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[REDACTED]: Today is September 12th, 2024, and this is the transcribed interview of [REDACTED].

House Resolution 1367 directed this Task Force to investigate the facts and circumstances of the attempted assassination of Donald J. Trump on July 13th, 2024, in Butler, Pennsylvania. Pursuant to House Resolution 1367, Chairman Kelly and Ranking Member Crow have requested this interview as part of the Task Force investigation.

BY [REDACTED]:

Q. Can the witness please state their name and spell their last name for the record.

A. [REDACTED]. The last name is spelled [REDACTED].

Q. Thank you, [REDACTED].

My name is [REDACTED], and I'm a Senior Counsel with the Task Force Majority Staff. I want to thank you for coming in today for this interview. The Task Force recognizes and appreciates that you are here voluntarily.

You are allowed to have an attorney present to advise you during this interview. Do you have an attorney present representing you in a personal capacity with you today?

1 A. No, I do not.

2 Q. Is there also an attorney present
3 representing the Butler County Sheriff's Office
4 today?

5 A. No, there is not.

6 [REDACTED]: Next, starting with
7 Majority, then Minority, can additional staff
8 members please introduce themselves with their
9 name, title, and affiliation.

10 [REDACTED]: [REDACTED],
11 Task Force Majority Senior Counsel.

12 [REDACTED]: I'm [REDACTED]. I'm a
13 legislative attorney with the Congressional
14 Research Service, but I'm providing support to the
15 Task Force.

16 [REDACTED]: [REDACTED]. I'm an
17 Investigative Counsel with the Task Force Minority.

18 [REDACTED]: Thank you, all.

19 BY [REDACTED]:

20 Q. [REDACTED], before we begin, I would
21 like to go over the ground rules for this
22 interview.

23 The way this interview will proceed is
24 as follows: The Majority and Minority Staff will
25 alternate asking you questions, 30 minutes per side

per round until each side is finished with their questioning. The Majority Staff will begin, proceed for 30 minutes, and then the Minority Staff will have 30 minutes to ask questions. We will then alternate back and forth in this manner until both sides have no more questions.

If either side is in the middle of a specific line of questions, they may choose to end a few minutes past 30 minutes to ensure completion of that specific line of questioning, including any pertinent follow-ups.

In this interview, while one member of the staff for each side may lead the questions, additional staff may ask questions.

There is a court reporter taking down everything I say and everything you say to make a written record of the interview. For the record to be clear, please wait until the staffer questioning you finishes each question before you begin your answer, and the staffer will wait until you finish your response before proceeding to the next question.

Further, to ensure the court reporter can properly record this interview, please speak clearly, concisely, and slowly. Also, the court

reporter cannot record non-verbal answers such as nodding or shaking your head; so, it's important that you answer each question with an audible, verbal answer. Do you understand?

A. Yes.

Q. We want you to answer our questions in the most complete and truthful manner possible; so we will take our time. If you have any questions or do not fully understand the question, please let us know, and we will attempt to clarify, add context to, or rephrase our questions.

Do you understand?

A. Yes.

Q. If we ask about specific conversations or events in the past and you are unable to recall the exact words or details, you should testify to the substance of those conversations or events to the best of your recollection.

If you recall only a part of a conversation or event, you should give us your best recollection of those events or parts of conversations that you do recall.

Do you understand?

A. Yes.

Q. Although you are here voluntarily, we will

not swear you in. You are required pursuant to 18 U.S. Code Section 1001 to answer questions from Congress truthfully. This also applies to questions posed by congressional staff in your interview.

Do you understand?

A. Yes.

Q. If at any time you knowingly make false statements, you could be subject to criminal prosecution.

Do you understand?

A. Yes.

Q. Is there any reason you are unable to provide truthful testimony in today's interview?

A. No.

Q. Please note that if you wish to assert a privilege over any statement today, that assertion must comply with the U.S. Rules of the U.S. House of Representatives.

For the Chair to consider assertions of privilege over testimony or statements, witnesses or entities must clearly state the specific privilege being asserted or the reason for the assertion on or before the scheduled date of testimony or appearance.

1 Do you understand?

2 A. Can you reread that, please.

3 Q. For the Chair to consider assertions of
4 privilege over testimony or statements, witnesses
5 or entities must clearly state the specific
6 privilege being asserted or the reason for the
7 assertion on or before the scheduled date of
8 testimony or appearance.

9 Do you understand?

10 A. Yes.

11 Q. Finally, I would like to note that the
12 content of what we discuss today is confidential.
13 We ask that you not speak about what we discuss
14 here today in this interview to any outside
15 individual in order to preserve the integrity of
16 this investigation.

17 For those same reasons, the marked
18 exhibits used today will be provided to the court
19 reporter so that they may go into the official
20 transcript, and any copies of those exhibits will
21 be returned to us when we wrap up.

22 We plan to take a five-minute break at
23 the end of each 30 minutes of questioning, but if
24 you need a longer break or a break before that,
25 please let us know, and we are happy to

1 accommodate. However, to the extent that there is
2 a pending question, we would ask that you finish
3 answering the question before we take a break.

4 Do you understand?

5 A. Yes.

6 Q. Do you have any other questions before we
7 begin?

8 A. No.

9 [REDACTED]: It is now 9:02. Majority
10 Staff will now begin its questioning.

11 BY [REDACTED]:

12 Q. [REDACTED], thank you very much for
13 being here today. As an initial matter, can you
14 help us describe your role at the Butler Sheriff's
15 Office.

16 A. Yeah. I am the chief deputy.

17 Q. Okay. And what are your job
18 responsibilities as chief deputy?

19 A. My job responsibilities, I oversee the
20 operation of the office. It's mostly
21 administrative duties assigned by the Sheriff.

22 Q. Uh-huh. When did you first learn about the
23 July 13th event?

24 A. Monday of that week; so that would have
25 been -- I believe it was Monday, the 8th of July.

2024.

Q. Uh-huh. And how did you become aware of the event taking place?

A. From Sheriff [REDACTED].

Q. Okay. And what were you told at that time?

A. That we would be attending a meeting in Allegheny County with the Secret Service.

Q. Uh-huh.

A. And he would be visiting -- Former President Trump would be visiting the Butler Farm Show grounds --

Q. Uh-huh.

A. -- on July 13th.

Q. Uh-huh. Did you attend that meeting with Sheriff [REDACTED]?

A. I did.

Q. Who all was there?

A. There was a lot of people from all different agencies that were involved in the -- in the rally.

Q. Uh-huh. And can you describe what was discussed at that meeting.

A. It appeared to me they were trying to establish the groundwork to see what resources were available.

1 Q. Uh-huh.

2 A. They had breakout sessions --

3 Q. Uh-huh.

4 A. -- depending on what specialized duties or
5 responsibilities that each agency may partake or
6 have or offer.

7 Q. Uh-huh.

8 A. So they broke out into those groups, and
9 then they came together at the end, just a round
10 open discussion about what may take place or what
11 may be available to help, any agency could help or
12 assist in the event.

13 Q. Uh-huh. And at that meeting, what did you
14 understand the Sheriff's Office to be at the July
15 13th event?

16 A. That we would be assisting the Secret
17 Service and the Pennsylvania State Police with
18 security within -- within the event itself.

19 Q. So --

20 A. We weren't sure on that date what our exact
21 role on responsibility was going to be --

22 Q. Uh-huh.

23 A. -- not knowing what they were needing.

24 Q. Uh-huh. So after that -- that meeting, it
25 was unclear what the Sheriff's role would -- the

1 Sheriff's Office role would be in the July 13th
2 event?

3 A. Correct.

4 Q. Okay. At that meeting, who did you assume
5 was in charge of the July 13th event?

6 A. A female secret service agent [REDACTED]
7 [REDACTED], or [REDACTED]. Something like that.

8 Q. Uh-huh.

9 A. She facilitated the discussion.

10 Q. And did [REDACTED] provide the briefing at the
11 meeting? Was she leading the discussions?

12 A. Mostly. It appeared to me that she may or
13 may not have had little or no information at the
14 time as far as the visit.

15 Q. Uh-huh. Did you attend any particular
16 breakout meeting that followed that initial meeting
17 with all the agencies?

18 A. Sure. Sure. [REDACTED] requested I attend the
19 meeting with the folks that were going to be at the
20 airport. He was under the assumption that Former
21 President Trump would be flying into the Butler
22 County Airport, not the Pittsburgh International
23 Airport.

24 So once I found it was the Pittsburgh
25 International Airport, because he had offered s

deputy to assist in the motorcade, the motorcade meeting was right next to the airport meeting, so I went over and offered assistance, if needed, to the motorcade meeting.

Q. Uh-huh.

A. Which was led by the State Police and the Secret Service as well.

Q. Okay. Did you attend any other breakout meetings --

A. No.

Q. -- that day?

How long, roughly, did the meeting with everyone and the breakout meetings last on that date?

A. I -- I recall it to be an hour to an hour and a half.

Q. Did you have any Secret Service counterpart working in, you know, in tandem with the Sheriff's Office? Did you know who to report to or to communicate with from the Secret Service?

A. Other than Miss [REDACTED] stating she was overseeing it, no.

Q. Okay. So, total from the Sheriff's Office, that initial meeting with Secret Service, it was you attended, and did anyone else from the

Sheriff's Office attend?

A. Sheriff [REDACTED].

Q. Sheriff [REDACTED].

I understand that there weren't a lot of known details at that time about the July 13th event in terms of the setup. Can you describe what details that were available to you guys at that initial briefing.

A. Other than he was arriving at the Pittsburgh International Airport, the State Police and the Secret Service were facilitating the motorcade to the location, and the agencies were discussing how they were going to secure what was possibly going to be needed to secure the Farm Show grounds for his visit.

Q. Uh-huh.

A. The resources that they had.

Q. Was any paperwork disseminated by the Secret Service at that briefing?

A. I didn't receive any.

Q. Did you receive any written guidance?

A. I didn't receive anything.

Q. Uh-huh. Was there any PowerPoint presentation delivered for the groups there?

A. I don't believe.

1 Q. Okay.

2 A. They pulled up a map on Google on the big
3 screen and looked at the map to see what the area
4 looked like but --

5 Q. Uh-huh. So that -- that briefing occurs on
6 what date?

7 A. That was I guess it would be July the 9th.
8 It was the Tuesday.

9 Q. Uh-huh.

10 A. Yes.

11 Q. Okay. Did you attend any -- before July
12 13th, did you attend any other briefings or
13 meetings that were led by Secret Service in
14 preparation for the July 13th event?

15 A. Yes.

16 Q. Can you describe those.

17 A. Yes. July 11th at 10:00 in the morning,
18 Sheriff [REDACTED] asked that I attend the walk-around
19 meeting with the Secret Service and the State
20 Police and other agencies at the Butler Farm Show
21 grounds to determine what resources were going to
22 be needed or requested to see how we could assist.

23 Q. On July 10th, 10 a.m., the walk-through, do
24 you recall who from Secret Service was leading that
25 walk-through?

1 A. It was July 11th.

2 Q. Sorry, July 11th. Do you recall what
3 Secret Service representative was leading that
4 walk-through?

5 A. [REDACTED] was there, [REDACTED]. And
6 there was a couple others, but I don't recall their
7 names.

8 Q. I would like to introduce an exhibit for
9 the record. This will be Majority Exhibit 1. We
10 will use the map there.

11 (Majority Exhibit No. 1 was marked for
12 identification.)

13 Q. To the best of your recollection, can
14 you -- can you help us understand the path of the
15 walk-through on July 11th. I can give you --

16 A. Yes.

17 Q. -- a pen.

18 A. We met -- we met at the office at the main
19 entrance at the intersection in the -- inside the
20 fairground, inside the gates (indicating). We
21 started to walk east toward the AGR building
22 between the fences (indicating).

23 The discussions were led by Lieutenant
24 [REDACTED] and Lieutenant [REDACTED], as well as
25 Secret Service Agent [REDACTED], Lieutenant [REDACTED]

1 [REDACTED] from Butler Township Police Department,
2 myself, Major [REDACTED] from the Pennsylvania
3 State Police, and I think there might have been
4 someone from 911 with us. It might have been [REDACTED]
5 [REDACTED] at the time. I know he was up with us
6 at the end, but I don't know if he came up after if
7 he was -- I can't -- I can't recall.

8 Q. Uh-huh.

9 A. I didn't -- I can't remember.

10 Q. Uh-huh.

11 A. At any rate, we walked the perimeter of
12 the -- between the two fences to determine where we
13 were going to station or we needed posts for to
14 maintain security.

15 Q. Uh-huh. And is that the extent of the path
16 of the walk-through is between the fences there
17 going east?

18 A. Correct. And we walked around the entire
19 complex (indicating).

20 Q. Okay. Would you mind with this pen just
21 tracing that walk-through for us.

22 A. Uh-huh.

23 (Witness drawing on exhibit.)

24 A. We got in between -- I can't remember if it
25 was at this point or maybe it was (indicating).

1 The pen is running out of ink there.

2 Q. Sorry. This might be better.

3 (Continuing to draw.)

4 A. Scratch that. Move it up this way
5 (indicating).

6 Q. Thank you so much.

7 A. You're welcome.

8 Q. So, along the walk-through -- I'll just
9 keep it here for your reference in front of you.

10 A. Uh-huh.

11 Q. During the walk-through, can you describe
12 what was discussed, you know, by local law
13 enforcement entities that were there, the Secret
14 Service. What were you all doing on the
15 walk-through?

16 A. They were sharing concerns about where to
17 put the posts, how they were going to be manned.
18 It was determined that they were going to be in a
19 car. We determined how far apart would be, you
20 know, logistically reasonable with the
21 circumstances.

22 Q. Uh-huh.

23 A. The main goal was to keep people from
24 jumping the fence. I mean, the fence -- I don't
25 know if you've been out there, the fence is -- is

old. It's -- it's a fence, but it's, as far as security goes, it's really just to keep people out. It's not meant to be a barricade of really any big significance.

But at any rate -- so, we looked at some possible vulnerabilities where people could sneak in. Really, that's what our main thing was.

Q. Uh-huh.

A. That's what it appeared to me.

Q. Uh-huh.

A. The discussions were, like, with the State Police and the Secret Service, I shared a couple of concerns but --

Q. Do you recall what concerns that you shared with the Secret Service and State Police?

A. Yeah. Whenever we were walking -- whenever we were doing the walk-around, I just felt personally that coming in Brady Paul Lane just seemed like a really unsecure area to bring a motorcade in there with the Former President of the United States. Just me personally.

Q. Uh-huh.

A. It seemed like there was a lot of places that could be ambushed.

Q. Uh-huh.

1 A. But the State Police advised, well, we'll
2 have someone walk and make sure that, you know,
3 nothing suspicious.

4 Lieutenant [REDACTED] said he talked to all
5 the residents there and he didn't see an issue with
6 anything; so --

7 Q. Were your concerns about that entrance
8 satisfied before July 13th?

9 A. Could you repeat that.

10 Q. Were your concerns alleviated, addressed
11 before the event took place on July 13th?

12 A. Yes. I mean, I -- I -- I worked in law
13 enforcement in Butler County for 32 years.

14 Q. Uh-huh.

15 A. And, you know, I don't have any training in
16 dignitary protection other than -- other than my
17 background in law -- local law enforcement here in
18 Butler County; so --

19 You know, there were members from our
20 local ESU teams there that have specialized
21 training in tactics beyond -- beyond my training
22 and knowledge.

23 Q. Uh-huh.

24 A. So, they were doing their own walk-around.

25 Q. Uh-huh.

1 A. So I kind of felt that, you know, that's
2 what they were doing.

3 Q. Uh-huh. During the walk-through on July
4 11th, at any point were concerns about the AGR
5 building discussed?

6 A. I don't recall. I do recall Lieutenant
7 [REDACTED] having a discussion with the State Police
8 about what manpower he had available to him -- or
9 to them. And he said that they were able to man
10 the control -- traffic control points for the
11 motorcade coming in.

12 But beyond that, he did not have -- he
13 did not have the manpower to secure the property
14 around the AGR building.

15 Q. Uh-huh. Were -- were his concerns
16 addressed by Secret Service and State Police to
17 your knowledge?

18 A. To my knowledge, I -- you know, I mean, we
19 were walking around. But sometimes we were spread
20 out, and I didn't hear what everybody was saying.

21 Q. Uh-huh. During the walk-through, were
22 there any conversations about snipers or counter
23 snipers?

24 A. I do recall them speaking of their teams
25 being in the building behind the stage.

1 Q. And by "them," do you mean the Secret
2 Service?

3 A. Secret Service and the State Police, yes.

4 Q. Okay. Do you recall any discussions about
5 elevated surfaces, elevated -- elevated positions
6 as -- as possible vulnerabilities for the event?

7 A. I don't recall.

8 Q. Thanks.

9 Have you ever worked an event like a
10 campaign rally for a presidential candidate before?

11 A. In 2020, President Trump came, visited the
12 county at the Butler County Airport. I was a
13 sergeant at the time working a K9, and I was
14 assigned to a post outside of the airport grounds.

15 Q. Uh-huh. And for your assignment to the
16 post at the 2020 rally, who did you assume was in
17 charge of planning that event?

18 A. I was given -- I was assigned a post from
19 then-Chief -- Chief Deputy [REDACTED]. So I'm not
20 sure where he got his directives from.

21 Q. Thank you.

22 Can you describe any -- any briefings or
23 materials that followed the July 11th walk-through.

24 A. Yes. After we determined -- or they
25 determined how many posts that the Sheriff's Office

1 would be able to fill, Lieutenant [REDACTED] said
2 I will put together a -- post assignments, so and
3 so forth, and e-mail them to you and we can -- and
4 then I could assign our staff appropriately.

5 So, on Friday, I received that from him
6 in the morning around 10 via e-mail. I made the
7 assignments with our -- with our staff and e-mailed
8 it to the staff, and him as well so he knew who was
9 going to be working where and what.

10 Q. Uh-huh. Can you describe the assignments
11 that you assigned for the Sheriff's Office that
12 day.

13 A. Yes. It was determined that they were
14 going to stagger the Pennsylvania State Police with
15 the Butler County Sheriff's Office around -- around
16 the perimeter. I think there were approximately
17 five posts that we manned around with the State
18 Police. So I --

19 Q. Uh-huh. For -- one particular post for
20 Sergeant [REDACTED] was in the local command post
21 trailer.

22 A. Right.

23 Q. Do you recall assigning that post?

24 A. Yeah, I assigned that post. We wanted to
25 put someone in the command center; so I -- him

1 being a supervisor, I -- I assigned him to that
2 post.

3 Q. Did you know before the July 13th event
4 that there would be a separate Secret Service
5 command post?

6 A. Yes.

7 Q. When did you know that -- of that
8 determination that there would be --

9 A. In the walk-around.

10 Q. In the walk-around on July 11th?

11 A. Uh-huh.

12 Q. Can you describe how the Secret Service
13 command post was described compared to the local
14 command trailer.

15 A. I merely recall that the Secret Service and
16 the State Police were going to have a command post
17 in the office and the county was going to bring
18 their mobile command post, and it was going to be
19 stationed down by what they call the barns down
20 here (indicating) behind the Paul Brady FOP Lodge.

21 Q. Do you recall who made that decision?

22 A. I don't know who made the decision. That's
23 just what I heard was going to be going on. So who
24 determined that, I couldn't tell you.

25 Q. Uh-huh.

1 [REDACTED]: Do you recall who you
2 heard it from?

3 THE WITNESS: It was in general
4 discussion whenever we were doing the walk-around.

5 Q. Had you worked in a setting before where
6 there was two separate command posts?

7 A. No.

8 Q. What was the rationale for having the local
9 command post and the Secret Service command post
10 separate?

11 A. I -- I don't know.

12 Q. Uh-huh. Was that discussed at all during
13 the walk-through on July 11th?

14 A. I would assume that it wasn't together
15 because there wasn't enough room.

16 Q. Uh-huh.

17 A. I wouldn't know. I've only worked a
18 handful of details when there was a command post,
19 and, generally, there's only been one.

20 Q. Uh-huh. And do you recall when
21 communications for the July 13th event were first
22 discussed?

23 A. I don't recall.

24 Q. Do you recall --

25 A. I didn't learn of any frequency assignments

1 until the morning of the event when I arrived.

2 Q. Uh-huh.

3 A. I assumed and knew that the Sheriff's
4 Office would be communicating on our own channel.

5 Q. Uh-huh. If you had to get in contact with
6 Secret Service on July 13th, did you know how you
7 would get in touch with Secret Service?

8 A. Well, they were -- they were everywhere --

9 Q. Uh-huh.

10 A. -- within -- within the event. So, it
11 wasn't terribly hard to find one if you needed one.

12 Q. Uh-huh. How would you radio to the Secret
13 Service official?

14 A. I would probably -- if -- if I wasn't near
15 one, I would probably have to radio to Sergeant
16 ██████ in the command post.

17 Q. Uh-huh. Did you know who all was in the
18 local command post trailer prior to the event?

19 A. I -- I know of a few that were in there,
20 but I can't say who all was in the command post.

21 Q. Uh-huh. Did you receive any briefing
22 materials or diagrams or slides or aerial pictures
23 prior to the July 13th event?

24 A. Just the instructions, the map, and
25 assignments from Lieutenant ██████ from the State

1 Police.

2 Q. Uh-huh. I would like to introduce Exhibit
3 2, the Majority, for the record.

4 (Majority Exhibit No. 2 was marked for
5 identification.)

6 Q. Do you recognize this document?

7 A. This is the second time I've seen this
8 document. The first time I was talking with the
9 trooper at a post at the main gate, and we were
10 just talking. And he pulled it out to show me a
11 few things. But it appeared that this document
12 being the operational plan for the event.

13 Q. Uh-huh. Do you recall when you had that
14 conversation with that state trooper? Was that on
15 July 13th?

16 A. It was.

17 Q. All right. And what -- what led you to
18 consult with the state trooper about the
19 operational plan from the State Police Department?

20 A. I don't recall. I think it was just
21 general conversation about something, and he --

22 Q. Uh-huh.

23 A. -- he pulled it from his vehicle, and I
24 thought, oh.

25 Q. Uh-huh. Do you know if any officers from

1 the Sheriff's Office had seen this document prior
2 to July 13th?

3 A. I can't answer that. Not to my knowledge.

4 Q. Can you talk us through your arrival at the
5 campaign rally site on July 13th and what your role
6 and responsibilities would be on that day.

7 A. Yes. I arrived around 10:30 a.m. I wanted
8 to get there before the deputies got there.
9 Sergeant [REDACTED] and I both pretty much arrived at the
10 same time.

11 My role and responsibility was to ensure
12 that the -- I didn't -- we didn't have anyone
13 floating to give my staff breaks throughout the
14 day, so that was going to be my -- my post --

15 Q. Uh-huh.

16 A. -- to relieve and fill in whatever needs
17 filled in. I was an available person, as well as
18 support for Sergeant [REDACTED] if that was needed.

19 Q. Uh-huh.

20 A. With Sergeant [REDACTED] being a supervisor and
21 him being able to work the detail, I didn't want to
22 tie my hands to that post. I wanted to be
23 available for -- for my staff.

24 Q. Uh-huh.

25 A. I was essentially the OIC for us. I mean,

1 the Sheriff was obviously there. He is our CEO of
2 our agency, but he was busy doing his -- his thing.

3 Q. And "OIC," that means officer in charge?

4 A. Correct.

5 Q. Thank you.

6 On Exhibit 1 -- on Exhibit 1, can you
7 describe to us where you were located on July 13th
8 at your post. Were you around the campaign site,
9 were you at one particular spot?

10 A. When the shooting took place?

11 Q. In general throughout the day.

12 A. In general, I was all over the place.

13 Q. Uh-huh.

14 A. It literally took me an hour and a half to
15 make the perimeter to relieve my guys and girls.

16 Q. Uh-huh. And were you -- were you walking
17 or --

18 A. I was in a vehicle.

19 Q. Vehicle.

20 A. We were able to drive vehicles around.

21 Q. Uh-huh.

22 A. And with the heat, it was great because
23 we -- our staff was mostly able to stay in the air
24 conditioning, and it made us more mobile --

25 Q. Uh-huh.

1 A. -- in that area.

2 Q. Were there other vehicles manned by local
3 police entities, Secret Service, that were
4 traveling around the campaign grounds -- the
5 campaign rally grounds during the day?

6 A. In the inner perimeter?

7 Q. Uh-huh.

8 A. Yes.

9 Q. What entities were also mobile?

10 A. There was a magnitude of golf carts that
11 were being used by the Secret Service, the State
12 Police.

13 Q. Uh-huh.

14 A. And I don't know other agencies that had
15 them. I -- I can't answer that.

16 Q. Uh-huh. For your communications for July
17 13th, were you in possession of a radio that you
18 wouldn't originally have that day? Did you receive
19 any personal radios from any other local police
20 entity or Secret Service?

21 A. No.

22 Q. There were reports that there were personal
23 radios located near, in the local command post
24 trailer that were available for Secret Service
25 officials. Are you aware of those reports?

1 A. Just after the event, I heard that they
2 were available.

3 Q. Uh-huh. At your initial briefing with
4 Secret Service and other local law enforcement
5 entities on July 9th or at the walk-through on July
6 11th, were you advised on any situation when you
7 should directly reach out to Secret Service?

8 A. No.

9 Q. Did Secret Service participate in any
10 briefings or walk-throughs with the Sheriff's
11 Office on the day of the event?

12 A. No. Did you -- which entities? The Secret
13 Service?

14 Q. Secret Service.

15 A. No.

16 BY [REDACTED]:

17 Q. Did the Sheriff's Office have an internal
18 meeting on the day of the event?

19 A. No. I had a discussion with Lieutenant
20 [REDACTED] to see if they were going to have a
21 debriefing meeting type before the beginning of the
22 event, and he said no, he was going to advise his
23 troopers to respond to their posts by 10:45. He
24 was going to talk with them about what their roles
25 and responsibilities were going to be, but there

1 wasn't going to be an official briefing meeting at
2 the beginning.

3 So I said, okay. So I advised our
4 deputies what their responsibilities were going to
5 be, where to respond. I did have two deputies that
6 weren't familiar with maybe where their posts were
7 going to be; so I got there early, and I took them
8 to their posts, talked to them about what we needed
9 to do.

10 After that, once all the deputies and
11 troopers were on their posts, Lieutenant [REDACTED]
12 [REDACTED] and I -- actually, I jumped in his car, and
13 we rode around and reaffirmed and spoke with
14 everyone at their posts.

15 Q. Were any of your team responsible for
16 magnetometers or screening?

17 A. We had a deputy assigned to assist the two
18 troopers at that location.

19 Q. And what about explosive ordnance disposal?

20 A. We didn't have anyone assigned for that.

21 Q. What about K9 assets?

22 A. We didn't have any of that either.

23 Q. And for your description of the -- the
24 walk -- the brief overview with your deputy
25 sheriffs, you mentioned how to respond at their

1 posts. What did you -- what do you mean by that?

2 A. Like, what their roles and responsibilities
3 were going to be. We didn't want anyone -- we were
4 more concerned with someone coming in that didn't
5 go through the magnetometers. So their role was to
6 make sure that the people didn't come in, and if
7 they needed assistance, they were supposed to reach
8 out via radio.

9 Q. How would you describe the inner perimeter
10 versus the outer perimeter?

11 A. It was almost -- the inner perimeter
12 obviously is within the whole fence of the Farm
13 Show, and then they have another line of fences
14 kind of like the inner perimeter. It's a -- it
15 varied mostly.

16 Probably 75 yards in width, you know,
17 around most of the grounds, with the exception of
18 once you meet the -- on the west side of the
19 building, or west side of the property, it's pretty
20 wooded and there isn't -- it kind of goes down to
21 one fence, because the Farm Show grounds use that
22 area for parking whenever they have the Farm Show.

23 [REDACTED]: Thank you. That's it
24 for us.

25 [REDACTED]: We can go off the record.

1 (Discussion was held off the record.)

2 BY [REDACTED]:

3 Q. Well, thank you for being here. We really
4 appreciate you making the time to talk to us.

5 How many of these formal investigative
6 interviews have you done since July 13th?

7 A. This is probably my fourth one.

8 Q. Fourth. Can you say who you did those
9 interviews with.

10 A. The first interview was conducted by the
11 State Police and the FBI. Maybe only three.
12 There's -- there have been some informal ones in
13 the Sheriff's Office with some people but -- and
14 then the second one would have been with another
15 committee. I assume it was another branch of you
16 folks.

17 Q. Uh-huh. Do you recall if it was the Senate
18 part of the House?

19 A. I don't recall.

20 Q. Okay. So, you had said that you've
21 participated in a handful of details of this level.
22 I don't know if they were all political rallies,
23 but can you say a little bit what your past
24 experience with these types of big events was.

25 A. The first one I talked about was in 2020

1 when President Trump came to Butler Airport.

2 Q. Yep.

3 A. Vice President Pence came to Oberg
4 Industries after -- that might have been -- that
5 was before 2020. I don't remember what year he
6 came to Oberg. It might have been that year prior.
7 Probably an election year, I'm sure.

8 And I was a sergeant at the time. I
9 went with the Sheriff, and he had -- he assigned
10 me -- he and I were there, as well as I think we
11 had two other deputies out just doing traffic
12 control.

13 Q. Uh-huh.

14 A. And I was in the command post on that
15 event.

16 Q. Okay.

17 A. And then the July 13th event this year.

18 Q. And did you have a planning role in any of
19 those earlier events --

20 A. No.

21 Q. -- or was it -- no. Okay.

22 And was there, you know, just in your
23 experience, was there anything that stands out as
24 different about the approach to this July 13th
25 event as opposed to those earlier events that we

1 just talked about from sort of a planning
2 perspective?

3 A. Well, clearly when President Trump came and
4 he was president, there was a lot of security.

5 Q. Yeah.

6 A. It was very secure. This one seemed very
7 loose to me. But, you know, I didn't have a lot
8 of -- I don't have a lot of experience in planning
9 these; so I -- you know.

10 Q. Okay. So, it seems like there were more
11 resources there available when President Trump came
12 in 2020 as opposed to the July 13th rally?

13 A. Yes.

14 Q. So, who would you say was in charge of
15 Sheriff's personnel at the July 13th event? I know
16 Sheriff [REDACTED] was there. But was he there in sort
17 of an unofficial capacity?

18 A. No. He -- he's ultimately in charge all
19 the time.

20 Q. Uh-huh.

21 A. But he had assigned me to oversee our staff
22 and the resources that we were providing.

23 Q. Okay. So he had specifically delegated
24 sort of planning responsibility --

25 A. Yes.

1 Q. -- and operational?

2 A. And I reported back to him with what was
3 going on for approval.

4 Q. Okay. Going back to those early meetings
5 with Secret Service and the Pennsylvania State
6 Police, I think July 8th/July 9th, would you say
7 that Secret Service or the State Police were
8 assigning the Sheriff's Office a role?

9 A. Yes.

10 Q. And did you have any input in that role at
11 that early stage?

12 A. I know what resources we had available; so,
13 I offered those resources, and they utilized that.

14 Q. Okay.

15 A. Actually, it was they needed less than we
16 had available.

17 Q. They needed less than you had available?

18 A. Uh-huh.

19 Q. And just to confirm on something that you
20 said earlier, you had not received a Pennsylvania
21 State Police ops plan prior to July 13th?

22 A. The only portion of the ops plan that I
23 received, and I noticed it after the trooper showed
24 me because we were talking about our assignments,
25 maybe was the map of assignments. This -- these

1 two pages (indicating) was what I received from the
2 State Police.

3 Q. Uh-huh.

4 A. Via e-mail.

5 Q. Okay.

6 [REDACTED]: Just for the record, the
7 two pages are?

8 THE WITNESS: Pages 4 and 5.

9 [REDACTED]: Pages 4 and 5 of what was
10 introduced as Majority Exhibit No. 2.

11 A. That's what I used to assign our deputies,
12 and what that's what I e-mailed our deputies --

13 Q. Right.

14 A. -- as far as who was going to be where and
15 what their roles were going to be.

16 Q. Okay. Did you find that to be odd at all
17 that you did not receive an operations plan from
18 the Pennsylvania State Police, or was that --

19 A. Yes and no. We had assisted the State
20 Police -- we do it every year. Slippery Rock
21 University has a homecoming celebration, and
22 usually in the evening it gets a little crazy; so,
23 we have assisted them in the past for many years.

24 It varies from year to year. Typically
25 they want us there to assist them if they have to

1 make arrests because we have some transport
2 vehicles that can haul more than -- you know,
3 multiple people.

4 Q. Uh-huh.

5 A. And -- and I've seen their operational
6 plans for those events. They've shared them at
7 that point in time. Maybe -- maybe they just felt
8 that we didn't need -- need the whole plan.

9 Q. Uh-huh.

10 A. I don't know.

11 Q. Okay.

12 A. I know -- I've known Lieutenant [REDACTED] for
13 a long time, and I don't think he's someone that
14 would keep anything from us intentionally. I think
15 he just gave us what we needed.

16 Q. Yeah. So you and Lieutenant [REDACTED] work
17 together regularly?

18 A. I wouldn't say regularly. I've just known
19 him. He's a local -- he grew up here --

20 Q. Okay.

21 A. -- in Butler County.

22 Q. Uh-huh.

23 A. I've just known him a long time.

24 Q. Uh-huh. Okay.

25 A. He's always been fair and professional.

1 Q. Okay.

2 A. Uh-huh.

3 Q. So, in those -- in those previous events,
4 the Pence event, the 2020 Trump event, the -- did
5 you say Slippery Rock University?

6 A. (Witness nods).

7 Q. Do you recall whether there was a single
8 unified command post at these events?

9 A. There was.

10 Q. So is that -- is that pretty standard at a
11 large event, to have a unified command post, from
12 your perspective?

13 A. Yes.

14 Q. Do you know how many Sheriff's personnel
15 were assigned to the July 13th rally?

16 A. Yes. I believe we had, including myself,
17 seven of us.

18 Q. Seven.

19 A. There was five -- including me, probably
20 eight, because we had five posts around the
21 perimeter, one at the magnetometer, and one in the
22 command post.

23 Q. Okay. And you had mentioned that you had
24 additional staff available, but that it wasn't
25 requested?

1 A. We -- right.

2 Q. Is that typical? I mean, would -- would
3 the Pennsylvania -- sorry. That request came from
4 Pennsylvania State Police or U.S. Secret Service?

5 A. The Secret Service and the State Police I
6 guess --

7 Q. Uh-huh.

8 A. -- in conjunction with our walk-around
9 determined how many posts we were going to need,
10 determined we were going to do every other post.

11 Q. Okay.

12 A. Which I thought was reasonable because the
13 two posts could drive together and communicate; so
14 it wasn't like -- even though we don't have radio
15 comms together, and phone numbers were provided on
16 (indicating) -- on this sheet of the troopers that
17 were assigned to the post.

18 Q. Uh-huh.

19 A. So there was that, and "This is how many we
20 could do." "You have that many?" I said,
21 "Absolutely." So we assigned them appropriately
22 that was requested.

23 Q. Okay. And sheriff deputies were assigned
24 not just to that field in between the two fences,
25 but all the way around the entire perimeter of the

1 event?

2 A. Yeah. We had some stationed around the
3 west side of the property as well.

4 Q. Okay.

5 A. Not just in between the fence -- in between
6 the fences.

7 Q. And for the -- for the deputies that were
8 in that field between the fences --

9 A. Uh-huh.

10 Q. -- they were in their cars or they were --

11 A. Yes.

12 Q. And did you direct them to be in their
13 cars, or was that sort of just a discretionary
14 decision; it was hot?

15 A. Yes. It made them more mobile because
16 there was quite a bit of --

17 Q. So you didn't --

18 A. So, yeah, their discussion was, well, we'll
19 put -- we'll man around the inner perimeter --

20 Q. Okay.

21 A. -- with the post, and they will be in their
22 cars.

23 Q. So they were told to be in their cars?

24 A. Uh-huh.

25 Q. Do you remember who told them to be in

1 their cars?

2 A. I -- I don't recall.

3 Q. Okay. Can you talk just a little bit more
4 about the selection of Sergeant [REDACTED] to be in
5 the -- in the command post.

6 A. Uh-huh.

7 Q. Just your general thinking on that.

8 A. Yeah. So Sergeant [REDACTED] is, you know, he's
9 probably 30-some years in law enforcement. He's
10 worked for us I want to say since 2015. He retired
11 from the VA Police Department. He's an Air Force
12 veteran. He's organized, he's articulate, he's
13 professional. That's why we promoted him to one of
14 our supervisory positions.

15 Q. Uh-huh.

16 A. More than capable of manning that post; so
17 I had no concerns of him being -- being in the
18 post.

19 Q. Okay. And do you know, did he have
20 experience in that type of a setting, in a -- I
21 guess in a command post?

22 A. I can't answer that, if he's had experience
23 in that or not specifically.

24 Q. Okay. Did you -- did you consider putting
25 yourself in the command post?

1 A. Uh-huh, I did.

2 Q. And what was your thinking behind the
3 decision not to do that?

4 A. I wanted to be in a position to -- to
5 assist our staff, to make decisions, and I didn't
6 want to be tied down in the command post.

7 Q. Did you --

8 A. If he had -- I'm sorry.

9 Q. No. Please go ahead.

10 A. If Sergeant [REDACTED] had not volunteered to
11 work, I -- I wouldn't have put a deputy in the
12 command post, I would have been in the command
13 post.

14 Q. Uh-huh. Okay.

15 A. Not that we didn't have a deputy that could
16 have handled it. Because the one deputy that
17 volunteered to work is a retired corporal from the
18 State Police, and I'm sure he's worked command
19 posts in his -- in his career. He would have been
20 a candidate as well but --

21 Q. Okay. And did Sergeant [REDACTED], you know,
22 express any concern about having this position?
23 Did he --

24 A. No. He was -- I think he was flattered
25 that I asked him to go in there.

Q. All right. Just a couple -- just, I guess, kind of general command structure questions.

Who did you view as in ultimate control of this -- who was in ultimate command?

A. Secret Service.

Q. Secret Service?

A. Uh-huh.

Q. And then who would you say you were receiving directives from? Was it -- were you getting --

A. Lieutenant [REDACTED].

Q. With Pennsylvania State Police?

A. Uh-huh.

Q. And were you in contact with Lieutenant [REDACTED] throughout that day, or was it mostly just during the planning meetings?

A. He shared with me -- well, I had his personal cell phone, but he also gave me his cell phone number. I guess it was assigned by the State Police.

Q. Uh-huh.

A. Which I didn't use it until after the event.

Q. Okay.

A. I -- yeah.

1 Q. I'll transition there to communications.

2 So, you had a radio?

3 A. I did.

4 Q. Is that correct?

5 A. Uh-huh.

6 Q. And was that radio on the Sheriff's
7 channel?

8 A. It was.

9 Q. And would that radio have had access to the
10 ops 3 and ops 4 channels that some of the other --

11 A. Yes.

12 Q. Did you ever -- do you just keep it on the
13 Sheriff's channel or do you scan?

14 A. No. I was scanning 3 and 4.

15 Q. Okay. And obviously your radio had the
16 capability to do that if you were --

17 A. Right.

18 Q. Since you were doing it?

19 A. Correct.

20 Q. And then how were you communicating with
21 your -- with your deputies around the perimeter?
22 Was it mostly sort of physically I'm -- I'm driving
23 around, I'm visiting you and talking that way, or
24 were you --

25 A. They would reach out via radio if they

1 needed a break.

2 Q. Uh-huh.

3 A. Or Sergeant [REDACTED] would reach out to me via
4 radio.

5 Q. And that would have been on the Sheriff's
6 channel?

7 A. Right. I was continuously driving around
8 checking on them (indicating).

9 Q. Uh-huh. And how was it driving around the
10 grounds? I mean, was it easy to --

11 A. Yes.

12 Q. -- move around?

13 A. It was.

14 Q. So there weren't people or fences in the
15 way that were creating problems?

16 A. No. The people -- the people were being
17 funneled in, but from the magnetometers to the
18 stage area.

19 Q. Uh-huh.

20 A. Which I had no need or reason to go within
21 that area. I did relieve the deputy at the
22 magnetometers twice; so, I stood in there where he
23 was -- where he was stationed.

24 Q. Uh-huh. Okay. So you would actually --
25 you would -- you would actually relieve these

1 deputies by taking on their duties for a period of
2 time --

3 A. Yeah, so they could use the restroom.

4 Q. -- so they could get a drink?

5 A. Yeah. You know, it was -- as you know, it
6 was very hot that day.

7 Q. Yeah.

8 A. Unfortunately or fortunately, we have an
9 older staff with the type of work that we do.

10 Q. Uh-huh.

11 A. A lot of retired police officers come to us
12 looking for -- for employment after they retire.
13 And, you know, we don't respond to police calls, we
14 work just pretty much a study shift of daylight.

15 We do have some younger staff, and I did
16 assign our younger guys a post that I knew they
17 would be outside and could maybe handle the heat
18 better than others.

19 Q. Right. Okay. And did you have any radio
20 communications with Secret Service --

21 A. No.

22 Q. -- that day?

23 One other question about that 2020 Trump
24 event. It's our understanding that at that event,
25 deputies were paired with Secret Service agents.

1 Do you remember that at all?

2 A. I -- I was not.

3 Q. You were not?

4 A. I do know a deputy -- we were both
5 sergeants at the time -- Sergeant [REDACTED] was paired
6 with a Secret Service agent, and they were mobile
7 addressing issues.

8 Q. Okay. Did you have an operations plan?
9 Was there a Sheriff's Office operations plan?

10 A. Just these pages, four and five
11 (indicating).

12 Q. That you received from the Pennsylvania
13 State Police?

14 A. Right.

15 Q. So, how -- how would you say you
16 communicated the duties and obligations to your
17 deputies for that day? There wasn't a -- you
18 didn't do an early morning briefing, but you met
19 with them?

20 A. Via e-mail. There was a handful of them;
21 and so I just called and talked with each one.

22 Q. Okay.

23 A. Or spoke to them in person on that Friday.

24 Q. Okay. Sorry to go back to one
25 communication question. Do you have FirstNet on

1 your phone?

2 A. I do.

3 Q. Do you know, do all your deputies have
4 FirstNet on their phones?

5 A. I can't answer that. I don't think they
6 do.

7 Q. But they --

8 A. They all do not, I know.

9 Q. The Sheriff's Office doesn't --

10 A. Mandate it or require it or provide it.

11 Q. -- mandate it or require it or provide it?

12 A. Uh-huh.

13 Q. Did you have any cell phone issues on the
14 13th?

15 A. I don't recall having any issues.

16 Q. Okay.

17 A. I used my cell phone at the beginning and
18 at the end.

19 Q. Okay.

20 A. Because my -- my nephew was inside. So I
21 wanted to make sure he was okay.

22 Q. Absolutely. Absolutely.

23 A. Sorry.

24 Q. Do you want -- do you need a minute?

25 A. No. I'm good.

1 Q. Okay. Earlier in the day, were you ever
2 looking for drones?

3 A. No.

4 Q. Did the Pennsylvania State Police ever ask
5 you to look for drones?

6 A. No.

7 Q. And you didn't see -- did you see any
8 drones that day?

9 A. I don't recall seeing any drones.

10 Q. Were you in the trailer, the local command
11 trailer, at all?

12 A. I stepped in on occasion.

13 Q. And when you did that, did you -- did you
14 talk with Sergeant [REDACTED]? Was that the purpose of --

15 A. Yeah. I mainly would stop and talk with
16 him.

17 Q. Uh-huh.

18 A. But a lot of times he would walk outside of
19 the command post. That was prior to President
20 Trump's -- Former President Trump's arrival.

21 Q. Okay.

22 A. Uh-huh.

23 Q. During that day, did -- did you receive any
24 concerns about people around the AGR building?

25 A. I know there was a lot of people over

1 there. I -- closer to Trump's arrival, I heard
2 there was a suspicious person that they were
3 looking for over there, but that's -- he was a
4 suspicious person.

5 The deputies had a photograph of him. I
6 didn't have a photograph of him. I wasn't --
7 Sergeant [REDACTED] was trying to send via e-mail -- or
8 via text, but his phone was not functioning very
9 well.

10 Q. Uh-huh.

11 A. So he was able to get on e-mail and e-mail
12 them all, I guess, information about this
13 individual.

14 Q. Okay.

15 A. But that's all -- that's all I knew.

16 Q. Okay. So Sergeant [REDACTED] could e-mail but
17 not text?

18 A. Apparently because of the WiFi that was set
19 up in the command post.

20 Q. Oh. Uh-huh. Do you have any idea whether
21 Sergeant [REDACTED] had FirstNet on his phone?

22 A. I don't think he does because he was
23 complaining about having cell phone issues all day.

24 Q. Yeah. You mentioned this just briefly, but
25 when did you become aware of law enforcement

1 looking for a suspicious person with a rangefinder?

2 A. I didn't hear about a rangefinder until
3 after the event.

4 Q. Until after?

5 A. Uh-huh.

6 Q. So when did you hear about interest in a
7 suspicious male?

8 A. I'm sorry?

9 Q. When did you hear about interest in a
10 suspicious male then, or did you hear about
11 interest in a suspicious male?

12 A. It was either through a conversation with
13 Sergeant [REDACTED] or my travels checking on the
14 deputies between the Farm Show grounds and the AGR
15 building (indicating). I can't recall
16 specifically.

17 Q. And do you know -- do you have any -- a
18 guess at about what time that would have been?

19 A. I don't recall.

20 Q. And, I'm sorry, I know you mentioned this
21 already, did -- did you receive the pictures that
22 were texted of this suspicious person?

23 A. I didn't see a picture of the individual
24 until after the event.

25 Q. Until after.

1 A. I was assisting the Butler Township Police
2 establishing a perimeter over at the AGR building
3 along Route 68, I guess that would be on the north
4 end of the property, and they showed me a picture
5 of him on their phone. That's the first I saw a
6 picture of him.

7 Q. Yeah. And this was well after the
8 shooting?

9 A. Oh, yeah. Yeah.

10 Q. Did you know during the day that Sergeant
11 [REDACTED] was having issues distributing those pictures
12 to the sheriff deputies?

13 A. I know he was having cell phone issues, but
14 I can't -- I can't -- I can't either confirm or
15 deny.

16 Q. Okay.

17 A. I know he ended up sending them by e-mail,
18 but I can't remember when I learned that's how he
19 got it to them.

20 Q. Okay. And so the process for learning
21 about this suspicious male, you came to that
22 information it sounds like from talking to either
23 Sergeant [REDACTED] or deputies around the perimeter?

24 A. Yeah. More so after the event, honestly.

25 Q. Uh-huh.

1 A. Once I was over with the Butler Township
2 Police establish -- you know, maintaining that
3 perimeter, that's when I really learned the most --

4 Q. Okay.

5 A. -- about the suspicious persons that they
6 were working on.

7 Q. So you --

8 A. I didn't know they were working it prior to
9 that.

10 Q. Yeah. So you didn't hear any of the radio
11 chatter on -- on the other channels, on ops 3 or
12 ops 4?

13 A. A little bit. But, you know, a little bit.
14 Prior -- prior to Trump -- prior to Former
15 President Trump taking the stage, Sheriff [REDACTED]
16 invited me back behind -- behind the stage for a
17 time. They had a meet-and-greet with President
18 Trump. So I attended that, and I did turn my radio
19 off when I was in that area. Then after he came
20 out, I turned my radio back on.

21 Q. Do you know what time that meet-and-greet
22 was about?

23 A. That was probably ten minutes prior to him
24 taking the stage.

25 Q. Ten minutes prior?

1 A. Ten or fifteen minutes.

2 Q. Do you remember who was at that meet-and-
3 greet? Was it just you and Sheriff [REDACTED] and --

4 A. No. It was myself, Sheriff [REDACTED], the
5 State Police Lieutenants [REDACTED] and [REDACTED]
6 [REDACTED], Lieutenant [REDACTED] from Butler
7 Township Police Department, and there were several
8 other people there.

9 Q. Those several other people --

10 A. I don't recall who they were.

11 Q. Yeah. Do you recall if there were any
12 Secret Service folks there?

13 A. Oh, yeah.

14 Q. Yeah.

15 A. I mean, they were within the --

16 Q. Yeah.

17 A. -- area, yeah.

18 Q. Okay. How long do you think that meet-and-
19 greet lasted?

20 A. I was the first one to go. I shook his
21 hand, they took a picture, and I left.

22 Q. Okay.

23 A. About ten seconds.

24 Q. Ten seconds. Okay.

25 So, did you -- I mean, it sounds like

1 because -- it sounds like you weren't really aware
2 of the suspicions around this person near the AGR
3 building because you were monitoring the Sheriff's
4 channel.

5 A. I was. I heard the Township police working
6 something, but --

7 Q. Okay.

8 A. -- I didn't know what it was. I wasn't
9 even sure where they were at --

10 Q. Yeah. Uh-huh.

11 A. -- when --

12 Q. And so --

13 A. I probably won't scan all those channels
14 again because it got to be very confusing
15 logistically.

16 Q. Uh-huh.

17 A. You know, once the shots were fired, I
18 heard the shooter was down, I didn't know where
19 they were.

20 Q. Yeah.

21 A. I didn't know if they were in -- obviously
22 if they were out -- I didn't know.

23 Q. Yeah.

24 A. It was confusing. I won't do that again
25 probably.

1 Q. Do you know, is there any -- is there a
2 standard protocol for scanning radio channels? I
3 mean, is that something that officers are
4 encouraged to do?

5 A. Well, we're all -- we all take the training
6 FEMA offers, you know, for unified command.

7 Q. Uh-huh.

8 A. Right? Which is the whole purpose of
9 having the command post; so --

10 Did I answer your question or no?

11 Q. Yes. Yes.

12 So, at any point prior to hearing the
13 shots, did you have any reason to make your way
14 towards the AGR building?

15 A. I had no reason at that point, no.

16 Q. And then where -- so where were you when
17 you heard the shots?

18 A. Well, after the meet-and-greet, I was with
19 a couple other law enforcement partners that I've
20 known forever, and they were standing behind --
21 behind the bleachers, behind the stage, kind of to
22 the west side of the stage between -- between the
23 stage and the main tent where President Trump drove
24 in to.

25 They had backed up one of their SUVs to

1 where they actually ended up taking him out, and I
2 was pretty much standing right there whenever the
3 shots were fired.

4 Q. Okay. Did you --

5 A. Once the shots -- once the shots were
6 fired, I heard a loud hissing. So I went around to
7 where the speakers were, the hydraulic lines were.
8 I thought they exploded because the speakers were
9 coming down. There was fluid spraying all over the
10 place. And then I put two and two together that it
11 was shots fired.

12 It was really confusing because I guess
13 whenever President -- and then I kind of worked my
14 way toward -- not toward the AGR building, but in
15 that vicinity on the other side of the stage, and
16 then I heard the crowd cheering. It was just odd.
17 Because even though I was back there, I don't
18 recall seeing President Trump leave.

19 Q. Uh-huh.

20 A. But, anyway.

21 Q. Would you -- would you mind -- I think the
22 Majority has introduced the -- that map as Exhibit
23 1.

24 A. Uh-huh.

25 Q. Would you mind -- I guess, is it all right

1 if I stand up so I can see?

2 A. Yeah.

3 Q. Can you point out where the meet-and-greet
4 was, and then after that, where you were when the
5 shots were fired.

6 A. The meet-and-greet was in the tents right
7 here (indicating).

8 Q. Uh-huh.

9 A. So I exited, and I walked around to here
10 (indicating). My original -- my original post, I
11 was over with the command post (indicating). I
12 thought I would just stand over there, and if
13 Sergeant [REDACTED] needed me or if I needed to do
14 something, I would be available.

15 Q. Uh-huh.

16 A. Not knowing where I might be needed or what
17 might need to be done.

18 Q. Uh-huh.

19 A. So I was here (indicating). When the shots
20 were fired, I kind of worked my way toward this way
21 once I learned that the shots were coming from over
22 here (indicating) because I saw, you know, people
23 running this way (indicating), law enforcement
24 officers running toward the AGR building. All I
25 had on me was my pistol. I did not have any type

of long gun or anything like that.

So then I was looking for where I might be needed. They were carrying a gentleman over to a Secret Service van that was parked right there (indicating). So I provided security, went over and assisted them with the man that was shot over there.

Q. Okay.

[REDACTED]: Sir, you've been marking it. Perhaps you could just mark with a star for the record where you were when shots were fired.

THE WITNESS: Sure.

[REDACTED]: Thank you.

[REDACTED]: If it's all right with my colleagues, we can mark this as Minority Exhibit A.

(Minority Exhibit A was marked for identification.)

[REDACTED]: Okay.

[REDACTED]: Absolutely. And thank you.

BY [REDACTED]:

Q. And, sir, could you briefly denote the direction you went after you had referenced moving westward. Could you denote that on the map with an arrow, perhaps?

A. You mean once the shots were fired?

1 Q. You had mentioned generally following a
2 particular direction because of the audience or
3 some other crowd of people moving in a particular
4 direction.

5 A. I saw people carrying a wounded gentleman
6 to the van. Is that what you were referring to?

7 Q. No. But --

8 A. Oh. I saw law enforcement officers running
9 towards the AGR building, and a couple of my
10 colleagues, Lieutenant [REDACTED] and stuff, were
11 taking a position up -- there was a piece of
12 equipment there. He was taking cover behind it.
13 So I kind of went that way, and I also heard on the
14 radio that the shooter was down; so --

15 Q. And could you mark what that way is perhaps
16 with an arrow.

17 A. Sure.

18 (Witness drawing).

19 [REDACTED]: Thank you.

20 [REDACTED]: I think with that, we're
21 about out of time; so we can go off the record.

22 (Discussion was held off the record.)

23 (Recess was taken.)

24 BY [REDACTED]:

25 Q. Majority Exhibit 2, which is the

1 Pennsylvania State Police operational plan, I know
2 that you mentioned that you recall seeing Page 4,
3 which is the map, and Page 5, which is the post
4 assignment log.

5 A. Uh-huh. On Page 4, on the map, there are
6 numberings of different posts.

7 A. Uh-huh.

8 Q. Do you recognize those on the document?

9 A. I do.

10 Q. And correspondingly, there's post
11 assignments on the bottom of Page 4 and Page 5 that
12 list out the individuals that will be at those
13 posts by post number --

14 A. Yes.

15 Q. -- corresponding to the map. After
16 reviewing Page 5, there appears to be post 13
17 missing from the post assignment list.

18 A. I noticed that.

19 Q. Do you know what post 13 was for the July
20 13 event?

21 A. I didn't ask. I assumed 13 is an unlucky
22 number, so they didn't include it; it being July
23 13th, another unlucky number.

24 Q. Uh-huh.

25 A. Not that I'm suspicious or -- but it is

1 what it is; so -- it's just ironic. That's all.

2 Q. Were the posts listed on Page 4 and Page 5,
3 were they discussed at any brief within the July
4 13th meetings between the Sheriff's Office,
5 yourself, and any other local law enforcement
6 entity or Pennsylvania State Police?

7 A. Just that Lieutenant [REDACTED] said he would
8 put the posts together and send me -- send me what
9 they would be when he was done with them.

10 Q. Uh-huh. Do you recall post 13 being raised
11 at any point in those discussions?

12 A. No. I didn't know the numbering until --
13 we weren't discussing numbering on the walk-around.
14 He -- they numbered them -- whoever numbered them
15 after our walk-around and made the assignments.

16 Q. Thank you.

17 A. You're welcome.

18 Q. Going back to pre-meetings for the July
19 13th event. We talked about that initial meeting
20 where the Secret Service was present and there was
21 a break -- there were break-off sessions for
22 different components. For the record, we've gone
23 back and forth between the 8 th and July 9th. That
24 was on July 8th, the Monday; correct? Or was it on
25 Tuesday, July 9th?

1 A. I think it was on Tuesday. Hold on. Let
2 me look.

3 Q. Okay.

4 (Witness looking at cell phone.)

5 A. I'm sorry, it was on Monday.

6 Q. Thank you.

7 To clarify for the record, the meeting
8 with the Secret Service with the branch-out
9 meetings occurred on Monday, July 8th; correct?

10 A. I apologize.

11 Q. Thank you.

12 Was there a meeting on July 9th then
13 that you attended --

14 A. No.

15 Q. -- that was separate from that?

16 The only other meeting --

17 A. So I guess I probably heard of his visit
18 probably on July 5th then, not the beginning of the
19 week.

20 Q. Thank you for clarifying.

21 At the July 8th briefing, do you recall
22 any discussion of elevated positions as a
23 vulnerability for the July 13th event? Do you
24 recall any discussion of the AGR building?

25 A. I -- I can't recall.

Q. Okay. And at the July 11th walk-through where on Exhibit 1 we walked through, you know, the locations that you visited with Secret Service and other law enforcement entities on that day in preparation for the July 13th event, do you recall any mentions of the AGR building?

A. I know the State Police and the Secret Service were talking about their tactical teams and where they were setting up.

Q. Uh-huh.

A. So I --

Q. Okay. Did you personally experience any connectivity issues with your radio on that day, on July 13th?

A. I did not personally, no.

BY [REDACTED]:

Q. Did you use your personal cell phone at any point during the day for correspondence with other law enforcement colleagues?

A. Other than the telephone conversation with Sergeant [REDACTED], I might have called another deputy that had a question or needed a break.

Q. You said you had not used the cell phone provided by Pennsylvania State Police; correct?

A. Correct. I -- at the end, I did call

1 Lieutenant [REDACTED] because I was at the north
2 property -- north end perimeter around the AGR
3 building. It was 9:30 at night, and I knew that
4 that post was going to be manned for a long time.
5 I didn't know it was going to be manned that long.
6 I my knew I needed to get relieved. I couldn't
7 stay there forever.

8 BY [REDACTED]:

9 Q. At the event during the day on July 13th,
10 you mentioned earlier that Secret Service was all
11 around, that if you needed to get in touch with a
12 Secret Service official, they -- they were
13 accessible to you just by their location?

14 A. Yes. I felt pretty comfortable that they
15 were.

16 Q. Were you able to identify Secret Service
17 easily by demarcation or uniform that day?

18 A. Most -- yeah. Most of them. Obviously,
19 some of them were in vehicles and suits, and a lot
20 of them were just in tactical gear with MOLLE vests
21 that said "police" on them.

22 Q. Did you notice if there were any officials
23 from Homeland Security there that day?

24 A. I could neither confirm nor deny that. I
25 have no idea.

Q. Okay. Just going back to your actions around when shots were fired and you heard shots were fired and you experienced the different, you know, actions of various people at the event, the crowd, you know, you saw officers running towards the AGR building. Can you describe your actions after you heard that "shots fired" in the time after the event, you know, towards, you know, eventually leaving the site for the day.

A. After I assisted the gentleman that was -- assisted the paramedics and stuff with the gentleman that was wounded, Sheriff [REDACTED] got on the radio and announced that they needed assistance over at the AGR building to provide security. So I made -- got in my vehicle and made my way over to that area to assist them, and that's where I stayed for the remainder of my time at the event.

Q. And while you were near the AGR building for the -- you know, after shots were fired, did you observe any reports of additional suspicious individuals?

A. No.

Q. Did you observe any drones after shots were fired?

A. Not that I recall.

1 Q. Can you describe the activity of local law
2 enforcement around the AGR building when you went
3 there after shots were fired.

4 A. When I arrived, Sergeant [REDACTED] was running
5 back and forth trying to figure out what's going
6 on. I assisted a couple of deputies as well as
7 some Butler Township Police providing security in
8 that area.

9 At that point in time, Allegheny County
10 bomb squad had driven around because they were
11 conducting a sweep. There were other tactical
12 teams going in and clearing the building at that
13 time.

14 Q. Did you have any interactions with Secret
15 Service officials after shots were fired?

16 A. Not -- I did not have any interactions, no.
17 I do believe one of their agents had walked up to
18 where we were standing, but he really --

19 Q. Uh-huh. Your role at the AGR building
20 after shots were fired, can you describe more of
21 that. Were you assisting in setting a perimeter
22 for local law enforcement that was there in
23 securing the area; and, if so, what does that mean?

24 A. I was just on foot. My car was along the
25 road.

1 Q. Uh-huh.

2 A. I was just on foot to make sure nobody
3 walked onto the property.

4 Q. Uh-huh. And did you see anyone walk onto
5 the property?

6 A. No. A few times we had to keep people away
7 because there were some suspicious items they had
8 to check, the bomb squad was checking out.

9 Q. Uh-huh.

10 A. So until they cleared that, I wanted to
11 make sure nobody was --

12 Q. Uh-huh.

13 A. I think I even backed up myself at some
14 point --

15 Q. Uh-huh.

16 A. -- not knowing what was -- what they were
17 investigating.

18 Q. At what time did you understand that it was
19 good to leave for the day on July 13th? Did you
20 have any --

21 A. I was relieved by a Butler Township Police
22 officer.

23 Q. Uh-huh.

24 A. And the Sheriff. The Sheriff called me and
25 said, hey, you know, as soon as our guys can leave,

1 you guys can leave, do so. There's the State
2 Police and the Secret Service is in charge and
3 they, you -- if we're not physically doing
4 anything, to -- to leave for the day.

5 Q. When you left for the day, did you observe
6 any FBI officials that had arrived at the Butler
7 Farm Show grounds?

8 A. I don't know. It was dark. I left in my
9 vehicle from that point. I checked on Sergeant
10 [REDACTED]; said, hey, you know, we're -- we can take
11 off. So -- and I checked to make sure everybody
12 else was able to leave as well.

13 Q. Uh-huh.

14 A. I think we had two deputies that were
15 manning a traffic control point, and the barricades
16 had come, and they were leaving as well; so we all
17 left.

18 Q. Do you recall around what time you left?

19 A. Around 10:00.

20 Q. Did you participate in any type of, you
21 know, debriefing on July 13th with the Sheriff's
22 Office, Pennsylvania State Police, or Secret
23 Service?

24 A. No.

25 Q. Do you recall any of your colleagues at the

1 Sheriff's Office that participated in any type of
2 after-action debrief with Secret Service?

3 A. Not with Secret Service, no. Huh-uh.

4 Q. Do you recall who they might have debriefed
5 with if it was not Secret Service?

6 A. I haven't spoken to a Secret Service agent
7 since the event happened.

8 Q. Uh-huh. Around the time after shots were
9 fired when you reported to the AGR building, were
10 there reports of a second suspicious individual or
11 possible associate to Crooks?

12 A. There might have been mention there might
13 be other people involved, but they -- there was
14 no --

15 Q. Okay.

16 A. Nothing to verify that.

17 Q. Uh-huh. In your experience working at the
18 Sheriff's Office, you had mentioned earlier that
19 this appeared a very loose event in terms of the
20 planning, preparation. Can you elaborate more on
21 that.

22 A. After the meeting on the 8th, we -- the
23 Sheriff and I -- were leaving, and he asked me my
24 opinion on the meeting, and I think I stated,
25 "Well, I guess you got to start somewhere." You

1 know?

2 It just -- and I -- and I've never
3 experienced -- I don't know what's -- who gets told
4 what as far as what our roles and responsibilities
5 is going to be in an event like that with assisting
6 a large agency, a federal agency of that magnitude;
7 so I just thought this was normal.

8 But, you know, it just seemed to me, you
9 know, that where the stage was located is not where
10 I would have thought the stage would have been
11 myself but --

12 Q. As far as the post assignments go, going
13 back to Majority Exhibit 2, in your experience at
14 the Sheriff's Office, do you think that there
15 should have been more posts established, different
16 posts located?

17 A. I think the posts were appropriate.

18 Q. Uh-huh.

19 A. Clearly, the weak spots were the elevated
20 positions that weren't covered.

21 Q. Uh-huh.

22 A. Which there's a lot of them out there.
23 Which I don't understand why they put the stage
24 where they did. I don't know why you would have
25 elevated him like that.

1 Q. Uh-huh.

2 A. I have an opinion but --

3 Q. Uh-huh.

4 BY [REDACTED]:

5 Q. I would like to go back to the conversation
6 we had about the command posts. First, with
7 regards to the local command posts, do you know why
8 the trailer was placed where it was?

9 A. I do not know.

10 Q. And then with regard to the Secret Service
11 command post, had you heard anyone mention issues
12 about congestion that served as the justification
13 for the separate command?

14 A. I don't recall that either.

15 Q. Is it accurate to say that Lieutenant
16 [REDACTED] was your main point of contact for the
17 Pennsylvania State Police?

18 A. Yes.

19 BY [REDACTED]:

20 Q. During the day on July 13th when you were
21 roving the campaign rally site, did you stop in at
22 the USSS command post?

23 A. No.

24 Q. Would any of the Sheriff's Office personnel
25 there that day have -- have reason to, you know,

engage with the Secret Service command post as part of their duties and assignments?

A. No.

BY [REDACTED]:

Q. I have a list of the local police departments involved in the day of the event. You've mentioned them throughout your narrative. I would be grateful if you could give a brief description of each again so that way we have it all lined up next to each other, the nature of your interaction with the different local departments.

So I'll say the names. Please describe as best you can your responsibilities with the following groups, and if you did not have any responsibilities or interactions, and if you did not have any, just say so.

First was the Butler County Emergency Services Department.

A. I didn't really have any interactions with them.

Q. Butler County ESU?

A. Oh, I'm sorry, who was the first one?

Q. Butler County Emergency Services Department.

A. Just brief discussions in the command post

1 because I know them.

2 Q. And then Butler County ESU?

3 A. I didn't have any interactions with them.

4 Q. Beaver County ESU?

5 A. I did not.

6 Q. Butler Township Police Department?

7 A. Just at the end doing the perimeter.

8 Q. Butler City Police Department?

9 A. I did not.

10 Q. And then Washington Regional SWAT?

11 A. I did not have any interaction with them
12 either.

13 [REDACTED]: We can go off the record.

14 (Discussion was held off the record.)

15 BY [REDACTED]:

16 Q. Where would you have put the stage?

17 A. I would have put it down in the arena --
18 down in the arena where no one could -- I mean, I
19 know it's not exactly -- you can't get a whole lot
20 of people in there, but at least it's not out in
21 the open.

22 Q. Uh-huh.

23 A. You know, put him up on a platform --

24 Q. Yeah.

25 A. -- so he can be picked off. I mean,

1 really?

2 Q. So why do you think it was put where it
3 was? It was for visibility?

4 A. I think they wanted to get as many people
5 in there as possible. I think they wanted, you
6 know -- you know, it's almost like -- this isn't a
7 concert, you know, where you're trying to get as
8 many people in as possible, and, you know --

9 I understand it's a platform for him
10 to -- to voice his message, and -- you know. But
11 security-wise, shwoo, you know, it's a nightmare.
12 Looking at it now, obviously, hindsight is 20/20.

13 Q. Uh-huh. Who invited you to have a
14 Sheriff's representative in the local -- in the
15 command -- in the local law enforcement command
16 post?

17 A. I don't know if we were invited. The
18 Sheriff had mentioned at the beginning planning
19 stages we were going to assign one of our captains
20 to the command -- he asked, "Do you want to be in
21 the command post?" He said, "Sure."

22 Q. Uh-huh.

23 A. And then the day of -- then once -- what
24 happened was we polled our staff to see who would
25 be available to work with the understanding they

1 would be getting paid time and a half for overtime
2 because it's after -- outside of our work hours.

3 And then once it was learned that this
4 was going to be a comp time detail, they would be
5 working for comp time, many -- many people denied;
6 said they weren't available for that.

7 Q. Uh-huh.

8 A. So I got my -- I guess I got my directive
9 from the Sheriff.

10 Q. From the Sheriff. Was there a Pennsylvania
11 State Police representative in the local law
12 enforcement command post?

13 A. Not that I'm aware of.

14 Q. Was there a Pennsylvania State Police
15 representative in the Secret Service command post?

16 A. I assume.

17 Q. And no one from Pennsylvania State
18 Police -- sorry to use this term again -- but
19 invited you into the Secret Service command post?

20 A. I was not invited.

21 Q. When you -- after the shooting when you
22 responded to the AGR building, were you aware of
23 a -- of a bomb threat to that building?

24 A. I had heard that there was some suspicious
25 items over there, that that 's why the bomb squad

1 was going over there and doing a sweep, or whatever
2 they did. I could see them over there, but I
3 didn't know what was --

4 Q. And could you see the roof of the building
5 from where you were after the, you know, the
6 shooting?

7 A. I could see guys standing up there, but I
8 couldn't see beyond that.

9 Q. Uh-huh. Do you know -- were you involved
10 in establishing a secure perimeter around the AGR
11 building? Was that the intent?

12 A. Just on the -- yeah, the outer -- the
13 northern part of the property along Route 68.

14 Q. And in your view after the shooting, was
15 there a secure perimeter established around the AGR
16 building?

17 A. Yes.

18 Q. Did you or your deputies detain anyone --

19 A. No.

20 Q. -- at the AGR building?

21 Do you know if any of your -- you or any
22 of your deputies were on the roof at any time at
23 the AGR building?

24 A. No.

25 Q. I think my final question is just were

1 there any assets or resources that you felt you
2 lacked that you needed or that should have been
3 provided to you for that day?

4 A. From the Sheriff's Office point of view,
5 what we were asked to do?

6 Q. Right, from the Sheriff's Office point of
7 view.

8 A. I felt from our point of view, other than
9 the ability, I guess, to communicate via cell phone
10 for Sergeant [REDACTED] from the command post to those
11 assigned to the posts was probably the biggest
12 problem. But he overcome that by e-mail when he
13 needed to e-mail.

14 So, other than that, what we were asked
15 to do, you know, we were provided everything we
16 needed to do what we were asked to do.

17 [REDACTED]: Okay. Those are all my
18 questions. I think my colleague has some follow-up
19 questions. Go ahead.

20 BY [REDACTED]:

21 Q. Yes. Thank you, sir. Thank you for your
22 time this morning and for your service and
23 experience on July 13th.

24 I'm sorry, I'm going to dart around a
25 bit just to make sure I understand some of the

1 things that you've been discussing with us this
2 morning.

3 I believe you said there was a
4 walk-through with Secret Service on July 11th, and
5 [REDACTED] had asked you to attend that walk-through
6 that the Pennsylvania State Police was also at.
7 Was anyone else from your Sheriff's Office there
8 with you that morning?

9 A. No.

10 Q. And on that day, I think you said you
11 walked the perimeter, you walked around the two
12 fences, there was discussion about determining
13 where folks needed to be to maintain the security
14 of the site. Did you or anybody in the Sheriff's
15 Office have any role in determining what that
16 perimeter would be, where the perimeter for the
17 site would be?

18 A. No. They had already established that.

19 Q. And who was "they"?

20 A. When I say "they," I guess I would say
21 Secret Service and the State Police. And I assume
22 that the State Police were getting their directives
23 from the Secret Service.

24 Q. Okay. So that was another question I had.
25 Is it fair to think of the State Police for this

1 event as sort of a link between Secret Service and
2 local police? It sounds like you worked pretty
3 close.

4 A. Yes.

5 Q. Yes. So PSP is working with Secret Service
6 to set up the site for the day, and then I think
7 you said you and the Sheriff's Office referred to
8 taking your direction from the State Police that
9 day?

10 A. Right. Because that property, there's a
11 little bit of the property in Butler Township and
12 Connoquenessing Township. Butler Township has a
13 police department, Connoquenessing does not, so the
14 police have primary jurisdiction in that area;
15 so --

16 Q. Understood. And during that
17 walk-through -- you may have already said this --
18 did you or anyone else have any concerns about the
19 AGR building being outside of the perimeter?

20 A. I recall them talking about trying to put
21 people over there. Whether it was just a lack of
22 resources --

23 I -- I know, you know, everyone's
24 worried about their budgets, and it just seemed
25 like even the State Police after I was driving

1 around with Lieutenant [REDACTED] that day, I had
2 shared with him all of our guys are on comp time.
3 He's like, "Yeah, we got the same situation going
4 on with our department, with our agency. We're all
5 here on comp time," or -- you know.

6 Q. But even with that comp time ---

7 A. And I only say that because in my opinion
8 it seems like, you know -- and we got to be
9 financially responsible, fiscally responsible. Had
10 we been able to spend for more resources and more
11 people, that might have been a better outcome
12 obviously but --

13 Q. But I believe you said earlier you were
14 able to staff more people, and then the State
15 Police said, we don't need that many. Was that a
16 financial decision or was that --

17 A. No. That -- no, no. I don't think it was
18 a financial decision. Given -- maybe what was
19 asked of them to do, they determined that we could
20 adequately do it with 50 percent State Police, 50
21 percent deputy sheriffs around that perimeter.

22 Q. Okay. So it does sound like at least going
23 into that day, you felt that there was adequate
24 staffing?

25 A. Yes.

1 Q. Thank you.

2 And in discussion about AGR, did you
3 have any understanding of whether there would be
4 somebody posted there even if not from your office?

5 A. I did have an understanding that the ESU
6 team was over in that area. I didn't know where
7 they were specifically, but they were over in that
8 area.

9 Q. And did you know that on this July 11th
10 walk-through or was that -- did you learn that
11 later?

12 A. I did overhear the State Police and the
13 Secret Service discussing where some of the
14 tactical teams were going to be, the ESU team, the
15 Secret Service tac team. I don't think the State
16 Police had a tac team there, but I was unfamiliar
17 with where they may have been.

18 That day I saw where they were at
19 because they were stationed in those areas but --

20 Q. So you did have some sense that --

21 A. They were there.

22 Q. -- that building was covered by somebody,
23 even if not your department?

24 A. Right.

25 Q. But it doesn't sound like you had any

discussions with anybody about where exactly in the building, on top of the roof, anybody would be?

A. Right.

Q. Thank you.

You mentioned that you had a discussion with [REDACTED] about the manpower that you had available, and I think you said they were able to patrol traffic. "They" meaning Butler Township Police would be patrolling traffic that day?

A. Right. They would be able to man the traffic control points for the motorcade to come in, but he didn't have -- he didn't have the manpower to secure the AGR property.

Q. Understood. So who was securing that AGR property? I think you said ESU?

A. That's what I understand.

Q. And --

A. But I don't know what -- what responsibilities they were given or --

Q. And ESU from a particular county or some -- or was it federal tactical units? Do you know?

A. I would assume that the other ESU teams were getting their directives from the Butler County ESU team; they would be assisting them. But I'm just assuming that. I don't know.

1 Q. Understood.

2 We've talked a bit about the two command
3 posts. I think you said you had an assumption that
4 there were not additional or any local law
5 enforcement in the Secret Service command post
6 because there was not enough room. What is that
7 statement based on? Did you ever go in the command
8 post?

9 A. No. I never walked in.

10 Q. Okay. And you mentioned as we were talking
11 about the command posts a FEMA training --

12 A. Uh-huh.

13 Q. -- for unified command. What is that
14 training and who gets it?

15 A. We register online through FEMA. It's all
16 online training. They're little -- just to
17 familiarize yourself with what unified command
18 looks like, how it works, how it's supposed to
19 work.

20 Q. Do other local law enforcement agencies in
21 the area sign up for that training to your
22 understanding?

23 A. Yeah. I believe so, yeah. It's been in
24 existence for quite some time.

25 Q. And did any other local law enforcement

say, "Unified command" -- to Secret Service or to PSP -- "Unified command is best practice, can we be in that command post with you?" or did anybody invite Secret Service or PSP into the local trailer?

A. I don't -- I don't know that. The command post was being overseen by [REDACTED], I believe. The director of 911 was actually in the command post with Secret Service and the State Police as a county representative.

Q. As a --

A. I learned that after.

Q. So the day of, you had no understanding that anybody from local from the county was --

A. I'm not sure what connection there -- what communications there were between the two command posts.

Q. And I know you said that if you had needed to get in touch with Secret Service, there were lots of folks identifiable, you could have walked up to one of them, and I think you said you could have also been in contact with [REDACTED] in the local command post. How would he have gotten in touch with Secret Service?

A. I would assume probably through -- if our

1 director for 911 was up there, that his employees
2 within the command post could communicate with him.

3 Q. Thank you.

4 Appreciating you were sort of floating
5 around, checking in with all of our deputies,
6 including [REDACTED], and it sounds like you did at a
7 couple points speak with him in the local command
8 post, did you ever formally relieve him? Did he
9 ever leave the command post and leave you in there
10 on your own to sort of man the post?

11 A. No. I checked on him and he said he was
12 okay. So I -- you know, he must have just went to
13 the bathroom. I don't know what he did.

14 Q. Okay.

15 A. Yeah.

16 Q. The morning of, I think you said there was
17 no walk-through with Secret Service on July 13th.
18 Did you do any walk-throughs/briefings with any
19 other local law enforcement agencies?

20 A. The day of?

21 Q. The day of.

22 A. The day of, once all of our posts were
23 manned, I was speaking with Lieutenant [REDACTED], and
24 I hopped in his vehicle, and we did drive around
25 and talked with everyone.

1 Q. Sort of check-ins. But no everybody get in
2 the room together for any sort of briefing?

3 A. Right.

4 Q. In those check-ins, either with [REDACTED] [REDACTED]
5 or on your own, did any of your deputies raise any
6 concerns about what they were seeing, about their
7 communications?

8 A. Other than Sergeant [REDACTED] complaining that
9 his cell phone wasn't working all that great, no, I
10 don't recall any.

11 Q. And on that point, you mentioned that you
12 have is it FirstNet?

13 [REDACTED]: FirstNet.

14 Q. FirstNet. Do you pay for that --

15 A. Uh-huh.

16 Q. -- personally?

17 A. (Witness nods).

18 Q. Why do you do that?

19 A. Two years ago, Sheriff had an AT&T
20 representative come to their office, and I was
21 looking to switch from Verizon because where I live
22 at, I don't have very good coverage.

23 Q. Uh-huh.

24 A. It seems like AT&T was maybe a better
25 network for me to go with, and they had offered

1 this FirstNet network. It's the same price as a
2 regular plan; it's not any extra. It's just a cell
3 phone plan.

4 Q. So it's just a different plan that as law
5 enforcement you are sort of able to opt into?

6 A. You know, I really didn't think I would be
7 working any type of event where -- that this --
8 that this could happen, that it could be helpful,
9 and I never really much thought about it.

10 And I didn't use my cell phone a whole
11 lot on the 13th. But whenever I did, I didn't have
12 any issues.

13 Q. And you did have the radio working, and I
14 think we discussed the -- you had access to the
15 Sheriff's channel. You were also scanning ops 3
16 and ops 4. I just want to confirm that the State
17 Police has their own separate system frequency?

18 A. Yeah, they have their own frequency.

19 Q. Do you have any way of communicating with
20 State Police on your frequencies?

21 A. No.

22 Q. Can they listen in to your local
23 frequencies?

24 A. Only if they have one of our radios.

25 Q. And did anybody from State Police have one

1 of your radios on July 13th?

2 A. I can't confirm or deny that. I have no
3 idea.

4 Q. I understand.

5 [REDACTED]: I think that's it. Give
6 us one moment, please.

7 (Discussion was held off the record.)

8 BY [REDACTED]:

9 Q. Just before our time is up, we've obviously
10 spent a fair amount of time this morning, but is
11 there anything that we haven't covered that you
12 would like us to know maybe that you've spoken
13 about in your other interviews? Any final
14 thoughts?

15 A. It's just unfortunate that we're here
16 today. I have an opinion about the whole thing,
17 but I'm not sure if it's worth sharing or not.

18 Q. If you would like to share, we would
19 welcome it but --

20 A. It just -- it just -- you know, I'm one of
21 these people, if it walks like a duck and talks
22 like a duck and looks like a duck, it's probably a
23 duck; right? Why would you elevate the Former
24 President of the United States like you did,
25 provide minimal -- you know, not secure all these

1 elevated positions?

2 And I find it hard to believe that this
3 20-year-old young man came up with this all by
4 himself.

5 [REDACTED]: I think -- we have nothing
6 else from the minority. We can go off the record.

7 (Discussion was held off the record.)

8 BY [REDACTED]:

9 Q. On Majority Exhibit 2, we've discussed
10 Page 4 and Page 5 with the different post
11 assignments and the map of those post assignments
12 locations.

13 Sir, if you don't mind, after post 13,
14 there are -- there are posts 14, 15, 16, 17, and 18
15 identified on the map. On Page 5, the post
16 assignments go to post 15. Looking at the map on
17 Page 4, can you help describe for us whether there
18 was a Butler County Sheriff's officer at any of
19 these posts.

20 If it's helpful, we can just look at the
21 map and go through the posts after 15.

22 A. I don't know what 16 and 17 were.

23 Q. Okay.

24 A. Unless 16 was the command post, because
25 it's by the -- the office.

1 Q. Do you know if any Sheriff's Office
2 official was at post 18 on Page 4?

3 A. 18?

4 Q. Yes. (Indicating).

5 A. No, we were not on -- we were not there.

6 Q. What about post 19?

7 A. No.

8 Q. Could those posts have been filled by State
9 Police?

10 A. I assume.

11 Q. Okay. What about for posts 15, 16, and 17?

12 A. We -- we had a post --

13 Q. Was that by the State Police?

14 A. We had a post at 15.

15 Q. Okay. And not 16, not 17?

16 A. (Shook head).

17 [REDACTED]: Okay. Thank you. We can go
18 off the record.

19 (Discussion was held off the record.)

20 [REDACTED]: We have no further
21 questions.

22 [REDACTED]: Sir, thank you for your time
23 today. That's all from us.
