and "This is how many we could do." "You have that many?" I said,
 "Absolutely." So we assigned them appropriately that was requested.
- Q. Okay. And sheriff deputies were assigned not just to that field in between the two fences, but all the way around the entire perimeter of the

1 event? 2 Α. Yeah. We had some stationed around the west side of the property as well. 3 4 Ο. Okay. Not just in between the fence -- in between 5 Α. the fences. 6 7 And for the -- for the deputies that were Ο. in that field between the fences --8 Uh-huh. 9 Α. 10 -- they were in their cars or they were --Ο. 11 Α. Yes. 12 Q. And did you direct them to be in their 13 cars, or was that sort of just a discretionary 14 decision; it was hot? It made them more mobile because 15 Yes. Α. 16 there was quite a bit of --17 Ο. So you didn't --So, yeah, their discussion was, well, we'll 18 Α. 19 put -- we'll man around the inner perimeter --20 Q. - A. More than capable of manning that post; so I had no concerns of him being -- being in the post.
- Q. Okay. And do you know, did he have experience in that type of a setting, in a -- I guess in a command post?
- A. I can't answer that, if he's had experience in that or not specifically.
- Q. Okay. Did you -- did you consider putting yourself in the command post?

A. Uh-huh, I did.

- Q. And what was your thinking behind the decision not to do that?
- A. I wanted to be in a position to -- to assist our staff, to make decisions, and I didn't want to be tied down in the command post.
 - Q. Did you --
 - A. If he had -- I'm sorry.
 - Q. No. Please go ahead.
- A. If Sergeant had not volunteered to work, I -- I wouldn't have put a deputy in the command post, I would have been in the command post.
- O. Uh-huh. Okay.
 - A. Not that we didn't have a deputy that could have handled it. Because the one deputy that volunteered to work is a retired corporal from the State Police, and I'm sure he's worked command posts in his -- in his career. He would have been a candidate as well but --
 - Q. Okay. And did Sergeant , you know, express any concern about having this position?
- A. No. He was -- I think he was flattered that I asked him to go in there.

Just a couple -- just, I guess, 1 Q. All right. 2 kind of general command structure questions. 3 Who did you view as in ultimate control of this -- who was in ultimate command? 4 Secret Service. 5 Α. Secret Service? 6 0. 7 Α. Uh-huh. And then who would you say you were 8 0. receiving directives from? Was it -- were you 9 10 getting --11 Lieutenant Α. 12 Q. With Pennsylvania State Police? 13 Uh-huh. Α. 14 And were you in contact with Lieutenant 0. 15 throughout that day, or was it mostly just 16 during the planning meetings? 17 He shared with me -- well, I had his Α. personal cell phone, but he also gave me his cell 18 19 phone number. I guess it was assigned by the State Police. 20 21 Ο. Uh-huh. 22 Α. Which I didn't use it until after the 23 event. 24 Okay. Q. 25 Α. I -- yeah.

I'll transition there to communications. 1 0. 2 So, you had a radio? Α. T did. 3 4 Ο. Is that correct? Uh-huh. 5 Α. And was that radio on the Sheriff's 6 0. 7 channel? 8 Α. It was. And would that radio have had access to the 9 0. 10 ops 3 and ops 4 channels that some of the other --11 Α. Yes. 12 0. Did you ever -- do you just keep it on the 13 Sheriff's channel or do you scan? 14 I was scanning 3 and 4. No. 15 Okay. And obviously your radio had the Q. 16 capability to do that if you were --17 Α. Right. Since you were doing it? 18 Ο. 19 Α. Correct. 20 Q. And then how were you communicating with 21 your -- with your deputies around the perimeter? 22 Was it mostly sort of physically I'm -- I'm driving around, I'm visiting you and talking that way, or 23 24 were you --25 Α. They would reach out via radio if they

needed a break. 1 2 Uh-huh. Q. Or Sergeant would reach out to me via 3 4 radio. And that would have been on the Sheriff's 5 Ο. 6 channel? 7 Right. I was continuously driving around Α. checking on them (indicating). 8 9 Uh-huh. And how was it driving around the 10 grounds? I mean, was it easy to --11 Α. Yes. 12 Ο. -- move around? 13 Α. It was. 14 So there weren't people or fences in the Ο. 15 way that were creating problems? 16 The people -- the people were being Α. No. funneled in, but from the magnetometers to the 17 18 stage area. 19 Ο. Uh-huh. 20 Α. Which I had no need or reason to go within 21 that area. I did relieve the deputy at the magnetometers twice; so, I stood in there where he 22 23 was -- where he was stationed. 24 Uh-huh. Okay. So you would actually --Q. 25 you would -- you would actually relieve these

deputies by taking on their duties for a period of 1 2 time --Yeah, so they could use the restroom. 3 Α. 4 0. -- so they could get a drink? 5 Α. Yeah. You know, it was -- as you know, it 6 was very hot that day. 7 Yeah. 0. Unfortunately or fortunately, we have an 8 older staff with the type of work that we do. 9 10 Ο. Uh-huh. 11 A lot of retired police officers come to us Α. 12 looking for -- for employment after they retire. 13 And, you know, we don't respond to police calls, we 14 work just pretty much a study shift of daylight. 15 We do have some younger staff, and I did 16 assign our younger guys a post that I knew they would be outside and could maybe handle the heat 17 better than others. 18 Right. Okay. And did you have any radio 19 Ο.

One other question about that 2020 Trump It's our understanding that at that event, deputies were paired with Secret Service agents.

Okay. 23 Or spoke to them in person on that Friday. 24 Okay. Sorry to go back to one

your phone? 1 2 Α. I do. 3 Do you know, do all your deputies have 4 FirstNet on their phones? I can't answer that. I don't think they 5 Α. do. 6 7 But they --Ο. They all do not, I know. 8 Α. - A. I was assisting the Butler Township Police establishing a perimeter over at the AGR building along Route 68, I guess that would be on the north end of the property, and they showed me a picture of him on their phone. That's the first I saw a picture of him.

- Q. Did you know during the day that Sergeant was having issues distributing those pictures to the sheriff deputies?
- A. I know he was having cell phone issues, but I can't -- I can't -- I can't either confirm or deny.

where they actually ended up taking him out, and I was pretty much standing right there whenever the shots were fired.

A. Once the shots -- once the shots were fired, I heard a loud hissing. So I went around to where the speakers were, the hydraulic lines were. I thought they exploded because the speakers were coming down. There was fluid spraying all over the place. And then I put two and two together that it was shots fired.

It was really confusing because I guess whenever President -- and then I kind of worked my way toward -- not toward the AGR building, but in that vicinity on the other side of the stage, and then I heard the crowd cheering. It was just odd. Because even though I was back there, I don't recall seeing President Trump leave.

- Q. Uh-huh.
- A. But, anyway.
- Q. Would you -- would you mind -- I think the Majority has introduced the -- that map as Exhibit 1.
 - A. Uh-huh.
 - Q. Would you mind -- I guess, is it all right

if I stand up so I can see?

A. Yeah.

- Q. Can you point out where the meet-and-greet was, and then after that, where you were when the shots were fired.
- A. The meet-and-greet was in the tents right here (indicating).
 - O. Uh-huh.
- A. So I exited, and I walked around to here (indicating). My original -- my original post, I was over with the command post (indicating). I thought I would just stand over there, and if Sergeant needed me or if I needed to do something, I would be available.
 - Q. Uh-huh.
- A. Not knowing where I might be needed or what might need to be done.
 - O. Uh-huh.
- A. So I was here (indicating). When the shots were fired, I kind of worked my way toward this way once I learned that the shots were coming from over here (indicating) because I saw, you know, people running this way (indicating), law enforcement officers running toward the AGR building. All I had on me was my pistol. I did not have any type

1 of long gun or anything like that. 2 So then I was looking for where I might They were carrying a gentleman over to 3 be needed. 4 a Secret Service van that was parked right there (indicating). So I provided security, went over 5 and assisted them with the man that was shot over 6 7 there. Q. 8 Okay. Sir, you've been marking 9 10 Perhaps you could just mark with a star for the record where you were when shots were fired. 11 12 THE WITNESS: Sure. 13 Thank you. 14 If it's all right with my 15 colleagues, we can mark this as Minority Exhibit A. 16 (Minority Exhibit A was marked for 17 identification.) 18 Okay. 19 Absolutely. And thank you. 20 ΒY 21 And, sir, could you briefly denote the 22 direction you went after you had referenced moving 23 westward. Could you denote that on the map with an arrow, perhaps? 24 25 You mean once the shots were fired? Α.

You had mentioned generally following a 1 Ο. 2 particular direction because of the audience or some other crowd of people moving in a particular 3 4 direction. 5 Α. I saw people carrying a wounded gentleman Is that what you were referring to? 6 to the van. 7 No. But. --Ο. I saw law enforcement officers running 8 Oh. towards the AGR building, and a couple of my 9 10 colleagues, Lieutenant and stuff, were 11 taking a position up -- there was a piece of 12 equipment there. He was taking cover behind it. 13 So I kind of went that way, and I also heard on the 14 radio that the shooter was down; so --15 And could you mark what that way is perhaps Q. with an arrow. 16 17 Α. Sure. 18 (Witness drawing). 19 Thank you. 20 I think with that, we're 21 about out of time; so we can go off the record. 22 (Discussion was held off the record.) 23 (Recess was taken.) 24 BY 25 Majority Exhibit 2, which is the 0.

Pennsylvania State Police operational plan, I know that you mentioned that you recall seeing Page 4, which is the map, and Page 5, which is the post assignment log.

- A. Uh-huh. On Page 4, on the map, there are numberings of different posts.
 - A. Uh-huh.
 - Q. Do you recognize those on the document?
- A. I do.

- Q. And correspondingly, there's post assignments on the bottom of Page 4 and Page 5 that list out the individuals that will be at those posts by post number --
 - A. Yes.
- Q. -- corresponding to the map. After reviewing Page 5, there appears to be post 13 missing from the post assignment list.
 - A. I noticed that.
 - Q. Do you know what post 13 was for the July 13 event?
- A. I didn't ask. I assumed 13 is an unlucky number, so they didn't include it; it being July 13th, another unlucky number.
- Q. Uh-huh.
- 25 A. Not that I'm suspicious or -- but it is

what it is; so -- it's just ironic. That's all.

- Q. Were the posts listed on Page 4 and Page 5, were they discussed at any brief within the July 13th meetings between the Sheriff's Office, yourself, and any other local law enforcement entity or Pennsylvania State Police?
- A. Just that Lieutenant said he would put the posts together and send me -- send me what they would be when he was done with them.
- Q. Uh-huh. Do you recall post 13 being raised at any point in those discussions?
- A. No. I didn't know the numbering until -we weren't discussing numbering on the walk-around.
 He -- they numbered them -- whoever numbered them
 after our walk-around and made the assignments.
 - O. Thank you.

- A. You're welcome.
- Q. Going back to pre-meetings for the July

 13th event. We talked about that initial meeting

 where the Secret Service was present and there was

 a break -- there were break-off sessions for

 different components. For the record, we've gone

 back and forth between the 8 th and July 9th. That

 was on July 8th, the Monday; correct? Or was it on

 Tuesday, July 9th?

1 I think it was on Tuesday. Hold on. Α. Let 2 me look. 3 0. Okay. 4 (Witness looking at cell phone.) 5 Α. I'm sorry, it was on Monday. 6 Q. Thank you. 7 To clarify for the record, the meeting with the Secret Service with the branch-out 8 meetings occurred on Monday, July 8th; correct? 9 10 Α. I apologize. 11 Q. Thank you. 12 Was there a meeting on July 9th then 13 that you attended --14 Α. No. 15 Q. -- that was separate from that? 16 The only other meeting --17 So I guess I probably heard of his visit Α. probably on July 5th then, not the beginning of the 18 19 week. 20 Q. Thank you for clarifying. 21 At the July 8th briefing, do you recall 22 any discussion of elevated positions as a vulnerability for the July 13th event? Do you 23 24 recall any discussion of the AGR building? 25 Α. I -- I can't recall.

1	Q. Okay. And at the July 11th walk-through
2	where on Exhibit 1 we walked through, you know, the
3	locations that you visited with Secret Service and
4	other law enforcement entities on that day in
5	preparation for the July 13th event, do you recall
6	any mentions of the AGR building?
7	A. I know the State Police and the Secret
8	Service were talking about their tactical teams and
9	where they were setting up.
10	Q. Uh-huh.
11	A. So I
12	Q. Okay. Did you personally experience any
13	connectivity issues with your radio on that day, on
14	July 13th?
15	A. I did not personally, no.
16	BY :
17	Q. Did you use your personal cell phone at any
18	point during the day for correspondence with other
19	law enforcement colleagues?
20	A. Other than the telephone conversation with
21	Sergeant , I might have called another deputy
22	that had a question or needed a break.
23	Q. You said you had not used the cell phone
24	provided by Pennsylvania State Police; correct?

Correct. I -- at the end, I did call

25

Α.

Lieutenant because I was at the north property -- north end perimeter around the AGR building. It was 9:30 at night, and I knew that that post was going to be manned for a long time. I didn't know it was going to be manned that long. I my knew I needed to get relieved. I couldn't stay there forever.

BY :

- Q. At the event during the day on July 13th, you mentioned earlier that Secret Service was all around, that if you needed to get in touch with a Secret Service official, they -- they were accessible to you just by their location?
- A. Yes. I felt pretty comfortable that they were.
- Q. Were you able to identify Secret Service easily by demarcation or uniform that day?
- A. Most -- yeah. Most of them. Obviously, some of them were in vehicles and suits, and a lot of them were just in tactical gear with MOLLE vests that said "police" on them.
- Q. Did you notice if there were any officials from Homeland Security there that day?
- A. I could neither confirm nor deny that. I have no idea.

- Q. Okay. Just going back to your actions around when shots were fired and you heard shots were fired and you experienced the different, you know, actions of various people at the event, the crowd, you know, you saw officers running towards the AGR building. Can you describe your actions after you heard that "shots fired" in the time after the event, you know, towards, you know, eventually leaving the site for the day.
- A. After I assisted the gentleman that was -assisted the paramedics and stuff with the
 gentleman that was wounded, Sheriff got on
 the radio and announced that they needed assistance
 over at the AGR building to provide security. So I
 made -- got in my vehicle and made my way over to
 that area to assist them, and that's where I stayed
 for the remainder of my time at the event.
- Q. And while you were near the AGR building for the -- you know, after shots were fired, did you observe any reports of additional suspicious individuals?
 - A. No.

- Q. Did you observe any drones after shots were fired?
 - A. Not that I recall.

Q. Can you describe the activity of local law enforcement around the AGR building when you went there after shots were fired.

A. When I arrived, Sergeant was running back and forth trying to figure out what's going on. I assisted a couple of deputies as well as some Butler Township Police providing security in that area.

At that point in time, Allegheny County bomb squad had driven around because they were conducting a sweep. There were other tactical teams going in and clearing the building at that time.

- Q. Did you have any interactions with Secret Service officials after shots were fired?
- A. Not -- I did not have any interactions, no.

 I do believe one of their agents had walked up to

 where we were standing, but he really --
- Q. Uh-huh. Your role at the AGR building after shots were fired, can you describe more of that. Were you assisting in setting a perimeter for local law enforcement that was there in securing the area; and, if so, what does that mean?
- A. I was just on foot. My car was along the road.

1 Q. Uh-huh.

- A. I was just on foot to make sure nobody walked onto the property.
 - Q. Uh-huh. And did you see anyone walk onto the property?
 - A. No. A few times we had to keep people away because there were some suspicious items they had to check, the bomb squad was checking out.
 - O. Uh-huh.
 - A. So until they cleared that, I wanted to make sure nobody was --
- 12 O. Uh-huh.
 - A. I think I even backed up myself at some point --
- 15 | O. Uh-huh.
- 16 A. -- not knowing what was -- what they were investigating.
- Q. At what time did you understand that it was good to leave for the day on July 13th? Did you have any --
- 21 A. I was relieved by a Butler Township Police 22 officer.
 - O. Uh-huh.
- A. And the Sheriff. The Sheriff called me and said, hey, you know, as soon as our guys can leave,

you guys can leave, do so. There's the State

Police and the Secret Service is in charge and
they, you -- if we're not physically doing
anything, to -- to leave for the day.

- Q. When you left for the day, did you observe any FBI officials that had arrived at the Butler Farm Show grounds?
- A. I don't know. It was dark. I left in my vehicle from that point. I checked on Sergeant; said, hey, you know, we're -- we can take off. So -- and I checked to make sure everybody else was able to leave as well.
 - Q. Uh-huh.

- A. I think we had two deputies that were manning a traffic control point, and the barricades had come, and they were leaving as well; so we all left.
 - Q. Do you recall around what time you left?
- A. Around 10:00.
- Q. Did you participate in any type of, you know, debriefing on July 13th with the Sheriff's Office, Pennsylvania State Police, or Secret Service?
- A. No.
 - Q. Do you recall any of your colleagues at the

Sheriff's Office that participated in any type of after-action debrief with Secret Service?

- A. Not with Secret Service, no. Huh-uh.
- Q. Do you recall who they might have debriefed with if it was not Secret Service?
- A. I haven't spoken to a Secret Service agent since the event happened.
- Q. Uh-huh. Around the time after shots were fired when you reported to the AGR building, were there reports of a second suspicious individual or possible associate to Crooks?
- A. There might have been mention there might be other people involved, but they -- there was no --
 - Q. Okay.

- A. Nothing to verify that.
- Q. Uh-huh. In your experience working at the Sheriff's Office, you had mentioned earlier that this appeared a very loose event in terms of the planning, preparation. Can you elaborate more on that.
- A. After the meeting on the 8th, we -- the Sheriff and I -- were leaving, and he asked me my opinion on the meeting, and I think I stated, "Well, I guess you got to start somewhere." You

know?

It just -- and I -- and I've never experienced -- I don't know what's -- who gets told what as far as what our roles and responsibilities is going to be in an event like that with assisting a large agency, a federal agency of that magnitude; so I just thought this was normal.

But, you know, it just seemed to me, you know, that where the stage was located is not where I would have thought the stage would have been myself but --

- Q. As far as the post assignments go, going back to Majority Exhibit 2, in your experience at the Sheriff's Office, do you think that there should have been more posts established, different posts located?
 - A. I think the posts were appropriate.
 - O. Uh-huh.
- A. Clearly, the weak spots were the elevated positions that weren't covered.
 - O. Uh-huh.
- A. Which there's a lot of them out there.

 Which I don't understand why they put the stage
 where they did. I don't know why you would have
 elevated him like that.

1 Q. Uh-huh. 2 I have an opinion but --Uh-huh. 3 0. 4 BY I would like to go back to the conversation 5 we had about the command posts. First, with 6 7 regards to the local command posts, do you know why the trailer was placed where it was? 8 I do not know. 9 10 And then with regard to the Secret Service Ο. 11 command post, had you heard anyone mention issues 12 about congestion that served as the justification 13 for the separate command? 14 I don't recall that either. 15 Is it accurate to say that Lieutenant 16 was your main point of contact for the 17 Pennsylvania State Police? 18 Α. Yes. 19 20 During the day on July 13th when you were Q. 21 roving the campaign rally site, did you stop in at 22 the USSS command post? 23 Α. No. 24 Would any of the Sheriff's Office personnel Q.

there that day have -- have reason to, you know,

engage with the Secret Service command post as part 1 2 of their duties and assignments? 3 Α. No. 4 BY I have a list of the local police 5 departments involved in the day of the event. 6 7 You've mentioned them throughout your narrative. would be grateful if you could give a brief 8 description of each again so that way we have it 9 10 all lined up next to each other, the nature of your 11 interaction with the different local departments. 12 So I'll say the names. Please describe 13 as best you can your responsibilities with the 14 following groups, and if you did not have any 15 responsibilities or interactions, and if you did not have any, just say so. 16 17 First was the Butler County Emergency 18 Services Department. I didn't really have any interactions with 19 20 them. 21 Butler County ESU? 0. 22 Oh, I'm sorry, who was the first one? Α. 23 Butler County Emergency Services Ο. 24 Department. 25 Α. Just brief discussions in the command post

because I know them. 1 2 And then Butler County ESU? Q. I didn't have any interactions with them. 3 Α. 4 Ο. Beaver County ESU? I did not. 5 Α. Butler Township Police Department? 6 Q. 7 Just at the end doing the perimeter. Α. Butler City Police Department? 8 Q. I did not. 9 Α. 10 And then Washington Regional SWAT? Ο. 11 I did not have any interaction with them Α. 12 either. 13 We can go off the record. 14 (Discussion was held off the record.) 15 BY 16 Where would you have put the stage? Ο. I would have put it down in the arena --17 down in the arena where no one could -- I mean, I 18 19 know it's not exactly -- you can't get a whole lot 20 of people in there, but at least it's not out in 21 the open. 22 Q. Uh-huh. 23 You know, put him up on a platform --24 Yeah. Q. 25 -- so he can be picked off. I mean, Α.

really?

- Q. So why do you think it was put where it was? It was for visibility?
- A. I think they wanted to get as many people in there as possible. I think they wanted, you know -- you know, it's almost like -- this isn't a concert, you know, where you're trying to get as many people in as possible, and, you know --

I understand it's a platform for him to -- to voice his message, and -- you know. But security-wise, shwoo, you know, it's a nightmare. Looking at it now, obviously, hindsight is 20/20.

- Q. Uh-huh. Who invited you to have a Sheriff's representative in the local -- in the command -- in the local law enforcement command post?
- A. I don't know if we were invited. The Sheriff had mentioned at the beginning planning stages we were going to assign one of our captains to the command -- he asked, "Do you want to be in the command post?" He said, "Sure."
 - Q. Uh-huh.
- A. And then the day of -- then once -- what happened was we polled our staff to see who would be available to work with the understanding they

would be getting paid time and a half for overtime because it's after -- outside of our work hours.

And then once it was learned that this was going to be a comp time detail, they would be working for comp time, many -- many people denied; said they weren't available for that.

O. Uh-huh.

2.0

- A. So I got my -- I guess I got my directive from the Sheriff.
- Q. From the Sheriff. Was there a Pennsylvania State Police representative in the local law enforcement command post?
 - A. Not that I'm aware of.
- Q. Was there a Pennsylvania State Police representative in the Secret Service command post?
 - A. I assume.
- Q. And no one from Pennsylvania State

 Police -- sorry to use this term again -- but

 invited you into the Secret Service command post?
 - A. I was not invited.
- Q. When you -- after the shooting when you responded to the AGR building, were you aware of a -- of a bomb threat to that building?
- A. I had heard that there was some suspicious items over there, that that 's why the bomb squad

was going over there and doing a sweep, or whatever
they did. I could see them over there, but I
didn't know what was - Q. And could you see the roof of the building
from where you were after the, you know, the
shooting?

- A. I could see guys standing up there, but I couldn't see beyond that.
- Q. Uh-huh. Do you know -- were you involved in establishing a secure perimeter around the AGR building? Was that the intent?
- A. Just on the -- yeah, the outer -- the northern part of the property along Route 68.
- Q. And in your view after the shooting, was there a secure perimeter established around the AGR building?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. Did you or your deputies detain anyone --
- 19 | A. No.

Q. -- at the AGR building?

Do you know if any of your -- you or any of your deputies were on the roof at any time at the AGR building?

- A. No.
- Q. I think my final question is just were

1 there any assets or resources that you felt you 2 lacked that you needed or that should have been provided to you for that day? 3 4 From the Sheriff's Office point of view, what we were asked to do? 5 Right, from the Sheriff's Office point of 6 Q. 7 view. I felt from our point of view, other than 8 the ability, I guess, to communicate via cell phone 9 10 for Sergeant from the command post to those 11 assigned to the posts was probably the biggest 12 problem. But he overcome that by e-mail when he 13 needed to e-mail. 14 So, other than that, what we were asked 15 to do, you know, we were provided everything we 16 needed to do what we were asked to do. 17 Okay. Those are all my 18 questions. I think my colleague has some follow-up 19 questions. Go ahead. 20 ΒY 21 Thank you, sir. Thank you for your Ο. Yes. 22 time this morning and for your service and 23 experience on July 13th. 24 I'm sorry, I'm going to dart around a 25 bit just to make sure I understand some of the

things that you've been discussing with us this morning.

I believe you said there was a walk-through with Secret Service on July 11th, and had asked you to attend that walk-through that the Pennsylvania State Police was also at.

Was anyone else from your Sheriff's Office there with you that morning?

A. No.

- Q. And on that day, I think you said you walked the perimeter, you walked around the two fences, there was discussion about determining where folks needed to be to maintain the security of the site. Did you or anybody in the Sheriff's Office have any role in determining what that perimeter would be, where the perimeter for the site would be?
 - A. No. They had already established that.
 - Q. And who was "they"?
- A. When I say "they," I guess I would say

 Secret Service and the State Police. And I assume
 that the State Police were getting their directives
 from the Secret Service.
- Q. Okay. So that was another question I had. Is it fair to think of the State Police for this

event as sort of a link between Secret Service and local police? It sounds like you worked pretty close.

A. Yes.

2.0

- Q. Yes. So PSP is working with Secret Service to set up the site for the day, and then I think you said you and the Sheriff's Office referred to taking your direction from the State Police that day?
- A. Right. Because that property, there's a little bit of the property in Butler Township and Connoquenessing Township. Butler Township has a police department, Connoquenessing does not, so the police have primary jurisdiction in that area; so --
- Q. Understood. And during that walk-through -- you may have already said this -- did you or anyone else have any concerns about the AGR building being outside of the perimeter?
- A. I recall them talking about trying to put people over there. Whether it was just a lack of resources --
- I -- I know, you know, everyone's
 worried about their budgets, and it just seemed
 like even the State Police after I was driving

around with Lieutenant that day, I had shared with him all of our guys are on comp time. He's like, "Yeah, we got the same situation going on with our department, with our agency. We're all here on comp time," or -- you know.

- Q. But even with that comp time ---
- A. And I only say that because in my opinion it seems like, you know -- and we got to be financially responsible, fiscally responsible. Had we been able to spend for more resources and more people, that might have been a better outcome obviously but --
- Q. But I believe you said earlier you were able to staff more people, and then the State Police said, we don't need that many. Was that a financial decision or was that --
- A. No. That -- no, no. I don't think it was a financial decision. Given -- maybe what was asked of them to do, they determined that we could adequately do it with 50 percent State Police, 50 percent deputy sheriffs around that perimeter.
- Q. Okay. So it does sound like at least going into that day, you felt that there was adequate staffing?
 - A. Yes.

Q. Thank you.

2.0

And in discussion about AGR, did you have any understanding of whether there would be somebody posted there even if not from your office?

- A. I did have an understanding that the ESU team was over in that area. I didn't know where they were specifically, but they were over in that area.
- Q. And did you know that on this July 11th walk-through or was that -- did you learn that later?
- A. I did overhear the State Police and the Secret Service discussing where some of the tactical teams were going to be, the ESU team, the Secret Service tac team. I don't think the State Police had a tac team there, but I was unfamiliar with where they may have been.

That day I saw where they were at because they were stationed in those areas but --

- Q. So you did have some sense that --
- A. They were there.
- Q. -- that building was covered by somebody, even if not your department?
- A. Right.
 - Q. But it doesn't sound like you had any

discussions with anybody about where exactly in the building, on top of the roof, anybody would be?

A. Right.

Q. Thank you.

You mentioned that you had a discussion with about the manpower that you had available, and I think you said they were able to patrol traffic. "They" meaning Butler Township Police would be patrolling traffic that day?

- A. Right. They would be able to man the traffic control points for the motorcade to come in, but he didn't have -- he didn't have the manpower to secure the AGR property.
- Q. Understood. So who was securing that AGR property? I think you said ESU?
 - A. That's what I understand.
- O. And --
- A. But I don't know what -- what responsibilities they were given or --
- Q. And ESU from a particular county or some -- or was it federal tactical units? Do you know?
- A. I would assume that the other ESU teams were getting their directives from the Butler County ESU team; they would be assisting them. But I'm just assuming that. I don't know.

O. Understood.

We've talked a bit about the two command posts. I think you said you had an assumption that there were not additional or any local law enforcement in the Secret Service command post because there was not enough room. What is that statement based on? Did you ever go in the command post?

- A. No. I never walked in.
- Q. Okay. And you mentioned as we were talking about the command posts a FEMA training --
- A. Uh-huh.
- Q. -- for unified command. What is that training and who gets it?
- A. We register online through FEMA. It's all online training. They're little -- just to familiarize yourself with what unified command looks like, how it works, how it's supposed to work.
- Q. Do other local law enforcement agencies in the area sign up for that training to your understanding?
- A. Yeah. I believe so, yeah. It's been in existence for quite some time.
 - Q. And did any other local law enforcement

say, "Unified command" -- to Secret Service or to

PSP -- "Unified command is best practice, can we be
in that command post with you?" or did anybody
invite Secret Service or PSP into the local
trailer?

- A. I don't -- I don't know that. The command post was being overseen by _______, I believe. The director of 911 was actually in the command post with Secret Service and the State Police as a county representative.
 - Q. As a --

- A. I learned that after.
- Q. So the day of, you had no understanding that anybody from local from the county was --
- A. I'm not sure what connection there -- what communications there were between the two command posts.
- Q. And I know you said that if you had needed to get in touch with Secret Service, there were lots of folks identifiable, you could have walked up to one of them, and I think you said you could have also been in contact with ______ in the local command post. How would he have gotten in touch with Secret Service?
 - A. I would assume probably through -- if our

director for 911 was up there, that his employees within the command post could communicate with him.

Q. Thank you.

2.0

Appreciating you were sort of floating around, checking in with all of our deputies, including , and it sounds like you did at a couple points speak with him in the local command post, did you ever formally relieve him? Did he ever leave the command post and leave you in there on your own to sort of man the post?

- A. No. I checked on him and he said he was okay. So I -- you know, he must have just went to the bathroom. I don't know what he did.
 - O. Okay.
 - A. Yeah.
- Q. The morning of, I think you said there was no walk-through with Secret Service on July 13th.

 Did you do any walk-throughs/briefings with any other local law enforcement agencies?
 - A. The day of?
 - Q. The day of.
- A. The day of, once all of our posts were manned, I was speaking with Lieutenant _____, and I hopped in his vehicle, and we did drive around and talked with everyone.

1 0. Sort of check-ins. But no everybody get in 2 the room together for any sort of briefing? 3 Α. Right. In those check-ins, either with 4 Ο. 5 or on your own, did any of your deputies raise any 6 concerns about what they were seeing, about their 7 communications? 8 Other than Sergeant complaining that his cell phone wasn't working all that great, no, I 9 10 don't recall any. 11 And on that point, you mentioned that you have is it FirstNet? 12 13 FirstNet. 14 0. FirstNet. Do you pay for that --15 Uh-huh. Α. -- personally? 16 0. 17 (Witness nods). Α. Why do you do that? 18 Q. 19 Two years ago, Sheriff had an AT&T 20 representative come to their office, and I was 21 looking to switch from Verizon because where I live at, I don't have very good coverage. 22 23 Ο. Uh-huh. It seems like AT&T was maybe a better 24 25 network for me to go with, and they had offered

this FirstNet network. It's the same price as a regular plan; it's not any extra. It's just a cell phone plan.

- Q. So it's just a different plan that as law enforcement you are sort of able to opt into?
- A. You know, I really didn't think I would be working any type of event where -- that this -- that this could happen, that it could be helpful, and I never really much thought about it.

And I didn't use my cell phone a whole lot on the 13th. But whenever I did, I didn't have any issues.

- Q. And you did have the radio working, and I think we discussed the -- you had access to the Sheriff's channel. You were also scanning ops 3 and ops 4. I just want to confirm that the State Police has their own separate system frequency?
